### INNOCENCE OF DREYFUS.

Closing the Net Around the French Army Conspirators.

Special Dispatch to the Chronicle

PARIS, May 3.—Slowly but steadily the net is closing around the French general staff in the Dreyfus revision inquiry. General Mercier, who was Minister of War at the time Dreyfus was condemned, on being called upon by M. de Freycinet, the present Minister of War, to produce the report regarding the secret dossier, which Lieutenant-Colonel Du Paty de Clam testified he had sent to Mercier, replied that he had destroyed it, and he called General Gougeon as a witness to the truth of the statement. Unfortunately for Mercier General Gougeon has already testified before the Court of Cassation that, although Mercier had destroyed the original he kept a copy.

Another anti-Dreyfus argument has received its death blow. General Zurlinden, Military Governor of Paris, and others, while testifying before the Court of Cassation, attached great importance to the closing sentence of the bordereau, "I am starting for the maneuvers," as proving the guilt of Dreyfus and the innocence of Esterhazy, inasmuch as the staff probationers were only notified on August 29th that they would not be required to attend the maneuvers. It has now been proved that this notification was actually dated May 17th. Therefore Dreyfus could not have written "I am starting for the maneuvers" in the following August.

It is rumored that it was Lieutenant-Colonel Du Paty de Clam himself who communicated to the Figaro the depositions made before the Court of Cassation.

New York, May 3.—A Sun cable from Paris says: It is stated this evening that the Court of Cassation has concluded its supplementary inquiry into the Dreyfus case, and that M. Ballot-Beaupre, President of the Civil Chamber of the court, will be ready to report at the end of next week.

### INSURGENT ARMY BEATEN

General Lawton's Force Advancing from the East—Victorious Americans Move on the Filipino Capital.

MANILA, May 4.—San Tomas was occupied by General MacArthur this morning after fierce resistance, and Hale's brigade is now pressing on toward San Fernando. The rebels made their longest stand at the bridge south of the city and only gave up after a fierce encounter. They fought their way through the town, which they fired as they fell back. Colonel Summers has left Lawton's column with his brigade and is marching to Maasin. The move is designed to pocket part of the rebels. The losses are not yet known. It is the intention to press on to San Fernando. The troops are fresh and will be kept moving.

A Spanish prisoner who escaped into the American lines reports that after General Hale's advance on Quingan 200 Filipinos were buried, thirty-five in one trench and twenty-seven in another. This is the largest number of rebels that have been killed in any engagement for several months.

European Caravan Massacred in Africa.

CAPE TOWN, May 3.—Word has been received here that a caravan under the command of two Europeans was recently attacked near the headwaters of the Rovuma river, east of Lake Nyassa, the tribesmen killing fifty porters and capturing all the goods. The Europeans reached Chikla fort after wandering three days in the bushes.

## TOPICS OF THE DAY.

Before the Rev. Mr. Gordon becomes hysterical over the bad condition of the rooms allotted to plantation laborers he should make a visit to Oahu Jail and see how innocent men were housed in 1895 in an alleged civilized country. The laborers' residences are "baronial" compared with the cells in which we were penned up.

An effort is being made to have young Herring, who shot Huntsman some years ago, pardoned. We don't believe that there is any excuse for any man to take the law into his own hand, but in the case in question we think that Herring has been sufficiently punished and that his crime was caused through the very greatest provocation.

We hope that the Jockey Club will get a move on in endeavoring to make the meeting on the 11th of June a grand success. The interests of the owners of race horses should be considered first, then the interest of the patrons of the noble sport and lastly the "swell" people. Herebefore the managers of the Club have proceeded vice versa.

### The Orpheum.

Mr. C. S. Desky deserves great praise for keeping up the Orpheum Theatre in the manner which it is being conducted under the able management of Jim Post. We have churches and libraries and institutions of the Y. M. C. A. kind, but we also have a number of young men without proper homes, who have been educated to play ball only in our fine colleges, and who take no interest in literature or art. To them the Orpheum has proven a blessing. There they can enjoy themselves by listening to the troubles of an editor, admiring the handsome shape of Violet Dale, applaud and encore Myrtle Graham's rendition of "Chilipepper, Macaroni," and hear Matt Keefe's fine singing of Ola a-a, and if they feel athletically inclined they can watch Du Bell in his Spanish rings, and they can walk outside in the hall, smoke a cigarette, chat about topics of the day and eventually go home and to sleep after enjoying a clean show and an amusing evening. The Orpheum is doing a great deal of good among our young people, and we hope Desky will keep her "waving" for many days to come.

### The Queen's Birthday.

The Executive, after very careful consideration of the matter, felt reluctantly compelled to decline the loan of the Executive building for Queen Victoria's Birthday dance. It will be decided this afternoon whether or not the Drill Shed is available for the purpose.

The printing and advertising committee are summoned to meet at the Waverley Club to-morrow evening at 7:30.

The Executive has kindly consented to loan the Drill Shed to Queen Victoria's Birthday Ball Committee, subject to arrangement of details with Col. Jones.

## Fighting Suspended in Samoan Islands.

APIA (Samoa), April 27. — V. Auckland (New Zealand), May 3. — Mataafa, the rebel chieftain, has accepted an armistice.

The Germans, however, declined to sign the proclamation.

WASHINGTON, May 3. — Officials at the German Embassy say that up to the close of office hours no recent communication had been received of events in Samoa. Evidently nothing of an important nature was expected for some time, as Ambassador von Holleben has left the city for a visit of several days to New York.

Fuller reports of affairs leading up to the armistice are awaited with much interest, as the hope is confidently expressed that the Mataafa element has decided to submit and await the decision of the joint Commission now on its way there. Germany, it was stated, was anxious that there should be an end to hostilities.

## Price of Refined Sugar Has Advanced.

NEW YORK, May 3. — The American Sugar Refining Company to-day advanced the price of all refined sugars sold by it one-eighth of a cent per pound. Standard granulated was placed at 5½ cents, against 5¼ cents yesterday and 5½ cents against 5¼ cents yesterday and 5½ a month ago. The move was quickly followed by all the independent refiners. The current advance was really begun in London, where refined sugar prices have been hardening for some days. It was forced by the decided firmness in raw sugar, which cut down decidedly the margin of refiners' profits. Imports of raw sugar into the United States during March, increased 102,000,000 pounds over March, 1898, and in the nine months since last June the increase was fully a thousand million pounds.

## Julia Grant to Wed a Russian Prince.

CHICAGO, May 3. — Julia Grant, daughter of Brigadier General Frederick Grant, is engaged to Prince Cantacuzene of Russia, late military attache of his country's Embassy at Rome. The report reached Chicago to-day. General Grant, who is in the city with his wife for a brief visit before he departs for the Philippines to serve on General Otis' staff, confirmed it to-night. Miss Grant has been abroad with her aunt, Mrs. Potter Palmer, for several months, and both are stopping in Paris.

## Egyptian Soldiers Slain by Barbarians.

CAIRO (Egypt), May 3. — Ibrahim Ali, whom General Lord Kitchener sent upon a mission to Ibrahim's uncle, the Sultan Darfur, has returned to Cairo. Ibrahim Ali found upon reaching Darfur that his uncle had been dethroned by Ali Dinar. The latter, on the appearance of Ibrahim Ali, turned out with his troops and routed the escort of General Lord Kitchener's envoy, numbering 150 men, of whom 120 were killed.

# CONDENSED FOREIGN NEWS

It is claimed that the German representatives decline to sign the proposed armistice with Matsa'a.  
The Coghlan incident at first annoyed the Kaiser, but he now regards it as useful to him in assisting to obtain a stronger navy.  
General Eagan has been expelled from the Loyal Legion, because of his vituperative criticisms on General Miles.  
Idaho's Governor has proclaimed martial law in Shoshone county, owing to strikes and the Bunker Hill outrages; 104 prisoners are in custody.  
It is said that Major General Merritt is maneuvering to supplant General Miles as Commander General of the army.  
It is expected that Rome will fulminate against the doctrine of evolution.  
Embassador Tower has proposed to Russia the arbitration of the sealing claims amounting to about \$300,000.  
The President has appointed Herbert W. Bowen of New York, Minister to Persia. Minister Bowen was Consul-General at Barcelona before the Spanish war broke out.  
The Italian Cabinet has resigned on account of their Eastern Policy.  
Henry B. Hyde, the insurance man, is dead.  
Col. Frederick Funston has been made Brigadier General.  
Aguinaldo denies that he is suing for peace, but his officials state that he is willing to accept it with honor.  
The transport Leelanaw has sailed from San Francisco for Manila with ammunitions of war and mules.  
The doctors say that the Pope may live for many years yet in spite of the signs of old age.  
Spain now wants a land indemnity from China.  
The British fleet at Samoa has been strengthened by the armed sloop Torch with ammunition.  
A British gunboat has been sent to the Persian Gulf to take possession of the mouths of the rivers Euphrates and Tigris to forestall a Russian movement on the gulf.  
Dewey Day was generally observed throughout the United States with enthusiasm.  
The British Press suggest that the Pacific Cable touch at Samoa as well as at the Fijis.  
California has had an earthquake shock but little damage was done.  
The transports Grant and Sherlman were quarantined at San Francisco.  
A thousand rioters at Wardner, Idaho, with a ton and a half of dynamite have destroyed property to the value of half a million dollars.  
A German officer has wounded the Prince of Siam in a duel.  
Russian provinces are suffering terrible distress from famine.  
The collier Scindia is to be armed and to carry 4,550 tons of coal to Samoa.  
King Leopold of Belgium is to visit the United States.  
England and Russia have signed a convention in connection with their respective spheres of influence in China.  
The Anglo-German Delagea bay agreement is in danger, owing to German sentiment against the Anglo-American entente.  
England is lenient towards Captain Coghlan's indiscretion.
