Girls in the London University.
The Pall Mall Budget, of London, says
that the number of "sweet girl gradu-
ates" in the London University is al-
ready considerable; and judging from
the matriculation pass-list just issued,
there is no probability that the May
ceremonial will, for years to come, lose
the attractiveness it derives from the
assemblage of a large number of ladies
in full academicals awaiting presenta-
tion to the Chancellor by Miss Swanwick,
Mrs. Bryant, Miss Beale or some other
distinguished person. The ladies, in-
deed, seem to graduate in larger propor-
tion than the men. It appears that this
summer 181 ladies have matriculated.
Last year the number was less by about
50. It will be satisfactory, also, to some
persons to know that the admission of
ladies seems to have the effect of increas-
ing rather than diminishing the number
of male candidates, of whom 860 have
passed this time—a much larger number
than that of both sexes last summer.
The total of matriculated students at this
half-yearly examination has thus reached
the unprecedentedly large number of
1,041.

A Battle of Birds.
A battle of birds is reported to the
Frankfurter Zeitung by an eye witness,
in a letter from Sophia. "Early Thurs-
day morning," he says, "we saw an un-
usually large number of eagles, prob-
ably about two hundred, taking their
flight toward the mountains of the
Jantra. A crowd of persons watched the
spectacle, and the crowd greatly in-
creased a few hours later, when a num-
ber of storks, not fewer than three hun-
dred, flew straight toward the regiment
of eagles, evidently bent on war. In an
instant, eagles and storks were mingled
in a deadly affray. It was a fearful com-
bat. Every now and then a wounded or
dead bird, stork or eagle, fell to the
ground. The battle lasted for nearly an
hour, when the two armies, apparently
weary of fight, flew off in opposite direc-
tions. Upon a rough reckoning it was
estimated that at least a third of the
combatants fell in the severe struggle.
The prefect sent some men up into the
mountains to count the dead eagles and
storks. The people are quite eager to
know which of the two armies was vic-
torious. Probably, as in many wars of
unfeathered breeds, the advantage lay
on either side."

The Indian National Congress.
The opposition of the Mohammedans to
the idea of the so-called "national" con-
gress continues, a representative meet-
ing of the Bombay Mohammedans having
been held, at which it was resolved that,
considering the educational backward-
ness of the community, it was undesir-
able to participate in the congress. One
speaker declared that British rule was a
thousand times better than Russian—a
sentiment greeted with cries of Inshallah
—May God preserve it.

LOCAL AND GENERAL.

Police Justice Dayton has had his office nicely tidied up.

A marriage is coming off in November, for which the bride crosses two oceans.

A Chinaman was arrested yesterday for vagrancy, and a native for drunkenness.

The road material piled there having been removed, Palace Square now looks itself again.

Mr. Pierre Jones has been appointed to the Private Ways and Water Rights Commission.

The U. S. S. Alert sailors got liberty Thursday afternoon. They are a sturdy and jolly appearing lot.

Judge Preston will render his decision upon the Aki \$71,000 claim in Supreme Court Chambers at ten o'clock this morning.

The instructions to hold mails for the U. S. S. Nipsic have not been countermanded but it is doubted at the Consulate if that vessel will come here this year.

All teachers in Government schools are officially notified to be in attendance at their schools daily at least fifteen minutes before the opening hour.

A party of Alert sailors passing the Station House laughingly addressed the officers at the door: "You needn't look at us; we drink nothing stronger than beer."

The Zealandia on her last up trip did not arrive till early on the Saturday morning, but her record is such that her arrival this afternoon would not be surprising.

The meeting called for this evening in the Brewer Block will consider the subject of temperance, and is for men only. The addresses will be short, to the point, and interest you.

The down-town concerts by the Royal Band, inaugurated on Thursday morning, are bound to be universally agreeable. They furnish a new antidote to the insular monotony.

Counter attractions and interfering individual duties, were too many for the Debating Society Thursday evening, and adjournment was made by the less than a quorum till same night next week.

Mr. Morgan will sell two very desirable properties at noon to-day, viz.: the Harrison homestead with two cottages, corner of Lunalilo and Victoria streets; and a residence in Nuuanu Valley nearly opposite Mr. Schaefer's.

More Chinese Immigration Complications.

The S. S. City of New York had 385 Chinese and 52 Japanese steerage passengers for this port. Besides the Custom House officials, Marshal Soper and Deputy Attorney-General Peterson went out to the ship, lying in the roadstead, for the purpose of scrutinizing the return permits held by the Chinese immigrants. Up till a late hour the Marshal and Crown attorney had not reported at the Station, and neither could be raised by telephone. It was understood, from reports that reached shore, however, that a number of Chinese had been refused permission to land, owing to irregularity of their papers. Also it was reported that the steamer would not sail before this morning, owing to a writ of habeas corpus having been served upon Captain Certain, for the production in Court of certain of his Chinese passengers.

A Bad Word.

In a Supreme Court hearing on Thursday a barrister objected to opposing counsel trying to "bulldoze" the witness. The Court disallowed the objection on the merits and rebuked the objector for using the word "bulldoze" in addressing the Court. Thereupon the barrister referred to verbally noted an appeal to Webster's Dictionary. It appears, on reference to the 1884 edition of that work, that: "Bulldoze, v. t. To intimidate; used originally of the alleged intimidation of negro voters, in Louisiana. [Low. Recent. U. S.]" There is no doubt that the word has made great headway since its recent introduction, and the probability is that the parenthetical designation "low" will disappear in future editions of Webster.

The Alert Welcome.

Every arrangement for the complimentary concert by the Royal Hawaiian Band, to Capt. Anderson and officers of the U. S. S. Alert, was perfect at the Hotel. The shrubbery on the lawn was bespangled with radiant incandescent electric lights, while the noble building was beautifully illuminated with the same agent, together with colored lanterns profusely hanging in festoons. There was, however, not so large an attendance of the general public as might have been expected, from the usual popularity of concerts at the Hotel and very favoring weather. Many notable folk, though, met the guests upon the comfortable verandas, and the greatest degree of enjoyment of the superb music was evinced.

An Old Acquaintance.

Prof. W. T. Brigham, who arrived by the Australia, held a professorial chair in Oahu College 25 years ago. About ten years ago he revisited the Islands. He is the author of a work entitled: "Geological Formation of the Hawaiian Archipelago." It is said that some of the views therein have been combated by Prof. Dana, and, although our representative has not had the good fortune to meet Prof. Brigham, it is surmised that his present visit may have for an object further scientific investigation. The Professor has been widely known as a scholar with means sufficient for the fullest exercise of his tastes.

A Scrap for Seashore Loiterers.

U. S. S. BROOKLYN DISABLED.

Now en Route from Japan Under Sail—Will be Due at Honolulu October 10th to 15th.

The United States Consulate received instructions by the S. S. City of New York that the national ship Brooklyn had departed from Nagasaki, Japan, under sail for Honolulu on the 5th inst. She had left the Asiatic squadron for home by way of the Cape of Good Hope, but breaking her main shaft put back to Nagasaki, whence she sailed as above stated.

Admiral Chandler has instructed the Consulate here to send out a tugboat if one be signalled for on the arrival of the Brooklyn off port. The latter vessel was the Admiral's flagship until relieved by the Marion, that called here en route. The Brooklyn is a large ship of the old class, and will probably go out of commission on arrival at the Coast from hence. She is commanded by Captain Hiram Wilson.

An Evil Condemned from the Bench.

It transpired before Judge Bickerton on Thursday that Mr. Kauli, ex-representative of Ewa and Waianae, had taken acknowledgment of a forty years' lease from an old woman who was deaf as a post and could neither read nor write, without the slightest explanation to her of the contents of the instrument or inquiry as to whether she understood them. The Court thereupon annulled upon such official looseness, saying it was an exhibition of an evil continually cropping out in litigation here. Even forms prescribed by statute were not observed in the drawing up of legal instruments. In this particular case the lease was acknowledged in May although not executed until a month or two later.

Wedding Bells.

A most interesting event occurred Thursday night, being the marriage of a very popular couple. Mr. Edwin Oscar White wedded Miss Anna Caroline Austin, daughter of His Excellency the Minister of Foreign Affairs. Rev. W. B. Oleson and Rev. Dr. Beckwith fastened the nuptial tie, in the presence of the immediate relatives and friends of the contracting parties. Presents were many and elegant, and a reception was held from 7:30 to 9 o'clock. The bride's parental residence in Nuuanu Avenue was handsomely decorated for the occasion.

Going for Revivalist Sam Jones.

ALBANY, N. Y., August 30.—Rev. Dr. Lowell, of the Methodist Church, has made an attack upon Sam Jones for his "clownish and ungentlemanly remarks" at the Round Lake Assembly. He also objects to Jones "using the pulpit for the abuse of Christians who do not vote for Prohibition." He advises the association to ask Jones to get out. Jones' remark that "if God meant women to go bare-armed and shouldered he would have given them feathers," has staggered many of his supporters.

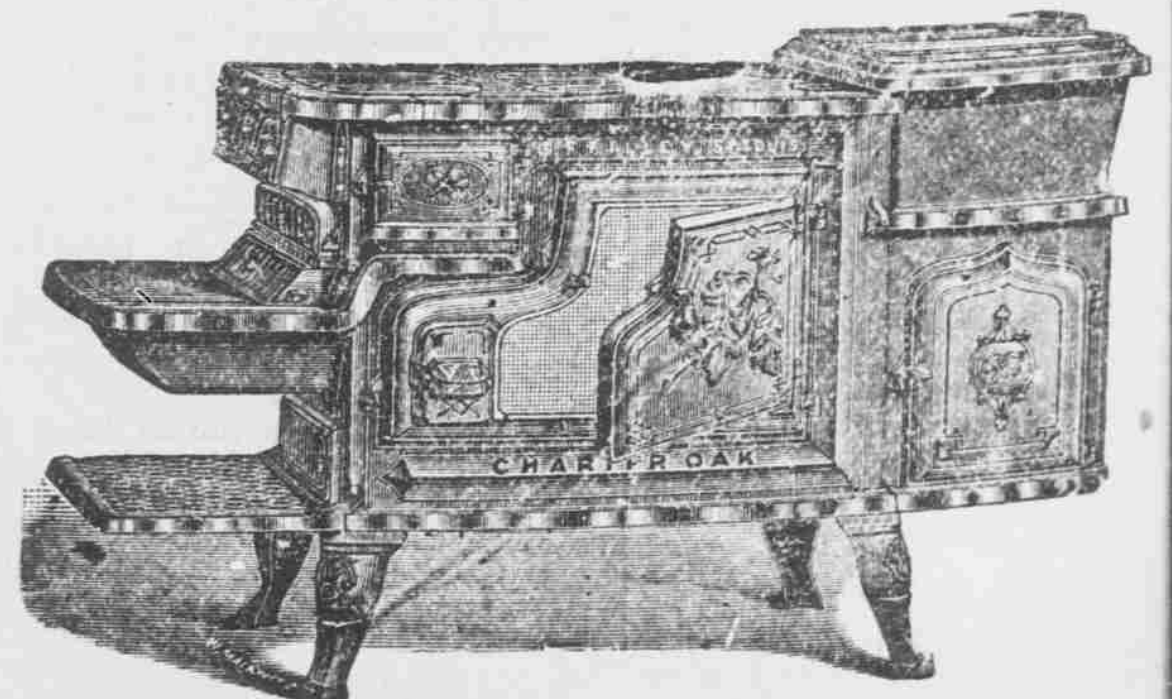
