FOR A GOOD REASON.

Some capital has been attempted by the supporters of corrupt practices to be made out of the action of His Honor, Justice Preston, in sending the evidence and facts of the Kekoa case into the Legislative Assembly. Even some honorable members who have no sympathy with the supporters of corruption in the kingdom have expressed a mild disapproval of the course taken by the learned judge. The laws of this kingdom do not prescribe specifically the duties of the judges in such cases. The rules of the Hawaiian Legislature, however, provide that, in the House, English and United States precedent shall be followed in cases not otherwise met. The learned justice, in acting as he did in this case, was explicitly following English precedent in the matter, and at the same time complying with the rules of the House.

CHINESE TAXATION.

A petition has been laid before the Legislative Assembly by Chinese residents against the proposed act to tax them for the support of any of their countrymen who may become indigent. In connection with this fact, it is to be noted that, among the leading Chinese residents of the city the bill is received with approbation. These gentlemen feel that the provision made for needy Chinese is more abundant in its absence than otherwise. One of the purposes of the Chinese Club was to help those in need, but, since the fire, the funds of that society are not sufficient to meet the demands upon them. Those of the Chinese who are in favor of the tax are desirous of seeing a hospital for Chinese established, and other arrangements effected whereby the resources of private individuals may be relieved to some extent of burdens which are properly the function of the state to carry.

AN ECCLESIASTICAL PARLIAMENT.

When the churches in the Hawaiian Islands, established by missionaries of the American Board, were thought able to manage their own affairs without any control over their proceedings by the missionary society, the churches on the various islands were united in Island Associations for the management of matters of common interest. The General Association, now holding its twenty-third annual session, is the union of these various Island Associations, assembled for the discussion and direction of all matters pertaining to the welfare and progress of the whole body. All its business is transacted in the native language. The Hawaiian pastors and lay delegates from the various associations form a company of intelligent and influential men, as is evident from their appearance, the style of the reports they present and the orderly manner in which their business is transacted.

THE LEGISLATURE.

THURSDAY, JUNE 3, 1886.

WEDNESDAY, June 2nd.

The Assembly was opened with prayer by Rev. J. Waiamanu, at 10 A. M., the President, Hon. J. S. Walker, in the chair. Present: Ministers Gibson and Kapena; Nobles Dominis, Cleghorn, Kaee, Kanoa and Martin; Reps. Keau, Baker, Amara, Brown, Nauia, Kalulou, Pahia, Kaunamano, Kaula, Nahu, Kauhane, Kekoa, Kaulau, Kani, Paeahoale, Kaula, Palohau and Lilikalani.

PETITIONS.

Rep. Keau presented a petition from five individuals employed as guards at Oahu Prison, who allege they were hired at \$25 a month but only have received \$22, and ask that the balance be paid them. Referred to Finance Committee.
Rep. Brown, from Koolauloa, with 64 signatures, praying, 1st, that no change or any increase in any salaries

be made; 2nd, that Chinese be prohibited from taking their children by native wives to China; 3rd, that two foreign schools be allowed for the district; 4th, that parents having four or more children be exempt from taxation; 5th, for an appropriation of \$5,000, for the purpose of making Kahana harbor accessible to vessels. Referred to Committee on Miscellaneous Petitions.
Rep. Kaulau, from Kaunapali, that konohiki or sea fisheries be made free to all. Referred to Public Lands Committee.

STANDING COMMITTEES.

Rep. Brown, from the Judiciary Committee, reported on sundry petitions, as follows:—From Wailuku, against licensing lotteries; from Hapa, that the law relating to the appointment of District Judges be repealed and the old law re-enacted, and that witnesses in criminal cases be paid; from Wailuku, against a lottery bill; from Puna, that Hawaiians be not allowed to mortgage their property except to the Government; from Wailuku against a bank bill or an opium bill; from South Kona that the gold law be abolished, that the currency law be amended, and that the pay of Government officials be reduced; from Puna, that the law compelling the payment of taxes over ten dollars in gold be abolished. The committee recommend that said petitions be laid on the table for consideration with any bills or matters on their respective subjects which may be introduced. Adopted.

Rep. Kaulukou, from the same committee, said they had so much work that they had to bring in several reports, and reported in petitions as follows:—From Honouliuli, that men 50 years of age be exempt from the poll tax; from Puna, that the law regulating the Board of Inspectors of Elections be changed; from Makawao, that the law regulating the Board of Tax Appeals be repealed and the old law re-enacted. The committee recommend that said petitions be laid on the table to be considered with any bills or matters on their subjects. Adopted.

Rep. Kaulukou presented another report from the same committee, on a petition from Hilo, to make the fisheries in Hilo Bay free, stating that on examination they found a hardship existing, but, being in doubt whether the fisheries belonged to the Government or to the Crown Lands, they recommended that the petition be referred to the Minister of Interior, who should confer with the Commissioners of Crown Lands. Adopted.

Minister Gulick, from the Printing Committee, presented the house with printed copies of sundry bill.

Rep. Kaunamano, from the Sanitary Committee, reported on the petition from 116 residents of the leper settlement of Kalawao, Molokai, asking for a committee of 13 to visit the place and report to the Assembly. The committee recommend that a committee of five be appointed for the purpose mentioned, and that the President of the Board of Health be requested to have a swift steamer ready on Saturday next at 12 o'clock to take the committee to the settlement.

Rep. Kaulukou moved that the report be adopted.

Rep. Kaai moved that it be laid on the table. The petition contained no statement of grievances, and was signed by not a very large number of the inhabitants. Let the matter stand over, and then the petitioners would see that the house wanted them to state their grievances.

Rep. Paeahoale was in favor of adopting the report. It would be well to have the committee go up and report before the items for the leper settlement were reached.

The motion to adopt carried, and the President appointed the following committee: Reps. Kaunamano, Castle and Lilikalani, and Noble Cleghorn.

Noble Cleghorn moved he be excused, as he was a member of the Board of Health.

The President said that was why he appointed him.

Rep. Dole suggested that the hon. member for Molokai (Paeahoale) be appointed in the hon. noble's place. The committee was supposed to criticize the Board.

Noble Cleghorn was excused and Rep. Paeahoale named in his stead.

Rep. Lilikalani presented a report from the Committee on Commerce, on the petition from Makawao that no subsidy be paid to Spreckel's steamers unless they call at Kalapelo, recommending that it be laid on the table for consideration with any item that may come up for such subsidy in the Appropriation Bill. Adopted.

Rep. Kaunamano presented a report of the Sanitary Committee on a petition with 256 signatures from Honolulu, that Dr. Goto be appointed resident physician at the Kakaako leper settlement and keeper of the dispensary, recommending that the prayer of petitioners be granted.

Rep. Brown moved to lay report on table, which carried.

SPECIAL COMMITTEES.

Noble Bishop presented the report of the select committee on the currency bill, recommending its passage with certain amendments submitted.
Rep. Kaulukou moved to lay the report on table to be considered with the bill in its order. After discussion of the most appropriate procedure to adopt in the case, by Minister Neumann, Noble Bishop, and

Reps. Dole, Brown, Thurston and Aholo, the motion was carried, and the bill was read with the proposed amendments and laid on the table.

Rep. Keau reported for the special committee to present Hon. Godfrey Rhodes with the complimentary resolution adopted on the occasion of his leaving the kingdom on account of his health, submitting the following reply made by the hon. Noble:—

GENTLEMEN: I beg you to report to the honorable Assembly that I receive with the greatest gratification testimonial which the honorable Assembly has been pleased to bestow on me. I return my most sincere and hearty thanks to His Excellency the Minister of Foreign Relations who proposed, to His Excellency the Attorney-General who seconded, and to the honorable Nobles and Representatives who so generously passed this grand resolution, conferring unexpected eulogium on my humble efforts to promote the prosperity and happiness of my adopted country, and I assure the honorable Assembly that I shall pass it down to my successors and descendants as amongst the most valued of my worldly possessions. With grateful acknowledgment of the kind expression of hope that I may return with restored health to continue my legislative duties in the future, I would remark that I note with pleasure the presence of younger men in the Assembly, both of native and foreign descent, thoroughly competent to play the part to which in days gone by, without seeking it, I found myself called, and in which, having accepted it, this, your too kind and flattering resolution, bears witness, that in your estimation I have not altogether failed in doing what was no more than my duty. To that younger growth of men my weight of years warns me that I must before long give place, and when doing so I would bid them, "Be just and fear not." They will undoubtedly in the battle of life meet many rebuffs, but conscientiously doing their duty they will in the end secure the lasting regard of all men. Gentlemen, I bid you farewell. Whether or not I may return to my duties, as you kindly express the hope I may, the remembrance of your kindness, and my love for Hawaii, will be present with me to my latest breath. Farewell.

RESOLUTIONS.

The President read an invitation from the trustees of Lunailo Home, for the Assembly to visit the institution on Friday next at 3 o'clock.

Rep. Thurston (after Rep. Kaulukou had waived a claim to the floor on repeated request) made the following statement to the house: I regret to take up any further the time of the house with regard to a matter that does not pertain to the business of the house. But as yesterday the house took up the whole afternoon, I think I may be excused if I take up a few minutes more. My resolution of this house I was ordered to apologize to this house for certain specified words spoken by me. Yesterday I endeavored to comply with the resolution. After about three hours' discussion this Assembly came to the conclusion that I had not apologized. I thought that I had spoken plainly enough to be understood, and personally I do not think that anything further is necessary. As, however, a large number of the members of the Assembly seem to have misunderstood what I yesterday said, and are therefore laboring under the misapprehension that I have not apologized to the house, for the purpose of removing that misapprehension I hereby repeat what I said yesterday, to wit: That the words in the amendment complained of, in the connection in which they were used by me, were unparliamentary, and I apologize to the Assembly for having used them.

Minister Neumann moved that the apology of the hon. member for Molokai be accepted. Carried. [Applause.]

Rep. Keau read a first time an act to provide a permanent settlement for the widow of the late Hon. Paul Kanoa.

Minister Kapena read a first time an act to promote steam communication between the Hawaiian Islands and Japan. It provides a subsidy of \$25,000 per annum to any steamship company that shall establish a direct steamship line, the service to be monthly with not less than ten round trips per annum between Honolulu and Yokohama.

Minister Kapena also read a first time an act to promote mail communication between the Hawaiian Islands and the United States. It is the same act, substantially, as that of last session, giving the Oceanic Steamship Company a subsidy of \$1,500 per round trip, the service to be bi-monthly in vessels of not less than 1,800 tons register, and the subsidy expiring March 31, 1888.

Minister Kapena also read a first time an act to provide for expenses incurred by His Majesty's Chamberlain at coronation, and in building and furnishing Iolani Palace.

Rep. Paeahoale presented a resolution for an appropriation of \$6,000, to be paid twice by one Monokapula. On motion of Noble Cleghorn, it was referred to the Finance Committee.

Minister Neumann read a first time an act to provide for the licensing of a brewery of malt liquors in Honolulu.

Rep. Nahale read a first time an act to provide for a Police Justice in North Kona.

Rep. Keau presented a resolution that the Secretary be instructed to pay \$2 for carriage hire of the committee to present the resolution to Hon. Godfrey Rhodes. Carried.

Rep. Amara gave notice of an act to provide for the appointment of Hawaiian youths in the Survey Department. Also, an act to require the Minister of Interior to consult representatives regarding proposed improvements to roads in their respective districts. Also an act to require that any representative presenting a bill shall sign his name with that of his district thereto. Also, an act to provide a permanent settlement of \$600 a year on the orphan children of the late Rev. Abel Clark, Government school teacher at Waialua.

Minister Neumann, at 11:55, moved the house adjourn till 3 o'clock, to enable members to accept the invitation to the annual examination and exhibition of the Kawaiahaeo Female Seminary. Carried.

TWENTY-NINTH DAY.

THURSDAY, June 3rd.
The Assembly was opened at 10 A. M., with prayer by Rev. J. Waiamanu, Chaplain. Present: Noble J. S. Walker, President; Ministers Gibson, Gulick, Kapena and Neumann; Nobles Wilder, Kuileiani, Kanoa and Cleghorn; Reps. Keau, Lilikalani, Baker, Kaula, Pahia, Nahu, Kekoa, Kaulau, Kani, Paeahoale, Kaula, Amara, Thurston, Aholo, Kauhane and Kaula (the quorum of 24 being obtained at 10:15, and Nobles Bishop, Dowsett and Kaee arriving five minutes later).

Rep. Keao presented petitions from Puna, as follows: That any remnants of Government land in that district be sold to people of the district—referred to Public Lands Committee; that tuition fees be remitted to parents of children attending English schools—referred to Education Committee; for an appropriation of \$1,000 to improve the landing at Kula—referred to Public Lands Committee.

Rep. Paeahoale, from Halawa, Molokai, that a stock of medicines be sent to that place for gratuitous distribution, and that Mr. Van Giesen be appointed to distribute them—referred to Sanitary Committee.

Rep. Keau, two petitions with the same prayer from Honolulu, one with 282 and the other 140 signatures, that S. H. Meekapu be appointed Government physician for lepers and be paid a proper salary—referred to Sanitary Committee.

STANDING COMMITTEES.

Minister Gulick, from the Printing Committee, presented the house with certain bills ready for distribution.

RESOLUTIONS.

Rep. Keau presented a resolution for an appropriation of \$3,000, to assist in the construction of a new schoolhouse for the Kawaiahaeo Female Seminary. Laid on table for consideration with the Appropriation Bill.

Rep. Nahale gave notice of an act to amend sec. 23, chap. 44, laws of 1881, relating to the sale of spirituous liquors.

Rep. Kauhane presented a resolution for an appropriation of \$500 for erecting a court house in the eastern part of the District of Kau, where there is no such building now. Laid on table to be considered with the Appropriation Bill.

Rep. Amara presented a resolution that the Minister of the Interior be requested to immediately order the Superintendent of Public Works to place at the corners of new streets, in the burnt district of Honolulu, stone or iron posts bearing notices of the required height of buildings and the grade of streets. He said owners of property in that district were at a loss to know how to proceed with building operations, for want of knowledge of regulations. Referred to the special committee on fire limits.

Rep. Paeahoale gave notice of an act to amend sec. 783, Civil Code, relating to the holding of elections.

Minister Neumann moved a suspension of the rules to permit him to read an act of which he had not given notice, which being carried, he read an act to confer jurisdiction on Police and District Magistrates in the District of Kona, Oahu, with regard to the fire limits law just ratified. He said this provision was inadvertently omitted from that act. The rules were suspended to allow of the bill being read, and by similar operation it was forwarded past second reading by title and referred to Judiciary Committee.

ORDER OF THE DAY.

On motion of Rep. Kekoa the order of the day was taken up.
An act to amend sec. 3, chap. 44, laws of 1884, was announced for second reading, but it was discovered to have been referred to the Education Committee.

An act to amend and consolidate the law relating to commissioners of private ways and water rights, second reading. On motion of Rep. Hayselden, the rules were suspended and the bill read a second time by its title, when, on motion of Minister Neumann, it was referred to the following special committee, appointed by the President: Rep. Castle, Minister Neumann, Rep. Dole, Noble Dowsett, and Rep. Keau.

An act to make a permanent settlement on Thomas W. Everett. Some discussion arose on the pro-

cedure to be adopted with regard to this and similar measures. Rep. Castle moved to lay the bill on the table to be considered with a bill to regulate pensions, which was lost. Rep. Hayselden moved it be referred to a special committee, which carried. Then, by motion of the same member, bills for permanent settlements on other persons were taken out of their order, on suspension of the rules, and similarly disposed of, namely, those referring to Hon. W. C. Parke, Princess Poomaikalani, Hon. A. Fornander and Mrs. K. P. Kanoa.
An act to make Kailua, District of Kealahou, Hawaii, a port of entry, was, on motion of Minister Neumann, referred to the Judiciary Committee.

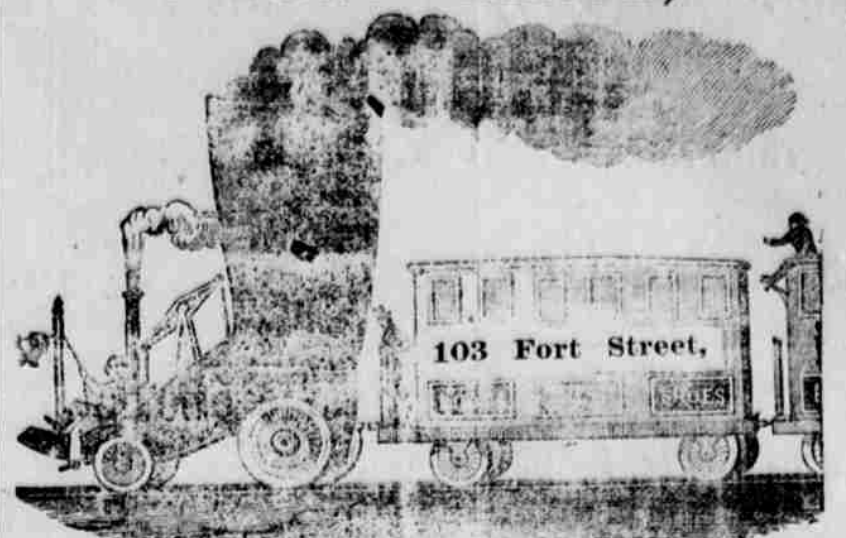
