## THE LEPELERS' COMPLAINTS.

The party visiting the Leper Settlement last Saturday found everything in good order. When the Board of Health met in the afternoon to listen to the complaints of the inmates of the settlement it was clear that the main complaint relates to the water supply, the taro, and the freight charges.

There have recently been many disputes over the water, the people claiming that the water is diverted from their homes for the benefit of the Board of Health taro patches. Superintendent Reynolds on the other hand says that it is only during the night that the water is diverged from the houses and that there is no hardship for the lepers on that account. As there is plenty of water at Waikolu an endeavor will shortly be made to bring an ample supply of water to the settlement.

The poi question is very annoying. Ambrose Hutchison, whose taro was pulled by the Board of Health before it was ripe wants what he considers his due. The Board of Health answers that he can have the money whenever he wishes but Hutchison is not willing to accept the figures arbitrarily fixed by the Board of Health and far below what he would have realized if his taro had been allowed to grow to maturity. The taro in the patches of the Board of Health is growing very rank and the experiment seems to be a waste of money.

The lepers wish that the Board of Health would buy its own steamer so that no freight would be charged to the lepers. Wm. Notley ordered 2000 feet of lumber from Honolulu for the purpose of repairing his house. Dr. Pratt refused to give a freight pass and Notley was obliged to pay \$35 freight for his lumber. That is wrong and it is one of the foolish actions of the Board which causes ill-feeling and dissatisfaction. It is true that Notley didn't buy his lumber from the Wilders but that fact ought not cut any ice with Dr. Pratt.

## TOPICS OF THE DAY.

We think the Rapid Transit people should change its present rule and order the cars to stop on the "near" corner and not cross the street and stop at the opposite corner. By stopping at the near corner ample opportunity is given to drivers of the intersecting roads to see the trolley car and decide whether it is safe to drive on or

safer to wait until the trolley car has passed.

The Maui police is not setting a good example to the virtuous citizens of that Island. A week or so ago a number of prominent residents were arrested and charged with gambling because they were shaken dices for drinks. A week ago from last Thursday the Deputy Sheriff of Wailuku had a horse belonging to him raffled for. The Deputy Sheriff had personally gone around with a list selling chances. The raffle took place in the house of a policeman, and another policeman was the fortunate winner. When the gambling was over an adjournment was taken to a Chinese house where the affair was duly celebrated. Is there any Grand Jury on Maui?

The Advertiser ought to add to the rates for advertising and subscription, posted in its office, its rates for suppression of news. We notice that when a Rapid Transit car overturned a private carriage with several people in on Punahou street a few days ago no mention was made of the accident while a column and a half is devoted to describing the collision between Pain's car and the trolley car which occurred yesterday. In the space mentioned the usual "roasting" of Pain is not omitted although no one knows yet who is blameable for the occurrence. A sensational "smash" occurs on the Stock Exchange and the affair is the topic of the day but not by a line does Mr. Thurston's organ indicate that it has heard the news. Better publish the suppression rates, neighbor!

## Kauai Notes

The Fifth Circuit Court is still in session at Lihue Kauai. There were 36 cases on the calendar of which the following cases have been disposed of:

A nolle proes was entered in the case of the Territory vs. Thomas Ledward, burglary, and the defendant was indicted for malicious injury and the case continued to the March term 1902. A. G. Correa for defendant.

The case of the Territory vs. Wai-aleale, embezzlement, was dropped, defendant having died.

Ah Chong charged with larceny did not appear and his bond was declared forfeited.

In a gambling case where Ng Har alias Ah Ha was the defendant, the bond was forfeited and the sureties called.

A nolle proes was entered in the case of Wikoli Kulanaiahakoi charged with assault with intent to commit rape.

A true bill was found in the case of Lee See Foo, Cam Sing and Lee Quong, charged with assault to kill. S. K. Kaeo, Kinney, Ballou & McClaughan, and A. G. Correa for defendants.

No bill was found against Lee See Foo, Lee Tack and Cam Sing committed for burglary or against Makiuli (w), also committed for burglary.

Nakashima charged with assault and battery had his case stricken from the calendar and will have a hearing at chambers.

The damage suit of Lam Yip vs. J. H. Coney was continued to March 1902.

The replevin suit of Kahaleanu vs. Kana (w) resulted in judgment for plaintiff, jury being waived. The replevin was for 1 cow and 3 hiffers. S. K. Kaeo for plaintiff.

In the divorce court the case of Malsika vs. Kaiunakaalele was discontinued; the case of Frank Louis vs. Maria Gloria Costica was continued to the March term; Louisa vs. Joseph I. was dropped the plaintiff having died; the divorce case of S. Sasaki vs. Annie Sasaki was granted and a divorce was refused in the case of Augusta Teixeira vs. Josia Teixeira.

The people of Kauai were very disappointed at the non-appearance of the Band. The Lihue people had made great preparations for the reception of Berger's musicians and had been ready for them, halls illuminated with electric lights, special

laid in for the occasion, refreshments on ice, and about \$30 on hand to be used in entertaining the visitors. The idea to send the band to Kauai in November, when it is a rule rains, cats, and dogs, is considered at par with most of Governor Dole's official imbecilities. It is suggested here that Dole should secure one of Lovejoy's advertising umbrellas for each band boy before sending them to Kauai in November. The people here feel very hostile over the matter and Dole is not spoken of in very flattering language.

The Mariposa will sail for San Francisco on Wednesday Sept. 11.

A new four-bladed propeller for the Fearless arrived by the Mariposa.

A Porto Rican laborer was drowned on the 1st inst. in a reservoir at Paia.

Mr. Carl Waldeyer and Miss Hous both of Wailuku will be married on the 17th inst.

A Japanese was thrown out of his brake on the Paia road on the 5th inst. and killed.

S. L. Rumsey of Benson Smith & Co. has returned after an extensive visit to the East.

Lieutenant G. R. Hancock stationed at Camp McKinley has been promoted to be first lieutenant.

General Ludlow U. S. V. who was well known in Honolulu, died at Morristown N. J. from a consumption.

It is very likely that an appeal will be taken from the Supreme Court decision in the Income tax case.

The engagement is announced of Miss Mary Louis May of Honolulu and Mr. John L. Hjorth of Hanalei, Kauai.

A petition is being signed by Maui Episcopalians praying that their church in the Territory be placed under American control.

Several claims were submitted to the commission this morning. Among the claimants was Geo. C. Boardman who estimates his loss at \$23,000.

Judge Gear on Saturday sentenced W. H. Thone to pay a fine of \$350. Thone was found guilty on a charge of assault with a deadly weapon on his father-in-law. The fine was paid.

Charles Bellina has bought the controlling interest in the Club Stables and will assume the management at once. The many friends of popular Charley wish him all possible success in the future.

The Native Sons of California will give an entertainment and dance at Progress Hall this evening and great preparations have been made for a proper celebration of the 51st anniversary of the admission of California as a state.

John Kalimapehu, Moapono, Charley Kalimapehu and Kalei Kalimapehu were arrested yesterday for having committed a serious assault on Tum Fat at Manoa valley. The Chinaman is at the Queen's Hospital.

The Customs team beat the police at baseball on Saturday. The score was 14 to 6. It was a very hot game especially the batting. Lieutenant Leslie had a thumb broken but played the game to the finish in spite of the pain.

Tracy McDonald, a well known old horseman died yesterday at the Queen's Hospital from injuries received by being thrown out of a buggy on Saturday last. He was about 60 years of age and was buried this afternoon at the Pearl City Cemetery.

The family of the late T. H. Davis has presented a beautiful stained glass window to St. Andrew's Cathedral. The inscription reads: "To the dear memory of Theophilus H. Davis, a true servant of God and a faithful friend of the Hawaiians."

The experiment of sprinkling the streets with oil is to be made tomorrow under the supervision of Marston Campbell, assistant superintendent of public works. The test is to be made on Richards street, from King to Hotel, and over 700 gallons of crude petroleum will be used.

**Will Shamrock Win?**

The all-absorbing topic in the United States at present is whether Sir Thomas Lipton's Shamrock II. will lift the cup this time. Fortunately for Sir Thomas, Commodore Clarence W. Macfarlane of the famous La Paloma has arrived at Gilmanton, N. H., and is devoting all the time he can spare from his concert tour, to giving advices to Lipton as how to sail a yacht, and editing a valuable book entitled, "How Me and La Paloma sailed to Lahaina."

The outlook is very favorable to Sir Thomas' yacht according to press notes of which we publish a few sent to us by Commodore Macfarlane:

QUARANTINE, N. Y., Aug. 22, 1901. Sir Thomas Lipton, Designer Watson and party went on board the Shamrock II. this morning, and, after consultation with Capt. Sycamore, it was decided to start at 2:30 this afternoon for a sail down the bay.

Talking this morning with Sir Thomas, he spoke with great confidence over the result, saying:

"I really feel and believe the Shamrock II. will lift up the cup this time. Watson is, without question, the best man in Britain, and I feel that he has planned the best boat on either side."

After looking over the Shamrock a conference was had between Watson, Sycamore and Hillyard. There is no doubt what Sycamore thinks of the two American boats, but the Shamrock people feel that they have the best sail and that there is the advantage to their craft.

There is a good breeze blowing from the southeast, so that today's test should tell something of the Shamrock's going. The sail today will be about three hours, after which the challenger will return to Stapleton.

NEW YORK, August 22, 1901. Sir Thomas Lipton left the city this morning at 10:30 and went to Stapleton to board his steam yacht, the Erin. He said he would not return to New York until the races for the America's cup were all over. With him were the Hon. Charles Russell, the representative of the Royal Ulster Yacht Club; J. B. Hillyard of the Clyde Yacht Club, and David Barris.

On Saturday Sir Thomas and party will go and see the Constitution-Columbia race off Oyster Bay.

The tug carrying Sir Thomas Lipton went down the bay to Stapleton, where Sir Thomas, after a visit to the Erin and the Shamrock, went on board the Associated Press tug Unique, and told the newspaper men that the cup challenger would go out about 2:30 this afternoon.

Designer Watson was the first of the party to step on the challenger's deck. Sir Thomas was the last man aboard. Capt. Sycamore shook hands with each as they came over the gangway. About a dozen of the crew were at work on deck, and caps came off in a jiffy as the men saluted the yacht's owner. After a brief conference on deck with Capt. Sycamore, Sir Thomas went below and inspected the yacht.

"I am very much pleased with her," said he when he went aboard the Associated Press boat, "and I feel sure she will give a good account of herself. We will have a good sail this afternoon anyway, and you can see how she looks."

NEW YORK, Aug. 22, 1901. According to the Journal and Advertiser, Sir Thomas Lipton was informed last night that C. Oliver Iselin would accept the bet of \$25,000 offered by C. Arthur Pearson of London on the Shamrock.

Mr. Iselin will, yachtsmen say, take the Constitution, and at even money.
