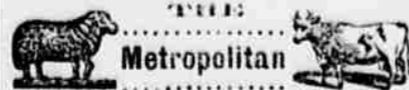

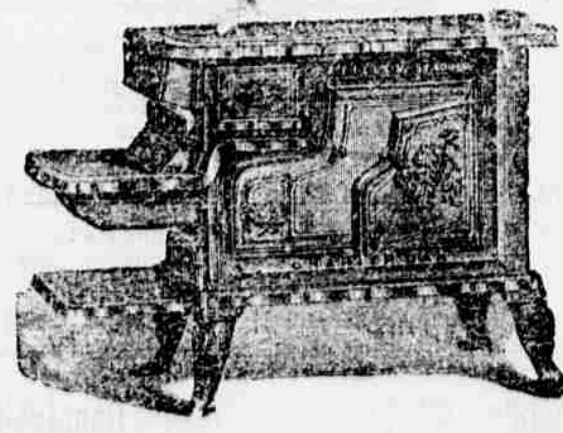

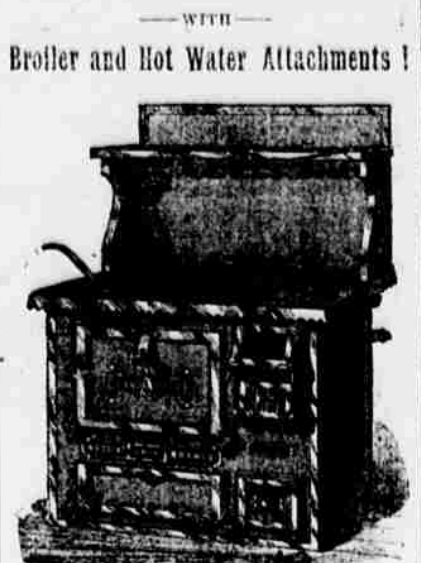

OUR MERCANTILE MARINE. Description of the Robert Lewers a Late Addition.

The American four-masted schooner Robert Lewers, since her arrival from port Townsend several weeks ago, has been an object of much attention among the shipping agents and also lovers of marine architectural beauty. She is the largest vessel yet built on the Pacific Coast for the Hawaiian trade, and is the first four-masted schooner built for and owned by Hawaiian merchants. During her stay in port, she has been visited by many ladies who have uttered nothing but praise of her finish. Marine experts have inspected her and found her to be what she was built for.

The Robert Lewers was built at Port Blakely by the Hall Brothers, builders of many of our merchant vessels and also the coasting steamers of the Inter-Island Steam Navigation Company. The keel was first laid in June, 1889, and the vessel was finished and launched in September of the same year. Her model is of the medium type. She is 290 feet length over all, 40 feet extreme width, and 14 1/2 feet depth. Her net tonnage is 698.13, capable of carrying 24,000 bags of sugar or one million feet of lumber including a deckload of 87 tons. The report of survey whilst building states: "The Robert Lewers is built of the best material, of large size and long lumber (the workmanship first class) and a vessel well adapted for general business." She is supplied with a donkey engine for hauling cargo and also connected for pumping and getting anchors. The length of the masts is 98 feet and they are 25 inches in diameter at the deck. The cabin is large and elegantly furnished. The Captain's stateroom is artistically finished, while steel engravings and other ornaments adorn the walls. The Chief Officer's cabin is a model of neatness and beauty. The staterooms for passenger accommodations are equal in elegance to other vessels built by the Hall Bros.

Captain De B. P. Penhallow, formerly of the bark Hope, and lately of the bark C. D. Bryant, is the commander. The Robert Lewers is now lying at the Pacific Mail Steamship Company's wharf taking in sugar, and will leave next Wednesday with a cargo of sugar for San Francisco. Although she did not have a fair show of her sailing qualities on her maiden voyage owing to unfavorable weather, yet the log shows that 227 miles were made on December 3, and this record of course can be increased under more favorable circumstances.

HILO NOTES. A dinner given to the Japanese and Chinese by the ladies of Hilo, on Christmas day, passed off smoothly and was appreciated by the recipients.

Co. was placed at the disposal of the society, and with evergreens, ferns, flags and lanterns the building was most beautifully decorated. On one side and end were booths where ice cream, fenz and coffee were sold, while at another young and old enjoyed themselves blowing soap bubbles for a prize. The following programme was most artistically rendered and elicited rounds of applause: PART I.
