

POST OFFICE IMPROVEMENT.

Two Hundred and Fifty More Boxes To be Provided.

Included in the estimates of the Minister of the Interior for the expenditure of the \$44,200 yesterday allowed by the Senate for repairs to public buildings is an item of \$4000 for repairs to the general post-office in this city.

In the Senate Minister King explained that the money was to be spent in providing an entirely new set of iron boxes with patent locks. The present front of the building will be extended towards Merchant street about two feet and every inch of space will be filled with boxes.

Owing to the present scarcity of boxes, as many as half a dozen people are now using the same one in several instances. The new arrangement will be a great convenience and is a matter of necessity owing to increased business.

JAPANESE COMPETITION.

Instigated by commercial bodies of San Francisco, Representative Johnson has presented a resolution directing the Ways and Means Committee to investigate the whole question of competition from Japan in products and manufactures, and to report by bill or otherwise. A London trade journal received by last mail has the first of a series of articles on the same subject. The Foreign and Colonial Importer is the journal referred to, and it refers in the following words to an accusation that the Japanese are not quite square in commercial dealings:

The very keen competition which exists for Japanese orders appears to be a distinct answer to this charge of "want of business morality." For ourselves we believe that Japanese commercial men are in every way as honest as their competitors in other countries, and such indeed is the general belief throughout the commercial community over here; and as English manufacturers secure a very large share of Japan's orders, they are perhaps in an excellent position for forming a judgment, and it is probably only the disappointed wooers who talk about her faults. The fact that England does secure so good a proportion of her requirements may induce us to watch her enterprise in those quarters of the world which we have always considered as the best fields for the reception of our own manufactures with a little more good nature than might otherwise be the case. The seriousness of her competition, however, is fully recognized, and in subsequent articles it will be more clearly seen why there is so good a cause for apprehension. In the course of our remarks it will no doubt be necessary to find fault with many of the Japanese productions, but more frequently perhaps the reverse will be the case. No doubt also many of our friends at home will seriously disagree with our touching upon the subject in so fair a manner, being under the impression that by so doing we shall be pursuing a policy detrimental to the interests of English traders. That, however, is a narrow-mind-

ed view of the position which we cannot accept, and we are fortunately strong enough, and have the courage, to support our convictions.

The foregoing is a manly way of treating the subject. Every country that joins the march of civilization, as Japan has done, ought to be welcomed as a gain to the hope of universal peace and prosperity. Japan must be accorded the same rights to "a fair field and no favor" as any other nation, and if her progress disturbs the equilibrium of universal commerce, there is naught for other nations to do but to adjust their enterprises and policies to the new circumstances.

It is reported from Havana that 15,000, or perhaps even 20,000 Spanish soldiers, are missing somewhere in Cuba. The fact has been communicated to the Madrid Government, and there is a search going on for the whereabouts of the soldiers day and night. Incorrect records, desertions to the enemy and unreported deaths in the field are surmised as singly or jointly explaining the hiatus in numbers. Referring to the possible cause of losses in fights not being reported, the Havana correspondent of the New York Mail and Express pithily observes:

The expectation that many losses in engagements have not been sent in receives support from the known falsity of those reports, which has repeatedly been pointed out. That 700 Spanish should attack 5000 rebels, that a battle lasting seven hours should ensue, and that only one Spanish soldier should be wounded (as was told in a report from Santa Clara last week), indicates that the Spanish soldiers have charmed lives or that an enormous amount of lying is being done.

McKinley's chances for the Republican nomination have petered out somewhat. He was the choice of Pennsylvania until Quay's name was announced. Now, according to a canvass made by the Pittsburg Commercial Gazette, the solid delegation of that great State will be for Quay. McKinley holds Virginia entire, unless, by the authority just quoted, Senator Elkins should run. It will be a pity for the party if Quay should be preferred to McKinley. Quay represents the most extreme machine politics—he is for the "bar" of money in a campaign every time—while McKinley, besides being a square man and an able, in his name represents the leading doctrine of his party—protection.

This, from the Hilo Tribune, does not look like economy: "Honolulu boasts of one lone policeman with a captain to see that he attends to his duties. Hilo has ten policemen and two captains, but no deputy-sheriff."

THE HAWAIIAN CABLE.

Extension of the Proposed Line to China is Under Consideration.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 19.—The Senate Committee on Foreign Relations this morning gave the proposed telegraphic cable propositions connecting the United States with the Hawaiian Islands and the Asiatic coast much consideration. The proposition of the New York company, headed by James A. Strymser, was materially amended today in a statement laid before the committee by a proposition to extend the cable to such other islands in the Pacific Ocean as may be selected and to the coast of China, making that one of the termini instead of the island of Japan.

The rate for ordinary private messages between the United States and Japan and China is \$1.25 per word, and on messages between the United States and the Island of Oahu in the Hawaiian group at 35 cents per word. Press rates are not to exceed one-quarter rates charged for ordinary messages. No action was taken by the committee.

Dynamite.

Mr. and Mrs. T. D. Stimson of Los Angeles, Cal., visited Honolulu a few months ago, and Mr. Stimson intended to come here again. A Los Angeles paper received by D. V. Waldron, who is staying at the Hawaiian Hotel, contains an account of an attempt to blow up Mr. Stimson's house with dynamite on the evening of February 27. A neighbor fired several shots at the dynamiter with out result. The residence is palatial and valued at \$150,000, and the Stimson family are to be congratulated upon their escape from both loss of life and of property. Mrs. Stimson and her daughter have many acquaintances in Honolulu.

Facts About a Watch

(From N. Y. Commercial Adv.) "A watch balance gives five vibrations every second, 360 every minute, 18,000 every hour, 432,000 every day, 157,680,000 every year. At each vibration it rotates about 1 1/4 times, which makes 197,100,000 revolutions every year. In order that we may better understand the stupendous amount of labor performed by these tiny works, let us make a pertinent comparison. Take for illustration a locomotive with six-foot driving wheels. Let its wheels be run until they have given the same number of revolutions that a watch does in one year, and they will have covered a distance equal to twenty-eight complete circuits of the earth."

What stupendous working powers your tiny little machine has; and how little attention you give it until it has refused to go further. "Tired out." The accumulation of old oil, particles of dirt, so minute you can't see it, have so added to its burdens, that it refuses to go further. RAROTONGA.

Good Thing Held by a Honolulu Resident.

Dr. Daniel McLennan of Honolulu owns a fine coffee plantation in Rarotonga, South Pacific. He has a hundred acres of coffee land there, and a letter received from his manager, by the Alameda, says the crop will be ripe within two months. The steamer Richmond on her last trip to Auckland took \$48,000 worth of coffee from Rarotonga. Dr. McLennan is informed that algeroba seedlings sent to his estate last year are now four and six feet high, also that royal palm and other seedlings transmitted the same time are growing finely.

The island is under the British flag and times are now flourishing. There is a school in every settlement and English is taught in all the schools. The teachers are all brought out from England.

Hereafter there will be three steamers running from the island to Auckland, making a round trip every two weeks. Rates of both passage and freight will be reduced, as there is competition between the steamers.

In Rarotonga the natives are not allowed to sell their lands, nor to mortgage their lands or crops. Dr. McLennan secured his holding in fee simple, however, before this prohibition came into force. He has therefore a good thing in the southern isles.
