SONSUMPTION IN NEW YORK. The Consumptive Wards in the Hos-pitals are Overcrowded.

Public authorities in New York seem to be aroused on the subject of con-sumption. The questions of hosiptals and hospital treatment is also a subject that interests the public there, as ap-pears from the following in a late is-sue of the New York Sun:

"Dennis Kenny, homeless, was found unconscious on the sidewalk at Fortyfourth street and First avenue on Thursday night. An ambulance sur-geon from Flower Hospital said that the man was dying of consumption He was taken to Believue and on Fri-

He was taken to Bellevue and on Friday was sent to the Metropolitan Hospital on Blackwell's Island.

"Last night Kenny was found unconscious in the street again. When he was revived in the police station he said that the people on the Island had told him that they had no room for him in the hospital and had brought him back to the city. Dr. Stewart of Flower back to the city. Dr. Stewart of Flower Hospital said it was a shame that Ken-ny had been turned out of the hospital as death was only a matter of a few days in his case. Kenny was taken to

Bellevue again. "Dr. Bickley, the acting superintendent of the Metropolitan Hospital, when asked about Kenny's case over the tele-

phone, said: phone, said:

"Kenny was placed in the phthisis ward, which is terribly overcrowded. They are sleeping on the floor there and we can only keep those who are unable to walk or move about. Kenny was a very sick man and it was a shame to very sick man and it was a shame to let him go; but he was stronger than some of the others and so we had to leave him out. We couldn't put him in another ward, as it would be a crime to put a consumptive in a regular ward. The whole city seems to be full of consumption and we are so overcrowded here that a terrible condition of affairs exists."

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



STRUGGLE FOR SUPREMACY GOES MERRILY ON.

good profits, and it was seriously argued that the American Company was in all probability earning once more on a scale which would justify a restoration of the dividends on its common stock from a 6 per cent annual basis to the 12 per cent rate which was paid in the scries of years during which it comseries of years during which it com-manded the field and had no serious competition. At the same time, the chief factor which gave support to su-gar stock was the belief that, directly or indirectly, an understanding had been reached as to prices and produc-tion by the American Sugar Company and its competitors. The developments which attended the creation of the new National Sugar Company last spring seemed to give the first practical indi-cation that such a course had been decided on. That corporation was formed by a combination of the new plant, built by the Messrs. Doscher, to combuilt by the Messrs. Doscher, to compete with the American Company and other refining plants, including that of the Messrs. Mollenhauer, the management of the National Company being so constituted as to support the belief that it would act in harmony with the American Company. There was certainly no indication of an onen alliance. American Company. There was cer-tainly no indication of an open alliance between the latter concern and the re-maining outside competitors in the su-gar refining business, the Messrs, Argar refining business, the Messrs, Arbuckle Bros, But the increased demand and advance of values for refined sugar making their appearance at this juncture, all interests in the trade seemed to act in harmony with reference to prices, so that in Wall street, at least, there was a general impression that the chief combatants in the precading compatitive price was impression that the chief combatants in the preceding competitive price war, the American Company and the Arbuckles, had come to some understanding. On this, and on the favorable situation of the trade, American Sugar shares had a marked advance in the spring, accompanied by the evidences of speculative manipulation that has been a common in that secuthat has been c common in that secu-

sugar-trade circles, there has been all along a good deal of dissent from the belief that any tan-gible agreement existed, or that the various interests were doing more than take advantage of enlarged demands and higher prices. One circumstance which agreed badly with the theory of a new combination and lasting peace in the trade was that the litigation be-tween the Arbuckles and the coffee concern controlled in the interests of the American Company went or was allowed to go on as a bitterly as ever; another was the failure of the trust to restore its dividend rate to the old basis, the last quarterly payment have of 1½ per cent. This caused some mis-givings in speculative quarters, and, at the same time, with the end of the summer season the demand for refin-ed spradual reduction. The new reserved ed a gradual reduction. This week, however, has brought developments which seem to show that the alleged settlement of the sugartrade war was a mistake. Cutting by the National Company and a reduction of prices by the Arbuckles was followed shortly by a cut of 40 points in the prices for the principal standard grades by the American Sugar Refining Company. This reduction, which was from 6.15 cents to 5.75 cents, was the heaviest ever made in a single day since the company was formed, and rethe heaviest ever made in a single day since the company was formed, and re-sulted at once in similar action by all parties. To Wall street the inference that the war is on again is a plain one, and, while sugar-company stock has and, while sugar-company stock has been held up by the presence of a large short interest in it, with the buying to cover contracts put out by the bears, it is considered that the stock in ques-tion may again execute one of the downward movements for which it is just as famous as for its sudden and compactable rises. remarkable rises.

OOM PAUL'S PEDIGREE.

In a letter published in the Standard, London, the following is of interest:

The authority for President Kruger's pedigree is Mr. T. F. van Vordt, B. A. ("Paul Kruger and the Rise of South African Republic." Jacques Dusjean, Amsterdam and Kanpatad). I give the title in English but it is a Dutch book, and I do not know if it has been translated. As he investigated the matter thoroughly, and the particulars are not given quite correctly in the English papers, you will allow me to repeat them. Franz Kruger, in Berlin, marries Elizabeth Hartwigs. A son, Jacob, then seventeen, arrives in Capetown in 1713, in the service of the East Indian Company. He seems to have lost the free use of one of his hands, and is allowed to establish himself as a Burgher in Stellenbosch; marries Johanna Kemp; has eight children. The sixth one—a son, Hendrik, baptized April 8, 1725—marries Francina Cloete. It seems that this Hendrik soon went eastward, as his son Gert (Gerrit) Kruger, bapthat this Hendrik soon went eastward, as his son Gert (Gerrit) Kruger, baptized May 21, 1759, marries, November 12, 1769, Susanna Lacya Buys, of which lady it is known that she belonged to lady it is known that she belonged to one of the first families that went east-ward. Their son, Stephanus Johannes Paulus Kruger, was baptized March 15, 1778, in Graaff-Reynet, and this man was the grandfather of President Stephanus Johannes Paulus Kruger. Of course, "baptized in" means here in the district of, and thus also in the district which afterward was called Graaff-Reynet.

was Tarka; "treks" in 1836 with Potgie-One of his sons, Caspar Jan Hen drik, born 1894, marries Elsis Francira Steyn, daughter of Doun Steyn of Bul-hoek, near actual Colesberg. They re-main there some time, and in that place the president is born October 19, 1825.
