### To Show the World what American Women Can Do

LONDON, Nov. 8.—At the request of the Associated Press, Lady Randolph Churehill made to-day the following statement to American friends with regard to the project of American women in England of fitting out a hospital ship for use in South African water:

"The time for fitting out the Maine is so brief that I am glad to avail myself of the Associated Press to set the project fairly before the American public. The interest manifested by Americans has already taken such tangible form from New York to San Francisco that I am sure that an intimation that what remaining work there is to do must be done immediately will spur the American public into a response to our needs. There is but one motive, one reason, for the project of sending a hospital ship to the Cape. We have had oratory and societies for the promotion of Anglo American friendship. This is the golden opportunity to put that expression of good will into tangible form. It is especially the province of American women to promote this cause, but it is woman's function to foster and nourish the suffering. American people are more adept at it, we believe, than any others. The Maine is to be essentially an American woman's ship. We are not only to aid the suffering, but are to show the world that American women can do that good work better than any one else can do that good work better than any one else can do it. I am going to the Cape in the Maine, not because my son is there, for he will be a thousand miles away, but because I want the generous effects of American contributors to be carried out under the personal supervision of a member of an executive committee. I am going because I think I may prevent any kind of friction between the American nurses whom Whitelaw Reid is sending out on Saturday and the British officials, in case such friction should arise. I contribute that much time and service gladly, and all our committee would do they would do the same. The Maine will be a success and we hope American contributions, already given so generously, will with in the next few days insure that success beyond a doubt."

### Electric Light Baths.

American physicians are said to be strongly advocating electric light baths. They are less exhausting than Turkish baths, as they excite the skin activity far more rapidly, and Dr. J. H. Kellogg, who put forward the claims of the electric light bath at a recent meeting of the American Medical Association, finds say the Scientific American, that it affords prompt relief in the treatment of rheumatic diathesis, obesity and nervous headache.

The electric light bath, he stated, enjoys the great advantage over other methods of applying heat in that it produces strong tonic effects, at the same time that it encourages powerful elimination. As a prophylactic, the electric light bath possesses a high value, especially for persons who are compelled to lead a sedentary life, such as teachers, doctors, lawyers, preachers, judges, and professional men generally, and to a still greater degree by the majority of women, and which necessarily results sooner or later in disease and premature death from the accumulation within the body of those poisons which are destroyed or thrown off through active exercise in the open air. The electric light bath is the best of all substitutes for muscular activity; for persons whose business necessarily keeps them confined indoors, it is the most invaluable means of maintaining sound health.

### CONDENSED FOREIGN NEWS.

General Buller has taken effective steps to check the Boer advance on the border towns.

It is reported that the Basutos have risen against the Boers in the Orange Free State.

Republican gains throughout the Eastern States are regarded as strong administration victories.

The St. Paul will be the Christmas ship for Manila; sailing from San Francisco on the 22d inst.

The Marquis of Dufferin has been elected Lord Rector of Edinburgh University, defeating Sir Henry Asquith.

It is reported that the Boers have decided to employ privateers to prey on British commerce. The news is Frenchy.

The Czar of Russia and the Emperor of Germany with their Imperial consorts met at Potsdam on the 8th instant.

Senator Hoar again stands by Aguinaldo and claims that the Islanders should at once be given self government.

The London press regard the results of the elections as a sure indication of McKinley's election for a second term.

The Times in a careful editorial lately on the relations of the United States to the war in South Africa says: "When the Continent rings with denunciations of England it is very cheering and refreshing for the English people to note the sympathy and intelligent comprehension manifested in the United States. We should prize American sympathy in any case, but it becomes doubly grateful when manifestly based on a deliberate and well informed judgment of the essential merits of the quarrel, as well as upon a reciprocation of the kindly feelings with which Englishmen regard American enterprises.

The American people are not to be blinded by the accident that the Transvaal calls itself a republic. They know that every essential attribute of a republic is wanting; and they know also that England stands for equal laws, individual freedom and the energetic progress which together make up the republican ideal of the Americans. As England plumped for the United States, so the United States now plump for England without regard to the fine drawn technicalities of the attorney.

## THE TRUANCY LAWS.

Minister Mott-Smith is an interview with the Advertiser expresses his views on the truancy question which recently has been taken up in our columns. The Minister does not understand the point we have taken. We know that it is useless to criticize the law as it stands on the statutes, but our "kick" is against the manner in which the law is carried out by the irresponsible truancy officers. Mr. Mott-Smith certainly knows that a charge against anybody should be proven before punishment is inflicted. But this is never done in the truant brought before the magistrate. The truant officer finds a child on the street. He does not know the age of the child; he has no complaint from any teacher in his district; he does not know whether the child has ever been to school or whether there are good reasons why it is not at school. He simply yanks the child to the Station House where it is locked up among drunks and criminals and the next morning it is brought before the magistrate who is asked to punish it without any proof of its alleged offense having been produced. That is where the "kick" comes in and we think a better and more just method should be enforced. That Mr. Mott-Smith can cause to done even as the law stands.

Forgetting the Dead.

SIR:—I notice in your paper a few days ago an article commenting on the burial of an ex federal soldier (Jas. Shearin) in a pauper's grave, but are American citizens alone responsible for this disgrace? Jas. Shearin has been a faithful, honorable member of Co. B, N. G. ## Death of Dr. McWayne.

Dr. A. McWayne died early this morning at the Robinson residence at Waikiki after an illness of several months.

The deceased was in his 48th year and was born in Geneva near Chicago. He came to Honolulu 24 years ago and entered the office of the late Dr. Geo. Trousseau as a druggist. Later he opened a drug business on the corner of Merchant and Fort streets where Roth's tailor business is now located and he conducted his business there until he left for the States where he studied medicine and upon his return to the islands he was granted a license to practice.

He married Miss Lucy Robinson, a sister to Hon. Mark Robinson, who with three young children survive him to mourn their great loss.

A few years ago the deceased made considerable investments in coffee lands at Krihua at which place he took up his residence personally superintending his property and also accepting the position of government physician for the district.

Dr. McWayne had many friends in Honolulu and was always friendly and pleasant to those he met in social or business relations. His bereaved family to whom he was very devoted have the sincere sympathy of the community here as well as on Hawaii.

The funeral will take place from the Ward residence at the Old Plantation on King street to which place the body was taken, to-morrow at 3:30 p. m.

The Supreme Court has declined to interfere with the verdict sentencing Ihara Ishigoro to death for slaying a Chinaman during the Kahuku riots. Unless the President extends clemency the condemned will be executed on December 4th.

The final accounts of M. N. Sanders administrator of the estate of the late Marie J. Sanders, has been approved by Perry and the administrator discharged and bond cancelled. The property remaining is ordered delivered to Elsie M. Sanders, daughter of the deceased.

The Census Office opened this morning at 9 o'clock in the room recently occupied by the Chinese Bureau at the Judiciary building. Mr. George Bigelow, who was appointed Mr. Atkinson's assistant by the Census Department of the United States, will assume his duties in the office. It is safe to predict that under Mr. Atkinson's supervision our Census will be taken in a manner deserving of the highest commendation.

Does anyone really care what form of government is awarded to us, so long as our sugar stock maintains a high figure and cheap asiatic or imported alien labor is secured to us?

If the political local-American Journals would only write something of use and benefit to Hawaii during the congressional discussion, instead of quarrelling over dead issue and incompetent correspondents, how much better it would be.

What congress would like to know is to which national party will Hawaii affiliate, if the opportunity of affiliation is given. Unless a pronounced sentiment is expressed by our local leaders both parties will put us down as "mug wumps" and deservedly dump us into salt river.

Senator Marcus A. Hanna, the political father of President McKinley, announces that the Republican slogan for 1900 will be "full dinner buckets, protection, an unchanged currency and expansion," as against "the empty dinner bucket policy, free trade, a debased currency and anti-expansion."

One is pleased to learn that, as we anticipated, the Washington authorities will probably do the right thing in connection with our land laws. Believing our federal superiors to be honest in their intention, as our Judges, it only requires a proper presentation of all cases in dispute for us to obtain verdicts fraught with even and equal justice.

Minister of Finance Lansing, as might have been expected from his past career, has declined to allow the financial bulls to recklessly pasture in the rich Treasury paddocks. That the people's money can only be expended by the people's legislature is one of the soundest axioms of a people's government. As we can apparently afford it, it may be wise to expend all that the legislature has said we may expend upon public improvements. But then we have Brother Rowell to deal with, and Minister Young will find him as tough a nut to crack as did his predecessor.

Had the P. G., or Republican, Legislatures in Hawaii been more honest in action instead of being guided so greatly by the interests of the money makers, many of "the bequests of the old regime" might ere this time have been blotted from our Statute books. Take the penal clause of the labor contract Laws for instance. A deliberate promise was made of its repeal, to catch annexation votes abroad, but how was that promise kept? None will welcome the advent of American reform more heartily than those who conscientiously opposed the methods adopted by the Dole compact to obtain annexation.





According to such staid and staunch, Republican papers as the Argonaut and Call the re-election of Phelan as Mayor of San Francisco portends the certainty of his election, in course of time, as governor of California and subsequently as United States Senator. This is only right for Mr. Phelan, although a Democrat, has proved his capacity to hold office honestly, he is a man of wealth and above all things a California born boy. His opponent Horace Davis is one of the most estimable of men, and Republicans, but he is unlucky in politics, and the Republicans, unless much changed of recent years, do not rustle like the Democrats in municipal elections. They are too conservative and only show, their knuckles when necessity calls for their display.
