SPAIN'S COMBINED FLEET

It Will Cross the Atlantic to Make a
Desperate Stand.

Movements of United States Vessels—An
English Admiral's Estimate of Dewey—
The Spanish Downfall.

Fall of Manila.

A full report of the glorious American victory at Manila will be found on the inside pages of this paper.

Yokohama, May 4.—The situation created by the defeat of the Spanish fleet at Manila is regarded as being taken for granted that it presages the downfall of the Spanish power in the East and the freedom of the Philippines.

English Opinion.

London, May 4.—The Westminster Gazette this afternoon, discussing the Philippine question, quotes the assumption of American newspapers "that the United States can do precisely what she chooses with Manila or the Philippine Islands—return them, sell them or barter them," implying that America has only to speak and no one will venture to dispute her right to dispose of her lawful prize as she chooses.

The Westminster Gazette says it much fears that "view will entail disagreeable surprises," adding:

"In entering European politics the United States will probably discover that these simple ideas of doing what you will with your own have become obsolete in Europe. The first symptoms are likely to be marked by an increase of the anti-American pressure, which, if Great Britain could be counted on to join it, would speedily lead to intervention in behalf of Spain."

After pointing out the fatality of expecting Great Britain to join in such a movement and the probability of attempts upon the part of the Continental powers at the close of the war to prevent the United States from holding the Philippine Islands, the Westminster Gazette says:

"The natural tendency of all this is to bring the United States and Great Britain together and we hope it will be fostered by statesmen and by a revival of the arbitration treaty at the first opportunity."

Spanish Atlantic Fleet.

Lisbon, May 4.—News has been received here to the effect that the Spanish Cape Verde Squadron has returned to join the Spanish fleet near Cadiz, which is nearly ready for sea. It is added that the combined fleet of Spain will shortly start for American waters.

United States Squadrons.

Key West, May 4.—10:40 a. m.—This harbor is again empty. Rear Admiral Sampson's fleet has sailed and the situation is one of renewed expectancy. There is a strong impression prevailing that the next news from the fleet will tell of an important engagement of the same character as the Asiatic Squadron's Manila victory.

Newport, R. I., May 4.—The cruiser New Orleans sailed at 10 o'clock this morning for Hampton Roads, to join Commodore Schley's flying squadron, to which she has been attached in place of the Columbia. The New Orleans has been receiving an outfit here.

The cruiser Minneapolis arrived here at 8 a. m., and anchored in the harbor.

Provincetown, Mass., May 4.—The cruiser San Francisco arrived in this harbor at 7 o'clock this morning.

Bar Harbor, Me., May 4.—The cruiser Columbia sailed east at 7:30 o'clock this morning.

War Expenses.

Washington, May 4.—The Secretary of the Navy sent to the House today a deficiency estimate of \$20,975,500 for the remainder of the present fiscal year and on account of the fiscal year, 1899.

The Senate has agreed to the conference report on the fortifications bill.

It is expected that the extraordinary expenditures for the army and navy on account of the war for the first six months of the coming fiscal year will make the general deficiency appropriation bill now being held in the House committee on appropriations reach an aggregate of about \$120,000,000.

Four New Generals.

Washington, May 4.—The President has sent a long list of nominations to Congress. Among the civilians are Fitzhugh Lee, Representative Wheeler, J. H. Wilson of Indiana and Senator Sewall of New Jersey, all to be Major Generals.

The Government has obtained possession either by purchase or charter of the Pacific Mail steamship City of Peking, now at San Francisco, and she will be put in condition to sail by the 15th at the latest, with coal, stores and troops for Manila.

An English Admiral on Dewey.

London, May 4.—Vice Admiral Philip Howard Colomb, retired, the inventor of improved systems for signaling at sea and the author of a number of naval works, in an interview on the subject of the splendid victory of the United States fleet at Manila, is quoted as saying:

"I doubt if there ever was such an extraordinary illustration of sea power. A superior fleet has attacked and beaten a Spanish fleet supported by batteries, and it now appears it passed those batteries and has taken up an assailable position off Manila. The boldness of the American commander is beyond question. Henceforth he must be placed in the valhalla of great naval commanders. Nothing can detract from the dash and vigor of the American exploit or dim the glory which Dewey has shed upon the American navy. It may be bad for the world, for assuredly the American navy will never accept a subordinate place after this exhibition of what it can do."

Spanish Blow Stopped.

City of Mexico, May 4.—The Government has stopped the contemplated meeting of Spanish clerks here for the purpose of raising money and volunteers for Spain. The police were ordered to prevent the meeting as contrary to the obligations of a neutral nation.

There has been great excitement here over the American naval victory, and its moral effect will be great, for the Spanish local papers and other journals under Spanish influences have confidently anticipated triumph for Spain in the first encounter on the ocean.

American Fleet in Motion.

New York, May 4.—A special to the Tribune from Key West says:

Indications here point to an important move by part of the North Atlantic squadron at an early day. Rear Admiral Sampson's fleet has arrived to coal. The

ships here are the flagship New York, the Indiana, Iowa, Cincinnati, Detroit, Mayflower and the Marblehead. The last came in with a prize, the Argonauta.

New York, May 4.—A Key West dispatch says:

The ships of Admiral Sampson's squadron, which have been coaling here for two days, sailed today under sealed orders. Their mission is probably to intercept the Cape Verde fleet and then move on Porto Rico.

It is believed the flying squadron at Hampton Roads will soon join Sampson's fleet.

New York, May 4.—A Key West dispatch says:

Late intelligence regarding the movements of Sampson's fleet shows it is the intention of the Admiral to attack and occupy Porto Rico before the Spanish fleet arrives. After destroying the base of supplies there the American fleet will put to sea in search of the Spanish vessels.

A Fort Destroyed.

New York, May 4.—A dispatch to the World from Key West says:

The gunboat Wilmington early this morning destroyed a Spanish fort just being finished about four miles east of Cojima. The Wilmington also fired at a troop of cavalry passing Jaraco beach and two men were seen to drop on the beach. The torpedo-boat Ericson on Sunday noticed a large number of infantry passing eastward toward Matanzas on the beach and followed them for miles, but used no guns.

Spies are Rampant.

New York, May 4.—A Key West dispatch says: It is understood that this city is to be placed under martial law on Friday, and the first step of the military will be to arrest half a dozen Americans who are known to be in the employ of Spain.

The blockade of Cuba has been more or less of a failure, and a number of small craft have succeeded in reaching Havana and Matanzas with supplies.

An officer of the Ioways there is proof that the Italian man-of-war Giovanni Bausan landed ammunition in Havana.

Philadelphia, May 4.—The report that a supposed Spanish spy had been captured aboard the auxiliary cruiser St. Paul at Cramps' yard last night was confirmed today. Who the man is Captain Sigbee refused to state, and all that is known of him is that his father is a Spaniard and that his mother was born on Cuban soil.

Prayers Invoked.

London, May 3.—According to special dispatches received here this afternoon, the Queen Regent of Spain has telegraphed the Pope on the subject of the defeat of the Spanish fleet at Manila, saying:

"The Spanish nation is calm, but resolved to resist to the bitter end."

Her Majesty also begs the Pope to bless the Spanish arms.

Fight at Cienfuegos.

New York, May 4.—A dispatch from Key West says: The crew of the United States steamer Eagle, formerly the yacht Almy, are positive that one Spanish gunboat was sunk in the fight at Cienfuegos, and that a torpedo boat

was badly damaged. It was necessary to stop the Spaniards' gunnery which was excellent. One shot knocked two feet off the Eagle's bowsprit, and two flew over the decks. The Eagle was alone at the beginning and the Spanish had ten boats, but the little ship edged in as close as possible. The Eagle's people say the Spaniards did excellent shooting. The cruiser Marblehead, steaming up, got a warm reception, but made the Spaniards run. Both ships fired over a hundred shots each.

Firing Off Newfoundland.

St. John's, N. F., May 3.—The telegraph operators at Cape Race and Trepassey, on the south coast of this island, report having heard heavy firing of shots in the offing Saturday night. The firing lasted fifteen minutes and, to the operators, conveyed the impression that two ships were engaged in a sea fight. The telegraph wires have since been interrupted and no further news was obtainable. All possible steps have been taken to obtain, if possible, confirmation of these reports.

Coal for Uncle Sam.

Victoria, B. C., May 3.—The American ship E. B. Sutton, now here, has been chartered to load a cargo of coal for Honolulu. It is stated that the coal is for the American Government.

Spain Perturbed.

New York, May 4.—A dispatch from Madrid says: Gullon, Minister of Foreign Affairs, declared in the Cortes yesterday that the enemy would not set foot in Manila, as the garrison there was strong enough to repel attack. Canelijas expressed regret that De Lome had not been thanked for his services in a hostile country, where he could not appear in public without being insulted.

A state of siege has been declared at Valencia, and riots have occurred at Gijon. A bomb was exploded in front of the Mayor's house at Carraminal. The whole country is perturbed.

British Trouble.

New York, May 4.—A Kingston, Jamaica, dispatch says:

The British warship Alert, now here, accompanied by the Pallas, has received instructions from the British Admiralty to return to Santiago de Cuba and to demand the immediate release of Consul Remsen at the cannon's mouth if necessary.

Previous dispatches had told of the consul's imprisonment for killing a Spaniard when he fired on a mob that attacked him.

Not Afraid of Spaniards.

Baltimore, May 3.—The American clipper ship Cyrus Wakefield, from Baltimore with a cargo of 3010 tons of coal for San Francisco, passed out between the capes to sea this morning. She may have to cross the track of Spanish war ships, but Captain Henry, who commands her, says he is not afraid and he believes that with a fair wind the clipper could show a clean pair of heels to the best cruiser in the Spanish navy.

Trouble in China.

London, May 3.—The Times' correspondent in Hongkong says: Owing to dissatisfaction against the dynasty there is some reason to believe that the imperial court is preparing to migrate from Peking to Si Nigan Fu, capital of a department in the Province of Shen Se, and rely on General Wang Pu Ching to cover the removal.

NO CHANGE IN SITUATION

Mr. Thurston Says Nothing Contrary to
Press Dispatches.

Annexation as a War Measure Falls Through,
and the Senators in Opposition
Are Firm.

A telegram from L. A. Thurston says there is no direct change in the Hawaiian status. Incidental developments favorable. Troops will probably be sent to Manila via Honolulu. Suggest Honolulu people prepare to give them a good send-off.

New York, May 3.—A Washington special to the Herald says: Members of the Committee on Foreign Relations were in conference with the President today relative to the proposition to annex the Hawaiian Islands. Senator Davis, Senator Lodge and other Senators who believe that Hawaii should be annexed to the United States as a war measure, if no other good and sufficient reasons can be assigned, are now convinced that the pending treaty cannot be ratified by the Senate at this time.

They informed the President that opposition to annexation in the Senate is just as strong today as it was weeks ago, when the subject was regularly up for discussion. Recent developments in the Pacific Ocean, including the argument that Commodore Dewey's fleet might be operated to advantage with Hawaii as a base of supplies, appear to have no effect on the opposition. Within the last two days the question has been discussed in an informal way by Senators, and there is a good strong majority in favor of annexation. The position of the majority has been greatly strengthened by the victory of Commodore Dewey at Manila, and those who had previously discouraged the idea that we would need a coaling station in the Pacific Ocean are now firmly convinced that Hawaii would be of inestimable value to the United States at the present moment.

All the old arguments in favor of annexation have been revived, and to them has been added the new conditions which have arisen since last Sunday.

In spite of the force and persistency with which the question of annexation has been urged, its most earnest and confident advocates are forced to confess that there is a sentiment against it in the Senate of sufficient strength and determination to prevent any action in that direction.

This condition of affairs has been fully explained to the President, and it is hardly probable that any further agitation of the question will be had until the opposition in the Senate experiences a radical change of heart.

GREAT VICTORY AT MANILA

Commodore Dewey Inflicts a Smashing
Defeat on Spanish Fleet.

He Passes the Batteries and Gives the City
Twenty four Hours to Surrender
to the United States.

American Victory at Manila.

London, May 1.—The American
squadron commanded by Admiral
Dewey won a complete and glor-
ious victory over the Spanish fleet
in the Philippines today. The
fighting was of the fiercest charac-
ter, lasting from 5 o'clock this
morning until 1 o'clock this after-
noon.

The bravery of the American
seamen was of the highest charac-
ter, and, led by the intrepid
Dewey, they inflicted upon the
enemy a blow that may be termed
almost a veritable rout.

During the night Admiral
Dewey signaled to his war ships
that were in Subig bay, fifty miles
north of Manila harbor, to clear
the ships for action and to follow
him.

The squadron got under way,
with the flagship Olympia lead-
ing, and followed by the cruisers
Baltimore, Boston and Raleigh,
the gunboats Concord and Petrel,
the revenue cutter McCulloch and
the transports Nanshan and
Zafiro.

The news of the battle, which
comes through Government
sources and by way of the Span-
ish cable, shows that the attack
was terrible in its energy.

Signaling for the American
transports to keep well out and
that the Olympia and Baltimore
would engage the Spanish Admi-
ral's flagship, the Reina Cristina,
and the Castilla, the largest
of the enemy's fleet, the
American warships moved in line
of battle on the Spaniards.

Dewey directed the movements
of the squadron from the conning
tower of the Olympia. He moved
his ship up close to the Reina Maria
Cristina and sent shell after shell
plowing into the Spanish Admiral's
hull. Captain Charles V. Gridley
of the Olympia was with him. The
superior aim and the heavier pro-
jectiles of the Olympia soon began
to tell, and the fire from the
Spanish grew more wild and some-
what slower.

Captain Dyer of the Baltimore
put his ship in close fighting dis-
tance to the Castilla. The Balti-
more has four eight-inch and six
six-inch guns in her main battery
to the Castilla's four 5.9 inch
Krupp guns and two 4.7-inch and
three 2.2-inch guns. Both ships
have good secondary batteries for
cruisers. The din of battle was
terrific. All the while the Spanish
forts were keeping up an incessant
fire on the American fleet.

The ships were enveloped in a
cloud of smoke, and the incessant
crack of the rapid-fire guns and
the booming of the big guns
mingled into thunder.

The Boston, 3189 tons; the Ra-
leigh, 3182 tons; the Concord,
1700 tons; the Petrel, 890 tons,
and the McCulloch had all they
could do to handle the Velasco,
Don Antonio de Ulloa, Don Juan
de Austria, General Lezo, El
Cano, Marques del Duero, the Isla
de Cuba and Isla de Luzon, but
by maneuvering and rapid work

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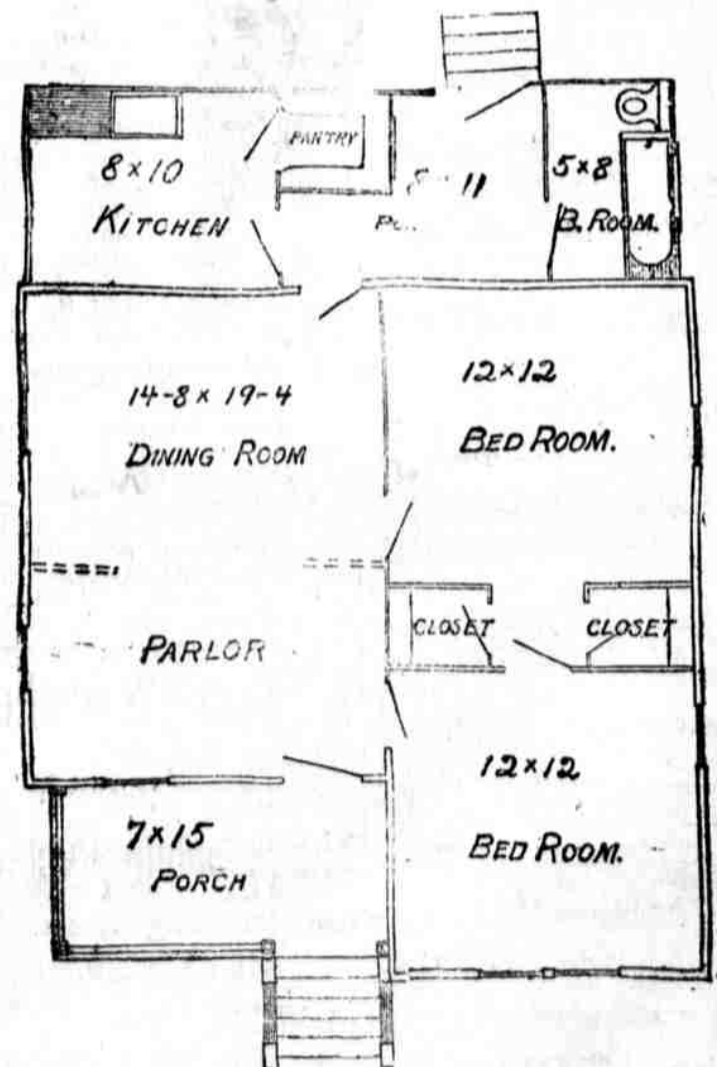

of the guns, fought their way to victory bravely.

Hot work on the Olympia brought the end of the Reina Maria Cristina, A shot from the American exploded a magazine, and she took fire. Despite the efforts of the Spaniards, the flames made rapid headway.

When the news that the commander had fallen spread through the ship the seamen seemed to lose heart. Her ammunition had been none too plentiful, and with its rapidly falling quantity and the fire that was raging, they were ready to give up.

Then there took place a piece of bravery on the part of the Spanish Admiral. Seeing that his flagship was doomed and unable to fight he ordered a small boat lowered, and with a daring crew rowed to the small gunboat Iela de Cuba, where he began hoisting his flag.

Soon after he left the Reina Cristina the flames devoured the boat, most of the crew jumping overboard, only to be drowned in the waters of the bay.

In the meantime Captain Dyer had sealed the fate of the Castilla. She, like the flagship, had considerable woodwork inside of her, and after being under fire for about two hours, took fire.

The American shells and deadly torpedoes plowed great holes in her sides and below the water line. Her crew fought gallantly, but they were no match for the Americans. She was completely riddled and torn to pieces by the rain of missiles.

With the most formidable ships of the enemy disposed of, Commodore Dewey, at 8 o'clock, withdrew with his ships a few miles out to sea. There the wounded were cared for, the guns examined, some tinkering done and preparations made for a second attack.

At 9 o'clock they started the second attack. The smoke had risen, and showed the wrecked Spanish fleet. The carnage wrought by the Americans was plainly evident.

With as strong a fire as before, the fleet again moved into battle. The numbers were more equal now, as the enemy had lost several boats.

During the first half hour of fighting the Spanish cruiser, Don Juan de Austria, was severely damaged and her Commander killed. The Spanish fortifications were more active this time, and attention was paid to them, a strong fire being directed at the defenses.

The Spanish ships Mindanao and Don Antonio de Ulloa were rendered useless. Several of the Spanish ships were deliberately blown up to prevent their capture.

Pouring a murderous fire into the forts, the flagship and several more of the boats forced the entrance to the harbor. They steamed to the west side of the bay and landed their wounded. No list of any killed or injured on the American side has, of course, been cabled from Manila, as the Amer-

No comment can possibly add to the gratified interest attaching to the news of the glorious victory of the United States Navy at Manila. It takes so much space to give even a condensed epitome of the war news, indeed, that there is no room left for words of eulogium regarding American bravery and prowess. Suffice it to say that the events thus far in the Pacific give good promise of equally gratifying intelligence of the first great crashes of armaments in the Atlantic. It may be stated that the BULLETIN'S news summary covers matter in the San Francisco afternoon papers of the 4th inst. which is not to be found in the metropolitan morning papers sold at the bookstores.

OFFICIALLY NOTIFIED.

Government Informed that War Exists between Spain and United States.

A representative of the BULLETIN called on President Dole this morning and inquired if the government had received any dispatches from Washington. The President replied that nothing had been received from either Minister Hatch or Mr. Thurston, and the Executive were somewhat at a loss to know why.

Minister Sewall had formally notified the Hawaiian Government this morning of the declaration of war between Spain and the United States.

Beyond the statement that the City of Peking would likely touch at this port on the way to the Orient with American troops bound for Manila, the President knew of nothing about the war which had not appeared in the press.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.
Very Harmonious Disposition of Various Bills This Morning.

The House Bill relating to appeals from decisions of District Magistrates passed third reading this morning without a dissenting vote.

The joint resolution calling for the appointment of a tax commission and an appropriation of \$50,000 to defray the expenses of such tax commission was unanimously adopted.

Minister Cooper presented an extended report relative to construction work being carried on by the Government at the present time on the Richards street slip of Honolulu harbor in reply to questions by Representative Gear. Referred to special committee on road contracts and work of public construction.

House Bill 70, relating to public cemeteries, passed third reading by a vote of 9 to 2 after being slightly amended.

Senate Bill 35, relating to National Guard, passed third reading unanimously. Recess until 1:30.

SHIPS TO CARRY SOLDIERS

Negotiations in San Francisco With Large Steamship Concerns.

The City of Peking Bought and Charter of the Australia Sought—Other Vessels Named.

For several days the Government has been making preparation for the transportation of troops to Manila, a San Francisco paper says. The Quartermaster General, through his assistants here, has been in communication with the Pacific Mail Company, John D. Spreckels Bros. & Co., Goodall, Perkins & Co. and other steamship companies.

The result of the inquiries has been to satisfy the Government that a sufficient number of vessels can be had to carry 5000 soldiers to the Philippines. The following telegram was received from Washington last night:

"Washington, D. C., May 3.—The War Department this afternoon telegraphed to San Francisco asking for immediate telegraphic bids from the steamship companies there for the transportation of troops to the Philippine Islands. It is understood that the Government proposes to take advantage of the law relating to the impressment of ships which can be converted into auxiliary cruisers, and that the Peking, Rio Janeiro and Peru will be taken immediately if they are in port. Otherwise such vessels as can be immediately made available will be impressed for the purpose of carrying to the Philippines some five or six thousand men, who are to be transported immediately after the receipt of Admiral Dewey's report of his operations in Manila.

"The regular army will be called upon to furnish cavalry from Fifth and Seventh Regiments, and such men as can be secured from the Fourteenth and Fifteenth Infantry will also be taken. The remainder of the troops to make up the five thousand will be the volunteers from the States of California, Oregon, Washington, Colorado, Nevada and Idaho. It is not believed by the authorities that it will be necessary to send men-of-war to convoy the ships, and it is desired that they shall be sent without men of war as escorts; first, because available warships are small in number, and secondly, because of the difficulty of supplying these ships with enough coal to warrant them attempting to keep up with the fast Pacific liners which are to be used for the purpose."

Negotiations have already been entered into for the purchase or charter of the Australia. The latter is a commodious as well as a speedy craft and can be fitted up, at comparatively little expense, as a troopship. The Mariposa, which arrived from Australia last night, may also be bought or chartered from Spreckels by the government. Both vessels have records as ocean travelers. Mr. Spreckels said last night that they could be fitted up to carry 1000 men each. Such vessels will just fulfill the requirements for transporting the soldiers.

The Peking could easily carry 1000 men and the City of Sydney of the same company could also carry a thousand men. The Sydney is due from Panama and way ports on the 9th. The Pacific Mail Company have one or two other vessels that might be pressed into service for transportation. The China, one of the largest steamers in the service, is on her way from China to San Francisco. She flies the Hawaiian flag, but it is not presumed that the war department of Hawaii will object to her carrying American troops. As far as can be learned, Hawaii has not yet declared neutrality.

The Government has been also looking over the available list of colliers to carry coal to Commodore Dewey's fleet. The Southern Pacific has the San Mateo and Mineola, both powerful carriers. The former is under the Hawaiian flag, while the Mineola flies the Stars and Stripes.

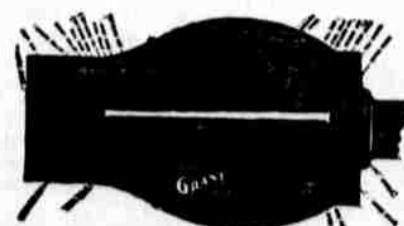

A GOLGOTHA AT WAIKIKI

Several Human Skeletons Found in "One Burial Blent."

Evidence That They Are Remains of Heroes of the Defense of Oahu Against Kamehameha the Great.

It is a strange coincidence that, while Minister Damon's bill to provide for the preservation of ancient heiaus and puhonuas is pending in the Legislature, a heiau not hitherto heard of in these days should have been unearthed in the suburbs of Honolulu. That is what happened yesterday.

Col. Geo. W. Macfarlane, who lately leased the Bishop premises at Waikiki, whereon to establish a seaside annex to the Hawaiian Hotel, had a gang of seven Japanese at work yesterday morning leveling off some mounds in the coconut grove. They had occasion to remove a tree and adopted the method of cutting off the roots. There was not much left to hold up the tree when they knocked off work for the noon hour.

As the Japanese were approaching the spot at one o'clock, the elements performed a regular freak. A gale rattled the foliage of the tall palms like castanets. The undermined tree shivered in the blast and began to reel to its fall. Even the ground rumbled and, it is authentically stated, the awa and mullet in an adjacent pond leaped upon their fins clear out of the water.

The Japanese happening to be coming along on the lee side of the tree retreated for their lives before the falling beam of destruction. Then an uncanny thing happened in reality which would have made a bold exploit of the imagination even for a Stevenson or a Verne. Flung high in the air by the catapultic motion of the roots was a mass of human bones—entire skulls, femurs, vertebrae, ribs, everything. One skull struck a retreating Jap in the back, and when he turned to see the missile he almost died of fearsome horror.

It was in vain to try to get that gang to resume work at the same spot. Only the foreman, through fear of losing the whole employment, returned. He began delving in the soil—a whitish substance, either volcanic ash or decomposed coral sand—when close to the surface he found an entire skeleton. It was in a sitting posture with arms extended over the head, as if the subject had been warding off a blow when struck down to his ultimate tomb. There was another skeleton discovered not so well united in frame. When a BULLETIN reporter inspected the scene at six o'clock the bones had been placed in a heap, the most conspicuous feature of which was a row of five skulls. Some of these had perfect sets of teeth intact. Only one was badly broken. Another had a temple dinged in, as if from a spear thrust.

The Golgotha thus exhumed is situated by the marshes at the Ewa corner of the Bishop premises within an easy stone's throw of the main Waikiki road. It is in a long uncared for and unimproved section of the demeane, some considerable distance from the residence structures to compose the hotel annex.

Col. Macfarlane very much doubts if Mr. Bishop himself knew of the existence of this remarkable deposit on the premises. There is not, however, entire absence of light upon the subject. Kaohi, a very aged native woman who was a retainer of the late Mrs. Pauahi Bishop, is still living on the place. She was in fact born there. Kaohi says there was a heiau on the spot, and that the bodies of Hawaiians slain in battle were buried within its walls. There is therefore a strong presumption that the remains now disinterred are those of brave defenders of the island of Oahu against the conquest of Kamehameha the Great. If such is the case they show remarkably good preservation after more than a hundred years of entombment.

The site of the heiau is known as Puuoniuhau. It was at the mouth of the stream adjacent, close to the Long Branch baths, that Vancouver lauded on this island. That stream was then

so free as to admit the great navigator's boats up as far as Aina-hau, the residence now of Princess Kaiulani and her father, Hon. A. S. Cleghorn. Two natives were hanged in the vicinity to render satisfaction to Vancouver for some pilfering from his ship. Mr. Cleghorn, it is understood, has collected a considerable body of authentic tradition regarding events of early Hawaiian history of the modern era in that neighborhood.

Close to the lane leading from the road to the Bishop residence there is well preserved the grass house in which Kamehameha V. is reputed to have prepared the new constitution which he forced upon the surprised Legislature that had failed to agree in attempting to frame the desired instrument.

Mariposa's Banner Trip.

GREAT VICTORY AT MANILA.

Continued from Third Page.

icans have no cable connection.
 It is believed, however, that the
 American loss is not great.

Naval officers in London regard
 it as a great victory and called it
 the annihilation of the Spanish
 fleet in the Philippines.

London, May 1.—A dispatch
 received tonight from Madrid says
 the news of the engagement at
 Cavite produced the greatest en-
 thusiasm among all classes, espe-
 cially in view of the fact that the
 American vessels were obliged to
 retreat before the inferior naval
 force.

Notwithstanding the severe
 damage sustained by the Spanish
 ships, which is freely admitted,
 the naval officers in Madrid con-
 sider that further operations by
 the American squadron will be
 conducted under great difficulty
 owing to its having no base where
 its ships can repair, obtain further
 supplies of coal or obtain the ne-
 cessary fresh supplies of provi-
 sions.

The dispatches state that the
 damage done to the Spanish ships
 Mindanao and Ulloa were very
 severe, although no details are
 given. The conflict is described
 as terrible. It is said that the
 Spanish losses were heavy. The
 American ships suffered severely.

Captain Gridley worked his
 ship around to rake the Spaniard.
 He fought his ship with one bat-
 tery and kept up the fire on the
 forts with the other.

A well-trained shot from the
 Olympia plowed through the
 fighting tower of the Reina Cris-
 tina and killed the ship's com-
 mander, Captain Cardazo. The
 Admiral was standing with him
 at the time.

New York, May 1.—A Sun cable
 from London says: A dispatch
 received from Madrid late tonight
 indicates that the public there is
 at last awakening to the fact that
 the Spanish navy has really
 suffered a terrible reverse in the
 Bay of Manila. There was
 a loud demand from the street
 crowds for an explanation of the
 fact that so many warships had
 been lost in the "great Spanish
 victory." A large force of civil
 guards was called out to overcome
 the crowds, who undoubtedly were
 on the verge of rioting.

New York, May 2.—A cable
 from Manila of this date to the
 Sun contains the following:

I have not yet been able to learn
 the loss of the Americans,
 but their fleet appears as fit as
 ever.

Not the least admirable feature
 of the exceedingly well planned
 attack was the astonishing ac-
 quaintance the American navigat-
 ing officers displayed with the
 waters of the bay. They never
 seemed to be in the least danger
 of running their vessels into
 shallows, though their maneuver-
 ing was constant and sometimes
 elaborate.

The same dispatch says that
 after Commodore Dewey silenced
 the land forts, he demanded the
 complete surrender of the city,
 fortifications, munitions and
 stores. The Governor refused to
 surrender. When informed of the
 refusal Commodore Dewey notifi-
 ed the Governor that he would
 give him twenty-four hours to

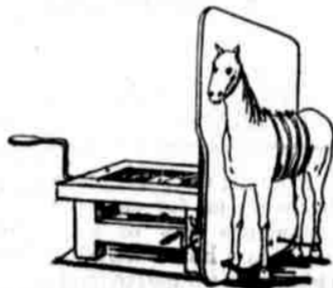

THE CABLE CUT.

The foregoing is the latest from Manila, as the cable has been cut. A report in Paris is that it was cut by the Americans to get an end for sending communications.

Latest War News.

Gibraltar, May 3.—Alarming rumors are circulated about town regarding the Madrid situation. It is said that Senator Moret, the Minister of the Colonies, and General Campos have been murdered. It is further rumored that Premier Sagasta has been forced to seek safety at the British Legation.

Madrid, May 3.—British protection has been offered the Chinese in Manila. The Spanish authorities regard this as some deep-laid machination on the part of Great Britain.

Washington, May 3.—Both the War and Navy Departments were assured today that they would have no difficulty in securing tonnage with Pacific Mail, Oceanic and American line ships now in the Pacific for the expedition to Manila. The five or six merchantmen necessary would be readily secured, and their loading and dispatch would be a matter of a few days after once under way.

Commodore Dewey is to be given the rank of Admiral.

General Merriam was today sent orders by were from Major General Miles to secure at once the mobilization of 10,000 troops at San Francisco.

The Secretary of the Navy directed Rear Admiral Kirkland, commandant at the Mare Island Navy Yard, to prosecute work on the Charleston as rapidly as possible and put the cruiser into commission as quickly as she is ready for sea.

These orders convey the determination of President McKinley to extend the sovereignty of the United States over the Philippines and to maintain it during the continuation of hostilities.

New York, May 3.—The Oregon will leave Rio de Janeiro tomorrow, the Nietheroy and Marietta following. The warships are in fine shape. On her trip from San Francisco, the Oregon exceeded her trial speed.

The Spanish torpedo boat Temeraria is laid up at Rio for repairs.

Commodore Dewey told American Consul Wildman that if the cable was interrupted or cut, it would indicate the last act of the Spaniards before the capitulation of Manila.

London, May 3.—The second Spanish squadron at Cadiz is nearly ready.

It has been determined by Spain to avoid isolated combats, and to throw the whole united naval strength of Spain into one supreme effort to crush the American squadron in Cuban waters.

It is believed the St. Vincent squadron has gone to intercept the Oregon and Marietta off the Brazilian coast. A strong force will be dispatched to spoil this Spanish game.

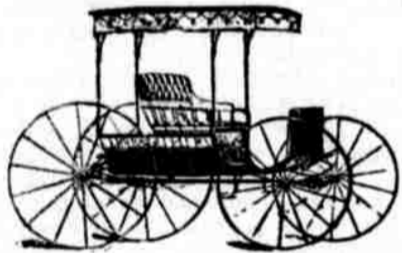

The Australia may go to Manila with United States troops instead of coming to Honolulu, is a report brought by the Zealandia.

The bark Andrew Welch sailed for San Francisco today with 26,556 sacks of sugar, 3,285,715 pounds, valued at \$110,459, shipped by C Brewer & Co, Castle & Cooke and F A Schaefer & Co.

The steamer James Makee arrived from Kapaa this morning with a full load of sugar for the bark Archer. Captain Tullett reports an east north east wind crossing the channel with easterly swell. The following sugar remains on Kauai: Kilauea 330, Kealia 9500, Hanamaulu 1000, Lihue 600, Koloa 2500, Makaweli 6600, Kekaha 5300, Eleele 3000 and Gay & Robinson 1100 bags. The steamer Norea was discharging at Koloa when the James sailed.

The Zealandia.

The S S Zealandia, which left San Francisco on May 4 at 2 p m, reports: Experienced moderate to fresh N W winds to the 7th. Thence to port light to moderate N E to S E winds, smooth sea and fine weather.

Arrival of the Aorangi.

The liner Aorangi is at the Pacific Mail dock from Sydney. Parser Mason furnishes the following report of the voyage: Left Sydney April 23 after having embarked a large number of passengers and a heavy mail. Sydney Heads were cleared at 3 p m, and fine weather was experienced to Wellington, N. Z., which was reached at 9 a. m., on April 27. At that port a considerable addition was made to her passenger list, almost filling the accommodations in every class. Left again at 4 p. m., April 28, making a very good run to Suva, Fiji, arriving there at 7 a. m., on the 3rd inst. Left Suva same day at 5 p. m., and crossed the equator on the 8th inst. Unusually strong head winds have been experienced throughout the voyage, more especially so since Suva, N E trades being met with and at times heavy sea and rain squalls. The speed, however, has been well maintained, the average being 13 1/2 knots per hour for the entire voyage. Under the management of a committee sports, deck games, concerts, etc., have been indulged in by the passengers, who are mostly booked through to Europe and the Continent. The Aorangi sails at 4:30 this afternoon for Victoria. D C Rennie is now chief engineer of the Aorangi, who was for 30 years in the P & O S S Co's service.

NEW OPIUM BILL COMES UP

Audit Act Passes Second Reading in the Senate This Morning.

Licenses of Notary Publics Lead to a Discussion—Finance Committee on the Audit Act—Hilo Railway.

In the Senate this morning a communication from the House notified the Senate of the passage of House Bill 64, amending the Railway Act.

Senator Brown presented the following report signed by all the members of the Committee except Senator Waterhouse:

"The Special Committee to whom was referred the Opium Bill beg leave to report, that they have prepared a substitute Bill in the place of the one referred, which they herewith submit for the consideration of the Senate. The substitute Bill places the importation and disposal of opium in the Board of Health, and may be said to be an offshoot of the so called Gothenberg or Scandinavian system which places evils of this kind, notably the use of liquor, in the hands of the Government and not in the hands or under the control of private individuals to make money out of and from the folly and evil habits of their fellow men.

"This Committee in introducing this substitute Bill do so thinking that it will in some manner lessen the smuggling, and as said the consequent corruption and bribery that follow the use and smuggling of this contraband drug, and do not wish to be understood as favoring or countenancing the evil, but as some people will smoke opium, and the opium, although contraband, is plentiful, it is thought that this Bill may lessen the use and stop the smuggling.

"The Committee recommend that the Bill go into effect on January 1, 1899, and in the mean time, the Board of Health can be preparing its rules and regulations and make all necessary arrangements, and as the Act will have been tried before the next meeting of the Legislature, that body can repeal or amend the same as the facts of its operation warrant.

"The Bill originally introduced was not such a one that could commend itself, and was cumbersome and intricate; the substitute is simple and any opium smoker or user of opium by enrolling his name in the District in which he lives may obtain a sufficient quantity to use in each day.

"The only expense to the user of opium under the new Bill is its cost laid down in the District where he resides and a duty at the rate of \$3 a pound. The Committee think that the less expense attending the cost, the less likelihood there will be of smuggling.

"In submitting this Bill the Committee earnestly hope that it will be the means of checking the smuggling and the many rumors of bribery and corruption, and also of checking an increase in the use of the drug.

"We recommend that Bill No. 10 be laid on the table.

The new bill was then read by Senator Brown, passed first reading and ordered printed.

Senator Lyman introduced his bill providing for an electric or other railway in Hilo, and through Oloa to the Volcano. The bill is different from that introduced in the House and provides for all the objections made to the House Bill. It passed first reading and went to the Printing Committee.

Senator Waterhouse from the Finance Committee presented the following report: "Your Committee of Finance, to whom was referred House Bill 50, known as the Audit Act, beg leave to report as follows:

"As the Senate is already aware this Committee has been engaged since the beginning of the present Session in an examination of the accounts of the various Departments and Bureaus of this Government. In so doing we have become very keenly alive to the immediate necessity of such a law as the one before us, especially with reference to the money received for the Government. In this respect there is today absolutely no check nor any means of ascertaining whether the amounts set forth on the books

of the various departments are correct or not.

The provisions of this Bill had received considerable attention at our hands before its reference to us, hence we are enabled to state at this early date our opinion of it and to make this early report.

We believe the bill to have been very carefully drawn, and for the reasons above set forth and others not necessary to be elaborated we are convinced that the necessity of such a bill has become so apparent that we have no hesitation in promptly recommending its passage.

Senator Baldwin from the Committee on Commerce presented a favorable report on Senate Bill 36, relating to milk and notaries' licenses.

House Bill 72, barbed wire fences, was further postponed until May 18.

House Bill 64, amending the Railway Act, passed first reading.

House Bill 50, the Audit Act, passed second reading without amendment. Third reading set for tomorrow.

Senate Bill 36, milk and notaries' licenses, passed second reading with a slight amendment. Third reading on Friday.

The Minister of Interior presented his answer to the questions propounded by Senator McCandless concerning the new Pacific Mail slip, which was referred to the Committee on Public Lands. Adjourned at 12:05 p. m.

Rough Voyage of Alden Besse.

The bark Alden Besse arrived in port yesterday from Honolulu badly battered and almost disabled as a result of a three day encounter with a terrific north-wester, says the San Francisco Chronicle of May 2. The same storm that mad the big steamship Gaelic heave to wrought havoc with the bark, and that lives were not lost in the battle with the elements seems a miracle. The storm raged all of three days—April 26, 27 and 28—and during that time it seemed to all on board that the Alden Besse was on her last voyage and that Davy Jones' locker was her destination. The sea was something terrific and heaved and tossed without any regard for regularity or anything else. The wind blew with powerful force and every plunge the bark took was thought by all on board to be the bowing down before an unavoidable fate. The tight little bark managed to weather the gale, however, and, although she looked as if she had had an encounter with a Spanish battleship, she sailed through the Golden Gate yesterday still able to take care of herself.

One sea, shipped when the gale was at its height, fairly gutted the house that used to stand amidships on the main deck and almost proved the death of its occupants. Other waves had swept past the house on either side, but this one saw fit to enter by a very narrow doorway and to play havoc with the interior. The cook, a Singalese, was carried out of his bunk and thrown around until the concussion with the deck and sides of the house rendered him insensible, and the cabin boy narrowly escaped drowning right in his bunk. Part of the bulwarks were carried away, the vessel's bow stove in and she generally looked a wreck. Four passengers were brought up on the Alden Besse, as well as a full cargo of sugar. Captain Potter said that the storm was the heaviest he had ever encountered on this coast at this time of the year.
