The Alameda left Sydney January 20th, or before the new schedule for the Australian mail service had been completed at San Francisco. This accounts for her leaving Sydney under the old time table. The Mariposa will be the first vessel leaving Sydney and the Monowai from San Francisco under the new schedule. The latter ought to be here on Thursday next, the 12th.

It seems that General Booth has secured the £100,000 or \$500,000, which he estimated would be necessary to commence his great scheme of relieving the 125,000 homeless and starving poor of London. This is an enormous sum for one man to raise and handle for any object whatever, and evidently shows that people of England have confidence in the man, in his ability and in his plan to relieve the poor by providing employment for them. It demonstrates more than that—that the contributors believe the plan is practicable, notwithstanding the vigorous attacks which have been made on it by Huxley, Loch and others. If with £100,000, which is one tenth of what he called for, he demonstrates that he can provide employment and homes for 12,500 of the present poor of London, or one-tenth of the total number the chances are that he will be furnished with the remaining £900,000.

Testimonial to Captain Morse.

The outgoing mail steamer Alameda arrived here from Sydney en route for San Francisco at 2:30 P. M. yesterday afternoon after a pleasant and fast trip across. Prior to the vessel's departure from Sydney, her popular commander, Captain H. G. Morse, was entertained by a large number of his friends at a banquet, when, in the midst of a very representative gathering, some ladies who had experienced the genial skipper's courtesy on shipboard, presented him with a hassock beautifully worked in a design emblematic of the flags of all nations. After a suitable acknowledgment by Captain Morse, a very pleasant evening was spent in mirth and melody.—[Auckland Herald Jan. 26th.]

THE HILO RECORD.

Items of Interest—Fatal Accident—The Volcano—Wedding Anniversary, Etc.

WILL THERE BE A NEW CABINET?

This is the question in everybody's mouth. We suppose there will be a new one, but if there is we hope it will be either all of the present one, or else none of them. It seems to us to be impolitic to make any change at present, but give those now in the chance to show themselves, up to the time of calling a new Legislature. They have commenced, and why not let them carry out their plans, and let us see what kind of stuff they are made of.

A case from Hanakua has been brought to the notice of the Sheriff, where a man was said to have fallen off his horse and died, while in the hands of the police of that district. From what we learn, there is cause for suspicion that he died from injuries received at the hands of one of the luns on the Kanihaele Plantation the night before. This is only report, and the matter is being investigated by the Deputy Sheriff there. The coroner's jury, we hear, brought in a verdict "of death at the hands of some one unknown." We shall await further developments in the case.

FROM THE VOLCANO.

On Friday last the Volcano reflection was most brilliant, as seen from town, and from a visitor who was there that evening, we learn that the Old Halemaumau was intensely active all that night, and that several large streams of lava flowed from the old lakes and reached almost to the eastern bank, underneath the bluff on which the Volcano House stands. Now is a good time to visit it, as it is very active all the time, and every once in a while puts on an extra spurt.

We see the Kinan advertises that she will not take any freight for Laupahoehoe. No more six hour stops there. A wedding anniversary (the first) brought a large number of the friends together at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Torry, and a most delightful season was spent there by all. The (yearling's) were again married by the Rev. Mr. Westervelt, and amid much fun and laughter they again promised to stick to one another through thick and thin. We wish them many more returns of the happy day.

During the past week our Hilo weather has just simply been perfect. Bright sunny days and cool refreshing nights. We claim that taking the months around, that Hilo has the most delightful climate, of any place on these Islands, where almost any place is perfect.

Quite a large lot of opium was captured by friend Stuppelbeen during the last week at Papaikon. The Chinaman loaned the Government \$250 taking no note therefor. Hilo, Feb. 5.

THE JORAN SISTERS.

Interesting Extracts From a Letter as to the Doings of these Talented Girls.

By the last mail Mr. Wray Taylor received a letter from Mrs. Joran, mother of the talented artists Lulu, Pauline and Elise Joran, dated Berlin, Germany, December 26th, 1890. The many friends of the young ladies in this city will no doubt read with much interest the following extracts from the letter:

"We are much delighted to receive Honolulu papers, to read the news of the islands, and really become quite homesick hearing of all the familiar names and places; for I may as well say in the first place that of all the beautiful spots we have visited since leaving them, none can compare with that charming little paradise. Our friends the Hagers let us have papers. Mr. Hager entertained us yesterday at a Christmas dinner. Since writing you last, we have been on a great tramp, an extensive tour through Mexico, Yucatan and Cuba, then to New York. From thence here, some six months ago. The whole tour was very successful, the girls reaping laurels everywhere; Pauline with her violin especially creating a furor. In New York it was our privilege to meet and hear of one very acquainted with that great pianist Eugen D'Albert. He heard all the girls play, and expressed himself in a letter to a mutual friend as 'surprised at their talent, which he found the best he had heard in America.' He urged our coming to Europe, and offered to take entire charge of the musical education of Elise and to assist the others by introductions, etc. He has kept his word, and Elise has been for some time studying with him. When I tell you that he only has two pupils, a sister of the celebrated Carl Heyman of Frankfurt, his friend and fellow student, and Elise Joran, and that he persistently refuses all applications from people of all countries, you will appreciate the full value of a distinction and honor as we do. D'Albert was much pleased with Elise's technique, which he says is scarcely to be improved; also her Bach playing is quite a specialty with her, he says, and has given her the forty-eight preludes and fugues to study in succession, as well as Beethoven, Chopin and some of the most difficult compositions of Liszt. He predicts that in two years she will make a European reputation. I feel a little personal pride in this also, as Elise never had a lesson in her life from anyone but myself until she took her first with D'Albert, who is the most celebrated, and really the greatest artist in Europe. Few would imagine what a wonder-

ful teacher he is; not only does he exact the greatest precision and observance of the composer's intentions, but he is very lavish with his own playing, thus giving his privileged hearer the benefit of his great interpretations. It is to be hoped that some day he will give the world of students the benefit of his instruction; at present, however, it would interfere with his greater work of composing and playing. He has a nature the gentlest and a heart the kindest in the world.

Pauline is very happy in the choice of teachers made for her; she is studying the violin with Emile Sauret with whom she is making wonderful progress. These great artists are so encouraging, having accomplished so much so easily themselves, they do not make the mountains impassable for others. The first time he heard Pauline play he said, "my child, you have a great career before you, at once you must prepare for it." So he set her at work upon the great compositions for the violin and believes that she will soon be ready to play both here and London, where he is shortly to go as director of the Royal Academy.

FROM THE SOUTH SEAS.

Change of the New Zealand Ministry—Samoa.

By the S. S. Alameda dates from Auckland to the 26th of January have been received:

A change has taken place in the New Zealand government. The Atkinson ministry having been unexpectedly defeated in the organization of the newly-elected legislature, by a vote of 36 opposition to 23, they resigned on the 24th, and on the 26th the following new ministry was announced:

Mr. Balance, Premier and Leader in the House.
Mr. Buckley, Attorney-General.
John McKenzie, Agriculture and Lands.
Mr. Seddon, Mines and Public Works.
W. P. Reeves, Education and Justice.

Mr. Ward, no portfolio.

The new premier has had fourteen years experience in public life, and has held portfolios in three or four ministries. The other members are new men. According to the local papers the new government differs very little in politics from the preceding, and the party seems to have come into power simply because the people desired a change. The Atkinson administration retained leaving a balance of \$780,000 in the colonial treasury—the largest surplus derived from domestic receipts that any ministry has ever been able to hand over to its successors in that colony.

"Pinkeye" has broken out in Sydney, and many horses have become affected with the disease and died. At latest date the City Tramways Co. had 130 horses laid up with it.

The exports from New Zealand are now reported to £10,000,000 or \$50,000,000 annually. Population 600,000. The imports for 1890 were £5,300,000.

Mr. John White, the well-known Maori scholar and author of "The Ancient History of the Maoris," died suddenly January 12 in Auckland.

Via Sydney the cable reports that Parnell and O'Brien visit America in February, and Dillon will succeed to the leadership of the Irish party in Parliament.

The new fleet of Australian cruisers will leave England in March for Australia. After rendezvousing at King George's Sound, they will proceed to their various stations.

FROM SAMOA.

The American and British residents observed the old custom of making New Year's calls. They started out in a body, and called upon the Chief Justice, the different consulates, and other officers and residents of note.

Upon the return of the German flagship Leipzig to the harbor from Pago Pago, a large ball was given in honor of the Admiral.

On December 30th Tamasese paid his first visit to Apia since the war. He was accompanied by seventy or eighty followers. His object in making the visit was to consult Dr. Funk in regard to his physical condition, having been ailing for some time. The King was asked to give the key of the government house to Mulinu to accommodate Tamasese. This he refused to do, stating there were plenty native houses in the locality capable of accommodating Tamasese if he intended remaining. On the same night representatives of the three powers held a consultation and agreed that it would be unwise for Tamasese and his large following to remain in Apia, and it is thought they requested him to go. Tamasese went the same evening on his way to Savaii.

Chief Justice Cederkrantz arrived at Samoa December 30th. Much anxiety was felt before his arrival. Strangers unacquainted with the peculiar circumstances could form no idea of the delicate position of affairs in Samoa—trembling in the balance between peace and insurrection—which the arrival of the Chief Justice could set aright. The King expressed great pleasure at his arrival.

A Samoan while coasting in his canoe was driven by wind along the coast of the Mulihana plantation. He was taken in by a black boy whom he knew. When the black

boys surrounded the Samoan to kill him, the black friend objected, but gave in when he found his own life in jeopardy. The Samoan was then killed and eaten, the cannibals afterwards buried the head and bones in a taro patch.—[Samoa Times.]

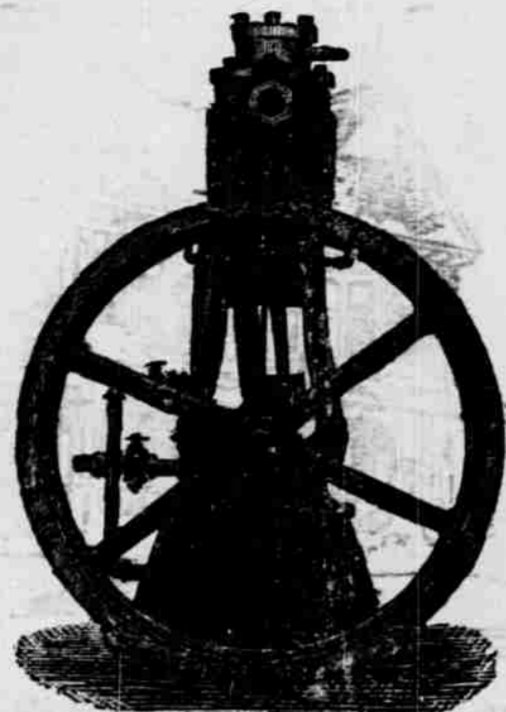

CURIOUS SIGNALS.

Some Particular Marks Which the Initiated Understand.

The private signals of ships often create curiosity which cannot always be satisfied. Each line has some peculiar mark which is known as the house flag and which serves for identification where other signals might fail. One of the most curious of these signals is that of the British steamship Dunmore Head of Belfast, Ireland, now loading at Canton for that port. It is the representation of a bloody hand on each side of the funnel and in the center of a white diamond in a blue flag flying from the mainmast. Below the wrist are elongated marks of crimson, representing dripping blood. It is a left hand, as is shown by the thumb being forward on the port side and aft on the starboard side of the funnel.

This gory symbol has a meaning. It is the coat-of-arms of the province of Ulster, Ireland, which derived it from the crest of the O'Neils, who were once the royal family of that kingdom. The whole is based upon a tradition which the crew of the Dunmore Head take pleasure in relating. Two sons of the King of Ulster were foraging in Scotland when the death of their father was heard. The two agreed to row across the channel in their primitive canoes, and the first to touch land was to be King, to succeed the father. When nearing the shore one of the brothers was about to lose the race, when he drew his sword and placing his left hand on the gunwale of his boat, chopped it off, and, picking it up, threw it ashore. He became King, and the bloody hand became the crest of the family. In its descent through ages it has, in these utilitarian times, served to decorate the funnel of a fleet of the finest freight steamships afloat. The Dunmore Head belongs to the Ulster Steamship Company. The line is better known as the Head Line, as all the vessels are named after headlands in the maritime counties of Ulster. They are the Bengore Head, Teelin Head, Innishowen Head, Horn Head, Black Head, Fair Head, White Head, Dunmore Head. The Ramore Head, now building is to carry 6,000 tons of cargo. On all these steamships the officers wear the sanguinary hand on their caps. The plates and cups and dishes and table linen are likewise emblazoned. In fact, the bloody hand of Ulster is prominent everywhere.—Baltimore Sun.
