THE INTERIOR DEPARTMENT

Some Figures Taken From Minister King's Biennial Reports.

Amounts Expended in the Several Districts for Road Purposes in the Last Two Years and Other Matters.

According to Minister King's biennial report to the Legislature, the total appropriations for expenditures under the direction of the Interior Department for the two years ending December 31, 1898, amounted to \$2,153,216.26, of which \$1,298,216.26 came from current receipts and \$855,000 from the Loan Fund. The total amount disbursed was \$1,854,757.95, of which \$1,164,897.22 came from current receipts and \$689,860.73 from the Loan Fund. At the end of the period the balances on hand were \$133,319.04 from current receipts and \$165,139.27 from the Loan Fund, making a total of \$298,458.31.

The Road Tax, special deposit, receipts were:

Of this sum \$67,656.81 was expended in 1896 and \$88,278.71 in 1897, leaving a balance on hand at the end of the period of \$40,309.91.

The total amount expended in the two years from these sources was divided among the various districts of the Islands as follows:

The increase in the receipts of the Interior Office at the clerk's desk for the year 1897 amounted to \$73,953.00, and the increase in the receipts of the several bureaus to \$4,634.35, making a total increase of \$78,587.35.

A comparative annual statement of the receipts of the Interior Department is as below:

The receipts from Land Sales in 1897 amounted to \$53,588.20, of which \$46,000 was the proceeds of the sale of the Hawaiian hotel premises.

The total receipts from licenses in 1896 was \$120,586.64 and in 1897 \$134,419.14.

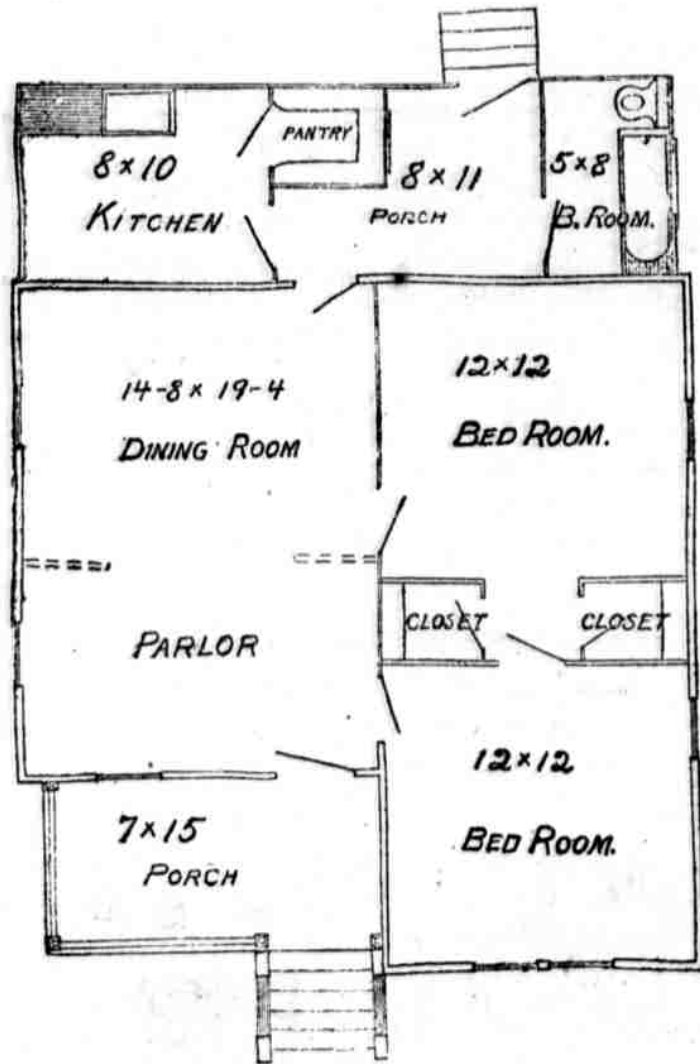

A gang of about a dozen police men, besides a host of volunteers, have been assisting the residents of the flooded district to get back into their homes today.

Clarence Macfarlane is going to build a waterside villa at Pearl harbor, to replace the one lately destroyed by fire on the eve of his return from San Francisco.

Up to 2:30 the body of the Japanese drowned in Nuuanu stream yesterday had not been recovered. It is thought to be buried in the mud at the bottom of the river.

Gus Schuman received another line of fine carriages of all descriptions by the Mohican, also a large consignment of double and single buggy, surrey and wagon harness, to be had at very low prices.

The last game of baseball to be played on the Y. M. C. A. grounds between Runaha and Kamehameha will take place tomorrow at 3 p. m. In case the series be continued the games will take place in future on the campus of one of the colleges.

AFTERMATH OF THE FLOOD

End of Tale of Overflow and Property Losses.

The Submerged District—Kukui Street Bridge—Fall of Six Inches at Luakaha.

There is little to add to the faithful statement in this paper yesterday of the situation in the flooded district near St. Louis College. Work of rescuing the people and their belongings from the submerged flat below Kaunakapili continued most of the afternoon. There was but one life lost, that of the Japanese in the stream. Damage to household property was very serious to the poor people along the stream.

Kukui street bridge had a hard fight against the flood. On the town side the bare rock foundation remained to support it. Water rushed madly around the pillars and it looked, for an hour or more, as if the structure must go. All of the retaining wall at the bridge was carried away. A hundred yards below another long break appears in the wall.

Parts of St. Louis College grounds were three feet under water most of the afternoon. The Brothers were around in bare feet, saving their own property and assisting others in the neighborhood. Next to the school, makai, water flooded the first floors of all the tenements.

Aala was another bad place. Water came up to the body of hacks in front of the Chinese theaters. A long string of fence was washed away and turned across the street. Above this district, in the neighborhood of Vineyard street, along School and up the valley the situation all yesterday afternoon was quite serious. All the low parts of Makiki, around Punahou and at Kewalo were flooded. Most of Palama was under water. Seveio's house at Liliha and School was three feet in water.

The fall up Nuuanu valley during the storm was six inches. Luakaha reservoirs were taxed to their utmost. Superintendent Andrew Brown and a big corps of assistants watched the big pools all afternoon and most of the night.

The harbor is filled with debris of all kinds. Last night it was banked up several feet high against the old Kaimiloa. Native have been engaged today rescuing lumber and everything else of any value.

All along the mauka side of the Waikiki road the Chinese vegetable gardens are under water. Viewed from the tramcars there is a sea of water from the road extending clear to the foothills. Most of this water collected during the night, as the flood was fully twelve inches higher than at 5 o'clock last evening. The Waikiki ditch was unable to carry off the water that came down during the storm, but this morning it was only one-third full at the King street bridge. At the point where it crosses the road beyond Hopkins' switch the stream was level with the bridge. From the few vegetable patches that were to be seen this morning it is likely there will be a big raise in their prices for a few weeks. There was some interruption to tramcar traffic on the Waikiki road yesterday afternoon owing to the breaking down of a section of the bridge near Jim Sherwood's report, and for several hours the cars did not run beyond that point. The rain fall along the Waikiki road, though heavy, was nothing compared to what it was in town.
