## FLEET OF ARMY TRANSPORT

Newport, Tartar and Manauense Arrived From Frisco To-day.

List of Officers In Charge of Various Commands—Some Colored Troops—Various Transport Matters.

The transports Newport, Manauense and Tartar, filled with United States soldiers en route to the Philippines, arrived in port this morning. The three steamers left San Francisco at about the same time and fair weather was experienced all the way.

The officers of the Transport Newport are as follows: Capt. Friele, formerly of the Rio de Janeiro and the Peru; Chief Officer S. S. Tandberg; Engineer H. W. Dixon, Steward H. A. Collins and Surgeon Chas. Arthur.

The Newport left San Francisco Oct. 26, with the Third Battalion of the 23rd Infantry aboard. She arrives 462 soldiers and 32 officers. There are also 34 men of the hospital corps.

The Burial Corps aboard the Newport is being sent on to Manila for the express purpose of preparing and sending back to the United States, the bodies of all soldiers who have died in the Philippines.

The military officers aboard the Newport are as follows: Inspector General Garlington of the Department of the Pacific; Major John M. Porter; Commander of the Third Battalion; Lieut. Col. John Biddle of the Engineers; Major Drabs, Major Davis, Major Diskam and Captain Featon of the Commissary Department; Major Starbun of the Signal Corps.

Staff officers of the Third Battalion are as follows: Adjutant Ginty, Surgeon De Kraft and Dr. Cottrell, assistant surgeon.

Company officers: Captains Fries, Carson, Dana and Kena; first lieutenants Barber, Gardner, Boise, Terrill; second lieutenants Young, Ansbury, Mitchell and Turner.

The Manauense carries a section of the 31st Inf. of 450 officers and men. The officers in command are Lieut. Col. Webb C. Hayes, Major Hunter Leggett, formerly captain of 5th Infantry regulars, Lieut. C. O. Thomas Jr. is adjutant, formerly of 8th Infmanes.

The staff officers are Capt. A. L. Haines, assistant surgeon; Sergt. Maj. V. C. Lewis. The company officers are as follows: Captains Bunchfield, Reynolds, Gilmer, Wagner, Sylvanus.

The Transport Tartar came in shortly after the Manauense with the first and second battalions of the 23rd Regt. U. S. Volunteers (Infantry) on board.

The Tartar started from San Francisco Oct. 25, but on account of a fog, was compelled to remain until the following morning.

She was the last transport to enter San Francisco harbor and the last to get away. Her present officers are:

## RETURNS NOT REASSURING

Conditions in Transvaal Cause British to Worry.

Troops Fall Back on Ladysmith—Another Battle Anticipated—Boers Annexing British Territory.

Latest dispatches from the Transvaal are that the British forces have retired from the scene of their late successes, Glencor and Dundee with the apparent intention of concentrating on Ladysmith and their giving battle to the Boers. The terrible cost of the victories is unquestioned and it is not yet known that the Boers lost in proportion. Kimberley and Mafeking still hold out, but are calling for claim an army 100,000 strong. President Steyn of Orange Free State has declared the annexation of British colonial territory. Boers captured by the British are reported in high spirits and confident of success. Dr. Jameson has gone to take part in the fight.

London, October 25.—The commander-in-chief, Field Marshal Lord Wolsley, has apparently now been convicted of "doctoring" official reports from the front, and there is a strenuous demand on all sides for a reversion to the earlier practice, when the reports of General Sir Stewart White, the British commander in Natal, were given out textually as soon as received.

The commander-in-chief's summary, as reads in the House of Commons yesterday, spoke of a successful action, whereas General White's own account puts an entirely different complexion on the situation, reduces the movements to its proper proportions and shows that further exciting intelligence may be expected from the same quarter at any moment.

It is quite evident that the war in Natal has only commenced and that the Boers are by no means discouraged at losing the first two battles. Many experts are satisfied that General Joubert is even now close to the heels of the British and that a decisive action may be fought today or tomorrow.

The main fact that the British were forced to evacuate the Natal triangle, which the Boers naturally and rightly claim as a conspicuous success, and which they even emphasize by a proclamation annexing Northern Natal, is proving an unpalatable pill to the public, whose appetite has been whetted by the previous successes, which had been assumed to be greater than they really were, as the determination and gallantry of the Boers enabled them to quickly reorganize and achieve desired objects by other methods.

Later estimates of the Boers' losses at Elands Laagte give 300 killed. Their coolness, bravery and good aim can be judged from the fact that out of seventeen or eighteen officers with the half battalion of Gordon Highlanders, four were killed and thirteen were wounded, while the casualties among the rank and file were 27 per cent during less than three hours' firing. Lieutenant Campbell of the Gordon Highlanders has since died from the wounds.

A dispatch from Cape Town today says that General White has engaged the Orange Free State Boers, who were advancing on Ladysmith, about seven miles northward, and that it was believed the advance had been repelled. This is probably another version of yesterday's fighting, as already known.

The situation in the west is becoming complicated. The Boer proclamations of annexation and the claims of a victory at Glencor are likely to induce the Dutch to

## DEATH IN THE TYPHOON.

Victoria, B. C., Oct. 21.—The terrible typhoon through which the Empress of India and the United States transport Senator passed off the Japanese coast on Oct. 7 and 8 was of even greater force near the shore than it was at sea.

Hundreds of houses were blown down in Tokio and Yokohama and in the small towns along the coast and at the fishing station of Cae-nuaza 200 boats and nets were wrecked.

At Oiso and Koiso, 500 persons were killed, thirty-six severely injured and 150 slightly injured. In Tokio and Yokohama hundreds of houses were wrecked in all districts. A train bound for Fubushima from Myeou encountered a gale of such terrific fury when crossing the Hokokogowa that it was blown down into the river. All the cars, carrying about 100 passengers, were precipitated from the bridge.

The S. C. Allen having a fair breeze yesterday, endeavored to sail out of the harbor without a pilot. When just outside of the lighthouse the wind changed suddenly and both anchors had to be dropped. Later she was taken out by the Elen.

## BIRTHDAY OF THE MIKADO

Celebrated at Japanese Consulate by Consul Miki Saito.

Japanese Received This Forenoon—Foreigners This Afternoon—Celebration All Over City—Japanese Club Tonight.

Right royally did Japanese consul Miki Saito and his charming wife celebrate at the consulate today the 48th anniversary of the birth of the Mikado and right loyally did the Japanese throughout the city observe the day. Places of business and residences were decorated in the usual manner with lanterns, greens and the ever present red and white.

At the consulate this forenoon were received the Japanese of the city. Among those present were sixty boys and girls of the Japanese kindergarten and 130 school boys besides a large number of Japanese subjects. Those who assisted Mr. and Mrs. Saito in the reception were as follows: Prof. and Mrs. M. M. Scott, Mr. and Mrs. J. O. Carter, Mr. and Mrs. Imanishi and Miss Stansbury.

Along the front driveway are strings of Japanese lanterns white along the front lawn are the red and white of the Japanese. The large reception room to the left of the entrance is decorated with chrysanthemums growing in boxes of various shapes while about on tables are vases of flowers, real and artificial. The smaller room to the right is the reception room for the ladies.

The back lawn is also decorated and, in the back yard, flags and other decorations are flying in the wind. There was to have been fireworks this afternoon but this part of the program will very likely be omitted on account of the strong wind.

The reception at the Consulate from 4 to 6 this afternoon will be for foreigners. The band will furnish music as it did this forenoon.

There will be another celebration at the Japanese Club this evening.

## TAUSSIG INCIDENT CLOSED.

Washington, October 23.—The incident that occurred in the Philippines between Rear-Admiral John C. Watson, commander-in-chief of the Asiatic station, and Commander F. D. Taussig, in command of the Bennington, owing to a misunderstanding as to the way in which certain orders of the Admiral were to be carried out, as a result of which Commander Taussig was relieved of his command and ordered to return to the United States, has been closed by the Navy Department's action in the following manner: "Admiral Watson's action is held to be within the discretionary authority vested in him by article 304, paragraph 3, of the navy regulations, it being impracticable to have a court of inquiry, and owing to the present importance of the Asiatic station it is indispensable that harmony should be maintained in his command."

Commander Taussig is regarded, from the time of his arrival in the United States, as having been detached from duty on a foreign station.

New evidences of the remarkable peace secured by the Samoan Commission are coming prominently to the front.

Future boxing contests that include the finish of one of the principals are likely to be discounted at 100 percent.

President Steyn is starting in early to annex British territory. No one can blame him for improving the opportunity while it lasts.

Russia shows her friendship for the United States by submitting her Behring Strait claims to arbitration. A clash between Great Britain and Russia will place Uncle Sam in the position of the man with too many friends.

If the Washington authorities inform the Chinese "students," refused a landing in Hawaii that there is no appropriation from which to pay damage claims, it is safe to assume the official organ will call on the local government to pay the bill and charge to profit and loss.

The Official Organ Jr. asserts that after investigation its statement that the majority of Congressmen know little of Hawaii and care less, "stands." Let it stand. It is an easy conclusion that a governmental scheme to fix on this basis will result in Hawaii receiving very little attention and it will know where the local official element stands.

A high priced victory that did not leave a proper force to follow it up seems to be the situation of the British army in the Transvaal. The results thus far certainly favor the Boers since they are still keep the British hedged in, and because of their practical success are gaining new support from the Dutch of the British colonies.

New York, October 24.—Jim Jeffries' injured left arm is apparently as good as it ever was. The week's postponement of his contest with him Sharkey has benefited greatly and the champion declares that he does not expect to be handicapped by any further physical defect. Sharkey is in fine fettle yesterday he had some indoor exercise but it was against the advice of Tim McGeehan. The latter is afraid that the sailor will do too much labor and in this way grow "stale."

Said Pasha was good, Maritana was better. The Boston Lyrics are winning highest favors in whatever operative role they essay.

Maritana was given last evening before a large audience and the reception accorded the principals in their rendition of the high class work for which the piece calls demonstrates Honolulu's appreciation of the more exacting demands of classical music.

Josephine Stanton in the title role and Maude Lockley as Lazarillo were at their best, receiving hearty encores for their artistic rendering of difficult parts. Katherine McNeil also came in for well deserved recognition. Lovette Rockwell as Don Jose came in for the marked approval, which, though merited was lacking at his first appearance. Rockwell has a splendid voice and is a master of his art.

WHAT MR. EOA SAYS.

Speaking of an article on the Inter-Island Co. that appeared in this morning's paper Mr. Eoa, vice-president of the corporation, had the following to say:

"I was very much vexed with what appeared in the morning paper. The presidency of the Inter-Island Co. has not been offered me, nor have I been stat'd for such office. Captain Godfrey handed in his resignation to the Board of Directors to take effect on the first day of the present month and he has already ceased his duties in this office. 'Now then, coming to the proposition of the presidency, I would say that, were I offered the position I would very probably decline to accept it. The Board of Directors were kind enough to give me a long leave of absence on account of my health. I went to California and was much benefited. Were I to remain here long my illness might return in a much worse form. California has been good to me, I have bought interests there and feel that to return is what I should do. 'For higher offices I shall recommend J. R. McLean and Norman Gedgo who have served faithfully and long with the Inter-Island Co. 'Mind you, I am only speaking now of what will probably occur should I be offered the presidency. As yet, there has been no meeting and nothing whatever has been done."

## THERE IS NO PEACE IN SAMOA

Apia (Samoa island), October  
 19, via Auckland, October 25.—  
 Ostensibly to collect the poll tax  
 imposed by the provisional gov-  
 ernment, thirty Matafa chiefs  
 came into Apia. Two of their  
 number were assaulted by a re-  
 lative of Temasese for a breach of  
 etiquette while passing the latter's  
 house.

Both factions prepared for hos-  
 tilities, but after strenuous effort  
 of the officials and friends of both  
 sides it was agreed that the dif-  
 ferences should be settled in the  
 native court, when both sides  
 apologized. Neither the German  
 Consul nor the captain of the Ger-  
 man cruiser Cormoran assisted to  
 avert fighting.

A proclamation has been issued  
 directing that taxes are to be paid  
 only at the Government house.  
 The project of a foreign captain  
 to drill volunteer forces, being op-  
 posed by the residents, was finally  
 abandoned. Speaking generally,  
 matters in Samoa are quiet.

London, October 24.—The First  
 Lord of the Treasury and Govern-  
 ment leader, A. J. Balfour, repy-  
 ing in the House of Commons to  
 a question regarding the damage  
 done to Roman Catholic missions  
 in Samoa by the shells of British  
 war ships, said only a single case  
 had been brought to the notice of  
 the Government, adding that any  
 claim would be fully considered.  
 But, he pointed out, according to  
 the principles of international  
 law, the Government was under  
 no liability to compensate for  
 losses caused by operations of  
 war.

Later Mr. Balfour announced  
 that it was expected that Parlia-  
 ment would be prorogued Friday.

**German Ship to Stay at Samoa.**  
 Berlin, October 24.—The Ger-  
 man protected cruiser Cormoran  
 has been ordered to remain at  
 Samoa. A dispatch to the Cologne  
 Gazette from Apia says: "The  
 proposal to divide Samoa is con-  
 sidered here a most unhappy  
 solution. Owing to the manifold  
 interests linking the islands to  
 Germany it is hoped that she will  
 not renounce her claims."

**Spanish Minister Resigned.**  
 Madrid, October 23.—The Min-  
 ister of Justice, Senor Duran, has  
 resigned in consequence of the  
 decision of the Government to  
 suspend the constitutional guar-  
 antees at Barcelona.

ARMY AND NAVY. Washington, October 24.—Secretary Long has determined to meet the demand for officers and men in the Philippines by placing several of the battleships on the home stations out of commission. The Indiana, now at the Brooklyn Navy Yard, and the Texas, at Norfolk, will be the first to be laid up, and it is possible that others will follow. Many of the officers and men on these two ships will be ordered immediately to the Philippines. Those whose terms of sea duty have nearly expired will be transferred to other ships on the home station in place of those who have nearly a full term of sea service before them.
