THE DREYFUS VERDICT.

French Ministry Preparing to Act if it is Against Him.

Special Dispatch to The Call

NEW YORK, Sept. 3.—A Sun cable from London says: The Rome correspondent of the Central News says that he has interviewed many of the Vatican officials, including Monsigneurs Piferi and Angeli, and learns that the Pope and a number of the high dignitaries are opposed to Dreyfus. He adds that the Vatican will not issue instructions to the French clergy in regard to their attitude when the Rennes court martial delivers its verdict.

NEW YORK, Sept. 3.—The Journal cable from Rennes says: Doubts of a full acquittal—even of any acquittal—are becoming so general that the Cabinet yesterday discussed the situation and a movement was begun to take the matter before the Court of Cassation with the design of having the proceedings quashed on the ground that the procedure before the court-martial was illegally transcended the limit set by the Cassation Court in transferring the case to a court-martial. Advices from Paris to-night state that the ablest lawyers of the parliamentary bar have been asked to report on the question, which is a difficult one, new to French procedure.

It is also reported on good authority to-night that if Dreyfus is condemned the Cabinet will either resign as a matter of form or ask for a vote of confidence from the Chamber as the preliminary of another action which will be of a very determined character, regarding Mercier and Gonse. This indicates that the entire gang of War Office conspirators against Dreyfus and Picquart will be arrested on a criminal charge of conspiracy and sent to trial without delay.

The charge is frequently made by the Catholic press that Dreyfus is a free Mason, but up to now proof has been lacking. Yesterday, however, some one furnished Millevoye of La Patrie with a copy of the official report of the Supreme Masonic Council of France for 1893, wherein Dreyfus appears as having taken the thirty-second degree.

LABORI APPEALS TO ALIENS.

Urges German and Italian Officers to Give Testimony.

Special Dispatch to The Chronicle.

RENNES, Sept. 5.—M. Labori this afternoon telegraphed personal appeals to Emperor William and King Humbert to grant permission to Colonel Schwarzkoppen and Colonel Panizzardi, German and Italian military attaches in Paris in 1894, to come to Rennes to testify in the trial of Captain Dreyfus. This is the news of the day and the chief topic of conversation in the cafes and resorts of the journalists this evening.

The appeals were couched in eloquent terms, invoking the assistance of their majesties in the name of justice and humanity. They were quite supplementary to the formal application that will be made by the Government Commissary, Major Carriere.

The demand of M. Labori that the court-martial should issue a process subject to the approval of the two sovereigns came like a thunderbolt at today's session. The step is fraught with momentous consequences, as it affords Emperor William an opportunity again to assume his favorite role of arbitrator of the destinies of the world. No one will be surprised if Colonel Schwarzkoppen, in the name of the Kaiser, makes a declaration that will practically decide the results of the trial.

Notes From Omaha.

Corporal Harry E. Murray of the Thurston Rifles is far, far from home. The young man is a resident of Honolulu, where his father is prominent in business and public affairs. The corporal went into service against the wishes of his family, but will be warmly welcomed back to the fold when he returns to the islands. He is barely of age, is a graduate of St. Louis college of Honolulu and received some military training as a member of his father's company in the national guard of Hawaii. Corporal Murray had not a little difficulty in getting into the volunteer army. He stowed away on a transport at Honolulu and joined company L. at Manila, but before enlisting served with the regiment in a borrowed uniform. Murray will visit here with army chums for a fortnight and then leave for his island home, spending yesterday at the exposition.

"Honolulu," says Captain Towse, "is represented in nearly every regiment in the Philippines, more than forty young men having taken passage from the resting place. It was at Honolulu that the 30,000 volunteers were entertained by citizens at a cost of \$19,000. On one occasion nearly 3,000 men were seated at a meal.—Evening World Herald.
