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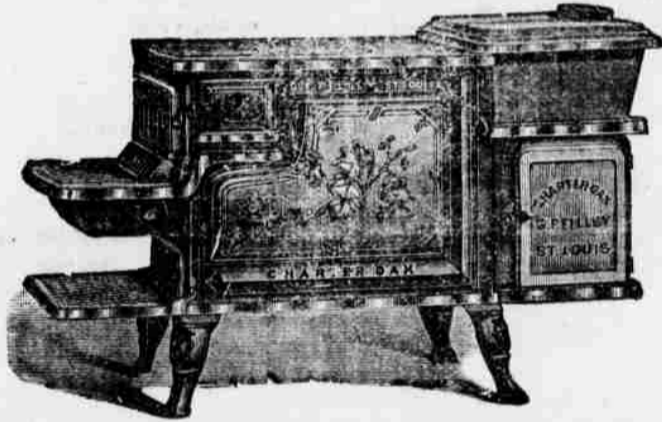

NEMO TO HOMO.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—

Homo appears to doubt the genu-
ineness of the opinion of Abraham
Lincoln on the subject of prohibition,
saying: "The quotation may be all
right, but I do not remember to have
met with it before, and it occurs to
me that Nemo may possibly be de-
ceived or mistaken." Are you sure,
Homo, that you have read everything
that Lincoln has written or said dur-
ing his lifetime? I think that if you
have read so much of Lincoln as you
would have the public believe, you
would see Lincoln's true character
in every word uttered by him that I
quoted in the BULLETIN of Oct. 23.
Why, man, it is just what honest old
Abe would say, if approached upon
anything that interfered with the
personal rights of man, as prohibi-
tion does. But you wish to know
the source of my information. Here
it is: I received it, with plenty of
the same kind, from the editor of
the South-West, a generous, whole-
souled, sturdy fighter for the rights
of humanity. Is it not a glorious
cause, Homo? Answer me truly. As
the editor of the BULLETIN begins to
grow about so many long articles
(and justly so), I will make this
short by giving only one article on
the same subject of prohibition. It
is from ex-Governor Andrews, the
old war governor of Massachusetts:
"Artificial offenses and meddle-
some legislation, and that felt to be
unjust, are, indeed, causes of crime
of which the philosophical educator
cannot afford to be ignorant. Arti-
ficial offenses put a large class of
people, and often that of the least
discriminating and instructed, into
needless antagonism with the law.
Confounding of moral distinctions
on the side of the law begets a cor-
responding confusion in the mind of
the citizen. If the law treats the
sale of a mug of beer or sweet cider
as of like delinquency with the crime
of larceny, how long will it take the
humble and unlearned to conclude
that the law is either a sham un-
worthy of veneration, or else a jump
to the converse of the first proposi-
tion, and vote larceny of an article
to be no worse than the selling of the
beer or the cider? So, therefore,
every statute denouncing the penalti-
es of the criminal law against men
in violation of the commonly received
sense of justice concerning human
relation in the civil state, becomes,
by reason of that very excess, a
generator of evil." NEMO.

THE EWA MILL.

Account of the Trip to See the Plant.

A party of gentlemen more or less interested in the sugar industry of the islands, through invitations by Mr. J. N. S. Williams, manager of the Union Iron Works, paid a visit of inspection to the Ewa plantation Saturday afternoon. A first-class Pullman car, headed by the iron horse "Kaala," left the railway station in Honolulu at 9:50 o'clock, the following gentlemen being seated in the car: Wm. G. Irwin, C. M. Cooke, W. O. Smith, Jona. Austin, F. M. Swamy, E. W. Holdsworth, Jos. Marsden, F. A. Schaefer, Senhor A. de Souza Canavarro, J. O. Carter, H. Waterhouse, W. A. Bowen, Captain H. W. Mist, B. F. Dillingham, Thos. May, W. F. Frear, Robt. More, T. E. Evans, H. M. Whitney, H. Klengel and the representative of the BULLETIN. A stop was made at the Moanalu station, when Hon. S. M. Damon joined the party.

The train was run past Pearl City to a point where an artificial fish pond is being dug. After a brief stay of a few minutes the train was run back to the main track and the trip to the great new sugar estate was resumed. Ewa plantation was reached in a little over an hour after leaving Honolulu and acres and acres of as fine cane as one could wish to see greeted the view.

The train stopped near the mill and all hands alighted and passed through the plantation store into the building which is a monster in itself, and was constructed entirely of corrugated iron on the outer side, the rafters and other parts of course being of wood. Entering the main door the first things that catch the eye are 16 centrifugals on an elevated platform, and above these centrifugals are two monster vacuum pans, through which the sugar passes to undergo the drying process. The cane slicers are on the mauka side of the building. They were given a run and surprised all by their speed, doing no less than 240 revolutions a minute. Passing through these cane cutters the cane is carried on an inclined traveler into the upper story, where there are 28 diffusion battery cells. After undergoing the diffusion process the chips are let out at the bottom to a moving platform and are carried to the maceration rollers. The maceration rollers were in motion on the occasion and worked satisfactorily.

Messrs. Kopke and Hughes, engineers, attended to those inquisitively inclined and were very accommodating. Messrs. J. N. S. Williams and Robert More, manager and superintendent of the Union Iron Works, also gave descriptions of the workings of the different machinery. On the mauka side of the building is the cooling room, which is partly finished and still in the hands of the workmen. The chimney, which is of brick, is on the seaward side and stands 113 feet. In the construction of the mill economy in the different processes has been in view. For instance, after all the sugar juice is taken out by the diffusion process, a watery liquid is left to run out through pipes as an irrigating fertilizer.

Only a part of the mill was finished, but it was sufficient to give an idea of its capabilities. After going through the mill a lunch of salads, sandwiches and liquids was had in the dining room, where the party were attentively served by Messrs. More and Hughes. The start for home was made shortly after noon, and the town station was reached about 1:30 o'clock. On alighting Mr. J. N. S. Williams was congratulated on his having brought home industry to such a high standard, the Union Iron Works having constructed every piece of machinery with the exception of the multiple effects and a few other articles. It is believed the mill will commence grinding in January.

OPIUM IN POSSESSION.

Ah Keao and Ah Look were disturbed on Saturday last while in the act of enjoying a smoke. There was no objection, of course, to the men's smoking, but for the fact they were using a drug known as opium. They were arraigned before the Police Justice to-day for having opium unlawfully in possession. It transpired during the trial that Ah Keao was deep in the mire and Ah Look near it. The former was fined \$100 and the latter \$50.

THE WORLD'S FAIR.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—
I notice in "World's Fair Notes" the following in regard to the Brazilian exhibit at the great fair:
A report of the work done by the Latin-American Bureau up to date shows that 17 of the 18 American republics and all of the colonies that have been visited by World's Fair agents have accepted the invitation to participate in the exposition and are actively preparing for proper representation. Aside from Mexico, for whose appropriation of \$750,000 the Latin-American Bureau claims credit, the appropriations made by American republics are as follows:
"The above is a pointer as to what other tropical and semi-tropical countries propose to do. They have all appropriated from \$20,000 to \$500,000, the total appropriations of the 17 Latin-American republics being over two million dollars. I know that these Islands ought to be in a position to appropriate as much as Costa Rica, and that little Republic proposes to spend \$50,000 in a proper exhibit of its industries and manufactures. I did not notice any definite action in this matter on the part of our planters last week and think it was a mistake.
Our iron works companies could also profit by an exhibit (if only of models) of their improved appliances for making sugar, as it is a well-known fact that the yield of sugar per ton of cane is larger here than in any sugar-growing country in the world, and this is largely due to our improved machinery for extracting it. Our minor industries could be aptly reproduced and the manner in which "poi" is grown would alone be a big advertisement to the Islands. There is one feature of the coming exposition that we should not lose sight of. Exhibits will be made by a number of countries of just such products as we are entering into the cultivation of. It would be money well spent if the Government would delegate some qualified person to obtain such information on the same as would be of value to us and publish it for the benefit of the community at large. We can't all go to the "World's Fair," and this would be a direct realization from any government appropriation that may be made. HAWAII.

AN AMERICAN DISSENT.
EDITOR BULLETIN:—
I wonder if His Excellency J. L. Stevens, United States Minister Plenipotentiary and Envoy Extraordinary, was sent here by the United States Government to mount the rostrum and champion the cause of the missionary; it would appear so. I quote the following from the Minister's speech in the BULLETIN of Oct. 21: "The missionary force—no sensible, thoughtful, person will be alarmed or misled by the senseless cry against it. I would not ask a better boon to Hawaii than that the missionary influences here might be twice as strong as they are." If the Minister thinks that the so-called missionary of the present day can launch himself into the labyrinthine cess-pools of machine politics (as they do here), and then command the respect that a true missionary should, he is sadly mistaken; and no amount of gush from any quarter will help his case whatever. But let the earnest missionary enter into the works of the Master in Hawaii, in the same true spirit as Dr. Livingstone and John Howard did; then he can rest assured that he will receive from one and all due reverence and credit, for his Christian precepts. AGRICULTURAL SCHOOLS.

A sugar school has been established in New Orleans under the auspices of the State and the Louisiana Agricultural and Scientific Association. The object is to offer facilities to take a course in the culture of cane and in the manufacture of sugar from it. It has a plantation attached with a small sugar house.
