We desire to meet some inquiry in respect to our Government loan. We will not at this time present an exact financial statement, but give a few figures for general information.

The Loan Act, approved October 15, 1886, authorized His Majesty's Government to borrow \$2,000,000. Of this amount \$500,000 was taken up in Honolulu and \$1,500,000, or rather \$300,000, were to be negotiated in London; \$200,000, or say \$1,000,000, was offered on the money market of this great financial center, and more than ten times the amount was speedily subscribed for.

There yet remains \$500,000 to be placed upon the market in case the Government is prepared to carry out enterprises of internal improvement contemplated in the Loan Act.

FOURTH OF JULY IN HONOLULU.

The Hawaiian people, ever since they have become a nation, and recognized by the great American Republic, have celebrated the anniversary of American Independence on the 4th of July as warmly and enthusiastically as if it were a much-cherished native national holiday; and they will hear with regret that there are Americans who want to celebrate in Hawaii this much honored holiday in a way to "accentuate" the opposition of American residents to the Hawaiian Government.

At the meeting on the 9th inst. to provide for the celebration of the Fourth of July, a strong desire was expressed to emphasize the principles of American government, "of the people, by the people, and for the people," at this time when all participation by the people in the Government of Hawaii has been eliminated, and the entire power has been concentrated in the hands of the King, whose decrees the corruptly elected Legislatures have become merely passive instruments to register.

By the Government paper of this morning's issue, it appears that the committee at arrangements have accepted the free use of the refreshment hall of Mr. Premier Gibson for the evening festivities.

cated in Honolulu, says that the celebration on July 4th is to be held for the purpose of accentuating "American opposition" to the course of the present Administration of the Hawaiian Government; claiming the right to be their spokesman from the fact that he has contributed to the fund. Now, Sir, the fact that he has contributed \$10 (an enormous sum, no doubt, in his eyes) does not give him any right to use the plural in that communication. I have heard somewhere a remark that there were only three persons entitled to use that pronoun in their addresses, etc., and they were: First, Royalty; second, an editor; and third, a person troubled with that very unpleasant disease—worms. I earnestly protest, as an American, against any endeavor to prostitute that National American Day and its observance to any such purpose.

With regard to the refreshment hall proposed to be used by the committee: The Committee on the Ball decided to have it in the Music Hall, and as there was no convenient place on the premises for refreshments, they cast about to supply the deficiency, and in all innocence hit upon the building in the rear of the Hall, as especially adapted for the purpose and secured it. And immediately "We, S. E. Bishop" and others, whom no doubt he does represent, proceeded to bulldoze the committee, threatening to withdraw their subscriptions if it was used. Why? Because by chance it happened to be the property of Mr. W. M. Gibson. As I do not care to be a party to the degradation of a day in the observance of which I have always taken the greatest pride, I have most respectfully resigned from the Committee. C. H. THE CUSTOMS CASE.

Judgment for Defendants—Appeal Noted. Police Justice Dayton delivered judgment yesterday in the replevin case of J. T. Waterhouse vs. A. S. Cleghorn and George Markham. After a careful examination of the evidence he found the facts to be that the Australia arrived Tuesday, May 31st; the suit was commenced and service made the following day; the cartridges were landed on Tuesday and the rifles on Friday; Markham testified to having delivered the goods to the Marshal on Friday; the instructions to the officers to be more particular, etc., were given by the Collector General on May 27th, and inasmuch as the two letters from the Finance Department had not been received when those instructions were given, they could not have any force in this case.

It did not appear that any portion of the goods in this invoice were sent to the Custom House, though the Collector General had the power to order one or more there for examination, and his Honor was of opinion that if the Collector General had ordered the two packages to the Custom House for examination he would have been within the statute; but if he detained them an unreasonable length of time it would be in order to sue under a writ of replevin, and to put in a claim for damages for unlawful detention. His Honor was of opinion that the suit had been prematurely brought, and he therefore gave a verdict for defendants.

The First Baby Born in Mid-Ocean Under the Hawaiian Flag.

On the 22d day of August, 1886, there was born on board the Hawaiian bark Kalakaua, between Valparaiso and Honolulu, a daughter to the wife of Captain Armstrong, of the above vessel. It was the first child born in mid-ocean under the Hawaiian flag, and the event has been noticed by His Majesty presenting the little girl with a silver mug bearing the following inscription:

Compliments of H. M. KALAKAUA I to Milina Andalusia Armstrong, Honolulu, Oahu, July 17, 1887, Hawaiian Islands.

Grand Concert.

As will be seen in another column, a grand concert will be given in the Hawaiian Opera House Saturday evening, July 24, by the Iolani Club, for the benefit of the Kaumakapili Church building fund. It will be under the patronage of His Majesty the King. The programme is an excellent one, and will no doubt attract a crowded audience, as the object is a worthy one. One important feature will be two Hawaiian tableaux to be performed in the ancient costumes of the country.

An Interesting Ceremony.

Nearly forty of the pupils from the Sacred Heart Convent school and St. Louis College partook of their first communion at the Roman Catholic Cathedral yesterday morning. Quite a large congregation was present. The musical part of the service was well sung by the older pupils of the convent school. The Bishop of Oiba celebrated, and delivered a short address to the youthful communicants. The St. Louis College band played as the people left the Church.

QUEEN KAPIOLANI IN BOSTON.

The Royal Visitors' Fifth Day in the City.

The People's Reception to the Hawaiian Queen.

Mechanics' Building Crowded With Humanity—An Occasion Participated in by Thousands—The Decorations.

[From Boston Exchanges, May 18th.]

Boston has rarely seen a bigger gathering than that which greeted Queen Kapiolani and the Royal party at the Mechanics' Building last evening. It seemed as if half the people of this good old city had turned out to give the distinguished visitors a welcome such as they had never experienced before. For an hour before the arrival of the Royal party crowds flocked to the building, some in carriages, but more on foot, and joined the throng slowly disappearing beneath the covered walk.

THE PRESENTATION.

As soon as the Royal party and distinguished guests had seated themselves, the Aids retired and shortly afterward escorted the Reception Committee to the stage and formally presented them to the party. Colonel Matthews stood beside the Queen and acted as master of ceremonies and introducer. Two by two the committee filed by, every man giving a nod of recognition to the smiling Queen and Princess.

THE LONG PROCESSION.

Began to move. With a rush and a jam, the 10,000 people formed in line, and guided and hurried along by the many officers and aids, mounted the platform on the right, nodded at the Royalty, which nodded in return, and hastened off to give way to the others. Among the many who paid their respects to the Queen were Andreas Blume, Newton Talbot, George H. Miner, Representative J. E. Fitzgerald, City Auditor Dodge, Police Commissioner, Whiting, C. F. Haldeman, Gen. Yarrar, H. A. Pemberton, Major and Mrs. Follett, Mr. and Mrs. George Hobbs, Max Backert, Fannie Kellogg, Senators Dwyer, Jordan and Glines, and Mr. William H. Pardon.

THE RECEPTION.

It had been announced that the reception would begin at 8 p. m., but not until about fifteen minutes later did the Royal party leave the Parker House. Arrived at the Mechanics' Building, they entered it at the northern door, just inside of which the motto "Aloha Oe," backed by the Hawaiian flag, gave a reminder of the land they had temporarily left. The Royal party were then ushered in a room specially set aside for their use. In this room, too, the decorator, Col. Wm. Beals, and the florist, Mr. T. F. Galvin, had been at work, and the result was seen in walls decorated with flags and all available nooks and corners filled with tropical and other plants. Here Mayor and Mrs. O'Brien gave the visitors a cordial greeting. After a rest of a few minutes the procession for the stage started at 8:35 p. m., Lieutenant Colonel Thomas R. Matthews, Chief Marshal, and Colonel Augustus N. Sampson, Chief Aid, and two divisions of 25 Aids each, led. Then came Queen Kapiolani, Princess Liliuokalani, Mayor and Mrs. O'Brien, Councilman Whall, Col. Boyd, Consul Bond and other members of the Royal and municipal parties. Two divisions of Aids brought up in the rear. The march was by a roped enclosure to the stage, where the Aids were drawn up on either side of the platform, and the guests of the evening took their seats and gazed down upon the

SEA OF HEADS.

Before them, Baldwin's Cadet Band meanwhile playing the souvenir march, "Aloha Oe," which was composed and arranged by Mr. J. T. Baldwin, and in which was incorporated the popular song, "Aloha Oe," by the Princess Liliuokalani. The gallery, extending round three sides of the hall, was completely packed, and all available space on the extensive floor was occupied. How many people were present could hardly be estimated. Some minutes before the arrival of the Royal party, Lieutenant

Colonel Matthews had hazarded a guess that 10,000 people were in the building, but the number had gradually grown and space was each minute becoming more valuable.

THE DISTINGUISHED PARTY.

Was seated as follows, from right to left: Commodore Beckley, Mrs. Gorham D. Gilman, Consul Bond, Mrs. Beckley, Col. Boyd, Queen Kapiolani, Mayor O'Brien, Princess Liliuokalani, Councilman Fowler, Mrs. O'Brien, General N. P. Banks. The Queen wore a handsome black silk dress made demi-train, with an entire front of jet, and jet ornaments on the side draperies. Costly black lace finished the neck and sleeves and white gloves were worn. For ornaments she wore on her left breast the handsome diamond Star of the Order of Kamehameha, "the lonely one," and a diamond ring outside the glove; bracelets, necklace and ear-drops were of

RARE HAWAIIAN SHELLS.

And a small "poni" or roll of rare white feathers lay in her hair. In her hand she carried a bouquet of flowers which had been sent her anonymously. "In memory of Mr. Elisha H. Allen," the card said. This gentleman was Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Hawaii for many years, and after that His Majesty's Minister to Washington, where he died not many years since. The Queen had received another bouquet for the evening of magnificent jaquemint roses, but she carried the other in preference, saying that those who sent it might be present at the reception and feel hurt if she did not show her appreciation of the man and the gift.

THE PRINCESS LOOKED SIMPLY MAGNIFICENT.

In a black velvet gown made with a long train and cut square neck, with no sleeves. The front was heavily trimmed with dull jet, and bands of the same passed down the back side seams of the bodice. Her handsome neck and arms were bare, and short black gloves with a black gauze fan completed the costume. She wore no ornaments save a wreath of pink and purple hyacinths about the edge of the neck, and the shell comb that held the knot of her wavy hair in place.

THE PRINCESS LOOKED SIMPLY MAGNIFICENT.

Mrs. Beckley wore a gown of soft black lace, with long tan-colored gloves, with a front of silver brocade, from which the side panels were turned back in revers faced with point lace. Her ornaments were diamonds at her throat and in her hair.

In the evening from 8 to 10 o'clock Major J. H. Wodehouse, H. B. M.'s Commissioner and Consul General, will hold an official reception at his residence, Emma street. The front of the house and grounds will be brilliantly illuminated for the occasion. There will also be a display of fireworks at Emma Square.

Supreme Court.

AT CHAMBERS—BEFORE BICKERTON, J. THURSDAY, June 16th. In re. bankruptcy of Daniel Lyons. Motion to assign property to bankrupt under section 14, chapter 31, of the Acts of 1884. Mr. V. V. Ashford filed an appraisal of the bankrupt's household furniture, showing a value of \$154. On reading the petition and the assignee's assent thereto, the Court orders that it is granted, conditional upon the bankrupt's paying and satisfying all costs, including the reasonable charges of the assignees; to be paid before application for discharge, the property to be held in trust for the bankrupt and his family, and not to be in any way alienated or disposed of. Mr. V. V. Ashford for bankrupt; Hon. W. C. Parke, one of the assignees, in person.

FRIDAY, June 17th. In re. bankruptcy of Jacob Lyons. Petition for discharge. Affidavit will be given by the Clerk of having mailed notices to creditors are found in due form.

The Court, on learning the contents of the petition, asks if there is anyone opposed to its being granted.

Mr. Glade states that as a member of the firm of H. Hackfeld & Co., he appears to oppose the discharge of the bankrupt, who owes his firm an account of \$19, upon which they have received a dividend of 11 per cent. from the assignees; that he is informed and believes that the bankrupt, as an auctioneer, must have had bondsmen, one of whom he is informed is Mr. Allen Herbert, from whom they now demand amount in full of their claim.

The Court informs Mr. Glade that his claim as stated is not a matter of this hearing.

The bankrupt subscribes to the usual oath on discharge.

Mr. Parke states he represents 26 California and one London, England, claims; that he has had correspondence with them explaining all his proceedings in the matter; that he has sent them copies of his final accounts, has remitted them their dividends, and everything seems satisfactory.

The Court orders that the bankrupt is discharged from the debts, and that it will sign an order to that effect on presentation of it.

The order is presented by the bankrupt and receives the signature of the Justice.

POLICE COURT.

BEFORE POLICE JUSTICE DAYTON. FRIDAY, June 17th. Kanakakoi and Frank Roche each forfeited \$6 for drunkenness.

Ah Tuck, Ah Hin, Ah Ku, Ah Cheang and Ah Tuck, charged with gaming on the 16th inst., pleaded not guilty. The two first and two last named were found guilty as charged, and were each sentenced to a fine of \$10, eight hours' imprisonment and \$1 costs. Ah Hin was found guilty of being present where gaming was being carried on, and was fined \$10 and \$1 costs.

CIVIL CASES. G. H. Luce, tax collector, vs Ah Ting. Assumpsit for \$59, tax for the years 1855 and 1856. Plea of general issue. Judgment for amount claimed with \$10 costs. The same vs Wainulu. Assumpsit for \$27 75 taxes. Settled out of Court.

C. L. Brito vs. P. Garcia. Assumpsit for \$13 25. Mr. Magoon, for defendant, applied for a dismissal, there being no appearance for plaintiff. Suit dismissed.

Castle & Cooke vs. A. Diaz, O. S. Swain, garnishee. Suit discontinued. Costs \$2 25.

Amelia Rose vs. Mary Hageman. Replevin of clothing. Suit discontinued. Costs \$2.

C. J. Fishel vs. Miss B. Rumble. Assumpsit for \$87 94. A set of \$78 was claimed. Judgment for plaintiff 60 cents, with costs \$3 51.

Several other cases were continued to 22d inst.

Another New Building.

Mr. W. E. Foster, the saddler, has temporarily removed his saddlery and harness business to No. 78 King street. The building lately occupied by him will shortly be taken down, and in its place a two-story brick store with cellar erected. Mr. E. B. Thomas has the contract and work will be commenced July 1st.

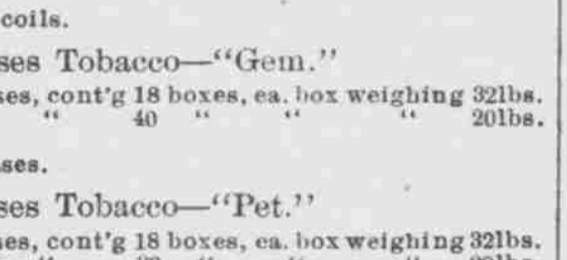

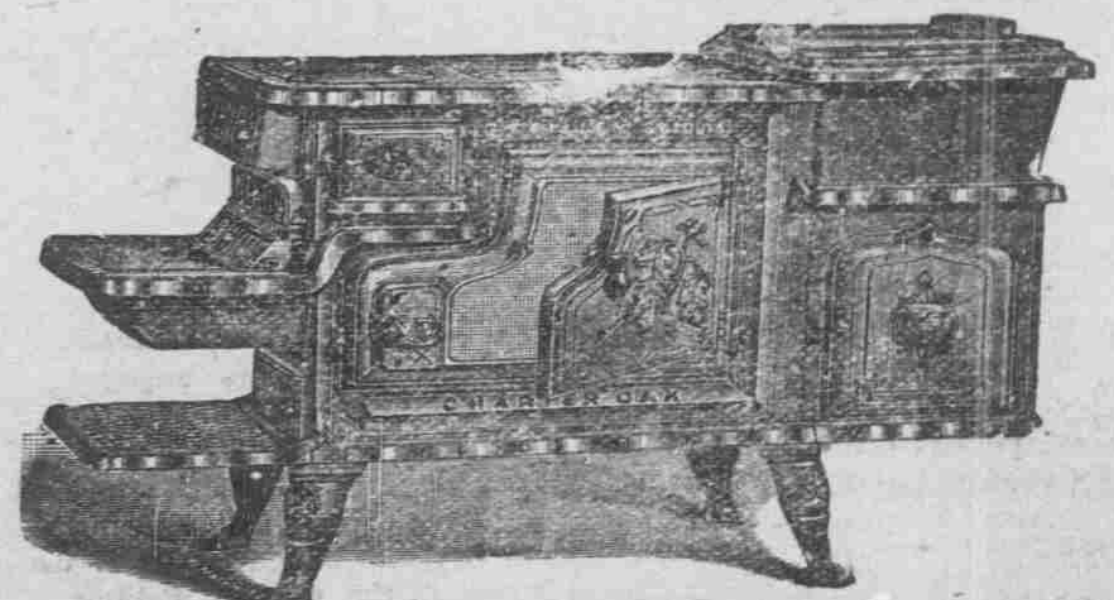
