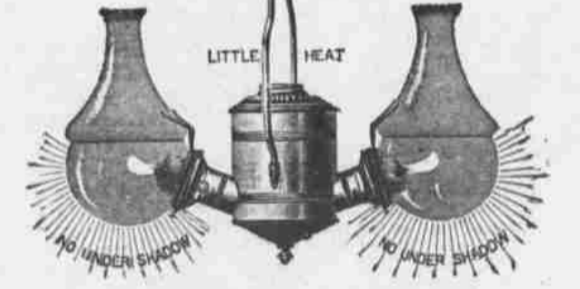

The Republican colors are very largely in evidence round town. Numbers of Hawaiians have adopted them and are wearing them round their hats.

There are several men wandering about the city without any visible means of support. There was a witness in a case in the police court yesterday who stated that he had done no work for three months, but he declined to state how he had managed to live during that time. He certainly did not look by any means starved, but was plump as a partridge. The inference is that the gentleman had lived by his wits, which means that he lived upon other people. Men of this class should be rounded up, and given a term for vagrancy.

It is announced that Rev. Charles M. Sheldon, author of "In His Steps," is now engaged in the preparation of a new work, which is to be brought out at first in serial form by a firm of Boston publishers. Mr. Sheldon will remain in Boston until the manuscript is finished, and the first numbers of the new book have appeared, which will probably be about November 1. The story deals with the life of a young girl who comes to Boston and enters service in a private family. It is stated that Mr. Sheldon's retainers for serial and book rights were close on \$10,000. The Rev. Charles makes his books pay certainly.

Fumigating ships for the purpose of destroying the rats has not been a very satisfactory process. During the plague one ship was set on fire through the sulphur not being in proper containers. A new device has been tried recently at Constantinople. This is to show attractive food at the bottom of the vessel and then pump in carbonic acid. The heavy specific gravity keeps the carbonic acid at the bottom of the vessel. After it has done its work it can be got rid of by either ordinary ventilation, or by the use of the air pump. It is absolutely fatal and above all things it is cheap. Moreover if any goods are in the ship it does them no harm whatever. The idea is well worth trying, but then port physicians are conservative and will not change their methods until they are forced to.

THE STRAIGHT TICKET.

The Star printed a specimen ballot yesterday and if every voter will mark his ballot as The Star suggested he will be sure of having the right man for Congress, the best men for the Senate, and the ablest men for Representatives. In point of fact it will be the straight Republican ticket and whose votes that is voting for the good of the Territory. It will pay the voter to study the specimen ballots and mark them exactly in the way suggested, and the more Democrats and Independents who will follow The Star's advice the better.

Seriously a good many, who have been coquetting with the parties above mentioned, are coming into the Republican ranks, and will vote the straight Republican ticket. This is especially the case with Hawaiians. There is a steady influx of these into the Republican ranks. Since the split in the Independent party the Hawaiians have flocked to the Republicans and it is the most popular party by long odds.

It must also be acknowledged that the Democrats are gaining somewhat in strength, though not as much as the Republicans. It is the Independents who are losing ground every day. The split between the Hui Aloha Aina and the Hui Kalalaina has proved a death blow. There is not the slightest chance of the breach being healed, and Wilcox's prospects of swaggering down Pennsylvania avenue are dwindling away to nothingness.

The man who will represent the Territory in Congress will be Sam Parker. All classes are uniting upon that gentleman as the proper man for the place, and his popularity advances by strides from day to day. November 6th, will see him elected as delegate, and Hawaii will obtain what she needs. Look out for the Republican victory which is surely coming, and don't fail to get into the band wagon.

SIBERIAN EDUCATION.

The United States Commercial agent at Vladivostok has collected data with regard to education in Eastern Siberia, which presents a very creditable showing for a portion of the Empire which is regarded as steeped in the depths of ignorance. The total number of schools in the Amur district, Peninsula of Kamchatka, the Island of Lag Nalien and the Apadyeand Commander islands was 114. These vary from classical gymnasium for boys and girls, each separate, to the country and parish schools which

are on a par with our country common schools.

There are besides a technical school (railway); preparatory school for the Siberian cadet corps; school for the naval department; a military school, a Russian Chinese school. According to the statistics the number of children received into the schools equals 15 per cent of all the Russian population.

In Vladivostok, evening classes were begun in the autumn of 1898 for the study of Chinese and English; they were continued during the winter of 1899 and met with reasonable success. The Chinese classes have been transferred to the Institute for Eastern Languages, but the English classes have remained under the patronage of the city. The charge for tuition is \$1 per month, three lessons of two hours and a half per week. In the winter of 1898-99, more than 150 students were enrolled, about half being women. The Chinese department began with some 60 pupils. At the close of the session of 1898-99, only 50 pupils remained in the English department and a much smaller proportion in the Chinese section. The instruction in both lines seemed to be of a very superior character. There is quite a rivalry among the young Chinese employed in the stores here, in learning English. Some have entered the Russian and Chinese schools, and others are asking the few Americans here to teach them. The Institute for Eastern Languages, whose opening occurred last November, is doing a good work, although not overburdened with pupils. There are now about 50 students—Chinese, Japanese, Korean, Manchus, and Mongolians.

This desire on the part of the men in stores to learn English, shows the advance of American trade and the necessity that is felt for acquiring which is sure to be the main commercial language.

Agent Greener further notes as follows:

"Last year a Japanese Russian school was opened at Blagovestchenek, where a Japanese colony has been established as also in Manchuria. Reports say the Japanese pupils are very diligent make great progress, and learn easily to read and write Russian. The bishop of this diocese is my authority that the same holds good of the mass of Koreans now scattered in this region as laborers. Their children are bright pupils, and both parents and children readily become followers of the Russian church. In the programme or reforms are plans for agricultural schools throughout the Empire.

"A summer school for teachers was held at Nikolsk during July. The project for a large mechanical school at Nikolsk in connection with the Great Siberian Railroad is completed, and the building will be proceeded with. The cost is estimated at 100,000 rubles (\$51,500). "A school for river navigation has just been opened at Irkutsk."

Upon the ability and application of the Japanese we have had ample opportunity to judge here. The Japanese who attend the Hawaiian schools are among the best of the pupils and take every advantage of educational facilities. The passage about the Koreans is worthy of special note. The children make apt pupils and acquire Russian readily, but not only that, they "readily become followers of the Russian church." Russia has been doing her best to Russinize the population of the Korean Peninsula. Nothing will effect this purpose more readily than the bringing the population within the pale of the church. Convert Koreans to the Greek church, and the white Czar becomes practically their patron saint. This is the more interesting, as the Russians have claimed that they do not proselytize.

Not only are there educational facilities for the young, but there are considerable intellectual opportunities for those of mature years. Most of the officials—military, naval, and civil—are men of education and professional training (many are not natives of Siberia), and the lines of the various literary, scientific, and philosophical societies of St. Petersburg are continued in Siberia.

In all the governments of western and eastern Siberia, libraries, museums and societies are found, patronized by most of the officials, while many important contributions have come from learned convicts. A branch of the Imperial Russian Geographical Society is located at Habarofsk, and a museum and library are connected with it. A subdivision of this branch—the Society for the Investigation of the Amur Province—is at Vladovostok. It has an excellent museum and a fairly good library.

The best equipped library says Agent Greener, is the Amur branch of the Imperial Royal Geographical Society at Habarofsk, and next that of the Naval Club at Vladivostok, another institution which would gladly receive many of the valuable publications of the United States. Throughout the provinces there are small libraries in schools, regiment, and police departments. There is a quasi-public library at Nikolsk, in the South Usuri district and a small library in the city hall at Vladivostok, with a reading room attached. A publisher—Theodore Pavlenko—has lately given 100,000 rubles (\$51,500) to open 2,000 public libraries.

There is a medical association composed of the doctors of the naval and military branches of the imperial service in the Amur and Maritime provinces. It has a northern and southern branch, and had a session at Habarofsk in September. The southern branch opened a Pasteur institute at Vladivostok last year.

All which goes to show that there is a lively intellectual life in Eastern Siberia, and that opportunity for education is given not only to Russians, but to other nationalities who go to make up the population.
