THE SUGAR TRUST WAR

New York, March 16.—It leaked out from inner circles today as a feature of the skyrocket work in the sugar stocks that a meeting will take place here soon at which all the glucose, sugar and coffee interests of the United States are expected to be present.

It is known that the great fight between the sugar trust and the Arbuckles has reached a plane where the sugar trust is making inroads on the package coffee business of the Arbuckles.

The attempt, it is said, will be made to regulate the business by leaving sugar to the trust and coffee to the Arbuckles.

THOSE SUGAR STEAMERS

Contract Let for Construction of the First Boats.

New Line to Operate Between Hawaii and the Eastern Coast—Union Iron Works Gets Contract.

San Francisco, March 17.—The Union Iron Works has just been awarded the contract for two of the largest freight steamers ever built in the United States.

The construction of the vessels means the entering wedge of Eastern competition in the commerce

From another source it is learned that the original incentive to the chartering of the Manauense was a large amount of freight that the B. A. liner Garonne was unable to take off the wharves at Seattle.

of the Pacific. The company is to ply its craft between New York, Philadelphia, San Francisco and Honolulu, with the possibility of extending the route.

The first steamer is to be turned out in April, 1900, and the second one at a later date.

The new steamers will each have a carrying capacity of 8250 tons. The first vessel to be built is of the first class cargo type, and is to be built under the three-deck rule.

Length, 415 feet; beam, 51 feet; depth 32 feet. The draught, loaded, is to be 26 feet. She is to be rigged as a two masted schooner and is to be framed on the deep frame system.

The coal bunkers, including the reserve bunkers, will have a capacity of 1500 tons. There will be seven steam winches to operate the various hatches.

Work on the first of the new vessels for the American Hawaiian Steam Navigation Company will be commenced as soon as the material arrives from the East.

Purser J. Derby.

THE SAMOAN AFFAIR QUIET

Understanding Reached Between the Three Powers.

New German Consul to Visit London and Washington—Stories of Trouble Not Credited.

Washington, March 13.—After numerous conferences and the exchange of notes between Secretary Hay, the British Ambassador and the German Ambassador, a satisfactory understanding has been reached between the three powers interested in Samoa.

To this end, Dr. Wilhelm Salf, who has been nominated by Germany as president of the Municipal Council at Apia, to succeed Dr. Raffel, will be recognized by the British and United States authorities.

Quiet in Samoa.

Washington, March 16.—The State Department believes there is little probability of a clash in Samoa, at least not one that will involve the European and American colonies.

Commander Tilley of the Abarenda has come to Washington to consult with the authorities of the Navy Department prior to starting for Samoa.

Tonight's Lecture.

The Rev. Dr. Alfred Kummer, pastor of the First Methodist church in San Jose, Cal., arrived this morning. He will deliver several lectures in the city for the Y. M. C. A. and will spend several weeks visiting places of interest.

REBELS FORCED TO WALL

Advance All Along the American Lines.

Climax Expected at Any Moment—Prisoners Taken by Hundreds—Small American Losses.

Washington, March 17.—Advices have been received from Manila which indicate that the climax may occur at any hour.

The officials here are very well pleased with the condition of affairs, but will not at present discuss the details of the dispatches.

More Prisoners Captured.

Manila, March 17.—4 p. m.—Company G of the Washington Volunteers has captured 150 additional prisoners near Taguig and also seized some ammunition.

The Twentieth Regiment will return from the front today.

Wheaton's Brigade Advances.

Manila, March 15, 8 a. m.—Late yesterday General Wheaton's column encountered the enemy in such force between Patros and Taguig as to necessitate a change in the original plans.

Queen Signs Treaty.

Madrid, March 17.—The Queen Regent has signed the treaty of peace between Spain and the United States.

The signed treaty of peace will be forwarded to the French Ambassador at Washington, M. Jules Cambon, for exchange with the one signed by President McKinley.

battery shelled the city and woods effectively.

Later the enemy crossed the river from Pasig. Two companies of the Second Oregon Infantry cleared the right bank after a sharp engagement and then retired with three wounded.

In the meantime the Washington Volunteers closed in, driving small bodies of the rebels back upon Patros. One man was killed.

During the night the enemy burned the town of Pasig.

Wheaton's Advance Continues.

New York, March 16.—A cable to the Standard Manila, March 16, 5:40 p. m., says: General Wheaton is still actively engaged in clearing the insurgents from the country to the eastward of Manila and today the villages of Cainta and Taytay were captured by the troops belonging to his provisional brigade.

Lieutenant Kilbourn of the Signal Corps communicated the news of the capture of Cainta from the front by wire.

LAND FOR THE ARMY

Property to be Taken for U. S. Military Uses.

War Department Will Act—New Bank Will Soon Open Offices Here.

Washington, March 13.—After mature consideration the War Department has decided to take advantage of the provision of the act by which Hawaii was annexed to the United States, transferring the public lands to the general Government, to acquire such tracts in the islands as may be necessary for military purposes.

NEW BANK IN HAWAII.

Anglo-Californian and Seligman's Will Establish a House.

Washington, March 13.—Perry S. Heath, first assistant Postmaster-General, and the Anglo-Californian Bank of San Francisco and Seligman Brothers of New York have completed arrangements for organizing the American Bank of Hawaii, with offices in Honolulu. It will be designated as the Government fiscal agent for the islands, and when the laws of the United States are extended over Hawaii it will be chartered as the First National Bank of Honolulu.

Newspaper General's Report.

Los Angeles, March 15.—Brigadier General H. G. Otis cables the Times as follows:

Manila, March 15.—9:15 a. m.—The Twentieth Infantry had an all-day fight at Pasig. Three thousand rebels were encountered, defeated and routed with heavy loss. Our loss is small.

Koki, an employe of the Hawaiian Gazette Co., had his arm cut off at the shoulder this afternoon.

C. S. Desky will take control of the Orphanum theater.

Engineers Mustered Out.

Washington, March 17.—Four companies of the second volunteer engineers, now at Honolulu, have been ordered to San Francisco to be mustered out.

ORATORIO CONCERT.

Kaumakapili Church Filled and Splendid Program Rendered.

Kaumakapili church was filled to the doors last night with an audience comprising most of the music connoisseurs of Honolulu. The oratorio concert arranged by Wray Taylor, St. Andrew's outboard organist and leader of the Amateur orchestra, was carried out in a manner that gave the large assemblage enthusiastic pleasure.

The opening number was Haydn's chorus, "The Heavens are Telling," by the Amateur orchestra with organ accompaniment. Then came tenor solos, by Handl and Mendelssohn, vocalized by Chas. E. Eleton. Mrs. Royal D. Mead gave a large from Handel on the violin which gave intense delight.

Mrs. Geo. W. Macfarlane sang "The Lost Chord," by Sullivan, in a way to thrill all hearts. To a rapturous encore she merely bowed, which was all the audience could in reason have expected, as Mrs. Macfarlane was down for another selection on the program. This was the air "Angels Ever Bright and Fair," Handel's beautiful hymn that she sang at the funeral of Princess Kaiulani. This time the recall refused to be quieted until the vocalist came forward and sang "Home Sweet Home."

The orchestra and organ made two appearances besides their opening one, the selections being an intermezzo from Macfarlane's "Cavalleria Rusticana" and the war march of the priests from Mendelssohn's "Athalia." Thus the official organ asserts that its intentions are, but the character of what it has published as truth relating to the Cabinet crisis calls pointedly to mind that "hell is paved with good intentions. The Advertiser published the truth once when it printed the interview clipped from the "evening journal."

The BULLETIN joins the official organ in requesting that a public explanation be made of the Cabinet crisis giving all the details. The official organ's prevarications about Mr. Dole's appointive power have already been proven. Let the good work go on. Thus will the strength of the Triple Alliance—Ananias, Aguinaldo, Advertiser—be made glorious.

GENERAL NEWS NOTES.

Benjamin P. Hutchinson, better known as "Old Hutch" the famous grain speculator of Chicago, is dead.

The German Reichstag has refused to grant the increase asked for the army.

Secretary of the Navy Long denies that he intends to resign from the Cabinet.

A big bicycle trust headed by A. G. Spalding, A. A. Pope and Gormully & Jeffry is on the tapis.

Admiral Villamil who commanded the Spanish torpedo destroyers of Cerveras squadron, is dead.

The Navy department will send 1000 more marines to Manila.

Ex Secretary of State John Sherman is ill in Martinique from pneumonia.

American Ambassador Choate was given a banquet in London Mar. 14. His remarks favorable to Great Britain were cheered to the echo.

New Powder Magazine.

The new powder magazine is about completed, but Mr. Rowell cannot say when it will come into use.

The Superintendent of Public Works said, in answer to a request for news, that the Supreme Court decision gave the Government a free hand to erect wharves on the ground that was in controversy.

The eighth annual report of the Oahu Railway and Land Company has been received. The excellent financial condition of this enterprise will later be given extended notice.

B.-A. LINE EXPANSION

H. Waterhouse & Co., agents of the British-American Line, have received a letter from Frank Waterhouse, president of the company, giving most interesting news of immediate expansion of the enterprise.

Mr. Waterhouse has chartered the steamer Elibu Thomson, a small vessel of 100 tons, as a help out to the Garonne for the next three or four trips. This auxiliary boat will run direct between Honolulu and Seattle. She will arrive here in three or four days from now.

In about a month Mr. Waterhouse will put on a steamer of 6600 tons dead weight carrying capacity as a regular thing. She with the Garonne will constitute the British-American Line, until business warrants more and larger vessels. When the United States shipping laws are extended to Hawaii, the Garonne and her mate, whose name is not given in the advices, will be replaced by American steamers.

The Garonne will continue to make Hilo. She will be here about the 10th of April.

Mr. Waterhouse writes that he is more than satisfied with the outlook, and intends to go into the Honolulu trade with a determination to pass it for the Sound.

GERMAN LLOYD OUTLET.

Steamers to the Orient from either San Francisco or Tacoma.

San Francisco, March 17.—Word has been received here from Berlin that Dr. Wiegand, Managing Director of the North German Lloyd Steamship Company, will visit San Francisco late next month or early in May. Dr. Wiegand was in this city last October. He also visited Tacoma and Seattle and then went to Yokohama en route home. While here he stated to several prominent citizens that his company was desirous of putting on a line of steamers across the Pacific ocean from Hongkong and Yokohama to either San Francisco or Tacoma, and that he fully intended to do so in the near future.

The company is now building eleven new steamers and it is thought that at least three of them are intended for the new service to and from this coast.

While the Santa Fe people are exceedingly reticent on the subject, it is known that the North German Lloyd people want that road as an overland connection at this point and it is the opinion of railroad people here that Dr. Wiegand will sooner or later make some deal with Messrs. Ripley and Walker of the Santa Fe. On the other hand, some people think Dr. Wiegand may select Tacoma in place of this city. Tacoma is the western terminus of the Northern Pacific. German capitalists are heavily interested in that road and many of them are also financially connected with Dr. Wiegand's company.

The New National Bank.

Cecil Brown, who is interested with the promoters of the First National Bank of Hawaii who were first in the field with an application for a charter, was asked about the Coast news on the subject.

Mr. Brown had not seen the newspaper report, but said, emphatically:

"No national bank can be started here until Hawaii comes under the laws of the United States. If the Seligmans or the Anglo-California Bank had decided to start a private bank here, to be ready for the occasion and turn over its business to the First National Bank when started, I know nothing about it. I have not received a line on the subject."

Reports on the Zealandia.

The work of repairing the transport Zealandia, which had a rough passage from Manila, is being rapidly pushed at the Pacific wharf, and it is expected that she will be ready for sailing on the 25th inst. Work is now being done on the boilers and on the new deckhouse. The smoking-room is being changed over into quarters for the soldiers, an iron deck is being laid, and some changes are being made in the officers' quarters. She is expected to carry troops to Manila as soon as she is in condition.—S F, Mar 16.

The T K K Hongkong Maru, Filmer commander, arrived in port and bauld alongside the Pacific Mail wharf at about 1:30 o'clock this morning. She sailed from San Francisco at 5 p m on the 17th inst and met with very bad weather with strong SE gales and heavy seas, this latter fact causing her delay in arrival.

The story that the Hongkong Maru had a bad accident going up, is denied. There was but slight damage which took but a short time to repair. The story in the San Francisco papers that the Hongkong Maru raced with the Alameda on the up trip is also denied. Captain Filmer had no idea of racing. His orders were to get in on scheduled time, which she did. The Hongkong Maru did not see the Alameda the whole way up.

Trouble on S C Allen.

The bark SC Allen, Captain John son, sailed yesterday for Honolulu with a general cargo, including a number of mules. Early in the morning there was some trouble with the crew, which for a while promised to be so serious that policemen were placed on duty at the wharf until she got away. Three of the sailors had signed articles, it is said, at \$25 a month, and the Seamen's Union insisted that they should be paid \$30. There was talk of boarding the vessel and bringing the clothing of the men ashore, and the controversy between the men and those on shore attracted a considerable crowd.
