## EXHIBITS IN THE CASE.

### INTERESTING HISTORY IN THE SUIT AGAINST SPRECKELS.

Ten Million Dollars the Capital of the Company—Documents Public and Private.

One of the most important actions ever brought in the Hawaiian courts, as regards the amount of property value involved, is that of the Hawaiian Commercial & Sugar Company against Claus Spreckels, reported exclusively in yesterday's BULLETIN. Some additional details from the petition and exhibits in the case will probably be of general interest.

The original name of the plaintiff corporation was the Hawaiian Commercial Company, incorporated under the laws of California in September, 1878, with a capital stock of ten million dollars. Claus Spreckels was the owner of 520 out of the 100 shares into which the stock was divided. It was deemed expedient by the directors that Mr. Spreckels should hold the property, etc., in his own name, and in October, 1878, he executed a deed of trust, declaring that he held the same to the use and for the benefit of the corporation. This deed is not now in the possession of the plaintiff, nor does it know or have any information of where it is.

Exhibit "A" is a petition to King Kalakaua and the Ministry in Cabinet Council assembled, in which Mr. Spreckels "most respectfully petitions and asks, that, in consideration of the sum of five hundred dollars to be annually paid in advance by the undersigned to the Hawaiian Government, and in consideration of the great and manifold advantages that will accrue to said Government by the construction of a large and extensive system of irrigation works on the island of Maui, whereby a large district, now lying waste, will be brought to a high state of cultivation, and in further consideration of the stipulations and agreements hereinafter contained and set forth," the Minister of the Interior grant to the petitioner, for the term of thirty years, all the waters not heretofore utilized running from and on the northerly and northwesterly slopes of Mount Haleakala, etc.

It is stipulated that at the expiration of thirty years the Hawaiian Government may acquire the water privileges by paying to the petitioner, his successors, administrators or assigns the value of the aqueduct property, to be determined by a commission of three residents of the Hawaiian Islands.

Exhibit "B" is an indenture made by and between Samuel G. Wilder, Minister of the Interior, and Claus Spreckels, on July 8, 1878, conveying the water rights petitioned for by the latter. This was recorded the same day with Thomas Brown, Register of Conveyances. Exhibit "C" is a deed dated June 25, 1895, by Henry Cornwell to Claus Spreckels for \$20,000 of 15,000 acres of land.

Exhibit "D" is a lease from the Commissioners of Crown Lands to Mr. Spreckels of 16,000 acres of land, dated July 5, 1878. It is signed for the Commissioners by John O. Dominis, Commissioner and Land Agent. Exhibit "E" is another Crown Land lease of 3260 acres.

Exhibit "F" is the grant of a right of way by Charles R. Bishop over his lands for one dollar's consideration to Mr. Spreckels for his ditches and pipe lines. Exhibit "G" is the grant of a free

right of way for the same by the Haiku Sugar Company, Alexander & Baldwin, composed of S. T. Alexander and H. P. Baldwin; W. F. Sharratt & Co., composed of W. F. Sharratt, S. B. Dole, W. O. Smith and A. H. Smith, and J. M. Alexander.

Exhibit "I" is the articles of incorporation of the Hawaiian Commercial Company. Claus Spreckels subscribes \$5,200,000; Frederick P. Low, \$100,000; William P. Babcock, \$500,000; Hermann Schessler, \$3,200,000, and Hermann Bendel, \$1,000,000. Exhibit "J" is the articles of incorporation of the Hawaiian Commercial and Sugar Company.

Exhibit "K" is a quitclaim of water rights by the Waitee Sugar Company for \$10,000 to Mr. Spreckels.

Exhibit "L" is a quitclaim deed from Princess Ruth Keelikouani to Claus Spreckels for \$10,000 of a certain Crown Land tract, dated September 13, 1880, and attested before Cecil Brown, notary public. Exhibit "M" is the deed of such land, being the Ahupuaa of Wailuku containing 24,000 acres by Walter Murray Gibson, Edward Preston and C. H. Judd, dated August 11, 1882. Exhibit "N" is a royal patent from King Kalakaua to Claus Spreckels for the same land.

Exhibit "O" is a conveyance of properties, franchises, etc., from Claus Spreckels to the Hawaiian Commercial & Sugar Co., but not including the Ahupuaa of Wailuku, dated Sept. 25, 1882.

Exhibit "P" is a deed from Mr. and Mrs. Spreckels to the corporation of one undivided half of the Ahupuaa of Wailuku, also a piece of land adjoining Hamakuaipo, also the privileges granted by Minister Wilder. The consideration is five dollars, and the deed is dated Feb. 27, 1885. It is attested before H. W. Severance, Hawaiian Consul at San Francisco.

The last exhibit "Z," is the first annual report of H. L. Dodge, president of the company, dated Nov. 16, 1885. It shows a production of a fraction over 6666 tons, sold at the average price of \$102.18 per ton, yielding \$681,240.22. The expenses amounted to \$807,146.80.

### CLAIMS FOR ROAD DAMAGES.

Exorbitant Estimates of Values by Nounou Stream Owners and Tenants.

Claims for road damages on the line of the Queen street extension are under examination in the Government Survey Office. Some of them are preposterous in amount, and the aggregate is no less than \$94,535.67, of which \$84,450.92 are from owners and \$10,084.75 from tenants.

One claim is for more than \$17,000, the owner wanting 75 cents a foot for land that lies under water. His property is above Eretania street where it has no present value as business property. A great proportion of all the land to be taken is under water. Another claimant wants 75 cents for wet land and a dollar a foot for land that is dry and under foot.

Mr. Hassinger, chief clerk of the Interior Department, is conducting a careful scrutiny of the claims. He is finding out what the property is valued at for taxation purposes. Also, in the case of recent buyers, what they paid for their properties.

A number of new residences are to be erected at Makiki within the next few months by well-to-do people.

Mr. Kamaki, an employee of the Metropolitan Meat Market, is celebrating the birthday anniversary of his child by giving a luau to the residents of Waikiki.

## TO ANSWER FOR PERJURY.

### GEORGE HOUGHTAILING TO BE TRIED IN CIRCUIT COURT.

Bail Fixed at One Thousand Dollars—Two Judges on the Bench for a Time.

When the habitues of the District Court took their usual seats this morning they were surprised to see both Judges Wilcox and Perry on the bench. In the language of the legal luminaries, such as Blackstone, Coke and others the Court was sitting in banco. This was necessary according to the law on indigent criminals who have no means of paying fines and have served out their terms of imprisonment.

Git Wa has been in jail six months for illegal transactions in opium and, upon testifying that he had no property or means to pay the fine imposed as part of his sentence, was allowed to go free.

A Portuguese lady named Teresa P. Machado Miranda next applied for relief under somewhat different circumstances. She was convicted on May 15, 1893, of stealing \$590 from Mrs. Maria J. Schwanck and sentenced to eighteen months imprisonment and a fine of \$100. She has served out her term and upon showing to the satisfaction of both judges that she was utterly unable to pay her fine they signed an order for her release.

This ended the proceedings before the Court in banco and Judge Wilcox gracefully withdrew, leaving the rest of the criminals to the tender mercies of his coadjutor.

Kobayakawa went visiting up Nuuanu valley without a permit and paid two dollars for the privilege.

Having sufficiently recovered from his recent indisposition, which at one time was magnified into cholera enough to supply the whole police department. Mr. Kabananni made his bow before the Court and pleaded not guilty to the charge of housebreaking in the daytime. He did not think it worth while to put Judge Perry to the trouble of holding a preliminary examination, however, and was held to answer to the Circuit Court at the next term.

Antonio Macario and Augusto Ferreira pleaded guilty of malicious injury in destroying a four dollar bridge on the corner of School, Emma and Punchbowl streets, the property of T. Netto. The defendants were fined \$5 each and costs.

The charge of receiving stolen goods, arising out of the transactions of a number of youthful coal merchants, against Wo Chong was nolle prosequit.

The examination of George Singleton Houghtailing on the charge of perjury was continued. Charles Ott and Gus Cordes testified for the prosecution, and the defendant and Patrick Murphy for the defense. At the conclusion of the testimony the Court found there was probable cause that a jury would convict on the evidence adduced and committed the defendant for trial at the coming term of the Circuit Court with bail fixed at \$1000.

The cases of Gibbs and Murphy on the same charge will come up tomorrow.

### The Free Kindergartens.

The five Kindergartens under the charge of "The Free Kindergarten and Children's Aid Association" will be opened whenever the public schools are allowed

to open. The new organization has been duly incorporated, and is ready to receive donations and bequests. It will hold a public meeting in the Y. M. C. A. Hall tomorrow morning at half past ten, for the election of officers and committees. All members of the Association are expected to attend, and all interested in Kindergarten work are invited to be present. The Association enters upon its work under very favorable auspices, and it is hoped that it will have a very creditable report to make at the next annual meeting, when the plans for its various departments of Kindergarten work shall have been in regular operation.

### JUDICIARY JOTTINGS.

Estate of the Late Minister Carter—Cases for the November Term.

Henry Smith, master, has made a report on the account of J. O. Carter, surviving trustee of the estate of the late H. A. P. Carter, for the year ending June 30, 1895. George R. Carter was appointed a trustee in place of the late C. L. Carter on August 2. The gross amount of income was \$16,485.97. General expenses and accountant's pay amounted to \$1491.46. Net income divided was \$12,515.94. The trustee received \$54,747.95 and paid \$45,118.42, leaving a balance uninvested to next account of \$9629.53. The master reports the account as correct.

F. H. Hayselden, surviving trustee of the estate of J. G. Hayselden, has filed his annual account, showing receipts of \$28,053.06 and a balance to the good of \$4566.30.

William Cowan has entered a suit for the November term of the Circuit Court against Thomas H. Patterson and I. A. C. Patterson his wife, for wages claimed to be due to plaintiff as manager of defendants' grocery store.

Caroline Amy Laing has filed a bill for divorce against Robert Laing.

Judge Whitney has rendered a decision granting the bill of Cheong Hoy against Chin Wo Company for dissolution of co-partnership. Castle and Thurston for plaintiff; Robertson, Kahoakano and Johnson for defendants.

John Emmeluth vs John Cook was on argument before the Supreme Court this afternoon. Judge Whiting sat with Chief Justice Judd and Justice Frear in place of Justice Bickerton.

### Poomakelani's Death.

Shortly after 6 o'clock last night Poomakelani, sister of Queen Dowager Kapiolani, died suddenly at her home at Kalih. A telephone message of her illness was sent to the Board of Health, but when Dr. Wayson arrived the lady had expired. Poomakelani had been partly paralyzed for some time, and her death is ascribed to heart failure. The funeral took place this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, services being held at St. Andrew's Cathedral by Bishop Willis.

## IT STILL STAYS WITH US.

### ANOTHER CASE OF CHOLERA REPORTED LAST NIGHT.

Another Victim of the Infected Taro Patch Water—Board of Health Meets this Afternoon.

After an absence of nearly five days cholera again made its appearance last night, the victim being another inmate of the Asylum named W. H. Wheeler, an American by birth. The case was reported to Dr. Herbert at 8:30 p. m., and by 10:40 had developed sufficiently to justify the physician in reporting another case of cholera to the Board of Health. Mr. Wheeler is about 65 years of age and has been an inmate of the Asylum some fifteen years. His dementia takes a religious form and he has always been considered harmless, and as such allowed the full freedom of the grounds. In common with other inmates this liberty to roam about was cut off after Saturday's case developed. Deprivation of liberty seemed to change the form of Wheeler's malady and he has since become quite violent, and at times has had to be strapped to a chair. There is no doubt that he also drank taro patch water on Friday or previously, as there has been no chance for him to have contracted the germs of cholera since. The patient was conveyed to the cholera hospital at once and at 2 o'clock this afternoon he was still alive, though little hope is felt of his final recovery, owing to his advanced age.

President Smith has called a special meeting of the Board of Health for 3 o'clock this afternoon to take measures on the new state of affairs involved. It was intended to allow the schools to reopen on Monday and this matter will probably be acted upon definitely. There seems to be no adequate reason why the schools should not reopen in spite of this new case.

Applications for passes and permits to ship necessities are becoming more and more frequent, showing that the community is becoming restive under the present restrictions to travel and commerce, and it is frequently remarked that the necessity for such restrictions no longer exists.

Several other minor matters will come up before the Board this afternoon.

The familiar presence of Senator Henry Waterhouse is sadly missed about the Board of Health headquarters. He left on the Australia yesterday to take a well-earned vacation and attend to necessary business. The position he filled at the office was an important one and it is to be hoped a competent person will be selected to act in his stead.

### Birthday Party.

Hugh C. Reid, the foreman pattern maker of the Honolulu Iron Works, attained his forty-sixth birthday yesterday. He celebrated it by giving an evening party at "Saratoga," the beautiful beach resort lately opened by himself and Mr. Carver on the old Waikiki road. There were music, dancing and a supper to entertain the guests. The musicians included Mr. Rosen of the band and Peterson's orchestra. Many friends of the braw chief Hugh were there to wish him many happy returns of the day, and they were delighted both with their entertainment and the soft briny atmosphere peculiar to that sheltered position of the beach.

FROM QUARANTINE WHARF.

THE INTERESTING DIARY OF GEORGE WASHINGTON SMITH.

Natives Serenade the Frisco Liner—Their Hands Full with the Flowers.

Monday, Sept. 30, worked hard all day on the freight of the Andrew Welch. The pleasing voices of Capt. Drew and mate were heard encouraging the men. A good day's work was done by the natives, everything stowed nicely on the dock under the supervision of Harry Webb and I tell you the deck looks like a large warehouse with all classes of goods placed as they should be for quick delivery.

At suppertime the Australia was telephoned and at about 7 p. m. she came by the Mail dock, where all of our jolly native boys were clustered together to give her a welcome song, which was given by the following named boys, singing Aloha Oe: Bill Olepau, Tom Pedro, Kalili (Fat Boy), Nawai, Philip, Hon. Kaea, Pokai and Sam Kalawalu, with the rest of the boys joining the chorus, and it was rendered so nicely that the officers, crew and passengers clapped their hands and some shouted: "Good boys, we know we are welcome. Thank you," etc., etc.

Jimmie Robertson holds his end up admirably in checking his requisitions for the inter-island steamers. Jimmie does it in a systematic manner, not to be outdone by any clerk, and doing it there is no flurry or worry about it. The boys all have a great aloha for "Jimmie."

October 1. The Miowera came along side the dock early this morning. Work commenced, and they are keeping it up with a will. The boys will have to work all night. The steamer has 900 tons of freight for this port. The freight consists principally of flour, grain, hay, and 500 bbls. lime. The officers are a very pleasant set of gentlemen, and are ready at any time to give us any information that we may require, and they do it in such a pleasing way that it makes our work pleasant and easy, blocked up as we are on the dock. We are doing well under the circumstances in getting the freight out of the way as fast as they can put it over the side of the steamer. Mr. Crabbe is working at a terrible disadvantage, but he is equal to the emergency. He handles himself like an old stager. Harry Webb, Jimmy Robertson and "Aids" keep the ball a-rolling, and Kelly, Smith and Hewett are runners, and they do it well.

A Cause of Sickness.

Descourts claims that deforestation of a given region increases the death rate. His argument is founded on the investigations of Dr. Jeannel, who reports that the mortality in the woodless departments of France is 1.64 per 100, while in those with forests the mortality is only .18 per 100. The proportional loss then is nine times greater in the thirty treeless departments than in the fifty-seven wooded departments. If deforestation is really the cause of the disproportionate death rate and of the diminished population in sunny parts of France, it must be regarded with as much solicitude as the contamination of water supplies, unhealthy dwellings or the contagion of zymotic diseases.

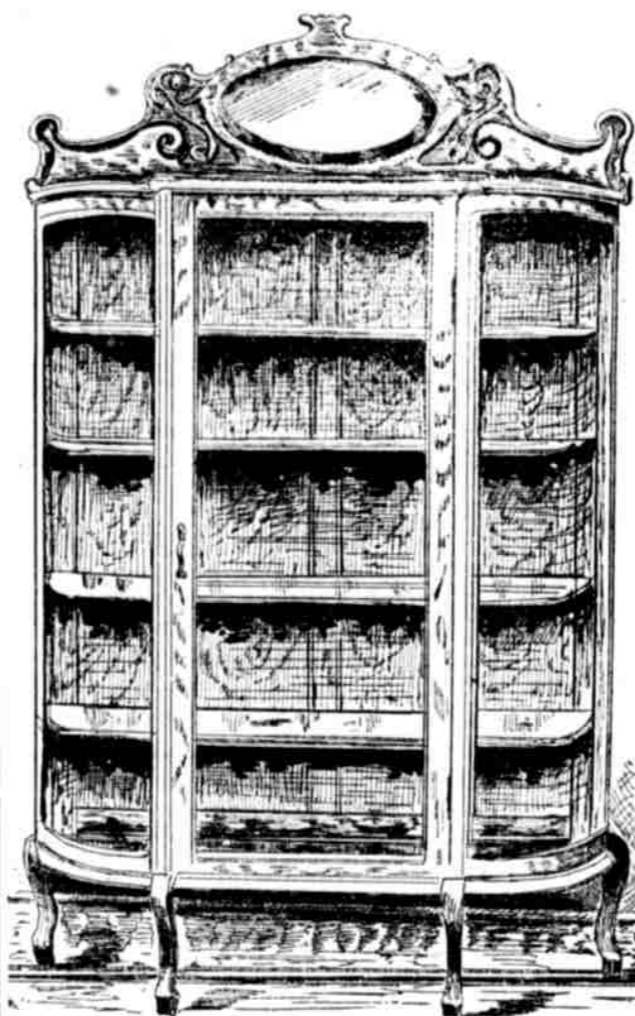

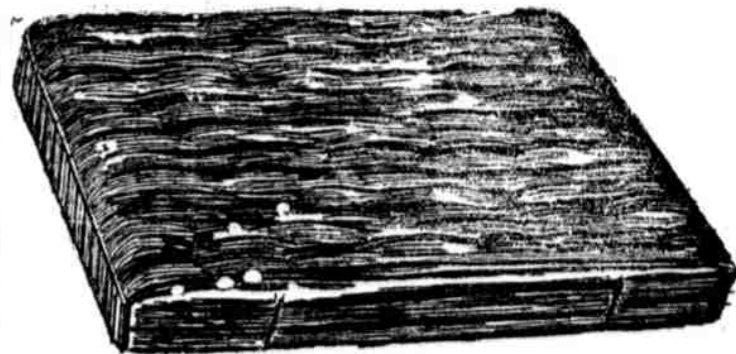

THE POET GOT HIS BATH.

Joaquin Miller's Adventure With Four Admirers at His Home Near Oakland.

It has long been charged against the people of California that they do not give due recognition to their men and women of genius. Up in his eyrie on East Oakland Heights, however, Joaquin Miller is sighing for less recognition of a certain sort. He is overrun with lion-hunters, who purloin his manuscripts, steal his books, peer through his windows and even carry off his coats, gloves and handkerchiefs. To such extent has this vandalism been carried that he has resorted to the expedient of nailing fast to the walls of his apartments anything that he really desires to keep.

On Wednesday of this week four well-dressed women presented themselves at the Heights and demanded to see the poet. Mr. Miller had just come in from the fields. It is no figure of speech when the poet of the Sierras speaks of himself as a laboring man. During the busy season of his ranch he is afield in the early morning, and has usually done a hard day's work about the time business men in the city are getting down to their daily tasks.

The work about the farm done it is the poet's custom to go to his cabin, take a bath and retire to his bed, where he devotes the rest of the day to literary work. He was just preparing his bath when the four pilgrims to the shrine of poesy appeared at his door.

"We have come to see Joaquin Miller," they announced.

Miller surveyed them. They were all strangers to him. He was dusty, hungry and tired from the morning's labor. There was manuscript that must be cut off.

"You must excuse me, ladies," he said. "I am about to take a bath and cannot see anyone this morning."

The women paid no heed. Instead, they gazed about the room, commented upon the decorations, asked questions and watched the poet getting the water ready for his bath. After waiting a reasonable time for the motion to adjourn the Bard of the Heights removed his hat. Then he paused.

"Is this where you do your writing, Mr. Miller?" the spokeswoman asked.

"This is where I take my bath," he said.

The remark passed apparently unheeded, and the poet removed his coat. Still his guests gazed and chatted. The water for his bath was rapidly cooling. He removed his vest.

"Where does that door lead to, Mr. Miller?"

"It leads out of doors," was the reply.

Still the ladies lingered, and the singer of the Sierras undid his necktie and dropped his suspenders from his shoulders.

Then he unlaced his shoes.

The situation was growing interesting, not to say dramatic. The visitors gazed at the poet. The poet returned their gaze. Then he dipped his fingers in the water to test its temperature. Then his choicer began to rise in earnest. He turned to the leader of the invasion. "I am about to take a bath," he explained, "and I think you will prefer to retire."

Shooing them gently before him, like so many hens, he was finally able to close the door upon them. "Well," said one, as the bolt was shoved home, "I call that cool."

The bath water was also cool.

THE SAMOA QUESTION.

Something must be done about Samoa by the three Powers—Germany, the United States and Great Britain—that made a treaty about the group several years ago which has proved to be a failure. It was reported some time ago that the large German firm, whose property interests gave Germany paramount foreign interests in the islands, was going to sell out to British capitalists. The United States has a national stake in the country from its treaty privilege of a coaling station at Pago-Pago, but it would seem that the splendid harbor so named belongs nominally to a British estate. We say "nominally" because it is doubtful if a harbor used by commerce and frequented by national vessels can be held in private hands. However, an interview has been published in London, which has been had with Dr. Lempriere, represented as "the agent of the late Mr. Sherwood, the owner of Pago-Pago, the largest harbor of Samoa and the only one secure from cyclonic disturbances." Dr. Lempriere is reported to have said:

"There have been constant communications between British, German and American governments regarding the future of Samoa. The present situation is an impossible one and can only result in the absolute destruction of trade and the gradual extinction of the natives. According to last accounts trade is at a standstill and the natives are in a condition of turbulence. New Zealand being the nearest British possession and largely interested in the development of Polynesian trade, is the proper quarter from which the question can be pressed best on the attention of the imperial government. I have the greatest confidence in Mr. Ward, the Colonial Treasurer of New Zealand, laying before his government some scheme having in view the alteration of the present condition of affairs.

"The Pacific cable having been decided on and the money guaranteed is a matter of vital importance to America as well as to Great Britain and the colonies. Fiji which was first proposed as a central station for coaling and for a station for repairing steamers, has been found unfit, being situated in the center of cyclonic disturbances. Only last winter a storm there leveled all the buildings in its track. Samoa, which is in the postal union and in direct steam connection with San Francisco, New Zealand and Australia, has a harbor three miles long by one-fourth of a mile wide and with safe anchorage.

"That America and Great Britain are both anxious to have the Samoan question settled is certain. Both countries desire to have an end put to the present deadlock, and it is hoped that some means may soon be found to settle the German claims and buy them out, if not at too exorbitant a figure."

There can be no question but that in international affairs British interests are ahead of all others. Not imperial interests, for Great Britain is not badly off for naval stations in the South Pacific, but the young lion New Zealand cannot but have nervous apprehensions over the possibility of any but the mother country taking possession or even control of Samoa. Whether or not the United States would lightly resign her pre-emption upon the harbor of Pago-Pago is one of the problems in the case. So far as the influence of her navy goes, she would stick to her privilege there. Her agents

sent to Samoa in other capacities would add their voices to those of naval officers in calling for the utilization of that harbor as an American naval station. Mr. Chambers, the commissioner sent by the United States to aid in settling land claims there, spoke with great enthusiasm to the writer about the harbor, saying it was unquestionably the finest in the world. In time to come, when the natural resources of Samoa are developed, it will probably be an important entrepot of commerce. If the United States hold on to her privilege there until that bane of her commerce, McKinleyism, be dead and buried, she will never relinquish it thereafter.

OBSERVATIONS.

Grammar, is it? Oh, take a tumble to yourselves!

There has really been nothing in the situation for the past two weeks to justify the continuation of the embargo upon internal commerce.

Why does not the Board of Health try some means of killing the disease germs in infected waters? It is said that this has been done elsewhere and can be accomplished without great expense.

Independent of cholera there was a greater mortality in Honolulu in September this year than in the corresponding month last year by eighteen. "Convulsions" was the most prolific cause of death next to cholera.

Nearly if not all of the foreign diplomatic representatives sent copies of Minister-elect Castle's Boston interview to their respective governments. It is learned that the document is considered a rare curio in diplomatic circles.

Watch the water and have it "healed" if possible, but cease restricting the people from their usual assemblies, especially when the restrictions are so partial as to be a farce. Witness the crowded cars and omnibuses these moonlit nights.

Turkey has obtained from private sources copies of the British Admiralty charts of the Dardanelles. She wanted them as a guide for laying torpedoes in that important passage. If Great Britain tells her to take the torpedoes up, however, up they will have to come. Poor old "sick man!" Dynamite will not make him well.

California winemakers are unreasonable in asking that their products should be made free of duty in Hawaii under the reciprocity treaty. Wine is regarded as a luxury to be taxed higher than necessities everywhere, even in countries where extreme free-trade sentiment prevails. If the Japanese saki, which is said to be driving out California wines, is as deleterious as it is said to be, let it be excluded from the country altogether upon the report of a commission of competent analysts.

Sugar may be regarded nowadays as a cheap commodity, but the enormous profits from its manufacture would indicate that people have to pay more for it than they should. An item from London is to the effect that Max Lebaudy, who inherited \$75,000,000 from his father, a sugar refiner, has, in his industrious efforts to dissipate the colossal fortune, fallen into the hands of the same gang who preyed upon the late Squire Abingdon the famous English sportsman.

That taro patch water at Palama ought to be analyzed and, if found to contain cholera germs, disinfected.

Some idea of the magnitude of Spreckelsville plantation can be gained from the figures in our reports of the great lawsuit.

It looks decidedly odd to prohibit the shipping of goods to the other islands, while allowing goods from Japan to be landed here. Cannot the fumigation of goods be effected here as well as at San Francisco, where the permitted Japanese merchandise has been fumigated.

It is reported from London that "the announcement of the engagement of the Duke of Marlborough and Miss Consuelo Vanderbilt has created a flutter of excitement throughout England." It simply means so much American gold married to the English nobility. If the daughters of Americans grown rich from monopolies allowed by the American people are too purse-proud to marry untitled American people, then the American people ought to take the hint and shut down on the facilities whereby so much unearned wealth is created to be transported across the seas.

TRIPLE OR THREE-STITCH
Sewing Machine

All the operator has to do is to draw out the interlaced shuttle thread and the chain stitch remains, which latter unravels easily as stated above. The machine can readily be changed from one stitch to another and back again to the ordinary lock stitch without any danger of getting out of order.
