The Chinese Exclusion Act.
The Chinese Exclusion Act expires in 1902, and if it is to be renewed at all, the Congress to be elected next month will have to do the renewing. How it came that the delegates from this coast did not secure a plank in both platforms on the subject we do not pretend to know. Is the Chinese question dead? It certainly seems to be forgotten. Where is Denis Kearney? Where are the men of the sandlots? It is passing strange that the Bryanites did not see the political capital there was in the question. It was passed over in silence by the Republicans and, as the Democratic Convention was held last it would have made a hit on the Pacific Coast by supplying the deficiency. Mr. Bryan, it is understood, personally framed the Democratic platform, and it could only have been ignorance of, or indifference to, the politics of this Coast, that led him into the grave political error of neglecting our burning issue. The law was passed in pursuance of a treaty with China, and can hardly be renewed without further negotiations with that power. It need hardly be said that it will be an awkward time at which to raise the question. While demanding an open door into China for ourselves it will be difficult to argue that we should close our own door against the Chinese. The indications are that Li Hung Chang and Prince Ching are bent upon taking their own time in ending the pending negotiations in Peking, and it may well be that they will not be finally out of the way when the necessity for action on the exclusion question will have arisen. Our future course in the Orient fairly bristles with difficulties.—S. F. News Letter.

The Failure of a Failure.
M. B. Curtis is insolvent, but needs no sympathy. Liabilities \$117,000, against which are assets of \$25 are not calculated to greatly impair his happiness. Still, Sam'l of Posen should not have failed, and somebody will be likely to charge him with not being a gentleman. His trouble began several years ago, when he murdered Patrolman Grant. The assassination was most cowardly and needless, and the ruling price of juries was high. The result was that while Curtis managed to purchase enough perjury and enough jurymen to avoid the unpleasantness of being hanged, he went broke against the game. He has never got a start since, doesn't deserve to and never will. He missed the hangman but sheriffs will rob the rest of his life of joy. ELECTION DAY.

To-day the saloons and courts are close and business practically suspended to enable all citizens to wend their ways to the polls and cast their ballots at the most momentous election ever in Hawaii.

The polls opened on the average very punctually at 8 o'clock this morning and will close at 5 this afternoon. To Judge from the noon reports from the different precincts the vote will be one of the largest ever polled in Honolulu. It was very slow work at first. In one precinct it took 45 minutes to reach from the bottom of the line to the ballot compartment.

There was a vast difference taken by voters, in making their ballots. Gov. Dole, for instance, took four minutes, another gentlemen ten and another only one; the average was, however, about from three to four. Although everything up to the present writing is proceeding extremely quietly High Sheriff Brown has taken every precaution against possible disturbance, but owing to absence of gin on the streets none is anticipated.

It is very doubtful if any reliable returns of the result will be afforded until very late tonight, and any prediction made is likely to prove incorrect.

At noon 1478 votes had been polled in the 4th District and 1441 in the 5th.

McKinley Odds in Many Cities

Betting Situation Shows Offers as high as 4 to 1 on His Re-election.

Dispatches from N.Y. Herald correspondents in many leading cities of the country show that there is not heavy betting generally on the result of the Presidential election. Odds are given in all places that McKinley will be re-elected. They are as high as 4 to 1. The average odds are 2 1/2 to 1, but the takers, it is reported, are not numerous.

Betting is lively in New York city, but at present no satisfactory estimate is made of the amount of money involved.

One broker in the financial district yesterday estimated that \$2,500,000 had been wagered in Wall street on the election. Many persons believe that this estimate is extravagant.

Two bets were made at the office of Bell & Co, brokers yesterday, on the result of the election.

One was at odds of 4 to 1 on McKinley on the general result, and the other \$1,000 even that McKinley would have 100,000 plurality in New York state.

The amount of the first bet could not be ascertained, but it is said to run into the thousands. The names of the bettors were withheld by the firm.

Mr Judge, a curb broker, who handles the largest proportion of the outside money, offered yesterday \$1,000 to \$250 on McKinley, on the general result, and offered also \$1000 even that Bryan will not have 55,000 plurality in the area of Greater New York.

Election betting in Washington

up to the present time is almost a negative quantity.

A liberal estimate of the amount of money placed up to the present time is \$7,500 and in making this aggregate it is necessary to count all the small bets made. The prevailing odds are 3 to 1 on McKinley.

Brokers say that there is plenty of republican money at 3 to 1. Betting on the result in Maryland is generally a feature here. Democrats are asking 10 to 7 at the present time, although even money was placed a short time ago.

About \$50,000 has been wagered in Philadelphia on the general result of the election. E. Foerderer wagered \$10,000 to \$40,000 put up by Thompson of Gloucester, N. J. that McKinley would be re-elected. Odds are either 2 1/2 or 3 to 1 in favor of McKinley. There is plenty of McKinley money, but few Bryan takers. Pittsburg, Pa. Nearly \$100,000 has been bet here on the Presidential election. Of this, \$40,000 was wagered by three men on McKinley at odds of 2 to 1. The \$20,000 end is held by Colonel W. H. Dewey, a silver mine owner.

M. F. Hughes & Co., brokers, have issued a bulletin increasing the general result betting quotations from 2 1/2 to 1 to 3 to 1 on McKinley. They are offering the same odds—3 to 1—that Bryan will carry New York city, and also that McKinley will carry that State. From even money on McKinley in West Virginia—they have jumped 10 to 7. Even money on McKinley's pluralities is offered as follows:—Pennsylvania, 225,000; New York, 60,000; Ohio, 95,000;

Chicago, Ill. In the betting on the result of the Presidential election the prevailing odds is 2 to 1 on McKinley's re-election, 3 to 2 in Illinois goes to republican, and even money on Cook county, according to announcements at Chapin & Gore's and by Frank E. Kennedy, timekeeper at Tattersall's. The money betting has not been heavy. Tailors, hatters, shoemakers and tradesmen generally expect to reap a harvest from the betting.

Boston, Mass. There has been no betting on the election here in Boston outside of small private wagers at odds of from 3 and 3 1/2 to 1 on McKinley.

St. Louis, Mo. It is estimated that the total amount of bets on the outcome of the Presidential election will not exceed \$100,000. The average odds seem to be 2 to 1 on McKinley.

Buffalo, N. Y. Not more than \$10,000 has been in this city by the supporters of Bryan, although there has been plenty of McKinley money, at odds ranging from 5 to 2 to 4 to 1. The bet at the longest odds was made by James Sullivan, a stockman, who bet \$4,000 against \$1,000 on McKinley.

Cleveland, Ohio. There have been no big bets made here on the election. Numerous wagers have been posted aggregating \$50,000. The odds are about 3 to 1 on McKinley on the general result.

Omaha, Neb. About \$10,000 has been wagered here by Bryan enthusiasts against about \$25,000 by the McKinley men, the odds are 2 1/2 to 1 on McKinley's re-election. Few even money bets can be obtained by Bryan men that McKinley will carry the State.

Albany, N. Y. There probably has not been \$25,000 bet in this city on the coming election. The largest single bet here was \$2,000 to \$1,000 that McKinley would carry the State. This was placed through Peter Elliott, who says he has \$10,000 to offer at the same odds.

The steamer Waialeale returned this morning after landing Candidate Paia Naki of the Democratic party at Kaunakakai about 9 o'clock last evening, and from there she steamed over to Lahaina, to deliver a message and campaign literature arriving there at midnight. She left early this morning on her return, arriving here about 9 o'clock.

The Crisis in China.

Shanghai, Oct. 9th—A Newchwang telegram received yesterday via Chefoo and probably dated seventh instant, states that the Russian Army from the north has taken Tieling, a town some forty miles north of Moukden. The southern army is reported to have occupied Moukden unopposed.

Nothing of a definite character has been received of late regarding the movements of the Court, but indications point to its having arrived in the neighbourhood of Chauching, north of Pingyang.

The Yangtze Viceroy's have addressed a joint despatch to the Consuls of the Foreign Powers at Shanghai, stating that it is reported that the Allies intend to despatch troops to Shaungtung and expressing a desire that they will refrain from so doing. The Viceroy's emphasize the fact that Yuan-shi-kai has protected the foreigners within his jurisdiction and that none of them have been killed in his province. They also point out that he is at present fighting to suppress the Boxers.

The Consuls have referred the matter to their respective Governments.

The November Term.

The November term of the circuit court opened yesterday Judge Humphreys presiding. There was a very large attendance of counsel and others.

There are some 200 cases on the civil calendar but the criminal calendar is a light one.

The following cases were stricken from the calendar: Territory vs. Ah Wai, larceny in the first degree; Territory vs. Wong Man, larceny in the second degree; Territory vs. Charles Kaha, assault with a dangerous weapon; Territory vs. B. Sued, larceny in the second degree; Territory vs. Lopez and Waiola, larceny in the second degree; Territory vs. Naibe, larceny in the second degree; Territory vs. Kawika, larceny in the second degree; Territory vs. Chee Kin, embezzlement; Territory vs. Henry Kia, malicious injury and mischief; Territory vs. Naholua, malicious injury; Territory vs. Candido, assault with a dangerous weapon.

These cases were dismissed by nolle prosequi: Territory vs. Mashimoto, liquor seller without a license; Territory vs. George A. Davis, violating license law.

The jurors, having been called, were excused until tomorrow morning, and Probate matters postponed until Monday next.

Court Notes.

Fred Meyer has brought suit in the Circuit Court against D. K. Naone and Jessie T. Naone for damages of \$4,450, alleged to have accrued by his eviction from certain land at Kawaihau. In his complaint he states that on April 1, 1899, he leased from the defendants for eighteen years the property in question. On October 25th he states that he was evicted from the land in question, although he had performed all the covenants to be performed on his part. When he entered into possession of the lands he asserts the property was barren, and he has expended large sums of money, amounting to \$500 in making it suitable for a residence. The property could be rented for \$20 a month, and he has been prevented from collecting this sum for the term of the lease. Besides the defendants have taken possession of a building belonging to the plaintiff valued at \$450. Wherefore, he asks damages of \$4,450. L. M. Strauss, A. G. Correa and Charles Creighton are his attorneys.

The final order of the distribution of the estate of Joseph Lazarus was signed by Judge Humphreys yesterday. By it the following sums were distributed: For costs of the court, \$18; to Esther Rosewarne a bequest of \$25; to Kaumakole Lazarus, wife of deceased and to Alexander Lazarus and Eldazar Lazarus, children of the deceased, and Naomi Lazarus, a granddaughter, and Adelaide Rosewarne Schlieff a granddaughter, the sum of \$809.05 each, or a fifth part of \$4,045.25, the residue of the estate.

Levi L. Joseph, messenger in the Judiciary Department, has been appointed assistant clerk and messenger in the Attorney General's department at a salary of \$60 a month. This leaves a vacancy in the Judiciary, an office which now pays \$40 a month.

Death Of David P. Eldredge.

By the steamer Waialeale which returned this morning from its short trip to Molokai and Maui, word was received at the Democratic Headquarters that one of its candidates for Representative for Maui, David P. Eldredge, died at his home at Kula early yesterday morning, probably of apoplexy.

He had just returned home on Sunday from campaign tour in apparently good health, and feeling sore in his back he laid down to rest, from which he expired after midnight.

Mr. Eldredge was a well known character amongst the Hawaiians and was over 50 years of age. He leaves a widow and family to mourn their loss. He was the father of Amos K. Eldredge, a brother-in-law of Sam Parker, the Republican candidate for Delegate to Congress.
