

LIGHTING WITHOUT WIRES

WONDERFUL ELECTRICAL INVENTIONS BY TESLA AND EDISON.

The Introduction of a More Perfect Illuminant is Now Near at Hand.

NEW YORK, N. Y., May 26. — The Electrical Review in its last issue announced by authority that Nikola Tesla had perfected his vacuum tube system of electric lighting without wires, the possibilities of which he first brought to public notice about five years ago in a lecture before the American Institute of Electric Engineers. This light is warmer, more brilliant and more intense than the arc light and is produced with a much smaller amount of electrical energy. A laboratory photograph has been made by means of this light with an exposure of only two seconds. The details in the photograph are remarkably fine. Tesla states that his apparatus has been greatly simplified and he will soon have it ready for practical use.

Working on different lines, Thomas A. Edison has, according to the Electrical Review, to be published tomorrow, succeeded in developing a new kind of electric lamp or vacuum tube, by means of which the Roentgen X rays are turned into pure white light. Edison's new lamp is an ordinary Crookes tube, coated on the interior surface with crystals of a new fluorescing substance which he has discovered, some of tungstate of calcium. The X rays in passing through this coating of crystals are changed to light. Very little heat is generated, and nearly the whole of the electrical energy expended is transformed into light. The new lamp is used in place of a Crookes tube, with the ordinary X ray apparatus.

Mr. Edison believes that there are great possibilities in his discovery, and is now enthusiastically at work perfecting his apparatus into commercial form. He expects that before long he will so develop it that it may be used with high economy on an ordinary incandescent circuit. Electrical and scientific people are eagerly watching the outcome of the work of these two great inventors on this important subject. The Electrical Review says editorially: "We cannot hesitate to express our positive conviction that the introduction of a more perfect illuminant is near at hand."

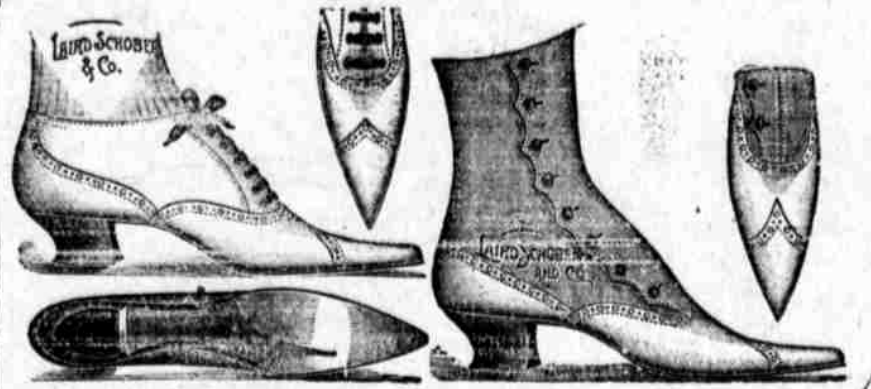

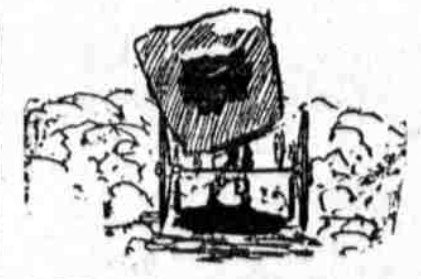

Circus tonight. The Club Hotel will be opened tomorrow. Senator Baldwin returned from Maui this morning. Lawyer Kinney and Dr. Rowat came over on the Hall. Hereafter Friday will be Sunday with the band boys. Mrs. Hickey is out on \$20 bail on a charge of profanity. A. Reynolds, who was formerly associated with C. B. Ripley, returned by the Coptic. T. C. Forsyth, the post-master of Lahaina, was a passenger by the Hall this morning. Judge Perry returned this morning from Wailuku, where he has been holding court. Some lovely and novel things in the line of hats at Mrs. Hanna's. Also temperance drinks. A. S. Wieland of the big San Francisco brewing firm of that name was a through passenger on the Coptic. The Cabinet, or rather what is left of it on the Hawaiian soil, was present at the Senate proceedings this morning. Some hoodlum stole Fred. Harrison's bicycle from the sidewalk in front of John Nott's store on King street today. A rehearsal of the Amateur Minstrels is called for this evening at 7:30 sharp, at the residence of Professor Berger. There will be a cricket match on the grounds of the Cricket Club on Thursday afternoon. The wickets will be pitched at 12:30. Lewis & Co., May & Co., H. E. McIntyre & Bro. and C. Hustace, leading grocery firms, will not open their doors on Thursday. The yacht Tolna, owned and navigated by the erratic Count and Countess Festetics, arrived at Yokohama from Sydney on May 24th. A brick vault is being constructed in the joint office of the Bureaus of Immigration and Registration for the preservation of records. Registrations up to 1 p.m. today were as follows: Japanese 725, foreigners 460, Chinese 380, Hawaiian 305, Portuguese 31, various 14. Total 1915. The halliards of the flagpole of the Judiciary building became blocked in the pulley this morning and a boy had to climb the pole and release them. Keliihanani petitions for probate of his wife's will, as devisee, legatee and executor named therein. There is real estate valued at \$200 and personal property at \$50. There is considerable rivalry in the matter of the program for the races on Thursday. There is only one official program and it will not be made public until tomorrow afternoon. The 500 tax suits which were to have been called in Judge de la Vergne's court yesterday afternoon did not come off until today. At 1:30 this afternoon the Judge commenced on the list. The iron ceiling of the Opera House is over-due, as the exterior and interior cornices were also late in arriving. It is not likely the building will be ready for opening before November. Only two days left in which to guess on the Piano at Wall, Nichols'. The candle will positively be lighted at 8 a. m. on the morning of the 11th and no coupon will be allowed after that date and hour. Judgments were rendered in the District Court yesterday afternoon in the cases of S. M. Ballou and C. W. Dickey against the Hawaiian Tramways Company for \$100 each and costs. An appeal in each case was taken to the higher court. C. W. Dickey vs. Hawaiian Tramways Co., appeal of defendant from judgment in the District Court, came before Judge Carter at Circuit Court Chambers this afternoon. Defendant was condemned below to pay \$100 damages for charging plaintiff two five-cent fares on the cars between Judd street and Punahou street.

The Rio Janeiro is liable to be in any time as the Coptic's people said she was only a little behind them. George Rodiek has been appointed assignee of Mata, bankrupt storekeeper at Wainoa, Kauai. Eleven vags of different nationalities are to be tried on the 10th. Two of them have put up \$100 cash bail. Judge de la Vergne sentenced seven Chinese gamblers to a fine of \$10 each and costs. Two others had their sentences suspended. Land Agent J. F. Brown has a notice in this issue stating that certain lots in Haleohii, North Kona, are open for application. The notice of the appointment of Worth C. Aiken as sub-agent of public lands for Maui, Molokai, Lanai and Kahoolawe appears in this issue. Ed. Gilsey was arrested this morning on a charge of battering his mother-in-law, Maria Williams. A Portuguese was also hauled in for beating a Chinese. Bruce Waring expects to leave on the Rio de Janeiro tomorrow. He will visit Roseburg, Oregon, where he has some ranch property, and Portland before returning.

LIFE AMONG BOERS.

Devotions are said at Daylight and Women Have a Way of Eating Alone.

The daily life of a Boer family is a simple one, says Captain White in the "Forum." At daylight all the members assemble in the main room—the kitchen and eating room, although most of the food is cooked in the open air—where the head of the family reads reverently a chapter or two from the Bible—generally the Old Testament—a simple, manly prayer is then offered, followed by the observance of an ancient Bible custom. A colored handmaid enters the room with a basin of water and a towel. The guest is first approached and invited to wash his hands and face and wipe them on the towel. The head of the family is next approached, and so on around the room until all have been included in the ceremony. This constitutes the day's ablutions of the family.

The morning meal consists of a dish of meat—deer or mutton, and sometimes beef—cut into large pieces. They all sit around the board, while the father says a long grace, and a stranger not familiar with their table manners is apt to be left in the lurch. Each man, for the women eat alone, selects a particular piece of meat that strikes his fancy, and as soon as the "amen" is spoken sticks his fork into the piece selected. It happens sometimes that two select the same piece; then, the quickest man gets the booty. Dry bread, sometimes butter, and strong black coffee complete the bill of fare, which may stand as a sample meal. It has been urged against the Boer that he is uncleanly, and this cannot be denied, but there is an excuse for this in the scarcity of water.

The military system adopted by the Boers is simple, and yet perfect in its way. Each district is commanded by a field cornet, whose duty it is in case of alarm to issue notices to all in the district. An alarm is generally brought in by some herdsman or native hunter, who has accidentally run upon the enemy, or upon some rumor of his approach. Mounted men at top speed are instantly dispatched to all quarters of the district, and in a short time every family, with household gear and herds, are trekking as quietly as possible to the district town in which is situated the laager. It takes but a comparatively short time for every white man, woman and child to be safely ensconced. The defense attended to, riders are dispatched to meet the foe and to bring news of his approach. Messengers are spurred to the capital to alarm the Government, and within a few hours thousands of the finest shots and best equipped horsemen in the world have assembled in defense of their fatherland. The Boers seldom attack the foe; their general plan is, as in the late Jameson raid, to hover around until a convenient piece of country is found, when, trusting to their prowess as shots and to the excellence of their horses to keep out of harm's way, they pour a deluge of lead on the foe from a long distance.

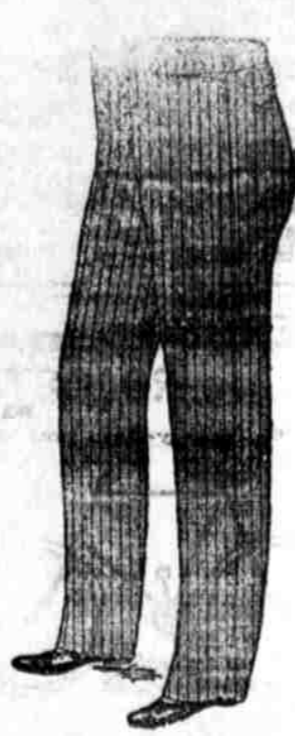

THE TRAMWAYS COMPANY.

A Correspondent Raises a Novel Point for Consideration.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—Judgments have already been entered against the Hawaiian Tramways Company in three cases for \$100 damages and costs in the District Court. If these judgments are confirmed by the Supreme Court, and there seems little doubt that they will be, every person who has been overcharged during the last six months has the right to sue the company for a similar amount. All that is necessary to do, unless the writer is badly mistaken, will be to refuse payment of the overcharge until the driver enforces it, and then pay under protest in the presence of one or more reliable witnesses. The action will lie any time in six months after. Who wants to make \$100?

Money Sent to Japan.

The Japan Herald gives the following item:

From the figures published in the annual report of the Japanese Consul-General at Honolulu, it would seem that a very fair percentage of the wealth of the Hawaiian Islands finds its way to this country every year. It seems from the reports in question that there were 5,436 Japanese coolies taken thither under contract last year, while 11,072 completed their contracted terms. 10,202 coolies were employed in 36 sugar factories and 1,625 on sugar plantations. The amounts transmitted to Japan totalled nearly four hundred thousand dollars, besides one hundred thousand deposited in the banks. 29,069 contract coolies have been landed in 11 years, 17,495 of these remain in the islands; during the same period 35,734 other Japanese have arrived, and 23,943 remain in the islands.

Smoked Out a Juror.

Smoking out an obstinate juror is a new way of arriving at a verdict which was successfully tried by eleven good men and true in Hartford, Conn., a few days ago, according to the Times. The obstinate juror stood out for a long time, and his will was only conquered when he became physically prostrated by the volumes of smoke that filled the jury-room from the cigars, pipes and cigarettes of the eleven other jurymen.

Japanese Digitalaries.

Among the through passengers on the Coptic are His Excellency F. Hoshi, Japanese Minister to the United States, who with his wife and child is on his way to Washington; Kakichi Sonada, president of the Yokohama Specie Bank, and S. Hayakawa, private Secretary of the Japanese Finance Department. The two latter are on their way to London.

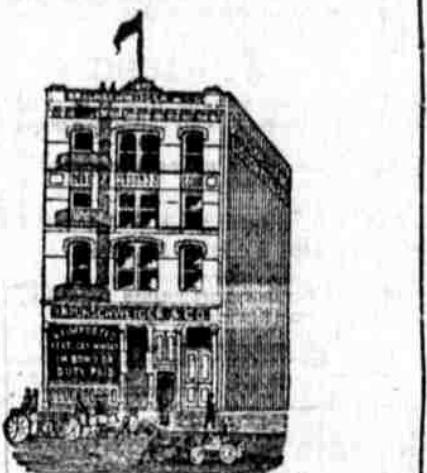
