ST. LOUIS COLLEGE

held its annual examination yesterday at which over 180 pupils were present. The Right Reverend the Bishop of Oba was present during the examinations. The school room was well filled with parents and friends of pupils who had come to see how they were progressing. A noticeable feature of the school was the trained habits of politeness shown by the pupils and their general neatness. Around the walls were displayed the evidences of their past work in the shape of copy-books, maps, etc. The classes went through their examinations very satisfactorily reflecting great credit on their teachers. Her Royal Highness Princess Liliuokalani was present during part of the day. The examination will continue to-day until 12 noon. Amongst the specimens of writing we especially noticed those of John Poepe as being very good.

SHOOTING SCRAPE.

Yesterday morning between 8 and 8:30 o'clock, a man named J. T. Quirk working on the Marine Railway as a caulker came down to the dock near the Fish Market, and drawing a revolver pointed it at the mate of the H. W. Almy, F. W. Freeman. said something about his having defamed him and his family and snapped it at him. Freeman seized young Hebbard who was standing near him at the time, and threw himself down on the dock keeping Hebbard between himself and Quirk, thus making him a shield for his own protection. Mr. Fuller also in the employ of Hebbard & Co., seized Quirk's hand and prevented him from shooting at Freeman. The revolver was snapped 5 times. In the meantime Freeman got up and ran away, and Quirk ran after him but failed to catch him. At noon Freeman went to the Police Court, and swore out a warrant for Quirk's arrest on a charge of assault with a pistol.

Quirk has only been in this country a few months, and had sent for his wife and four of his children, the two eldest being left at school in San Francisco. They came down on the Almy, and it is said that on the voyage down, Freeman was intimate with Mrs. Quirk. On Sunday afternoon between two and three o'clock she left her husband's house taking with her her two children, Quirk has not since been able to find her. She is about 24 years of age and has been married to Quirk for 6 years, being his second wife. She has had 3 children one of whom is dead. She brought with her her household appliances sewing machine, washer, etc., so that she apparently intended to settle down here. Quirk is about 35 years of age and Freeman appears to be about 26. The revolver was a handsome, ivory-handled, silver or nickel mounted, 5 chambered, Hopkins & Allen's No. L. It did not appear to have been loaded. Mrs. Quirk left for San Francisco on the J. A. Falkenburg yesterday afternoon.

The bark Hope came off the Marine Railway yesterday, and, after taking passengers on board, sailed for Port Townsend. The Novatum, Lizzie Marshall, and the S. S. Hankow sail on Saturday. The J. A. Falkenburg sailed yesterday for San Francisco. She took 5379 bags of sugar, 2385 bags of rice, and 60 bunch of bananas. Total domestic value \$47,471.75.

LOCAL & GENERAL NEWS.

St. Louis College has about 150 day scholars and 30 boarders. H. R. H. Princess Liliuokalani will hold her usual monthly reception this afternoon, from 3 to 5 o'clock at her residence on Beretania Street. Messrs Lyons & Levey hold an important sale to-day of immigrants' stores, etc., from the Hankow. Our readers are specially requested to note that the sale begins at 1 p.m. and not at 10 a.m. as previously advertised.

It is expected that five Christian Brothers will come out here from the United States to take charge of St. Louis College. These men belong to an order whose members have devoted their lives to the care and instruction of the young. In other lands they bear the highest reputation and we welcome their appearance amongst us.

In view of the present scarcity of water every person using water should be careful not to waste it. We have seen a duck pond near the slaughter houses where the water runs night and day and at a butcher's shop near it there is an iron pot used as drinking trough for animals in which the water is allowed to run all night so that it overflows and makes a pool of waste water.

The police have at last taken up the matter of shop-keepers and others obstructing the foot-paths with their wares. The first case was finished yesterday, the light pen 1 y of \$5 and costs being inflicted as it was the first offence. All other offenders in this direction will also be prosecuted. We commend the action of the police in this matter as side-walks in Honolulu are bad enough though fares naturally without being obstructed.

Our friend, the Church Chronicle, is delighted because the DAILY BULLETIN "is so enthusiastic in the cause of education, as to occupy so much of its valuable but contracted space with articles thereon." We can scarcely return the compliment; we wish we could. Our contemporary's "enthusiasm in the cause of education" is not disputed for one moment; but its editors and readers must admit that the "valuable space" occupied with articles thereon "is extremely contracted."

THE Gazette cannot see that anyone can find fault with its utterances unless they are grovelling and kicking the shoes of the Government. It cannot conceive, in its sublime conceit, in the first place, that it ever has been in the wrong and, secondly, that anyone would ever be independent enough to say so without receiving a quid pro quo from someone else for the saying. It is a well-known axiom that each man measures corn with his own bushel, and the Gazette exposes its own inner mind and heart by such remarks.

THE Anglican Church Chronicle, referring to the work of the Rev. S. W. Dias, an Episcopal clergyman of Ceylon, recently deceased, says, "It is by such men, and not the statesmen and the politicians, that the links are made that bind colonies to the mother country." Too much cannot be said in praise of such men as Rev. S. W. Dias and many other colonial divines; but to give them the sole credit of making the links which "bind colonies to the mother country," entirely omitting "the statesmen and the politicians," is a slight misrepresentation of facts. Several Statesmen might be named, both in England and the colonies, who have forged many strong links to "bind colonies to the mother country."

APPARENTLY, to some people in this community, a man ought not to live here unless he can take sides with some particular party, and stick to them through thick and thin whether they are in the right or in the wrong. We do not propose to alter our line of conduct, however in this respect and will praise what we find good, no matter on what side we find it and shall equally endeavour to expose what is wrong no matter what party is guilty of it always bearing in mind to "Naught extenuate nor ought set down in malice." If this determination would be taken and strictly adhered to by all the papers it would have a decidedly improving effect on themselves and the community at large.

FOURTEEN LIFE MISTAKES.

Somebody has condensed the mistakes of life and arrived at the conclusion that there are fourteen of them. Most people would say if they told the truth, that there was no limit to the mistakes of life; that they were like the drops in the ocean or the sand of the shore in number, but it is well to be accurate. Here, then, are fourteen mistakes. "It is a great mistake to set up our own standard of right and wrong and judge people accordingly; to measure the enjoyment of others by our own; to expect uniformity of opinion in this world; to look for judgment and experience in youth; to endeavour to mould all dispositions alike; not to yield to immaterial trifles; to look for perfection in our own actions; to worry ourselves and others over what cannot be remedied; not to alleviate all that needs alleviation as far as lies in our power; not to make allowances for the infirmities of others; to consider everything impossible that we cannot perform; to believe only what our finite minds can grasp; to expect to be able to understand everything. The greatest of mistakes is to live only for time, when any moment may launch us into eternity."

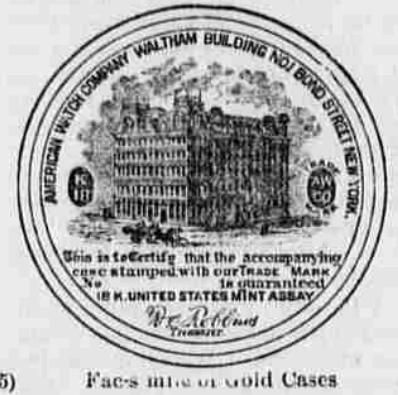

A Fever-proof Costume.—There was exhibited at the rooms of the National Health Society, 44, Berners-street, Oxford-street, recently, a novel dress intended for the protection of sanitary visitors, nurses, and others, who have to enter the rooms of persons suffering from infectious diseases. The garment is of mackintosh, glazed inside and out, and made completely to envelop the wearer, and with a hood to cover the head. Thus only the hands and face remain exposed—a matter considered of comparatively little importance, as these can be easily washed with disinfectants. A not less important object proposed to be effected by the use of this dress is that by its removal when the wearer leaves the sick room the clothes which have been protected need not be changed, and the danger of the disease being carried from house to house, or communicated to susceptible persons in public vehicles, is obviated. A tight case for the fever dress to be inclosed in is part of the invention. At the end of the day, or as often as may be convenient, the dress can be cleansed with disinfectants. Further protection is given by a simple form of respirator. This is made of two folds of thin washing net, between which is placed a layer of medicated cotton-wool, through which the wearer can breathe, though no germs can pass. The respirator has tape strings which tie round the ears. After use the wool is burnt and the net washed.—*Queen.*

A Paris firm has patented an invention for the instantaneous formation of steam. Water is pumped between two heated plates, which have only a capillary space between them. As the liquid spreads in a very thin layer it evaporates at once, without assuming the so-called spheroidal state, and is immediately used in the cylinder of the engine. The quantity of water forced between the plates is regulated by the engine, the pump being worked from the crank shaft.—*Home News.*
