The "Butter Question" seems to be exciting considerable cross comment between dealers and consumers.

An enterprising barbarian on Maunakea street has put up a "Meican" soda fountain, and is raking in a portion of the five-cent pieces.

Five hundred dollars reward has been offered for the arrest of the miscreants who set fire to the trash houses of the Star Mill, at Kohala.

It is alleged that some of the sheep killed for this market have been fed in fields where glandered horses had grazed and afterwards been shot.

Mr. M. Goldberg will open a clothing and furnishing store on the corner of Merchant and Fort streets, in the store formerly occupied by the Temple of Fashion, on or about the twentieth of next month.

It is reported that the reason the Government political meeting did not come off last Wednesday night was because it was found out at the last minute that there are not enough adherents to the Government party in Honolulu to make a quorum.

A bulky horse, attached to the express wagon of West, Dow & Co., kicked up a little shindig on Hotel street last evening about half-past five o'clock; fortunately, nobody was hurt and no damage was done—but there was a good deal of fun.

The Chinese on Nuuanu street are very much excited over a new gambling game lately introduced here, viz: they bet five cents apiece on the number of seeds contained in an orange, which is afterwards cut open by the game keeper. This is another show for policemen to make a little perquisite.

A musicale will be given at Oahu College on next Monday evening, December 14th, 1885. A varied and interesting programme will be given. The programme will consist of two parts, each containing eight numbers. Neat programmes have been issued, and a most delightful evening's entertainment is anticipated.

The new lime kiln being built beyond the Fish Market for the Hawaiian Stone Co., by Honolulu's enterprising builder and contractor, Mr. E. B. Thomas, is drawing near completion, and when finished will double the quantity of the company's production, which is at present less than the demand.

The calendar is compactly made, and contains the weekly phases of the moon, besides comparative calendars for the years 1885-6-7, and other valuable and interesting information.

"Irish Turkey!" displayed in prominent characters, formed one of the items of the bill of fare at a Nuuanu street restaurant yesterday noon. An Irish gentleman, impressed with the idea that the bird had been imported from his own native clime, said he would "try some of the turkey." He was promptly served with a fine plate of California cabbage, upon which were placed several neatly sliced pieces of corned beef. "But I ordered turkey!" roared Pat, who had his teeth set for the imported fowl. "Yes, sir, and here it is," politely responded the waiter; "this is what American-Hawaiians term 'Irish Turkey.'" "Sold again!" mused the boarder from the green Isle of the Shamrock; "begorra a man's never too old to learn when he's away from home."

The other day a man was asked if he could write a local; whereupon he sat down and took up that mightiest of mighty weapons, the sword, which travels over the wide world, cutting and slaying in the interest of love, war and commerce. After a little bashful hesitation he penned the following bosh, fully convinced he was not a newspaper man: "Yesterday morning at eight, fifty-one and a half, on Fort street, midway between the house that exhibits a red flag and the one that was once the O. P. M. B., a mulish Chinaman and a Celestial's horse afforded some amusement to the childish bystanders, by their attempting to prove their superiority over each other in the matter of opinion. 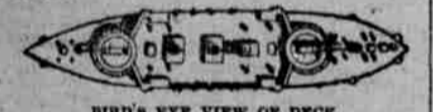
One of the New British Ironclads. Six war vessels have just been completed for the British navy. They are called the "Admiral" ships from being named for famous admirals.

The Benbow is, however, the most notable vessel of her class in the British navy. She is different from others in that she carries the two most powerful naval guns in the world.



The Benbow cannon is more powerful than the famous Krupp 110-ton gun. This weapon fires with a muzzle energy of 46,061 foot tons.

The Benbow's gun has a muzzle energy of 61,300 foot tons. It is calculated that it will pierce a wrought iron armor plate over thirty inches thick.



The Benbow's big guns are seen at each end of the ship, sticking out like a telescope draws out. They are very thick at the breech, and get smaller and lighter "by jumps" toward the muzzle.

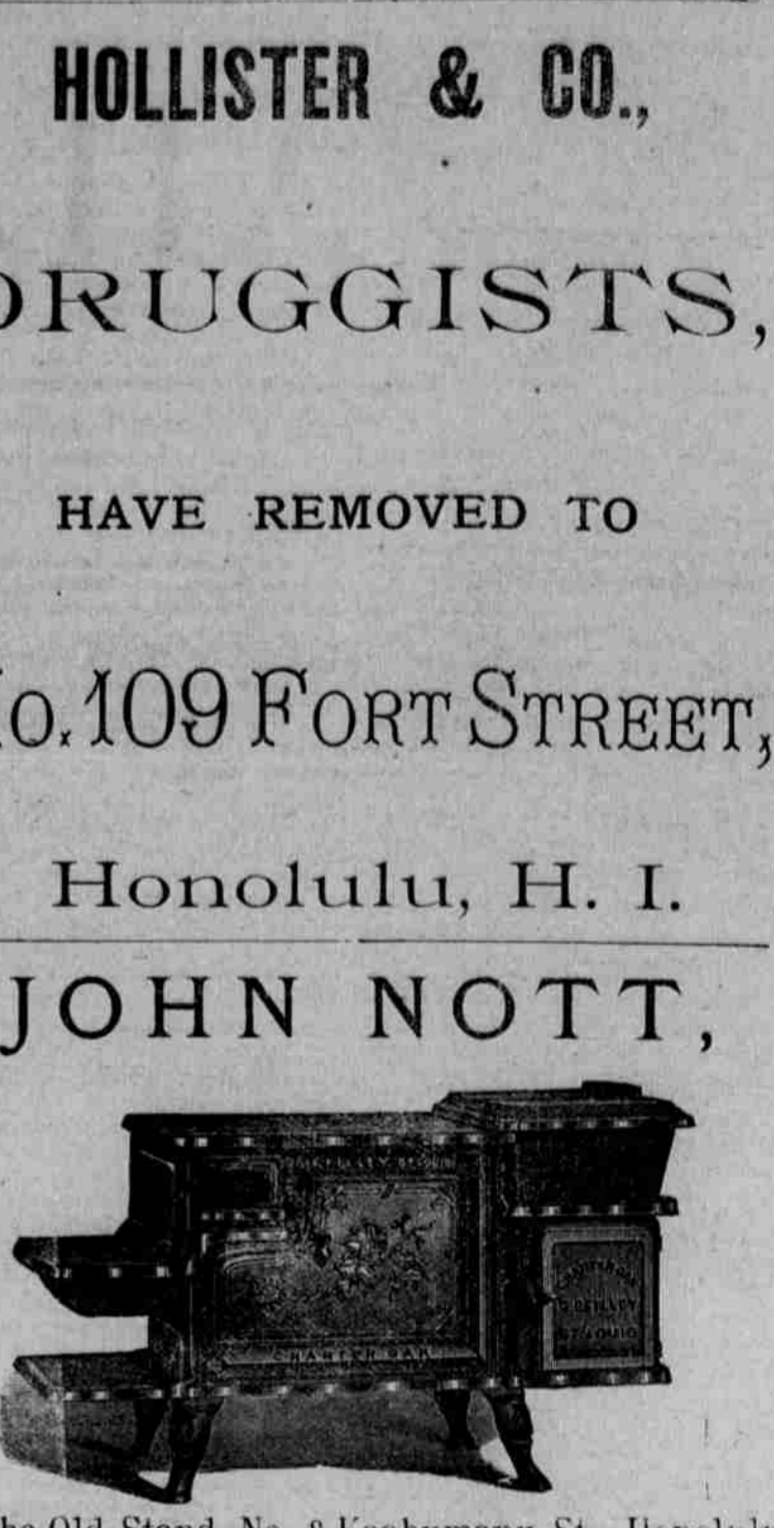
