A BIG HAUL OF OPIUM IS A PORTUGUESE DAY WILCOX IS A BOLTER

FOUND IN GOODS OF A LOCAL COMMISSION FIRM.

One Man Arrested But Gets Bail—A Defense—Bold Wholesale Importation—Tins in Dozens of Boxes.

The biggest opium seizure since the capture of the schooner Henrietta was made by Custom house officials this morning. The stuff came in 184 cracker cases consigned to the Washington Feed Co., a new firm doing business below Luce's auction rooms, Fort street.

By the Mt. Lebanon Sunday morning arrived the consignment of crackers from the Portland Cracker Co., and one hundred cases of salmon from another firm. This morning S. Lowden, one of the partners in the feed firm, called at the custom house and swore to an entry for the goods. After the opium was discovered he was arrested on the charge of "importing opium," but released later upon filing bonds in the sum of \$1,000.

After Lowden had signed his entry, instructions were given by Port Surveyor Stratemyer to Inspector Schmeden and the four guards under him to carefully search the boxes. Rumors had reached the customs officials of a shipment of opium in a lot of soap imported by the same firm, which occasioned the order for a special search.

The first box opened contained four tins of crackers. One of these had in the bottom a second box containing fifteen half-pound tins of opium. When this discovery was made the whole shipment of freight was confiscated and removed to the custom house. Lowden's arrest followed.

In a warehouse at the customs department less than four dozen of the cases were opened and 480 tins of opium were found. Over a hundred of the cases remain untouched.

The Washington Feed Co. is a firm of commission merchants. A part of the cracker shipment was for J. T. Waterhouse, W. M. McChesney & Son, Wing Wo Chan & Co., Ah Leong, Lee Toma and others. The names of these parties appeared under that of the Washington Feed Co., designating to whom the crackers were finally to be delivered.

A visit to all of the firms gives the total of their orders as 166 boxes of crackers. This leaves eighteen boxes consigned to the Washington Feed Co., and marked as above, unaccounted for. These all presumably contain opium. Allowing for those unopened sixty tins to the case, which is as they seem to run, it would show a total of 1,080 tins. Undoubtedly there is just exactly 1,000 tins, or 500 pounds, in the shipment.

The process of packing the opium is exceedingly clever and only a most thorough search could possibly reveal it. In each large case are four ordinary 25-pound cracker tins. A second tin box about three inches wide and made to fit the bottom contains the opium, fifteen tins each. Over these the crackers are carefully arranged and the cover of the outer container is pasted down and labeled. All this work was manifestly done at the factory.

The part of the Washington Feed Co. in the transaction is best known to the members of that firm. Mr. A. L. Morris, with Mr. Lowden in the business, denies stoutly any knowledge of the opium and asserts that they have been imposed upon by outside parties.

The Feed Co. claims, through Messrs. Lowden and Morris, that some one made the shipment under the firm's name and took chances of rescuing the stuff after getting it through the custom house.

Someone has lost a pile of money, perhaps as much as \$5,000, on this opium, and the first watch of customs guards have captured the finest Christmas present they care for this year.

MEMBERS OF THE COLONY CELEBRATING IN FINE STYLE.

National Salute Heard Early—Hoisting the Flags—Two Bands—At the Church and Consulate.

The Portuguese are celebrating their independence anniversary in grand style today. All over the city and for miles around they have declared a holiday, and have congregated in large numbers in Punchbowl town.

At daylight this morning the neighborhood was awakened by the national salute of twenty-one guns. At the same time the Portuguese flag was raised over the consulate and over the hall of the Lusitana Society. Large crowds witnessed both operations.

At 9 o'clock 600 men joined the procession at Lusitana hall and marched to the Catholic Cathedral. The line was headed by the Government band, Professor Berger leader. The committee on the celebration carried a large Portuguese flag and marched in the middle of the procession. After services at the Cathedral the march was continued down Fort to King, out to Alapai and up to the Lusitana hall.

At 11 o'clock Senor Canavaro, Portuguese Charge d' Affaires, held a reception at the Consulate. The Concordia band played. Members of the Government, the diplomatic corps and a large number of residents of all nationalities called.

At 2 this afternoon literary exercises began in Lusitana hall. There are several speakers. They dwell altogether upon the historical significance of the day. From 7 to 10 this evening a reception will be given by the society to Consul Canavaro and friends.

THE PLAY TONIGHT.

The Frawley Company appears in "His Wife's Father" tonight. The play pictures the half-comical, half-tragic trials and tribulations which grow out of the fact that Mr. Buchanan Billings is so anxious for the welfare of his young daughter that he cannot bear to leave her unsupported by his presence, even after her marriage, on her wedding trip or elsewhere. As a result, in his mistaken loving kindness, he makes himself a dreadful nuisance, and causes all manner of trouble. Finally, being a widower, he falls in with a fascinating widow and marries her, and that settles the trouble at once and forever.

WAS THE HACKFELD.

Yesterday forenoon a bark was sighted twenty miles to west. She remained in view several hours and then disappeared beyond Barber's Point. By some she was thought to be a passing vessel, but was most likely the H. Hackfeld, which sailed Sunday, becalmed.

COMMITTEE AT WORK.

The reorganization committee of the annexation club held its first meeting yesterday. The time was taken up in the discussion of a new constitution and by-laws for the club. After some preliminary work has been done the committee will announce a date for a general mass meeting of all annexationists to be held in Honolulu.

LECTURE NEXT MONDAY.

Dr. Emily B. Ryder is to lecture to the ladies of Honolulu in the Y. M. C. A. hall, beginning on Monday afternoon next. Her topic being "How Not to Be Ill." This lady comes here with excellent letters of introduction and the highest medical testimony and diplomas. Dr. Ryder spent five years working among the women of India, becoming conversant with the child marriage system practiced in that land. She has published a pamphlet entitled "The Little Wives of India," which has attracted much attention in Australia, where the Doctor has been recently lecturing.

HENRY IRVING'S POPULARITY.

People bought tickets for Irving's first performance of "Cymbeline" months before the night on which it took place, and the audience—that part of it with no reserved seats—began to gather in the theater at 7 o'clock in the morning, with luncheons and reading matter. An hour before the curtain went up a procession of ushers distributed cups of what they said was "tea with Mr. Bram Stoecker's compliments" among the tired feminine anticipators of great joy.

the opposition were corrupt. The statements set forth by those whom I had always relied upon as my friends to the effect that if elected I would be sent to jail by the Government and thereby injure the cause of the society, caused my defeat and I have deemed it proper to awake and look around and see who my friends really are. One of these especially for whom I have risked my life has caused my defeat now.

"The new society, 'Ka Ahahui Pookela,' has many friends already. It will soon take the place of the older patriotic organization. Our plans are to visit the country districts throughout all the islands and to acquaint the Hawaiians with the object of the society. Then we will call a mass meeting in Honolulu. This will probably take place at the end of the coming fortnight. I will see the Government officials and explain to them the objects and purposes of the new order. There is nothing to which the Republic will take exception, I am sure. Annexation receives no consideration in Ka Ahahui Pookela."

Many of the Ahahui Aloha Aina are still in the city. Some of the leaders express surprise over the inception of Wilcox's new party. They belittle it and insist that it can never flourish.

"Time does change things, doesn't it?" remarked one well known native today, who says he is posted on the existing rumpus. "There a few years ago Wilcox was leading a revolt against Kalakaua at the risk of his life. Today Liliuokalani leads a fight against him."

China May Arrive from the Orient Thursday—Long Voyage Ahead for the Rosalie—Notes of the Front.

The Andrew Welch is taking Ewa sugar at the railway wharf.

The Ke Au Hou sailed at noon with a big cargo for Maui and Hawaii ports.

The Portland steamer Mt. Lebanon sailed early this morning for Yokohama.

The Albert pulled back to Sorenson's wharf Monday afternoon and will take another wait for sugar.

Two hundred barrels of lime for the Makee Sugar Co. will be sent up by the James Makee next trip.

The flag ship Kilauea Hou will sail at 4 this afternoon for her usual ports on Hawaii. She is at Brewer's wharf.

The Sakura Maru is discharging her big cargo of Japanese freight at the Oceanic wharf. She will sail at noon tomorrow for Seattle.

The Likelike sails at 5 p. m. on the Claudine's route to Maui; the Iwalani will get away at the same time on the Mikahala's Kauai route.

The Mokoliu sailed about dark last night for Molokai. She was so full of freight that there was hardly standing room for her passengers.

The James Makee arrived this morning from Kauai with 2635 bags P, Nos. 1 and 2, for Hackfeld & Co. She will sail again tomorrow afternoon.

The P. M. S. S. China will fall due at this port from Yokohama on Friday. Being the record-smasher of the Pacific she may be expected Thursday morning.

The new Inter Island steamer should have made her trial trip on the 20th. It is calculated that she left on the 26th, which would make her arrive here Saturday or Sunday of this week.

The Waialeale tried her new shift yesterday afternoon and found it to be in good working shape. She will sail at 3 this afternoon with lumber for Makaweli and Waimea, and about thirty tons of coal for Elele.

The Hawaiian bark Rosalie, Capt. Nissen, will sail tomorrow for Esquimault. She will load lumber there for Geraldton, Australia. This little town with the big name is on the west coast of the southern continent, and the long voyage there will take the Rosalie into the Indian ocean.

The schooner Anna, Macdonald master, sailed from Mahukona for San Francisco on the 24th inst. with a cargo of 2803 bags sugar, Castle & Cooke, 1793 bags Halawa Plantation, 579,096 pounds and valued at \$16,370; 31 bags coffee and 114 barrels molasses. A THIRD C. & A. LINER

ANOTHER BIG STEAMER TO BE ADDED FOR THE SERVICE.

Capt. Metcalfe Speaks of the Growth of Commerce on the Pacific—Business of the Past Year.

Another boat will be added to the Canadian Pacific steamship line. It will travel over the same course as does the Warrimoo and Miowera and will come into the Honolulu harbor early next year.

So says Capt. J. Metcalfe of San Francisco this morning. Capt. Metcalfe is in Honolulu making an examination into the condition of the Gainsborough, which was wrecked off of Diamond Head, and which was insured in the Lloyds, of which company the captain is the Pacific Coast agent.

"Before I left San Francisco I was informed of this fact," said Capt. Metcalfe. "The new boat is the Aorangi. She is a fine ship and is larger than either the Warrimoo or Miowera. The Aorangi was built for New Zealand trade, but Messrs. Huddart & Parker, the agents of the Canadian Pacific line, have purchased her. She will sail from Vancouver in the latter part of March or early April and will touch Honolulu both on her down and up trip. She will traverse the same course as the other Canadian ships between British Columbia and the Colonies."

The trade of the Pacific ocean is increasing very steadily and rapidly," continued the captain. "All of the liners operating between British Columbia and the Colonies, America and the Colonies and to Japan and China, have done a most remarkable business within the past few months. The Pacific is destined to become a second Atlantic before many years have gone by."

It was Capt. Metcalfe who got the Miowera off of the reef a couple of years ago.

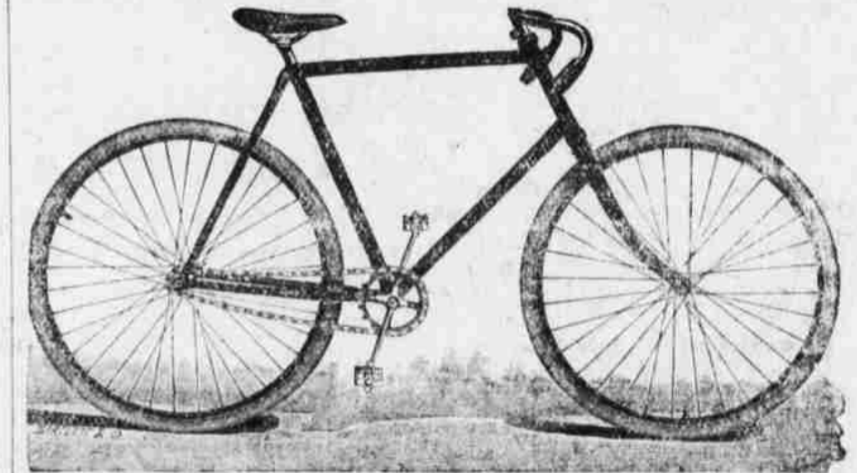

Even the Hui Aloha Aina has its troubles.

Mr. Rowell, the energetic Superintendent of Public Works, is now moving beautifully with his operations on Nuuanu stream.

The calamity howlers and the timid can do much better work for Hawaii by assisting in devising a route out of difficulties than by shrieking that individuals or interests are to blame for certain conditions.

The Star fails to see where it becomes necessary to apologize for the part American missionaries have taken in the affairs of Turkey. These brave and devoted men and women have certainly at all times been on the side of right.

Boston's city councilmen have concluded that "The Star Spangled Banner" is not "sacred" music. Its rendition at the theater of a Sunday evening has been forbidden. This is a funny freak. Perhaps the real Boston ruling is that the music is too sacred for a Sunday theater feature.

There has been sent to The Star warm approval of the idea for a new immigration qualification. No treaty can say that Hawaii shall not designate the character and circumstances of foreigners coming to her shores. This is an English speaking country and those coming here to remain can very properly be required to possess familiarity with that language.

The Washington correspondent of the Philadelphia Ledger revives the rumor that ex-Minister John W. Foster may become Li Hung Chang's chief adviser. "The old Tsung Li Yamen," he says, "the council which, it is said, would adjourn if a bird happened to fly in a particularly unlucky direction over their ancestors' graves, is to be dissolved and a foreign department organized as far as possible on the plan of our own state department is to be substituted in its place."

ONE ON A "YANK."

At a gathering in New Haven Dr. Watson (Ian Maclaren) told a story about his trip to the Holy Land, to which he had been looking forward for a number of years with pleasurable anticipation. As he was nearing the center of historic Palestine he met an American who was making all haste to get away. After a few greeting such as two English speaking men meeting in a foreign country might exchange, the American asked Dr. Watson where he was going. "To Jerusalem," was the reply. "Jerusalem!" exclaimed the American in tones of unfeigned disgust: "you don't want to go there. I've just come away. It's a slow town. Why, there isn't a daily newspaper in the whole place!"

NAVY COST.

Paymaster General Stewart's annual report to Secretary Herbert states that the cost of the United States Navy to the Government last year was \$15,494,862. This figure does not include any increase in the navy or the permanent improvements to yards and docks. For arms and equipment for the naval militia the money and material expended amounted to \$27,186. The report commends the present system of concentrating naval stores in one general stock, and shows that the expense from this department has been constantly decreasing from \$11,000,000 to \$7,000,000. Barges for the prompt delivery of naval stores are recommended. Special stores for the reserve fleet, which will be established, are contemplated.

HAWAII A STATE.

The late King Kalakaua I, negotiated both the treaty and the labor convention between this country and Japan. It is stipulated in the treaty that revision may be undertaken upon notice of six months. A preliminary year must elapse before the labor arrangement can be reopened for discussion. Japan could not listen to any proposal looking to relinquishment of "most favored nation" rights, but the

Idea that she would resent suggestion of amendment as to details is absurd. Hawaii is able to present the very strongest reasons and the most convincing argument on behalf of certain desired alterations in the present agreements. Hawaii is an independent Government, the peer of other states of the family of nations and withal having somewhat of a record in the business of diplomatic dealing. That she should be backward in presenting or opening any question is a confession of weakness that is not warranted. This country should not needlessly anger Japan, but should that country lose temper in the course of any negotiations, there is one Government at least that would stand by to see fair play. There are other Governments known all about that would be more than ready to advantage themselves of any situation in which Japan might have serious attention diverted to the west.

There should exist and be manifest the courage to seek a new treaty should such a step be deemed advisable from the Hawaiian standpoint! There must be no fast and loose galloping, but there should be firmness and confidence in these premises.

ENGLAND'S ROADS.

When General Stone delivered an address recently, on good roads and their relation to progress and civilization before the Educators' Convention held at Buffalo, N. Y., the New York Tribune called attention to it as a circumstance significant that road science should engage the attention and interest of such a body of representative people, where a few years ago the suggestion that any concourse desired to be instructed upon the subject would have been considered an absurdity.

This same address by Gen. Stone, it seems, has attracted attention in England and the Tribune's London correspondent recently used the fact to point a moral in reference to the necessity for constant watchfulness over roads when once constructed, so as to keep them in perfect order. Yet England has perhaps the best roads in the world, possibly even outdoing France. Her roads excite the admiration of all travelers, and their perfection is due to the diligence given to repairs. A defect or an injury to roadways is not neglected an hour. Trained repairers, having material ready at hand all the time, are constantly on the watch for defects and injury to immediately repair them. Thus economy is conserved and rebuilding is very rare.

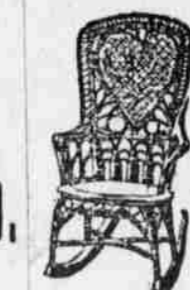

WITH THE FIRST REGIMENT

PROTEST OF B AGAINST THE MAR-
LIN SHOOT.

Sent to Headquarters—A Few of the
Points Made—Matches Between A
and H—Lieut. Carlisle Qualifies.

A meeting of Company H was held
last evening at which the following
appointments were announced as
made in the regular manner: M. Par-
menter, W. J. Coon, Peter Travens,
and Henry Gehring, to be sergeants;
Manuel Cordeiro and Charles Butzke
to be corporals.

A challenge from Company A for
another match shoot to take place
next Sunday was accepted. In the
first shoot, last Sunday, H won by a
score of 352 to 346.

Lieut. Carlisle has passed his exam-
ination and will meet with the Com-
pany next Monday evening.

After preliminary work Sergt. Ferry
took charge and directed H for an
hour.

Privates P. Johnson, G. Tiedjen and
J. J. Albert have been appointed cor-
porals in Company A.

The captains of the volunteer com-
panies have been notified that if arms
and equipments in the armory are not
removed at once they will be seized by
the armorer.

Ordinance Sergt. Weatherby received
his discharge Monday afternoon. He
will likely accept a position on a
Kauai plantation.

Company B will not drill tonight.
The meeting has been postponed on
account of the Frawley engagement,
to tomorrow evening.

The protest of Company B against
Saturday's shoot was forwarded this
morning to Maj. McLeod. D and G
teams did not sign for the reason that
it was not deemed necessary. Follow-
ing is the contention of the B team:
Honolulu, Nov. 30, 1896.

From Company B Headquarters,
To Col. R. H. McLean and Officers of
the N. G. H.

Dear Sirs:—We, the members of
Company B, wish to bring forward a
protest against rulings and decisions
on Saturday's match, November 28,
1896, viz:

1. That the shoot was ordered for
1:30 and members of said company
were on the grounds from 1:30 to 3:30
before they were permitted to shoot.

2. That the officer in charge of the
range showed favoritism to the regu-
lars by allowing them to shoot pre-
viously to and separately from the
volunteers, whereas we protest that
they should shoot a man from each
company side by side as near in order
as circumstances would allow, which
was not done.

3. That an officer interested in a
company shooting was detailed to have
charge of the range.

4. That, as the terms of the con-
test for this trophy presented by the
Marlin Rifle Arms Co., were negotiated
by a volunteer officer, we respectfully
submit that the volunteer teams
should be represented behind the
butts, which was also not allowed.

5. That preliminary rules governing
the shoot should be read before the
shooting commenced, which was not
done.

6. That Private Ewing wishes to
enter a protest against the ruling on
his individual score and asks that it
be investigated. The particulars need
not be presented here as they are
known to the officers in charge of the
teams.

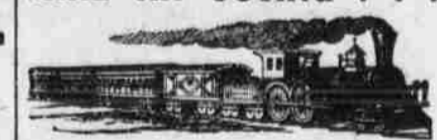
