VOYAGE OF THE JENNIE WALKER.

Capt. Holland, of the schooner Jennie Walker, said when he was leaving for the Carolines in July, that he expected to be back for his Christmas dinner. Sure enough he was, but a few hours later and his turkey would have been pretty cold. His vessel was just coming through the reef when the first part of the band concert was being played yesterday afternoon. Before the concert was over he presented his genial countenance in Emma Square, and was warmly greeted there by many of his friends. Below we give a record of the Jennie Walker's voyage.

Left Honolulu on July 23rd, bound for Jaluit. Arrived there after a very stormy passage of 22 days. Remained there two days, landing stores for the Gilbert Islands mission, to be forwarded by the schooner Kalama. Thence proceeded to Kusaie, west, arriving there after a passage of three days, and found all well there. Landed Miss Palmer, missionary, and stores for the Rev. Dr. Peas and Miss Cathcart. Remained three days, taking on board Mrs. Rand, who had been left behind after the wreck of the Morning Star. Thence departed for Ponape, arriving there in seven days, and lying off four days before effecting an entrance into the harbor. Found all well there, and remained three days, landing mission stores. Proceeded thence to the Mortlock Islands, reaching them in seven days. Had experienced a westward gale for 16 hours, supposed to be the same one that proved fatal to the American schooner "Ariel" and the German schooner "Olo Singa" at Ponape. Arriving at the Mortlocks on Sept. 25th, remained there four days, finding all well at the mission and leaving supplies. Thence proceeded to Ruk, making the passage in five days. Anchored off the Island of Tolons in 26 fathoms of water. Took the Rev. Mr. Logan in a whaleboat to Ruk, to find Moses the teacher, but not succeeding cruised about in search of a suitable site for a mission station.

At Fefarn Island all the owners of land were willing to grant the necessary ground, but owing to the absence of a woman proprietor nothing could be effected. Therefore, an invitation to Wola Island was accepted, where a plot of 30 acres of excellent land was taken over on behalf of the American Board of F. Missions. Shifting the vessel round to discharge cargo, everything was landed in fine condition. Captain and crew

in a few days put up the mission house. After a stay of 18 days, went to Ponape, where Capt. Kustell, shipwrecked in the American schooner Ariel, was taken on board. (The Ariel was formerly the revenue cutter Wm. L. Marcy.) After two days, proceeded to Kusaie, and took on board the missionaries—the Rev. Dr. Peas and family, the Rev. Mr. Leleo and children and Mrs. Rev. Haina and daughter. Thence sailed for Jaluit by way of Ebon, where a mail was landed. Arrived at Jaluit in nine days, and heard there of the loss of the schooner Kalama on the Gilberts, and also that of the Olo Singa. They here took on board the crew of the Morning Star.

Leaving Jaluit for Honolulu, bound west, all the way to Ruk, eight or nine hundred miles the Jennie Walker passed through a field of pumice, that coated the water with a brownish pink. Between Kusaie and Ponape the missionary Leleo, at 3 o'clock of a morning, fell overboard, but was rescued in about 20 minutes. It appears the gentleman is blind, which accounts for the accident. He is to be placed in the Lunaillo Home. Capt. Holland's observations at Ruk showed serious errors in one of the charts, in respect to soundings, the lay of the land and the location of islands.

ST. ANDREWS CATHEDRAL.

The special Christmas services at this church were of an unusually interesting character. The interior of the building was most profusely decorated with ferns, palm leaves, chrysanthemums, geraniums, roses, etc. The altar, which was in charge of Mrs. Willis and the sisters of St. Andrews Priory, was covered with most beautiful bouquets of flowers, and a text, "Good will towards men." The rood screen, which never looked better, was decorated by H. M. Queen Emma. Mrs. Wodehouse had charge of the pulpit, and the Misses Bertha von Holt and Mist made the font a perfect bed of evergreens and flowers. The services commenced at 6.30 o'clock by a choral celebration of Holy Communion in Hawaiian, the Rev. Alex. Mackintosh being the celebrant. This was followed at 7.30 o'clock with a choral celebration in English. The Bishop celebrating. At 9.30 o'clock came morning prayer in Hawaiian with an appropriate Xmas sermon, by the Rev. Alex. Mackintosh. The special hymns were heartily sung. At 11 o'clock occurred full choral service in English, which was attended by a congregation that filled the church to overflowing. The music was specially selected and was sung in a very fine manner by the large choir, particularly the Te Deum and the Anthem, "In the beginning." The proper psalms for the day were sung to single chants, and the old familiar Christmas hymns were rendered with fine effect.

His Lordship Bishop Willis took his text from Isaiah, "For unto us a child is born," and said the birth of the Redeemer was the central figure in the world's history. As well imagine the solar system without the sun as the condition the world would be in were it not for the event celebrated on this anniversary. What would the position of mankind be if the history of the gospel proved to be as legendary as that of the birth of Romulus and Remus? Instead of walking in the light of immortality they should be groping in darkness. Not only had man's nature been assumed by God, but his representative had been exalted to the right hand of God, and that was the well-spring of salvation to us. The preacher replied to the objections raised by some, that this prophecy was fulfilled in the times of Isaiah, and therefore could not have referred to the Saviour. He said many prophecies were referable to contemporary events, which yet had their chief fulfillment in the distant future. As long as the world lasted there would be deceivers, however, and he urged his hearers to cling more firmly than ever to the central truth they celebrated that day. "Rest not satisfied," he added, "that you have been to Bethlehem, but spread the good news around." In the afternoon, at 4 o'clock, evensong in Hawaiian was said, and

the Rev. Alex. Mackintosh administered the rite of baptism to two infants. The concluding service was held at 7.30 p. m., when the sermon was preached by the Rev. George Wallace.

Victoria, British Columbia, Dec. 6th, was visited by the phenomenal combination of a snow and thunder and lightning storm. Snow seldom falls there, and thunder storms are also infrequent.

The Prefecture of Police in Paris has insisted on models of all Christmas toys being submitted for censorship. All models recalling the war in China are prohibited. Mandarins and Black Flags are not allowed to be caricatured, or the storming of Sontay, to be celebrated, but a figure of El Mahdi was passed, according to which he is a portly Turk and he spins around on being touched by a spring.

Train robbers on the night of Dec. 6th raided the Little Rock, Mississippi River and Texas Railroad train, three miles from Little Rock, Arkansas, and got \$2,000 from the express safe and \$4,000 in money and valuables from the passengers. A despatch of the 9th shows three men examined before a magistrate in Little Rock, for the robbery, and held in \$10,000 bail each.

A wrestling match came off in the California Theatre, San Francisco, on Dec. 10th, between Duncan Ross, the Scotch athlete, and Tom Cannon, which was won by Ross with three bouts—two side-holds in harness and one collar-and-elbow. Cannon won two falls—the catch-as-catch-can and the Græco-Roman.
