## "HARD CASH."

Under the above heading "The Times," on its front page, referring to its subscription lists, makes the following its closing paragraph:

"President Roosevelt be it said is a deadhead and many of the bonton at the Capital; but we wouldn't mind that a bit if they will put in their oar for Hawaii to have 30,000 Chinese contract laborers for the plantations."

The gratuitous insult to the President and others implied by the above quoted paragraph is on a par with the "Righteousness" in the bosom of the person writing the same, who by the way must have written the article on "Labor" in the November issue of "The Times" wherein flippant reference is made to what the Declaration of Independence does not require. The writer of the article needs to read the document before he passes off hand judgment of this kind.

With true missionary instinct, forgetful of that "Righteousness" which is to Exalt this nation—the writer of the November article asks why Congress should do less for Hawaii which is a full Territory,

the Philippines—and we let Senator Tawney's reply to McCants Stewart when approached on this very subject, be our answer:

Simply stated—the Constitution will not permit of legislation of the kind desired—hence the necessity of making a colony of this Territory before Asiatics can be brought in and it is with this knowledge at hand that the article "Labor" was inspired and for all we know "Hard Cash" may have been paid for its insertion.

Any person at all familiar with local moral and social conditions, must surely, if sane, stand aghast at the idea of making this a dumping ground for 30,000 more Chinese.

As for the political conditions created by the act of annexation, is something for us to discuss. With annexation there came to native Hawaiians as well as to "Foreigners," as friend Kinney persists in calling resident Americans, the full measure of citizenship in the great Union of States, a status as fully guaranteed to these Islands and in like manner as that of any State or Territory in the Union. It was this guarantee of equality with mainland citizenship and mainland constitutional procedure, that induced the native Hawaiians to forego further agitation for independence and to voluntarily and freely accept the situation thus presented.

For that reason we warn the Executive of this Territory against transmitting to Congress or the President any matters now being collated in secret and to which the "Hard Cash" quotation undoubtedly alludes, without first giving the public in general and the voters in particular an opportunity to be heard relative thereto. Any proposals of such vital consequences to the body politic of this Territory should first be submitted to a vote of the people.

In his inaugural address the Governor used language in part as follows: "As a man born and bred in this country, I am a Hawaiian in thought and feeling. In all the Islands of the broad Pacific there is no aboriginal people equal to the Hawaiians—the flower of all Polynesia. Among them and with them I hope to carry out the traditions of the Anglo-Saxon race from which I spring, that point toward liberty of thought, freedom of speech, and a high standard of virtue."

Fine sentiments these—exquisitely worded and withal indicative of a high purpose—so high in facts that, from an analysis of his act to date, one is justified in the presumption that the aim was high on "the flower of all Polynesia," but low on "Anglo-Saxon traditions."

Time and the "Pinkham" Commission will tell.

Automobile enthusiasts are now discussing a scheme of races at the park or elsewhere in Honolulu. Any such project should be nipped in the bud by prohibitory legislation. The very same scheme of auto manufacturers has been tried all over Europe and in America, and has invariably resulted in disaster in some form or another. The case of Mr. Pair, the young millionaire, and his wife, in France, is still fresh in the minds of everyone. Honolulu is ripe for sport, but automobile racing is altogether too strenuous

## "RIGHTEOUSNESS EXALTETH A NATION."

The above axiom forming part of the "head" of "The Honolulu Times" would indicate to a casual observer that the editor and proprietor was a person of high ideals who had taken to the newspaper field as a means of advancing the moral, spiritual and physical tone of the community along pathways toward "Righteousness."

One of the leading paragraphs on the front page of the December number is headed "The Victory" and reads:

"We won the election on Tuesday, the 8th of November, 1904, in these Islands because our morning paper worked and planned for Righteousness in the land, day in and day out, even on Sunday, and was nothing daunted by chicanery, knavery or insolence."

Yes, "honor to whom honor is due" and don't you forget the same there at Washington, D. C."

From personal observation we fail to see any "honor," let alone "righteousness," in the methods adopted for carrying the Territorial elections. Thorough organization, a large amount of government patronage and unlimited free booze, with all the concomitants that are implied, these it was that carried the election for the Republican party. And we hope yet to see an investigation by the proper authorities into the methods adopted prior to and on the day of election to whip the electors into line as well as the violation of law by the Inspectors sworn to uphold the same. That investigation complete there would be a report to authorities at Washington, a report that would contain little of Honor and less of Righteousness for those responsible for "The Victory."

Instead of its being a *fiasco*, the automobile *fiesta* was a decided success as far as it went, it being the first of its kind here.

This city is getting more civilized with a "Carrie Nation" and a "John Gilpin," or a possible "Diek Turpin" racing through the streets. Whos, Bill; what are we coming to?

Again has Governor Carter appointed a Democrat to a position of honor, but not of emolument, in further recognition of the Democratic party and not of the Home Rule. But is it a sop to Democrats? It looks that way, to further placate them in the labor conspiracy.

THE INDEPENDENT takes this occasion to compliment Governor Carter in the appointment of the Hon. Abraham Fernandez upon the Board of Health vacancy, thereby recognizing a Hawaiian of sterling worth, probity and integrity. Still there is some good that comes forth out of Nazareth.

Thanksgiving Day has come and gone, and still we are thankful that we are yet alive and to be counted among the living; that Governor Carter is still with us and we'll have to have several more years of him. For all the blessings in disguise, we heartily thank the Republican party for being successful.

Regardless of the recommendation of his party's executive, the Governor went outside and appointed another Fernandez to the Board of Health vacancy. We wonder whether he mistook the names and instead of the Republican Fernandez, he appointed the Democratic Fernandez. Oh! wow; there'll be war, no doubt, in the camp of the ever faithful.

The claim of the Merchants' Association for a reduction in taxes on the plea that their stocks should not be assessed on a basis of actual cost is not without merit. Merchandise of almost every kind depreciates in value; and in an isolated community like this where shipments are necessarily infrequent and consequently very large. A reduction of twenty per cent in the values placed upon general merchandise is not, in all of the circumstances, unreasonable.

Why do not the theorists who are constantly urging the importance of and profits from small farming get out and demonstrate their views? It is well enough for the editor of the Advertiser to sit in his easy chair in Honolulu and point out how a man can support his family on so many acres; but, if he is so certain about it why does he not support his theories by actual accomplishments? The public has a right to demand some results before being forced into a scheme of this or any other kind.

#### Ex-Detectives Arrested.

Considerable of a sensation was  
created Wednesday afternoon by the  
arrest of former detectives McDuffie  
and Ah On on the charge of "accept-  
ance of a bribe by an executive  
officer." The arrests were made at

on five charges of embezzlement.

#### Fire At Hospital.

#### Prince Fushima Robbed.
