FROM SAMOA VIA VICTORIA

MATAAFA AT FIRST DEFIANT WITHDRAWS.

Rebels Suffered Great Reverse in Battle of Vaillima—Evidence Before Commission May be One-sided.

AUCKLAND, May 4. Apia, April 27.—The New Zealand Government steamer Tutaneke arrived here with dispatches announcing a request of the International commissioners that the inhabitants peacefully await the arrival of commissioners now on their way to the islands from San Francisco, has been without result. Admiral Albert Kautz, U. S. N., and Captain Stuart of the British cruiser "Pauranga" wrote and dispatched through a French priest to Mataafa, ordering him to withdraw his forces outside of a line ten miles long and six miles broad. Mataafa replied defiantly, refusing to withdraw unless the German consul and the captain of the German cruiser "Falke" agreed. Admiral Kautz and Captain Stuart thereupon sent an ultimatum to Mataafa, threatening to compel the withdrawal of his forces. In support of this ultimatum, a plan of action was decided upon. Lieutenant Gaunt's brigade, strengthened by a heavy gun landed at Mullinu and war vessels were gotten in readiness. Being informed of these preparations, Mataafa made a prompt reply, agreeing to withdraw immediately. On April 25th an important meeting of the king and his chiefs was held. Hufnagel, manager of the plantation upon which the attack was made on the British and United States sailors, which resulted in the death of Lieutenant Freeman of the British navy, Lieutenant Lansdale and Ensign John R. Monaghan of the United States cruiser Philadelphia and two others, is still detained on board the German cruiser "Falke". The gun carriage from the Philadelphia, lost at the time of the engagement, was recovered but the gun is still in the hands of the rebels. Officials and leading residents of Samoa who were interviewed are united in saying that the charges of inhumanity on the part of the British, made by a man named Laroch, are untrue. A majority of the inhabitants are highly dissatisfied with the cessation of hostilities. They say Mataafa is beaten now, and the trouble would be ended in a week or ten days, were the advantage pushed. The rebels are delighted at the delay, which gives them time to refill cartridges, shells, and build more forts. It is the general opinion that the rebels will be annihilated except for Germans and Frenchmen unless Mataafa and the rebel chiefs are severely punished. It is doubtful whether British subjects or United States citizens will give much evidence before the International commission, owing to the fact that to express themselves candidly would interfere with their trade relations. For this reason the evidence before the commission is likely to be one-sided.

The statement by the German Minister of Foreign Affairs, Baron von Bellow, that Mataafa was unanimously elected king of the Samoan Islands is denied in Samoa. The rebels admit the result of the battles at Vaillima the greatest reverse they ever experienced. They were astonished by the manner in which Gaunt's brigade sustained its position in the face of continuous firing. They were also astonished at the final shelling of Vaillima, by which many rebels were badly wounded.

PALAMA SCHOOL CROWDED.

There are today 410 pupils in the new Palama school. This crowds the place to about its fullest capacity. The Commissioners of Education feel some concern about the opening in September, it being feared that the increasing advent of pupils will superinduce some embarrassment. It is stated that many of the other islands, notably Maui and Kauai, are sending large numbers of children of the school.

MORE WITNESSES TESTIFY

TELL ABOUT DEADLY RIOT AT KAHUKU.

Part of a Chinaman's Evidence is Disputed by Dr. Wood—Plantation Luna on the Stand.

The Kahuku murder case made a full start in Judge Perry's court today, but that is about all that can be said of it. Attorney-General Cooper is questioning witnesses. At his left elbow is W. O. Smith, assisting. Mr. Robertson is conducting the case for the defense. He is assisted by a Chinese interpreter, who repeats the fine points of testimony uttered from witnesses of his nationality. On the stand for the Government early this morning was Chong Pong, one of the Chinamen hurt at Kahuku and a principal witness. He told the story of the assault of the Japanese upon the Chinese camp and of the killing of the three Mongolians. Among other things he said that one of the dead Chinamen was stabbed in the head with a knife. Dr. Hubert Wood later contradicted point blank this part of the testimony, affirming that there were no knife wounds whatever on the man.

The next witness called was Luna Worthington, of Kahuku. He told the same story given in the police court at the primary hearing. When the racket started he was in his house shaving. Getting his horse he put off immediately to the scene. The riot was then in full swing. Attention was devoted to stopping it. Witness saw no one being beaten or killed. When he arrived the dead and wounded men were already laid out. Dr. Hubert Wood, the third witness of the day, testified as to the wounds of the men, both the dead and those removed to the hospital. He was summoned by Manager Weight soon after the riot had been quelled. Three dead men and all of those with wounds were examined and treated by witness. It was in this testimony that Dr. Wood denied that one of the dead Chinamen was stabbed with a knife in the head. Other Chinamen and lunas of the plantation will go on the stand during this afternoon. It seems not at all likely that the prosecution will finish this week. A session will be held this evening in the court room.

DIAMOND HEAD RESERVOIR

SURVEYORS AT WORK ON THE LOCATION.

Minister Damon Starts Out to Give Water to the People of Waikiki. He Has \$20,000 to Work on.

Minister Damon was out this morning looking over the ground for the establishment of the water reservoir at Diamond head. He was acting in the capacity of Minister of Interior and in-termin. With the minister on his mission were surveyors, who were set to work determining elevations. Complete surveys will be made of all suitable places in the neighborhood. It was the intention of the Legislature, and is the determination of the minister, to have the reservoir in such position that it will be of the greatest benefit to the Waikiki district. In order to accomplish this the reservoir will be located at such a point on the side of the mountain that it will be above all residents and desirable settlement sites in the neighborhood. There was some thought of putting it on the very top of the mountain, but as this would involve expense and prove of no special additional benefit, the project was abandoned. With the \$20,000 at the disposal of Minister Damon, he will be able to put the work through in a short time.

THE KAHUNA FOUND GUILTY

JUDGE WILCOX SCORES AND FINES HER.

Charge Was Practicing Medicine Without License—Suspicious Case Investigated by Police.

Liliuoe, the Kahuna woman who practiced of Kaula, a Hawaiian woman aged 26, and killed her, was before Judge Wilcox in the district court this morning on the charge of practicing medicine without license. Mr. and Mrs. A. E. Scott and several natives were called by the government as witnesses. Defendant said little in her own behalf.

At the conclusion of the hearing Judge Wilcox administered a scolding lecture to the accused. He then declared her guilty as charged and sentenced her to pay a fine of \$100.

The defendant seemed perfectly satisfied with the sentence and said nothing of appeal. She asked the prosecution for time to get the money for the fine, which was allowed on her bond.

Deputy Marshal Chillingworth had another case before him this morning that promised some interesting developments. A Chinaman applied at the office of the board of health for a permit to bury a child five days old. There was no doctor and no cause of death was assigned or even known. The matter was referred to the police department, and for once the agent of the board of health did right. Deputy Marshal Chillingworth at once ordered an autopsy and held himself in readiness for a coroner's jury. Dr. Emerson, who conducted the autopsy, found that the child had pneumonia and that that was most probably the cause of death. Upon his report the permit was made out in regular form and issued.

POLICE COURT.

Bob Samoa was fined \$5 in Judge Wilcox's court yesterday for assault and battery on Wahaol. A second case, same charge, was dropped.

Sentence was suspended for one year in the case of John Poepe, charged with gambling.

Kow Kow was assessed \$5 for leaving his horse untied on the streets.

AMERICA MARU.

The America Maru was sighted at 2:40 this afternoon.

NIGHT SESSIONS.

IWA ACHIEVES GREATNESS

IS MISTAKEN FOR THE AMERICA MARU.

Has the Whole Town Dancing Attendance on Her Newly Acquired Distinction—The Final Comment.

This is the greatest day in the existence of the steamer Iwa. She was mistaken for the 5500 ton steamship America Maru. The smallest steam vessel of the Island fleet had the whole town waiting for her for two hours. Pilots, revenue officers, post office officials, and the whole business community shared the business in conformity with the new dignity of the flagship of the mosquito fleet. The Iwa has Mr. Webb, bookkeeper of the Waimanalo plantation to thank for its overwhelming distinction. At least it has somebody at Waimanalo to thank for it, and until Mr. Webb disclaims the honor, he will get credit for it. The Aorangi and the Gaelic were sighted from Diamond head and the whistles announcing the fact had the town thoroughly aroused, when a telephone message came from Waimanalo announcing that the America Maru was sighted. The whistles for this completed the excitement. It was two hours before it became known that it was not the America Maru, but the Iwa. Then the whole town joined in the exclamation which the Missourian said was the all but unanimous comment of the keno players when the wheel stopped.

"PYGMALION AND GALATEA."

Pleasing Farewell Performance of the Janet Waldorf Company.

CHARGED WITH SMUGGLING

J. C. COHEN WAS ARRESTED THIS MORNING.

Gives Bail and Will Have a Hearing Tomorrow Morning—Entry and Manifest Did Not Agree.

J. C. Cohen was arrested this forenoon charged with smuggling. He at once gave cash bail in the sum of \$4,000, offering for that purpose a certified check on Bishop & Co., which was accepted. The case will come up in the District Court tomorrow morning.

The arrest was made at the instance of the Customs department. The allegations upon which the charge is based are that when the Australia arrived a month ago Cohen received a consignment of coffee which he entered as 50 cases of 12 pounds each. The goods were delivered to him on his entry. When the entries were checked up with the manifest it was found that the goods were manifested as fifty cases of 60 pounds each, 12 tins each containing five pounds. As it was supposed this might be an error in the manifest nothing was said to him. On this trip of the Australia he received another consignment of coffee which he again entered as cases each of 12 pounds. An examination was made and they were found to be 60 pound cases the same as they were delivered to him and then the warrant was sworn out and also a search warrant for any of the former consignment that he might still have in his possession.

The duty on coffee is seven cents a pound.

STOCK IS PAID UP.

At the meeting of Makawell stockholders the stock of the corporation was declared paid up. Shareholders had paid in \$70 a share. There was no opposition to the move. The action of the shareholders will have a tendency to strengthen the stock on the market.

TREATMENT FOR EYES.

His sight has not been good for some months, and has gotten worse since a recent illness. On his trip Mr. Grievie will be accompanied by Mr. and Mrs. J. L. McLain, and other members of the family.

AN UNPLEASANT OCCUPATION.

There is no doubt that collecting taxes is by no means a pleasant occupation. It has never been regarded as such from long before the days of Matthew, the publican, or tax gatherer, who became a disciple, to the present day. The tax collector in modern days has been the butt of much cheap wit, and even big hearted Dickens had his jibe at him in the ridiculous and self-important Lillivick.

On these islands the tax collector has especially unpleasant work, because we still retain that relic of barbarism, the poll tax. There was a pretty vigorous onslaught upon this tax in the last Legislature, but the wisdom of the majority decreed its retention, and retained it was. The collecting of the personal taxes probably gives more trouble than any other money which the Government receives, and causes more friction than any other source from which the Government draws its funds. But tax collectors do not make the law, they are placed merely to carry out the law. One feels much sympathy for them in a very disagreeable task.

But there are ways of carrying out the law. It can be carried out in a dignified manner, or it can be carried out in a blustering manner. In the one case one can feel full sympathy with the tax collector, in the second he calls down reprobation on himself and upon his colleagues, and he quickly puts himself within the pale of the law, if it should be invoked against his acts.

A case was brought before Judge Wilcox yesterday, in which one A. A. Carreira, a clerk in the employ of the Tax office, was convicted of assault and battery upon a Chinese lad, and was fined for the offence. This Carreira, a Portuguese, served a warrant upon the Chinese boy, for non-payment of taxes. The boy was under age, and owed no taxes. This statement was made, but pooh poohed by the holder of brief authority, who seized the boy by the collar, pushed him to the gate of the premises he was arrested on, and bore him off to prison, where he was duly locked up. Fortunately for the boy he had friends who interested themselves in his case; the assault was proved; and a case later in the day proved that the boy was under age and owed no taxes. He had therefore been illegally imprisoned, illegally arrested and has a suit for damages if it is pressed.

This particular case naturally is of no public interest, but it becomes so as throwing a light upon the manner in which the minor tax officials do their work. There is absolutely no necessity for blustering and treating a man roughly because he has not paid his taxes. No official would dare to act in this way to an Hawaiian of good standing, or to any American. The manner of treatment of this Chinese boy, by this tax official, is no doubt what he has been accustomed to practice upon other Chinese, Japanese and Portuguese who are unaccustomed to our laws, and are ignorant of their rights, and who became alarmed at the unknown powers of a hectoring petty official. Such a creature will cringe before a man who knows his rights and can assert them.

It would be very much better that the heads of the department should make choice of instruments with better balanced minds than those they seem to have on hand. It would have been far more dignified for the collector to have avoided the present scandal of having his official fined in the police court, to have reprimanded him himself, instead of abetting him as he has done. If the upper officers did not countenance conduct of this kind, such conduct would not occur. What the Tax office needed, and what it received yesterday was a lesson. It was not a lesson only to the petty official fined, but it was a lesson to every one from the highest to the lowest, that such conduct was reprehensible in the instrument and indefensible in the officials who tried to palliate, and even brazen out a wrong done. The tax officials have no more right to bully a Chinaman, than they have to bully President Dole, Colonel Fisher or any other citizen. In the eye of the law the Chinaman has the same civil rights as the highest in the land. It is only that in the one case the cur dars bark, and in the other he would put his tail between his legs. There are many cases of similar injustice which are never heard of.

To take another view, what must be thought of an official who swears out a warrant for the arrest of a man, when he is himself ignorant whether the man should pay his taxes or not. The warrant for the arrest of the man in question was based upon no evidence, simply upon a supposition of the person who swore out the paper that the boy was twenty. It has been proved to the satisfaction of the court that he was not. Now this exposes another phase of the loose way things are done. Is a man to be deprived of his liberty and

hauled to prison simply because some nincompoop thinks he has a divine right of guessing ages? It matters not whether the man injured is a Chinaman or a Caucasian—but there is this difference. It is safe, in nine cases out of ten to do this to a Chinaman, whereas it is utterly unsafe to try such a game upon a Caucasian. Truly it shows noble methods for scraping a few dollars into the Government coffers, and all who are connected with the business must feel that they are indeed worthy scions of a dominant race, displaying the attributes of dignity and justice before the semi-civilized Mongolian. It must be a noble thing to pay for a seat in church, and luxuriously listening to the hallowed strains of the hymns, be able to say "Thank God, I have been able to make a Chinaman pay up \$5 a year before it was due," and drop a nickel into the plate towards a mission in the Celestial empire.

Minister Mott-Smith has the true ring of determination in him, which will carry him on his career. The supporters of the fee system have rallied into a solid phalanx, and though they do not say much they form one of those stolid walls of conservatism, which it is so hard to break down. They have lately come upon the idea that the abolishing of the fee system will lower the standard of education. God help the standard of education that depends upon 50 cents a week to maintain it. Reading the life of Stephenson, one comes across the same class of mind. If people traveled sixteen miles an hour behind a locomotive, those wise acres were satisfied there would be premature births, hens would not lay, fields would be set on fire, horses would deteriorate in breed, and all kinds of rubbish. The wise acres are a breed which like the poor we shall "always have with us."

A MISTAKE.

It looks very much as if the Administration was losing its head over Professor Atkinson. He and his fellow-cranks can send all the pamphlets they like through the mails, and so long as there are Filipinos to hunt and fight, the boys in the Philippines will go gaily about their business and never care a button for all the logic and the learned disquisitions of the theorists in Boston and the vicinity. The way to treat such people is to ignore them. To notice their efforts is to give them the notoriety which they desire and which they will live upon. As long as the army is actively engaged there is little or no danger from seditious literature. Men love the honor of their regiments, and the honor of their flag too much to listen to such stuff.

Kipling struck the soldier heart when in his story of "The Mutiny of Mavericks" he wrote, "Bid a boy defy his father when the pantomime-cab is at the door; or a girl develop a will of her own when her mother is putting the last touches to her first ball dress; but do not ask an Irish regiment to mutiny on the eve of a campaign." All the truck that Professor Atkinson can forward through the mails will have no more effect upon the minds of the soldiers than water on a duck's back. The boys in blue are just as fond of fighting as Kipling's Mavericks.

By stopping Professor Atkinson's pamphlets passing through the mail, attention is called to them, and they may be sought after where in nine cases out of ten, they would be ignored. When the peace time comes they will be sought after far more than they would have been if no notice had been taken of them. But under any circumstances the perverted logic of a conservative old man, however clever and however worthy he may be, will have no effect upon the irresistible march of imperial events.

What a tasteless back-number population that of New York and Paris is. Actually they have been enjoying in the one place the "Merchant of Venice" and in the other "Othello." These are poor stories written in "stilted language" and it is really surprising that any population would support such rubbish. Some how or other the plays were supported however, and the illustrated papers have given both considerable space. However, let us hope that some day their taste may be improved—then Shakespeare "won't do" in New York or Paris.

The results of party government are very odd at times. In Italy the cabinet has resigned because of the San Mun bay incident. Yet the ministry, which is to follow, will carry out almost exactly the same policy, for San Mun bay is to be occupied and that will necessarily mean fortifications and troops to hold them. It will be the same in the States, if the present Administration could by some impossible chance be overthrown and the anti-Expansionists get the power, they would have to carry out the same policy in the Philippines as is now being carried out.

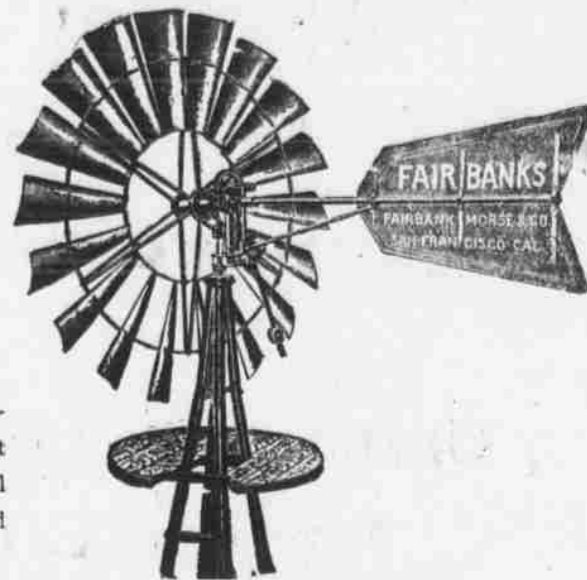

Williams, Dimond & Company's circular under date of San Francisco, May 3d, contains the following information: SUGAR: Prices were advanced in the local market and for export to Honolulu, April 11, and again changed the basis from barrels to bags on the 15, since which no change until May 2, the following schedule of prices was issued by the Western Sugar Refining Company, and we understand that the California Beet Sugar and Refining Company are selling on the same basis, namely:

Cubes (A) crushed and fine crushed, 5 11-16; powdered, 5 11-16; candy, granulated, 5 5-16; dry granulated, fine, 5 5-16; confectioners' A, 5 3-16; California A, 4 15-16; magnolia A, 4 13-6; extra C, 4 11-16; golden C, 4 9-16.
 For export to Honolulu in bond, prices were changed on May 2, and we now quote the market for dry granulated at 3 7-16 in bags by both refineries.

BASIS: April 5, sale in New York cost and freight, 2100 tons at 4.51; 6th, to arrive, 250 tons at 4.51, 1100 tons at 4.30; 10th, to arrive, 1500 tons 4 9-16; 12th, 500 tons at 4.51; 13th, cost and freight sale 3000 tons 4.51; 17th, spot sale, 250 tons at 4 9-16; 18th, spot and to arrive sale 5000 tons 4 5/8; 21st, cost and freight sale 1100 tons at 4 5/8; May 1st, cost and freight sale 800 tons at 4.70; to arrive sale 500 tons at 4 11-16; May 2d, no sales reported, making net basis for island sugars here on that date 4.32.

STOCKS: Willett & Gray report U. S. four ports April 26, 202,397 tons against 245,317 tons same date last year. Cuba six principal ports 85,500 tons, against 81,396 tons same date last year. Total stock in all principal countries, latest uneven dates, April 27, by cable, 2,156,397 tons against 2,544,992 tons same date last year, showing a deficiency under last year of 388,295 tons.

EASTERN AND FOREIGN MARKETS: Owing to the news regarding decrease of sowing of beet sugars in Germany coupled with the confirmation of reduced estimates for the Cuban crop, which, during April was estimated to not exceed 290,000 tons, the European market for beets steadily advanced, which in addition to the fact that there were very few sugars in first hands in the United States caused our market to maintain a firm position, and to steadily advance. Some tendency for the whole month being rather in favor of sellers than buyers, and from present indications there seems to be no reason why prices should not be maintained for some time to come, at least until lower priced sugars of the new beet crop become available in October.

We quote from C. Charnikow's Weekly London Circular under date of April 13, as follows:

"A further reduction in the Cuban crop estimates, together with larger beet orders from America, have resulted in a further rise of about 5d per cwt. in values of present crop beet, and though this movement may to a certain extent be speculative, it has a strong foundation in the reduced stocks and increasing consumption of the world, both of which we have referred to on former occasions.

"The moderate holdings by distributors have led to increased activity both in raw and refined, but the comparatively small quantities offering have to some extent restricted transactions. Doubtless the present level of values is very satisfactory to producers, but the latter, seeing that there is no fear of any extra supplies from outside sources (as has previously been so frequently the case in advancing markets), are not pressing their sugars for sale. It is, in fact, probable that we shall have a very healthy trade demand for some time to come, they may, during the summer months, show some falling off, owing to the difficulty experienced by continental refiners in obtaining raw material at a working margin.

"The great difference between the values of present and new crop beet has at last attracted the attention of speculators to the latter, and transactions of some importance have taken place at an advance of 1/4d, which still leaves quotations at considerable discount below old crop."

CALIFORNIA BEET CROP: With rain during the last ten days, the condition, as advised in our last, has been fully maintained, if not improved, and the estimates are that we shall have at least three-fourths as many beets as if rain had commenced early in the season.

COFFEE: Market for all coffees shows a softening tendency. Stock of Hawaiians in first hands today 1699 bags. We quote for Hawaiians as follows: Good, 13@14c.; prime, 15@16 1/2c.; fancy, 17@18c.

RICE: No Hawaiian in market. Louisiana of similar quality can be laid down at from 5 1/2 to 6c. Many lots of inferior rice are being imported from the East, and selling at prices ranging from 4 to 5 1/2c, according to grade, but bulk of trade is in Japan rice.

HAVANA'S POLICE FORCE

OFFICERS AND MEN FROM THE CUBAN ARMY.

Men Needed Who Were Familiar With Language and Locality—850 Selected Out of 2000 Applicants.

HAVANA, April 29.—Gambling has been thoroughly stopped in Havana. The only places where it is carried on are the clubs, which are private affairs. The general did not think he was required to invade clubs, unless some public scandal was created by the playing.

It had been charged that men of the police force were getting rich by granting permits for gambling and for houses of ill-repute. Regarding the latter, General Ludlow says they have in Havana the continental system of licensing houses and women, and keeping them all under constant police and medical supervision, requiring physical examinations and certificates of good health.

After describing the Spanish police system, General Ludlow says of the new force: "An American police was out of the question. We did not want American army officers as members of a Havana police, and we did not want United States policemen."

"We needed men who were familiar with the language and the locality and could make themselves effective and follow a criminal. Furthermore, it was of the utmost importance that the new police to be constituted should be of such a material as should command the respect and confidence of the public. I determined to organize it on the highest plane practicable. I took a major-general in the army, a man highly esteemed, and American bred, as the chief, and through him secured the cooperation of young officers in the Cuban army of rank and high social position as inspectors, captains, lieutenants and the like. For the bulk I had 850 men selected out of over 2000 applicants, requiring that every man should have a standard of height and weight and be able to read and write, and in other respects be certified as a man of intelligence and good character by two or more citizens. A good many of these I got from the Cuban army, but the 'read and write' difficulty kept out twenty-four out of twenty-five of this class, and of these I used about 200 in the organization of the rural police, who are mounted and patrol the suburbs to the limits of the department."

END OF THE BEEF ENQUIRY

REPORT OF COMMISSION IS SENT TO PRESIDENT.

Court Finds That Beef Was Not Doctored and That it Was the Beef of Commerce.

WASHINGTON, April 29.—The War Department today concluded its work in connection with the allegations of General Miles concerning the beef supplied to the army during the war with Spain. The text of the report has not been made public and will not until after the president shall have read it. It will then rest with him to say when the report shall be given to the public. The verdict, however, is known to be that the charges which General Miles made before the War Investigating Committee are not sustained in reference to the refrigerated beef, although the contention that the canned roast beef was not a suitable continuous ration is admitted. There is direct criticism of General Miles for failing promptly to bring to the attention of the War department the reports made to him concerning bad beef.

The court takes the position that the testimony is conclusive that both the refrigerated beef and the canned beef were in good condition when delivered to the Government and continued so until issued to the troops, except in special instances, when the deterioration was due to accidental conditions in the transportation or to the influence of the tropical climate. The report admits the liability of refrigerated beef to taint quickly after removal from the ice chests. The court finds the charges of "embalming" the fresh beef to have been unsubstantiated by testimony and says no chemicals were used to preserve it. It also says that it would have been impracticable to secure beef on the hoof for the Cuban campaign. The finding is also adverse to the assertion on the part of General Miles that the use of the beef was an experiment.

The Commissary-General of Subsistence is roundly criticized for the purchase of the meat in such extensive quantities. As to the character of the meat for wholesomeness and nutrition the reports of Professors Atwater and Chittenden are quoted at length, sustaining the claims in this respect. The court finds that the meat was not "doctored" that it was the beef of commerce; that there was no more neglect than was incidental to the hurried preparation for the war; that the inspection, while generally according to regulations, was not always up to the requirements, and that the sickness of the troops was not to any great degree occasioned by the use of either the canned or the refrigerated beef.

DEWEY DAY AT MANILA.

MANILA, May 2, 8:25 a. m.—The anniversary yesterday of the battle of Manila bay was observed by the United States fleet, the usual drills being omitted. Admiral Dewey had many visitors, and the American and British merchantmen dressed ship.
