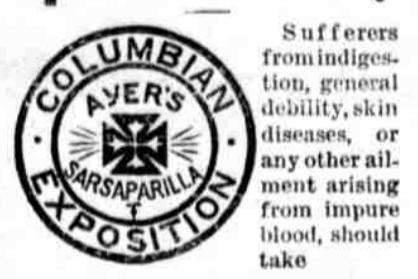

AN EVENING OF COMEDY

TWO PLAYS GIVEN BY LEADING LOCAL TALENTS.

"My Uncle's Will" and "Jane"—Brilliant Characterizations and Fine Acting—Large Audience.

It might have been expected that the transition from high classical opera to the lightest of light comedy—between the first and the second nights of the opening season of the new Opera House—would have changed the ratio of numbers and enthusiasm in favor of the galleries as against the choicest parts of the auditorium. Such was not the case, however, as the most prominent feature of the audience last night was the large proportion of "grave and reverend seigniors" and venerable dames interspersing a good house of the representative professional, business and social life of the community. President and Mrs. Dole were in the middle of the auditorium, and functionaries of church and state were present with their wives and daughters. In view of the fact that the audience assembled in the midst of a thunder and rain storm, the house was in itself a grand tribute to the ladies and gentlemen of Honolulu who provided the entertainment.

It was an entertainment that fulfilled one of the prime functions of public amusements, in that it made the people laugh heartily and took them wholly out of the influences of carking care for the time. The "moral" of the principal play was one to be taken inversely, as directly it implied that the most artistic lying does not always end badly for the artist in that line. As the whole scheme is full of absurdity, the inference in question is made absurd, and the result is a moral lesson by contraries.

For a certain raiser the one-act comedy, "My Uncle's Will," was produced with the following cast:
Harry Cashmore.....
.....Major G. C. Potter
Mr. Baker.....Mr. R. L. Scott
Florence Marigold.....Miss McGrew

Harry Cashmore, a naval officer, and Florence Marigold are companions of youth to each other. The young lady's uncle dies, leaving the pair of them \$250,000 if they intermarry within one year. Harry gets home on furlough when the year has but a week to run. There is much constraint between the young people, in the mutual knowledge of the provision in the will, and when they meet their exhibitions of regard for each other are extremely the reverse of affectionate. All this vexes the old executor of the will, Mr. Barker, to whom the little fortune reverts if forfeited by the young people's failure to marry. He has no use for the money and would prefer that the marriage should take place, but if the conditional devisees prove obdurate he will apply the wealth to founding an asylum for mad dogs. Barker uses all his powers of conciliation and persuasion upon them, and plays the trick of placing photographs of a strange man and a strange woman where they will be picked up, respectively, by the belle and the beau, so as to put the strong motive of jealousy in operation for bringing about the match. This brings on a terrible quarrel, ending in each one writing a renunciation of the other—and the fortune—in language that the funny little evening paper might envy in reviewing the political situation. Next Harry in an independent mood destroys his letter, leaving the lady her rightful prerogative of rejection. She follows suit with her letter, and then he woos and wins her in a five-minute siege, while the old man comes in to rejoice at the destruction of his dog asylum in the air.

It was all acted out in a style beyond criticism. Miss McGrew and Major Potter, although they had achieved no small distinction on previous occasions, raised expectations by some degrees for the more elaborate comedy to follow. Our elaboyant takes a different view of the gist of the comedy just described from others. The pair were lovers throughout. What made them so mutually repellent and irritable was the sense of bondage from the iron decree of the will. They wanted to woo and be won, respectively, like other people, and the way was opened for this happy condition only when both had renounced the money consideration. After all their mutual recrimination the exhibition of extreme affection in the denouement would have been unseemly. Their moderate display of passion was just right, criticism to the contrary notwithstanding.

"Jane," a society comedy in three acts, was the main piece. Its cast was as follows:

Shakelton is a high roller of London. William is his valet, Claude his footman and Jane his housekeeper. Mrs. Chadwick is aunt of Miss Martin, a young lady for whom he cherishes the divine spark. Mr. Kershaw is an uncle of Shakelton, who has from a distant town supplied for years the wherewithal to stand off the young swell's creditors. By and by the uncle, getting tired of the drain on his bank account, resolves to visit Shakelton and lecture his supposed wife on the extravagance of the housekeeping. This places Shakelton on the brink of an awful catastrophe, for he has no wife to be lectured. He deposes William to employ a woman to personate a better half for him. William hires Aunt Chadwick only too easily, for the dame has soft designs on Shakelton. Before William reports the success of his commission, Shakelton has hired Jane for a hundred pounds, with wardrobe and jewels thrown in, for the same purpose. But it happens that Jane had secretly been married to William that very morning. Kershaw arrives in this situation and Mrs. Chadwick introduces herself as Mrs. Shakelton. Kershaw is not quite polite in his direct remarks to the lady on her length of days in the lard. Shakelton repudiates the first wife and presents Jane as the genuine article. William swoons and the curtain falls the second time on a ludicrous tableau. Only indifferent success follows the effort to conciliate William, who makes a frightful wreck of dishes in serving luncheon. Kershaw wants to see the baby, but Shakelton had forgotten he had ever mentioned such a creature. The embarrassment of the request is tided over with hair-raising tergiversation, and a borrowed baby to be returned at 7:30 is produced. It's still in swaddling clothes, however, and the uncle's fatal recollection of dates induces another fiction, regarding a child two years old away to school, who has already won seven prizes. A handsome money settlement is promised, but, William's jealousy breaking all bounds, he gives the whole thing dead away. Repudiation of the nephew comes swift and severe, but is followed by reconciliation all round. Mr. and Mrs. Pixton are the parents and lessors of the baby and their anxiety to recover it was a feature of the denouement.

It would be impossible to bestow more praise than is deserved on the local talent that presented this comedy. Mrs. Dimond in the titular role adorned every situation. It is usually uphill work to surmount high expectations.

A GORGEOUS SPECTACLE

GRAND PAGEANT AT NIGHT IN NEW YORK HARBOR.

A Marine Demonstration by Business Men in Favor of Sound Money.

New York, October 24.—Probably the most gorgeous marine spectacle as well as the most imposing political demonstration that has ever been witnessed in the United States was the parade of vessels in New York harbor to-night under the auspices of the Shipping and Industrial Sound Money Association of the port of New York. The parade was a demonstration on the part of the business men and others who favor the gold standard, and many weeks had been devoted to the preparations for the event. Nearly 300 vessels, including every description of river craft, made up the illuminated and decorated flotilla, which extended for nearly seven miles along the Hudson river and into the waters of the bay. Many of the boats were equipped with calcium and flashlights.

From the piers along the river front on both sides of the Hudson and from floats anchored at various points on the route fireworks were exploded. These displays included aerial mottoes of fire such as "Honest Money," "Peace and Plenty," "The Starry Cloud," "Old Glory." The latter was an immense representation of the American flag, 500 feet by 250. The most imposing display was at the Battery, where a piece entitled "The McKinley Bouquet" was produced simultaneously by the discharge of 3000 colored rockets.

On board the vessels were many political bodies and organizations. The propeller Aurora was the reviewing boat. Soon after 5 o'clock the Aurora, with General E. C. O'Brien and the reception committee on board, left for Jersey City, where she took on board Vice-Presidential candidate Hobart and his party. The shores on both sides of the river were black with people along the route of the pageant.

WAR AMONG THEOSOPHISTS

MRS. BESANT DENOUNCING MRS. TINGLEY.

The Leader of the Indian Section Says the American Woman Makes False Claims.

London, October 24.—The hosts of Theosophists are only waiting for the political excitement in the United States and Europe to subside before they throw themselves at each other with another crash. Mrs. Besant is announcing an approaching cataclysm in a series of lectures in India. She is telling the faithful there that Mrs. Tingley of New York is falsely claiming to be Mme. Blavatsky reincarnated. Mrs. Besant is denouncing this alleged masquerading as gross fraud upon theosophy.

She produces what ought to be conclusive proof of her statement in the shape of Mme. Blavatsky's declaration before her death that she was not going to inhabit any such carnal frame as that now used by Mrs. Tingley. She was going to have a brand new body, which "was then preparing for her incarnation." It was not to be that of a woman or any member of Western races, but simply the body of an Indian youth. It ought not to be necessary to say anything more, but Mrs. Besant adds:

"Many of us who have a personal knowledge of her know this statement of hers to be true. An adept can take the soul of his chela and put it into a new body, but nothing can be more absurd than to imagine that he would choose the worn-out body of a middle-aged woman for carrying on work which chela's old body had not been able to do. She has always to provide the body of a young person, because of its greater adaptability to her direction and the longer term of life through which the work may be carried on."

Nevertheless this lucid statement from Mrs. Besant has excited the greatest ire among the English Theosophists, who are opposed to her. The president and vice-president of their society write beseeching the British public to give no weight to Mrs. Besant's words. They say Mrs. Tingley has in their hearing expressed the conviction that Mme. Blavatsky is not reincarnated at all. Then they crush Mrs. Besant with the declaration that her statement will have no weight with any but the handful of Theosophists in America, where those who recognize Mrs. Tingley as the leader of the Theosophical movement are numbered by thousands as compared with the hundred or so who have elected to follow Mrs. Besant and her Adyar society.

THROW IT OPEN.

There can be but one opinion in the minds of unprejudiced and disinterested people regarding the rumored movement to have the exclusive cable franchise renewed on its expiration at an early date. Renewal would be flying in the face of the disappointing experience of the past. Those who advocate it should assume the burden of proof that the results will be any more satisfactory than those from the latest experiment in that line. They should be asked to point out one flaw, as shown by the present position of the matter, in the objections that were urged by the BULLETIN against the hasty action of the Government and Legislature, in railroading the franchise granted to Mr. Spalding. The Government ought to stop dickering with private speculators for the carrying out of large affairs of national importance. It

has only met failure in every instance of the kind, the cable and the refunding bonds being glaringly in evidence. All that Hawaii can do, while not in a position to lay a cable purely as a Hawaiian undertaking, is to offer all the encouragement the country can afford for open competition. Make the subsidy and landing privileges available to the first company that can give a guarantee that it will construct a cable. From the experience of other countries, indeed, Hawaii ought to exercise great caution about granting exclusive cable landing privileges. There is little doubt that, when once one cable is laid across the Pacific, others will soon follow. A cable from America to Japan would not be long in operation until one between America and Australasia would be projected, and vice versa. There is bound to be cable communication now before a great while, and Hawaii cannot do a great deal to hasten or hinder it. But we have a position invaluable to any transpacific cable. Do not sell our valuable franchises too cheaply to any combination.

There are persons in Honolulu who have been in the Armenian country, whose estimate of the lower classes of that race is not calculated to encourage the movement for introducing Armenians to this country. It will not help the advocacy of such labor any to traduce the motives of people holding contrary opinions.

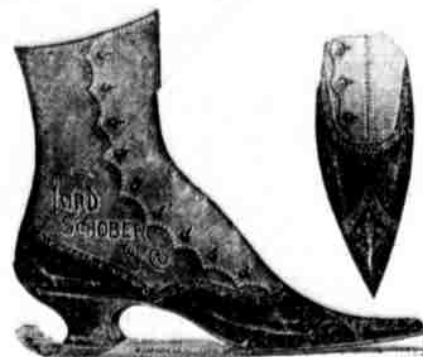

JAPAN ON THE OCEANS

LINES TO ENGLAND, AUSTRALIA AND INDIA NOW RUNNING.

Captain Seabury of the China Tella of Twelve New Steamships Bought in London.

"Japan is evidently aspiring to be known among the nations of the sea," commented Captain Seabury of the Pacific Mail steamer China, in a recent interview after his last trip to the Orient, where the ambitious maritime ventures of the Mikado's subjects are exciting much interest.

"There seems to be no lack of money behind the scheme," continued Captain Seabury. "Though I have nothing definite in the way of figures I am assured by persons in a position to speak authoritatively that the various Japanese lines are subsidized to such an extent that all their running expenses are covered. During my brief stay in Oriental waters steamers of the Nippon Kaisha Company sailed for Europe, for Australia and for Bombay.

"In addition to the vessels already used, twelve more have been secured in London, to be used, I believe, on the line between Japan and England. The length of these vessels, if placed in line one after the other, would just reach a mile, thus giving each steamer an average length of 440 feet.

Regarding the lines to India and Australia I have little information. The vessels which left for these localities during my stay were the first on each line. It is rather early to predict either success or failure for the venture.

"While the various lines are in receipt of the subsidy of course they will get along swimmingly, but how long the subsidy will last no one seems to know. Whether the lines will be able to pay their own expenses soon, or at all, remains to be seen.

"At the same time the Japs seem bent on making a fight for the honor of being known as a great maritime power. If persistency alone will carry the day, they certainly stand a fair chance of succeeding, in a measure at least. In the meanwhile the new enterprise is calling forth much comment in commercial and maritime circles, and its outcome is awaited with no small interest."

LATEST FOREIGN NEWS

GENERAL DISMAY AT PRINCE BISMARCK'S REVELATIONS.

Conspiracy Against Spain in the Looloo Islands—England's Foreign Policy May Lead to War.

The steamship Alameda brings telegraphic dispatches up to October 30th, of which the following are the most important:

BISMARCK'S REVELATIONS.

Vienna, Oct. 28.—Referring to a statement published in Prince Bismarck's personal organ to the effect that a secret treaty between Germany and Russia was in existence, the disclosure of which it was feared would affect the stability of the Triple Alliance between Germany, Austria and Italy, Austrian newspapers express dismay at Prince Bismarck's revelations, but profess faith in the Emperor of Germany despite the double dealing of the ex-Chancellor.

Berlin, October 29.—The Emperor William is stated to be furious at Prince Bismarck's revelations.

The press reproach Prince Bismarck for his recent utterances.

Vienna, October 29.—The city newspapers are now calmer in their references to Prince Bismarck's revelations, which leads to the conclusion that they have been inspired. They now contend that Prince Bismarck's duplicity will not affect the stability of the Triple Alliance.

ENGLAND'S POLICY FEARED.

London, October 29.—The Marquis of Dufferin, speaking at Belfast, said people in England had no conception of the haunting anxiety experienced by those in high positions on the Continent. The war cloud was ever impending, and Continental statesmen were terrified lest Great Britain's policy should hasten a conflict. Hence the feeling of hostility which was prevalent towards Great Britain.

TROUBLE IN THE LOOLOOS.

Madrid, Oct. 28.—A conspiracy against the Spanish authorities has been discovered in the Looloo Islands, and reinforcements have been sent from Manila in the Philippines.

FIGHTING IN THE PHILIPPINES.

Sydney, Oct. 29.—Late files by the mail steamer from the East show that the revolt in the Philippine Islands continues, and some hard fighting has taken place. A great many rebels have been killed and hundreds arrested, including many leading men. Numbers were shot in the public squares as a warning to the others. A body of eight thousand rebels hold a fort, but they are gradually being surrounded by the Spanish troops, and the worst is considered to be over.

READY FOR FLIGHT.

Constantinople, October 28.—It is reported that the Sultan's yacht is lying night and day opposite a secret passage leading from the Palace.

AN OFFICIAL DENIAL.

London, October 28.—The report that the British squadron in North American waters is to be increased to twice its present strength is officially denied.

NOT HOSTILE TO BRITAIN.

Paris, October 29.—The Temps declares that the Franco-Russian Alliance would not be hostile to Great Britain, and that all disputes between these nations can be adjusted by diplomacy.

INDIAN FAMINE INEVITABLE.

Calcutta, Oct. 29.—There is still no prospect of rain falling, and a famine throughout the country is inevitable.

FIGHTING THE TURKS.

Constantinople, Oct. 28.—A band of Macedonians defeated the Turks at Coroytza, killing 90 and taking 8 prisoners.

THE MATABELE WAR.

Capetown, October 28.—Colonel Baden Powell has destroyed many of the Matabele kraals, and a general surrender of the natives is expected shortly.

Dr. Burgess is a son of our esteemed fellow-townsmen, N. F. Burgess, and does credit to Honolulu for his present enterprise, as well as for the standing he has achieved in the medical fraternity in California. He is a regular contributor to a medical journal of that State.
