WORLD NEWS BY CABLE

EMPEROR WARNED. St. Petersburg, Feb. 18.—It is reported that the Empress Dowager, the mother of the czar and sister of the Queen of England, has been warned that she will be the next victim of the socialist assassins.

SPREAD OF DISCONTENT. St. Petersburg, Feb. 18.—The unrest in the empire is growing. The strikes are multiplying.

MAYOR ASSASSINATED. St. Petersburg, Feb. 18.—A minor official, mayor of Vaganzhopod, has been assassinated. The prefect of police at Kishineff was assaulted but not killed.

CEAR'S FAVOR FOR DUKE. St. Petersburg, Feb. 18.—The czar has restored to favor the Grand Duke Paul, who was degraded on account of a morganatic marriage. It is now reported that the Romanovs will not assemble until March 1.

ACTIVITY OF JAPANESE. Mukden, Feb. 18.—A large force of Japanese cavalry is moving toward Gungshan from Monogoula. It is reported that General Ma, commanding the Chinese frontier forces, is assisting the Japanese.

RUSSIAN GUNS OUTCLASSED. Moscow, Feb. 18.—The Japanese are constantly bombarding Port Arthur, the key to the Korean peninsula, with siege artillery. The increased fire exceeds the Russian capacity to reply.

PRESIDENT'S PRESENT. Washington, Feb. 18.—The Chinese Minister has presented President Roosevelt with the portrait of the Empress Dowager which was exhibited at the World's Fair.

ADMIRAL DEWEY SICK. Washington, Feb. 18.—Admiral Dewey is ill of the grippe.

BRITISH STEAMER SEIZED. Tokyo, Feb. 18.—The British steamer Biviana, with coal for Vladivostok, has been seized.

DISASTROUS FIRE. Indianapolis, Feb. 18.—A fire has occurred in the wholesale district of this city, causing a loss of \$15,000,000.

SYMPATHIZERS DISPERSED. New York, Feb. 18.—The police dispersed a meeting of sympathizers with the Russian revolutionaries. A number were arrested.

SERGIUS' FUNERAL. St. Petersburg, Feb. 18.—The funeral of Grand Duke Sergius will be held on the 23rd inst. The remains will be temporarily deposited in Moscow, pending an alteration in the Romanoff nomenclature. Requiem for the dead were sung throughout the Empire yesterday.

RUSSIAN DARK DAYS. St. Petersburg, Feb. 18.—The political ferment is increasing. More strikes are menacing the empire. The Government is embarrassed. Manifestos have been ordered, to the value of \$5,000,000, from France and Germany.

ASSASSIN UNIDENTIFIED. Moscow, Feb. 18.—The identity of the murderer of Grand Duke Sergius has not thus far been established. A state of gloom pervades the city.

NAPHTHA EXPLOSION. Baku, Russia, Feb. 18.—A naphtha explosion has occurred here, twenty persons being killed.

AN EDUCATOR DIES. Menlo Park, Feb. 18.—I. G. Hoyt, educator, is dead.

TURKS BURN VILLAGE. Batavia, Feb. 18.—Twenty Dutch villages were killed and wounded in a battle with the Turks, who burned a village.

**MAILES BEST IOLANIS WANT MOSQUITO FUND**

**STRENUOUS SOCKER BALL ENDS IN 4 TO 1 VICTORY**

**LOSING TEAM'S WEAKNESS LIES FORWARD—WOO TO BE IN LINE BY SATURDAY. BIG CROWD.**

A fast and exciting game of Association football between the Mailes and the Iolanis took place at the Buschall Park before a good attendance of spectators on Saturday when the above teams met for the third time this season, under the direction of D. W. Anderson.

At the outset the Mailes made an incursion into Iolani territory, a mistake by Kellie giving them a corner, but nothing resulted. Iolanis then bore down on the Maile chieftain but were repulsed and a fine passing movement by Mon Yin and Fernandez ended in the ball going behind. The green and gold then inaugurated a spell of pressure on the blue and white lines but John Anderson raised the siege and transferred the venue of play mid-field. Iolanis now took up the running and several opportunities to open the score fell to them but they attacked in rather a slack manner when at close quarters. Haggard play followed for some time and both goals were visited in turn.

Three corners fell to the Mailes but were successfully disposed of by the vigilant defence of the blue and whites. From the result of an opportune pass Beardmore succeeded in opening the score for his side by beating the Iolani custodian with a high dropping shot passing right under the bar. Just before the interval the same player again was prominent in tricking three opponents and his parting effort finding the net. Iolanis thereupon retaliated strongly, McTitchie having some anxiety as to the destination of the ball as it kept bobbing about dangerously in the vicinity of his charge, but the Maile backs repelled the attack and half time arrived, the score reading Mailes 2, Iolanis 0.

On the resumption of hostilities the blue and whites started in operations towards their rival's territory and several fierce onslaughts were made on the opposing defense. Campbell and company at last breaking through and Mon Yin reducing the leeway by planting the sphere past the Maile custodian. Encouraged by this success the blue and whites kept things humming for some time and it was only after strenuous work on the part of the Maile defense that they were able to repel their opponents and transfer the venue of play.

The game was much faster now, the kicking of the four backs making the play range from end to end of the field and both sets of halves were persistently harassed by the opposing forwards. A good bit of passing by the Maile van resulted in Kellie again being severely tested and from a noice in the goalmouth Harwood netted.

Sustaining vigorous tactics the Mailes kept up the pressure on the Iolani goal and forced a corner from which B. Anderson deftly headed the ball into goal out of reach of the custodian making the score 4 to 1.

The Iolanis, right up to the finish of the match, concerted every inch of ground and their desperate attempts to retrieve the situation deserved success but luck was not with them. The game was interesting in so far as it brought out the defensive capabilities of both teams, the Mailes' forward kicking well and shooting at every angle while the Iolanis lacked cohesion and Woo's absence was badly felt in their forward line. Beardmore dribbled well and fed his forwards judiciously while Anderson is always handy with his cranium.

The back divisions of both teams were safe and reliable, although the Iolani backs when pressed mis-kicked frequently. As before stated their weakness lay forward but this state of things will no doubt be remedied before next Saturday by the inclusion of Woo.

The Mailes thoroughly deserved to win on play, but it was hard lines for the Iolanis to go under to the tune of 4 to 1 after the stoutly contested game they put up. The line up was as follows:

**LEGISLATURE ASKED FOR APPROPRIATION**

**COMMITTEE RESOLVES THAT TERRITORY SHOULD PAY EXPENSES OF CAMPAIGN ON MOSQUITOES.**

The committee appointed by President Pinkham of the Board of Health to obtain an appropriation to carry on the mosquito campaign and place it under one of the Government departments, at a meeting held last Friday night adopted the following resolutions:

Whereas, through the efforts of a Citizens' Mosquito Committee, acting in conjunction with the Board of Health, the Department of Public Works and the Bureau of Survey, it has been found possible to reduce the numbers of mosquitoes in and about the city of Honolulu by at least fifty per cent. in one year's work; and

Whereas, the money for carrying on the work has been subscribed by a comparatively few public-spirited citizens to the amount of from two or three hundred dollars per month; and

Whereas, the Hawaii Experiment Station has determined the species of mosquitoes responsible for the nuisance which has worked out their habits, life histories and breeding places and this data together with the experience of the committee in the work of control for the past year is sufficient to enable an organization with the proper authority and financial aid to further reduce the numbers of mosquitoes in general throughout the Territory; and

Whereas, since the work of mosquito control is a public service and to become effective must be a permanent affair, comparable with other functions of the government, as the garbage system, street cleaning, etc., and since it is manifestly unjust to indefinitely support a public service on the subscriptions of private individuals, therefore, be it resolved:

1. That it is the opinion of this committee that the work of mosquito control should be placed under the supervision of the Territorial Board of Health.

2. That a sum of money of at least \$200 per month is necessary to carry on the work as already inaugurated by the Citizens' Mosquito Committee and that the Legislature now in session is urged to appropriate to the Board of Health for mosquito control work in general throughout the Territory of Hawaii the sum of \$7,200 for the coming biennial period.

3. That the work should be placed in charge of a Superintendent who shall be a person well qualified by experience or training to outline and carry on the work of mosquito extermination under methods now known to be effective and practical, whose salary shall be not more than \$150 per month, whose assistance shall be such as is in the opinion of the Board of Health necessary and who shall be especially instructed to continue the work of investigation of the subject with reference to local conditions.

4. That the Board of Health should enact such rules and regulations as are necessary to enable them to deal with the problem in all its phases and that it shall be the duty of the Superintendent to have printed such rules and regulations, together with recommendations and other information regarding the extermination of mosquitoes and distribute same to the residents of the Territory.

5. That it should be the further duty of the Superintendent to prepare the publication, at least once in three months, a report on the progress of the work with definite recommendations for the solution of the various issues posed by the Board of Health, to be printed in bulletin form and distributed to the residents of the Territory.

6. That the Citizens' Mosquito Committee should continue as a permanent organization whose objects shall be to cooperate with the Board of Health in the work of mosquito extermination; emphasize the duty of citizens in the work of control; investigate the various species of mosquitoes occurring in Hawaii in their relation to the comfort, health and other interests of the citizens of the Territory; keep alive the public interest in the work through the press and by public meetings; become more closely identified with the work on the mainland and with the National Society; and promote the organization of societies similar to the Citizens' Mosquito Committee of Honolulu in other districts of the Territory.

Editor Evening Bulletin:—As one interested in the development and up-building of this Territory by "small farmers" irrespective of what they may adopt as an industry, be it Rubber, Pine, Bananas, Cane or what else...

Accepting Mr. Iten's figures as correct the dues not credit his account with the value of the seed taken, nor distribute the cost of seed, plowing and planting over three crops as he should...

Taking the contra side we find by referring to the Olan report that it cost from the mill to the market \$16.21 per ton of sugar, hence we deduct cutting and burning...

To this must be added Cost of burning, watchmen, delays, etc. Handling bums boxes, haulage, installation and removal, waste, etc., say...

Making a total cost to Mill... \$30.71  
Add price paid to Mr. Iten... \$1.68

Making a grand total of... \$32.39  
The price paid to the Mill was \$73.35 less 1-10 of a cent or net 71.35

The Mill profit... 9.56  
Against Mr. Iten's... 9.38  
If the cane should be 9 to 1 instead of 8 to 1, the Mill profit would be proportionately reduced.

AT KAKA'AKO MISSION

HIGH SHERIFF HENRY COMPLIMENTS LEADER

NOTABLE WORK DONE IN NOTORIOUS DISTRICT—RECLAIMING THE CHILDREN—A REMARKABLE SCENE.

High Sheriff Henry and Deputy Sheriff Rawlins, while on a tour of inspection around the city Saturday evening, were given the privilege to see what is being done by an earnest man and a devoted woman to reclaim the lost children of a notorious district and educate them in the principles of religion, morality and good citizenship.

Very few people in Honolulu know of the existence of the Kaka'ako Mission. Yet it has been doing a splendid and lasting work during the two years since its foundation by Mr. and Mrs. P. W. Rider, and a number of young men, now members of the churches graduated at the Mission. When High Sheriff Henry drove to the entrance of the Mission on Saturday evening, a remarkable scene was offered to his view. A hundred children of all ages, all conditions, and all nationalities—who two years ago would have been found on the streets of the Kaka'ako district learning all that is evil and pernicious—crowded the hall of the Mission and in an edifying manner were singing lustily:

"All unclean He found me  
Poor and comfortless,  
But He threw around me  
Robes of righteousness."

High Sheriff Henry heartily congratulated Mr. Rider upon the work he was doing and before driving away, remarked that the change which has taken place in the Kaka'ako district since the opening of the Mission was plainly evident and much appreciated by his department.

The meeting on Saturday evening was a notable one, as it celebrated the reopening of the hall, renovated and much enlarged. While preparations were being made the meetings and school were conducted in a cottage opposite. The hall was prettily decorated with flags and illuminated notices, and the bright raiment of the children of so many nations kept up a changeful kaleidoscope of light and color.

A musical program made up of solos, duets, choruses and recitations was rendered by the members of the Mission. The meeting began with the singing of the above quoted hymn and after a duet had been sung by Stephen Lake and H. Wilson, prayer was offered by Mr. Turner of the Boys' Manual Training School. A song was given out and all heartily joined in the singing. Then an extraordinary thing happened. Mr. Rider said that the boys would give some Scriptural reading and turned the meeting over to them. A young man began in a deep basso voice, "In the beginning was the Word," etc., and continued until he had recited a large part of the chapter; he had not yet resumed his seat that a little tot, about five or six years of age, whose head could hardly be seen above the bench, took up the recitation where the boy had left it and carried it right through to the end of the chapter. This continued for half an hour, and about thirty boys and girls took part in this novel Bible reading. The Hawaiians read in their own language, the Chinese in Chinese, the Porto Ricans in Spanish, etc. Not a Bible was in sight and it is doubtful if a similar exhibition of Biblical learning could be given in any of the Honolulu churches. Mr. and Mrs. Mattox sang a duet which was much appreciated and then the meeting was turned over to the friends who had honored the Mission with their presence. Short talks were given by the Rev. Dr. Gulick, Dr. Whittier, W. W. Hall, Theodore Richards and others. The meeting closed with the singing of "God be With You Till We Meet Again."

The Kaka'ako Mission has now been open for two years and three months with Mr. and Mrs. Rider in charge. They began in a small room with a very few boys, and for a time met with but scant success. When the population of the district, however, found that these missionaries were not after their money but only after their children, a complete revolution of feeling took place. Men and women, boys and girls flocked to the new "church" which had come to them and have been enthusiastic supporters of it ever since. The Mission, which is located in a large hall in the Magoon block, has on its rolls the names of 75 adult people and 160 children, representing twenty nationalities. There is a night school every evening except Wednesdays, on Sunday afternoon Sunday school, on Monday afternoons a temperance lesson, and on Friday afternoons a sewing class for the girls.

New Trial Ordered

IN KAPIOLANI

Estate vs. Thurston

Territorial Supreme Court orders a new trial in Kapiolani Estate vs. L. A. Thurston, ejectment. Verdict in Circuit Court was for plaintiff. Justice Hartwell writes the opinion. Says the syllabus:

The administrator with the will annexed of the Estate of Kalakaua (from whom the plaintiff in the present case claimed title) retained counsel to defend an action of ejectment by one Oku against Cummins, Kalakaua's lessee. Held: Evidence of the defense of the action at the instance of the administrator was inadmissible for the purpose of showing that Kapiolani, the devisee of Kalakaua, was ousted by the judgment in the case against Cummins.

Conveyances and mortgages made by Kalakaua and Kapiolani and by the trustees of Kalakaua were improperly admitted as evidence to rebut defendant's evidence of adverse possession, and on that ground a new trial is ordered.

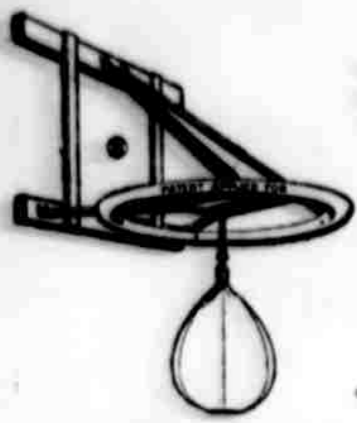

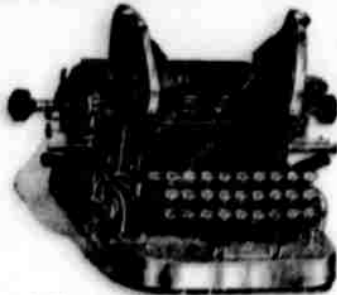
