Foreign News Items.

The Spanish are straining every nerve at Cadiz to prepare Camara's fleet for sea.

Insurgent advices say that confusion and even terror exist in anticipation of a combined sea attack. Riots are apprehended immediately the attack is begun. The insurgents will signal the fleet when all is ready.

El Herald, a Madrid paper says: "Cervera's squadron at Santiago is of little advantage, either for itself or for what it represents. It can neither hinder the Yankee expedition nor strengthen the defense of Havana. Spain was never before led through such a straight road to perdition."

The British authorities of Jamaica are consulting the Home government as to the neutrality of press boats that carry official dispatches.

Senator Yancy Carter of Georgia will lead a company of giants in the war with Spain. He enlists only men six feet high or more. Physically the company will hold a distinction similar to that of the Queen's Horse Guards in London.

Joe Anderson, elephant keeper in a circus, was killed by an elephant at Racine, Wisconsin. The animal became ugly and chased the whole police force and a crowd of excited citizens.

When Blanco surrenders Havana the largest flag in the world will be hoisted over Morro Castle. It was made to the order of a patriotic Wall street New Yorker. This star spangled banner is 120 feet in length and 43 1-3 feet in width.

The Red Cross Society of Sacramento has sent to San Francisco a large lot of articles for the soldiers, besides raising \$2500 in money.

Complaints have been sent to Washington about the bad condition of the water supply and sewerage at the Presidio, where the soldiers for Manila are quartered.

The United States has demanded of Paraguay that the Spanish torpedo boat Temerario either be dismantled or ordered to leave Paraguayan waters at once.

The steamer Ohio, to be used as a transport, was expected to sail from Seattle for San Francisco last Tuesday. She is having her accommodations increased to carry 1000 troops.

The popular votes in both Victoria and Tasmania has resulted in favor of the Australian Federation bill. In New South Wales the result is still doubtful.

A movement is on foot to have a title conferred on Mrs. W. E. Gladstone. It is suggested that she be created Countess of Liverpool and that another member of the family be created Viscount of Hawarden.

SENATOR KEPOIKAI REPORTS

Bill to Establish an Employment Agency Laid on the Table.

Senate Adjourns Out of Respect to J. I. Dowsett and Appoints a Committee to Attend the Funeral.

The Senate Session lasted about half an hour this morning.

Senator Schmidt from the Finance Committee presented the report on the expediting of the Custom House books, which was read and filed.

Senator Kepoikai, from the Miscellaneous Committee, to whom was referred House Bill 84, establishing a general employment agency, reports adversely for the following reasons:

"The committee is of the opinion that there are altogether too many paid officials in the Government employ at present without increasing the number by new legislation, and that the number should be lessened instead of increased.

"In other countries where there is a demand for an employment bureau such as is proposed by the present bill, there is generally to be found both enterprising men and women willing to open the same and depend on their own exertions for remuneration.

"Further the Committee does not believe in the government going into the business of opening an employment bureau, or that it would succeed if it did with our present limited population, and therefore recommend that the bill be laid on the table.

"In conclusion the undersigned would add that he is the only member of the Committee in town but is firmly of the opinion that if the other two members were present they would thoroughly endorse and agree with the above."

The report was adopted by a unanimous vote and the bill laid on the table.

In answer to the request of the House for a conference on House Bill 81, relating to pounds and estrays, the Public Lands Committee was appointed to represent the Senate.

Senator Brown after a few words of eulogy on the late J. I. Dowsett moved that a committee of five be appointed to attend his funeral and that the Senate do adjourn out of respect to his memory.

President Wilder appointed Senators Schmidt, Lyman, Wilcox, Brown and Kepoikai as the Committee and at 10:30 declared the Senate adjourned.

WORK IN THE HOUSE.

In the House this morning, the Speaker announced the committee to attend the funeral of the late J. I. Dowsett: A. B. Loebenstein, D. H. Kabaulelio, P. R. Isenberg, L. L. McCandless, and J. L. Kaulukou, chairman.

NOW FOR ANNEXATION.

Agreement Reached to Put Hawaiian Question to Vote.

The following telegram was passed around the House of Representatives this morning by Minister Smith: "A telegram from Minister Hatch dated June 3d states that Speaker Reed has withdrawn his objection to the Joint Resolution of Annexation, and that it would be taken up as soon as the Revenue Bill had been acted upon in the Senate. This was to be done immediately.

ANNEXATION ADVICES.

Views Expressed by Prominent San Francisco Firm.

A prominent business firm received the following from the San Francisco agents in today's mail: "June 3.—The situation has been improving so far as early action is concerned. The general opinion is that some definite action will be taken within a very short time.

The urgency of the president to place the Islands under the American flag is one of the principal reasons why we are inclined to think early action may be expected. Friends of the Islands generally are supporting the President in his views and we are convinced the opposition is weakening.

Russian Cruiser for Pacific.

St. Petersburg, June 3.—The new Russian cruiser Sveitlana, of 3828 tons displacement, has been ordered to the Pacific. She has a speed estimated at over twenty knots and carries six 5.9 inch quick-firing guns of the Canet type and ten 1.8 inch guns. She was built in France. She has four inches of armor over her gun positions and has an armored deck two inches thick.

Surcharging Revenue Stamps.

The Department of Finance is having a quantity of 25 cent revenue stamps surcharged to 20 cents, the supply of the latter denomination being exhausted, while there is little demand for the 25 cent variety. Twenty cent stamps are required on all certificates of stock transferred, which accounts for the unusual demand for this denomination.

They Want Annexation.

The Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce which up to a month ago has been bitterly opposed to annexation has passed a resolution endorsing annexation and wired the Southern California delegates in Washington to work for it. This means Senator S. M. White.

Fair in Aid of St. Andrew's.

On Saturday afternoon the Fair given in aid of St. Andrew's will open. The doors open at two o'clock in the afternoon and seven in the evening. The Government band will be in attendance as well as the Quintette Club.

The Rapid Transit Bill.

Lawyers W. A. Kinney and W. R. Castle, with the lay assistance of C. G. Ballentyne, spent yesterday afternoon laboring with the Senate Committee on the Rapid Transit Bill. The committee was in session over three hours, and nearly the same time in the morning.

He is unable to get enough of the beetles to supply the demand for the inoculated ones.

HIGH NOONTIDE MARRIAGE

Nuptials of D. Howard Hitchcock and Miss Hester Dickson.

Friends of the Couple Assisting at the Ceremony—Decorations and Music—Breakfast and Honeymoon.

The marriage of Mr. David Howard Hitchcock and Miss Hester Dickson was solemnized at high noon today in St. Andrew's cathedral. There was a large assembly of invited people. The Rev. Alex. Mackintosh, pastor of the Second congregation, was the officiant. He employed with his accustomed impressiveness the ritual of the American Episcopal church.

Decorations were of a striking and stately kind. The pulpit, lectern and canelabra were decked out with flowered royal palm fronds, papyrus leaves and tall ribbon lily blades. Banks of ferns spangled with roses and other flowers were on the front pews, and the choir desks were matted with delicate ferns.

The front pews were occupied by relatives and intimate friends of the contracting parties—Dr. and Mrs. J. S. B. Pratt, Mr. and Mrs. H. S. Townsend, Mrs. S. G. Wilder, Mrs. C. L. Wight, Dr. and Mrs. F. R. Day, Mr. and Mrs. A. M. Brown. Others in church were Mrs. S. B. Dole, Rev. Dr. Bingham, Mrs. A. Mackintosh, Chief Justice and Mrs. A. F. Judd, Justice and Mrs. W. F. Frear, Col. and Mrs. W. F. Allen, Senator A. de Souza Canavaro, Commissioner for Portugal, among a host of prominent people.

Gerrit P. Wilder, Saml. G. Wilder, Geo. R. Carter and E. R. Adams were the ushers.

Walter F. Dillingham was best man, and John and Harry Waterhouse were groomsmen.

Miss E. Paushi Judd was the maid of honor, and the bridesmaids were Miss Cordelia Carter and Miss Clara Fuller.

The bride was supported to the chancel rail by Chief Justice Judd, who did the service of giving her away.

The bride was neatly and simply attired in a white grasscloth costume, trimmed with white satin including drooping sash, her hat ornamented with white feathers, orange blossoms peeping from under the rim. She carried a bouquet of maiden hair fern with white asters.

HERO HOBSON'S GRAND DEED

With Seven Men He Blocked Santiago Harbor Channel.

Blew Up Collier Merrimac—Captured by Spanish but Remarkable Bravery Recognized.

An Associated Press dispatch of June 3 from Port Antonio (Hayti) says: "The fleet is wild with delight tonight over the termination of the most daring expedition since the destruction of the Confederate ironclad Albatross by Lieutenant Cushing in 1864. The Admiral is just as glad as the youngest jackie.

Just before daylight seven gallant seamen took the collier Merrimac under the blazing Morro batteries, and anchored and sunk her beneath a spiteful fire of musketry and cannonading from the shore.

This splendid stroke, was planned by Lieut. Richmond P. Hobson, who commanded the expedition. He is a naval constructor, attached to the Annapolis, and his home is in Brooklyn. With him went Samuel L. Montague, George Charette, J. E. Murphy, Oscar Deiguan, John P. Phillips and John Kelley, all non-commissioned or enlisted men. A steam launch from the flagship New York, commanded by Cadet J. W. Powell, followed the Merrimac to the mouth of the harbor, and despite the fire from the forts, cruised in the vicinity for an hour and a half after the collier was sunk, but no sign of the brave Americans was seen and Cadet Powell was finally compelled to return to the flagship.

Hundreds of men volunteered for the dangerous errand.

By 10 o'clock all but the men who were going on the dangerous errand had been taken from the Merrimac, and the collier took a position near the New York.

It was an impressive night among the men of the fleet, for few expected that the members of the little crew would see another sunrise.

Lieutenant Hobson appears to have carried out his plan to the smallest details, except as regards the method of escaping. The row-boat, in which the crew were to attempt to escape, was either blown up or shot to pieces, for Lieutenant Hobson and his men drifted ashore on an old catamaran, which was slung over the ship's side at the last moment as an extra precaution.

Upon reaching shore the men were taken prisoners and sent to Santiago City under guard. Later they were taken to Morro Castle, where they are now.

Captain Ovi-do, Admiral Cervera's chief of staff, who boarded the New York under a flag of truce, does not give further details of the capture.

The bravery of the Americans evidently excited as much admiration among the Spaniards as it did among the men of the American fleet. The prisoners will be perfectly safe and will probably be well treated while they remain in Morro Castle.

CERVERA IS BOTTLED UP

Hemmed In at Santiago By Sunken Steamer.

American Fleet Outside—Army of Invasion Soon to Go to Cuba—General News Notes.

Cape Haytien, June 3.—3:15 p. m.—The American fleet, according to advices received by cable from Santiago de Cuba, the cable being under Spanish control, opened fire again at 3 o'clock this morning (Friday) on the fortifications and war ships. The cannonade was well sustained until 4 o'clock a. m.

One of the United States auxiliary cruisers, "well armed," attempted to force the passage into the harbor. The Spanish allowed the cruiser to cross the first line of torpedoes, but before she arrived at the second line they discharged at her a torpedo, which broke a great hole in her side and caused her to sink almost instantly, bow first. The name of the vessel is not known, nor is the number of victims reported.

One officer, one engineer and six sailors were made prisoners by the Spaniards.

"10:25 p. m.—A dispatch from Santiago says that the vessel sunk is understood to be the Merrimac. Only the extremities of her funnel and two masts are visible above the water.

Port Au Prince (Hayti), June 3.—9:45 p. m.—This morning at 3 o'clock the American squadron began the bombardment of the fortifications of Santiago de Cuba and a lively cannonade ensued for two hours, which silenced the Spanish batteries.

An American vessel, the Merrimac, described in the advices from Santiago de Cuba as an auxiliary cruiser, making a dash to force the entrance, succeeded in passing the first line of defenses, but was torpedoed about 500 feet up the channel. She went down "perpendicularly." An officer, an engineer and six seamen were taken prisoners. The number of victims is unknown. Only the funnel and masts of the sunken vessel can be seen.

There is great excitement in the city. A part of the population assisted in the fighting on the heights. Everybody is astounded at the audacity of the American vessel. The American squadron was cruising all the while in the offing.

A second dispatch from Santiago states that it is believed that the Merrimac was sent into the neck of the harbor by the Americans for the purpose of closing the port and thus preventing the escape of the Spanish squadron. From information conveyed by the prisoners it is believed that they volunteered for this dangerous work, and that none perished. They were prepared for the explosion when it occurred.

It is reported here that the Spanish Consul received a cable saying that the Americans again bombarded the defenses of Santiago and that at the same time a body of insurgents, led by General Rabi, attacked the town. The hand engagement was bloody. It resulted in a drawn battle. Insurgents encamped on Holguin road, the Spaniards around the Plaza de Armas. The Spanish fleet in the harbor suffered under bombardment.

Baltimore, June 3.—The Merrimac was purchased by the Government from the Lone Star Steamship Company early in April. She was formerly the Norwegian steamer Solveig, and was nearly destroyed by fire at Newport News in 1896. She was built at Newcastle, England, in 1894, was 330 feet long, 44 feet beam and had a net register of 2103 tons. The Merrimac left Norfolk, where she was fitted for Government purposes, about a month ago.

CAMPAIGN FOR ANNEXATION

Quick Work Expected in House of Representatives.

Old Enemies Combining in Senate—President McKinley Bringing His Forces to Bear.

A Washington despatch of June 3 says that the annexation resolution will be called up in the House either the 6th or 7th inst. Two days discussion will be allowed. The resolution will be taken up in committee of the whole.

It is believed the resolution will be adopted by a majority of about 50. If the resolution passed by Thursday it will go to the Senate immediately if on Friday it will be taken up in the Senate the following week.

It is believed a combination has been formed by Senators Allison, Aldrich, White and Jones of the Finance Committee to prevent action. Annexation Senators, however, still insist there is no doubt of favorable action. One Senator states he believes a week only will be required to settle the opposition.

President McKinley discussed the question of Hawaiian annexation with several Representatives who were in conference with him today. He told them it was of the utmost importance that the two houses of Congress take prompt action upon the resolution. He indicated that he received assurances of a majority in the Senate who will vote for annexation.

Condensed Dispatches.

There is a persistent belief in Paris and Madrid that Admiral Cervera's fleet is not at Santiago de Cuba, but on the way to Manila.

A Gaulois correspondent has it that Cervera maneuvered so as to deceive the Americans and then started at full speed for the Philippines. He was expected to arrive there on the 4th or 5th of June. His orders were to destroy Dewey's fleet and then go out and capture the transports. Admiral Camara's squadron would join Cervera's in a few weeks.

Foreigners in Manila are said to pity the 2500 troops on the way there.

Twenty thousand American troops will go to Cuba as the first army of invasion. The troops are the pick of the soldiers at Tampa. They were to sail last Monday.

A Cadiz dispatch says it may be positively stated that Admiral Camara and the entire third fleet were at Cadiz on Monday. The squadron might sail in a few days, its destination unknown.

The Minister of War, in the Spanish Chamber, answering a question said the Government was deliberating about sending troops to the Philippines.

Admiral Sampson's squadron has joined Commodore Schley's off Santiago. The squadrons are not united but will act as separate entities.

In Washington it is given out, that Cervera and his ships are at Sampson's mercy whenever he elects their destruction.

Fifteen transports with 10,000 troops, sailed from Tampa on Saturday for Santiago and Porto Rico.

Five transports left Mobile. Schley's reports confirms the naval officials in the belief that they have been wise not to direct a reckless assault upon Santiago.

A London paper announces a United States war loan of \$200,000,000 to be issued in London this week.

All doubt of the Spanish fleet's trapping in Santiago is removed by a report of Captain Sigbee of the St. Paul, describing how that cruiser and Schley's squadron made the discovery.

A dispatch received in Philadelphia on the 4th, from an officer in Sampson's fleet says:

"A severe battle is now going on, and Sampson's fleet has completely demolished the fortifications of Santiago. The batteries are silenced. As to the American fleet, we can give no report at this time."

The war revenue bill has passed the Senate. It is expected to yield \$10,000,000 a year.

"No lives lost" is quite as cheering war news as that of the successful operations of warships.

In spite of all that has been said of the cussedness of Spanish nature, the Merrimac incident shows that they know how to appreciate and honor marked bravery.

Now the betting fraternity can exchange bets on whether the United States will act on the annexation measure before our own Legislature finishes its last thirty days.

When the San Francisco Call states that the annexation resolution is to be put to vote the people can come pretty near banking on it. An admission from the Call favorable to annexation must be a fact.

ANNEXATION OUTLOOK.

Advices by the Mohican indicate that the annexation campaign is fast approaching the period when American representatives will register themselves positively on the proposition. It seems reasonable to believe that the balance will be turned either for or against this government before the end of the present month.

Up to the present time both friends and enemies of the measure have been playing for place. The oppositionists have undoubtedly had the advantage. They have counseled delay on the ground that more important measures should be given the right of the way. Now, however, the decks are cleared for Hawaiian action. The revenue bill is practically out of the way, the administration has been supplied with the sinews of war, the hot season is coming on in Washington and finally, Congressmen are anxious to get home and patch up their political fences preparatory to the Fall elections.

About the only thing left is the Hawaiian proposition, and the administration forces are lining up, working tooth and nail to secure not only a vote but a favorable vote. Speaker Reed is reported to have withdrawn his opposition. We hope he has, but the Speaker has been similarly reported about once a week for the last six months. While our opinions are decidedly conservative, perhaps pessimistic, as to the future action of the United States on this subject, the outlook certainly seems very favorable for Hawaii. President McKinley's power and influence in Congress and among the people has been steadily increasing since the day he took his seat. He is a man who is universally trusted as a safe and conservative custodian of national interests. The object lessons of the war have created a remarkable change in the foreign policy ideas of the body politic.

All things have combined to cause the people to look with distrust upon those seeking to handicap the administration in handling the affairs of what may well be termed an awakened nation. Congressmen and Senators of the

"peace at any price" stamp know that they face political death. With the public temper in its present state and the elections close at hand, it seems probable that many legislators will profit by the experience of others and think twice before opposing the annexation of Hawaii.

WAR NEWS.

All signs indicate that the Spanish fleet in Cuban waters is securely bottled up in the harbor of Santiago de Cuba. The final cork was put in when Lieutenant Hobson with a picked crew of seven men sunk the collier Merrimac in the harbor channel. The lieutenant with his men escaped death, but were taken prisoners and are now held by the Spanish for an exchange that will soon be accomplished.

The squadrons of Sampson and Schley are centered at Santiago, and troops are being forwarded for a combined land and naval attack. A Spanish paper characterizes its fleet as on the high road to perdition. That it will be defeated seems assured.

Advices from Europe state that every effort is being used to get Camara's fleet in condition, and a persistent rumor comes from Paris and Madrid to the effect that a good number of Spanish ships are on their way to attack Dewey. This rumor however is not credited. Rumors of foreign interference are still rife, but Great Britain is steadfastly withholding from any combinations, and other nations fear to combine against her. Spain has yet to make overtures for peace.

At Manila all is quiet. Preparations for forwarding troops to Dewey's assistance go on apace. The war revenue bill has passed the Senate and now goes to conference. This bill provides for a war bond issue.

The Old War.

New York, June 3.—A dispatch from London says: A Havana dispatch says the insurgents have commenced a forward movement against the Spanish outposts. A force of 500 insurgents under Garcia attacked a hill fort near Holguin, but the garrison, composed of fifty volunteers, made a determined resistance and mowed down the Cubans at short range. Garcia retired, leaving sixty-eight killed and wounded, exclusive of many that were carried off.

A dispatch from Key West says: Blanco has withdrawn large bodies of troops from the coast line to Cardenas, Matanzas, Havana and Cienfuegos, leaving only a light patrol at the vacated points.

English Correspondents Released.

Havana, June 3.—The English newspaper correspondents, Whigham and Robinson, recently captured after having been landed on the coast, have been released, owing to the representations made in their behalf by Alexander Gollin, the British Consul.

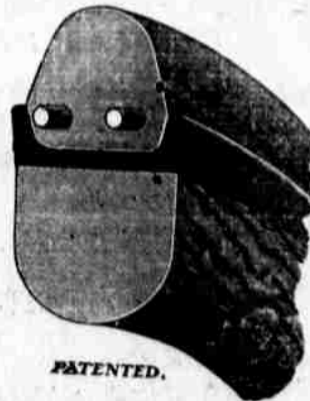

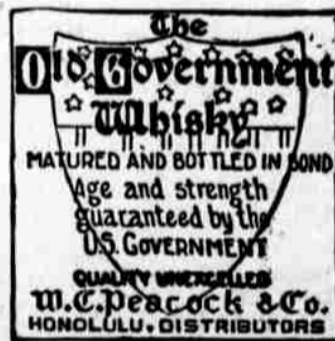

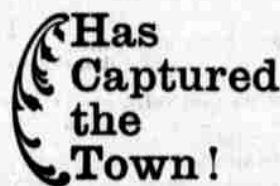

PROTEST AGAINST OPIUM

Woman's Board of Missions Expresses It Opinion.

The Following Memorial Against the Opium Bill Has Been Read Before the House Committee.

HONOLULU, May 31, 1898.

To the Honorable, The Legislature of the Republic of Hawaii.

This memorial from the Women's Board of Missions for the Pacific Islands, respectfully represents that we are deeply interested in the maintenance of a high standard of morality and purity in the character and homes of the people of this community.

We feel deeply the wronged and injury which has found advocates and champions on the introduction of a bill to license the sale of opium. Against such a measure we entered our most earnest protest, when such license was favored by H. M. Queen Liliuokalani, and in such protest we had then the earnest support of some who would now seem to favor the licensed sale of a drug whose deleterious influences have been manifested and condemned as ruinous to health, industry and happiness among just such classes of population as are so numerous in this country.

We are convinced that it destroys the vigor of manhood, the vitality of the race, the progress of society, the order of the family and interferes with the administration of the government.

And we herewith present our protest against the enactment of iniquity by law, and remonstrating against the passage of the proposed bill to license the sale of opium.

And your petitioners will ever pray.

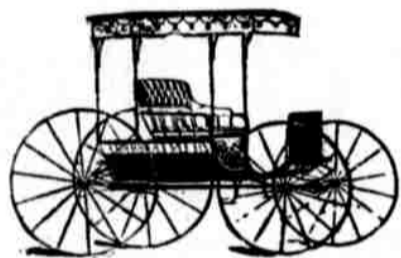

ITEMS FROM HARBOR FRONT

The Mauna Loa sails for Kona and Kau at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning.

The steamer Hawaii which is still on the Marine Railway will relieve the Helene on the Hilo coast as soon as she is ready for sea.

Captain Turner, formerly mate of the R P Rithet, who took command of the Mohican during Captain Saunderson's absence, has relinquished that vessel and returned to his position on the Rithet.

No news was received by either W. G. Irwin & Co. or Hackfeld & Co. regarding the sending of a steamer to Honolulu in place of the Zealandia or anything regarding the whereabouts of the Peru.

The Inter-Island company is in their new block on Queen street having completed moving Tuesday. It is said a prominent grocery firm now located on this street has taken the old offices of the company.

The record for a dull water front has nearly been reached. For four days no vessel has entered or cleared from this port. The steamer J A Cummins from Lagoon ports was the only arrival up to 2 o'clock p.m.

The barkentine W H Dimond is at Allen street discharging a general cargo from San Francisco. She came into port at 6 o'clock this morning after a 17-day trip having passed the bark S C Allen, which sailed the same day, off Molokai. The Dimond contains a lot of merchandise greatly needed by local tradesmen.

Over at the railway wharf today wharfinger Frank Bergstrom is busy unloading the ship Marie Hackfeld with the machinery and rigging intended for discharging coal vessels. He is succeeding in great shape and the iron flumes for the new plantation, chemicals for the Fertilizer works and other goods are being expeditiously loaded on the cars and sent away.

Crack Hawaiian Vessel.

The big Hawaiian ship John Ena arrived in port yesterday from Newcastle, Australia, after making remarkably rapid passage. She was just seventy-one days from port to port, and is the winner in a three-cornered ocean race by a margin that as yet is an unknown quantity.

The Ena left Newcastle in company with the ships Langdale and Gladys, both famous for their clean heels, and each captain was certain of reaching the city of the Golden Gate first. The John Ena encountered her share of heavy weather and for over a week encountered light baffling winds, but she was lucky in picking up the trades and has managed to make one of the smartest passages of the ocean.—S F Call.

Hawaii Will Tow Labrador Off.

Alex. Lyle of Sorenson & Lyle, the ship builders, who have the contract for floating the schooner Labrador off the sands at Makana, will go to that landing on the steamer Hawaii, Captain Bob Andrews, this afternoon. A complete outfit for securing the schooner will be taken along. A new hawser is on the Hawaii which will be used for the first time tugging at the wrecked vessel. Timbers will be placed below the Labrador so that her bottom will not be torn by the rocks over which she will have to be taken. It is understood that there is no specific sum in the contract between the Government and the wrecking company but that the Labrador will be hauled off as economically as possible and repaired and placed in good condition so that a reasonable amount may be realized from her sale. The Hawaii will not remain at Makana if operations are delayed but another steamer will be used.
