EDITORIAL

WHEEL OF DIPLOMACY

Wireless dispatches from Tokyo covering General Tatakawa's activities in Moscow, the USSR capital, report that the Japanese envoy is making good progress in his negotiations with the USSR on the Soviet-Japanese Trade Treaty. From Washington, D. C. is reported the recent return of Dr. Lauchlin Currie, President Franklin Roosevelt's special messenger to Chungking, where the former is supposed to have inspected Chiang's regime with the idea of finding out the method and extent of aid United States should furnish China; Chungking's ability to repay any loan that the United States government may decide to make both in cash and arms; China's resources that can be developed under U. S. planning and aid.

Another wireless dispatch from Tokyo reports that according to authoritative reports coming from Shanghai, the American government is already supposed to have committed itself to lend China some \$100,000,000 in cash; a huge number of fighting planes and bombers, as well as gigantic field guns; and finally send some eighty technicians to develop China's natural resources and aid her in the construction of railways, highways and large industrial plants. In return for all this, China is supposed to have agreed to mortgage her resources to America and to lease airbases to the United States in case of a Japanese-American war. Another report reaching Tokyo and radioed throughout the world tells us that Dr. Lauchlin Currie, after painstaking investigations has found that China was beyond U. S. assistance and there was no hope of the former coming out ahead as the result of U. S. aid.

From an ordinary layman's standpoint and taking as disinterested a view as it is possible for one to do, any one endeavoring to search for the exact truth of all these conflicting flashes that come from all parts of the world would find himself perplexed, not knowing just where to place his finger and say: This is the situation right now. In short, international diplomacy has even taken to the air, especially of late, full of censored and propaganda dispatches, actually thrust-

BRITISH PRESS IN SINGAPORE REMAIN SILENT

EVIDENTLY WAITING STAND OF HOME GOVERNMENT ON PARLEY

SINGAPORE, Mar. 14—Newspapers here did not comment on the prominently publicized Tokyo reports on the success and conclusion of the Japanese-sponsored mediation conference on the Franco-Thailand border dispute.

The lack of comment on the part of newspapers was believed due to the fact that British authorities here desire to learn the home government's attitude on the conclusion of the Tokyo Mediation Conference prior to publishing their own views.

Meanwhile, Thailand's consulate-general here displayed its national flag in celebration of the successful conclusion of the Tokyo conference and Consul-General Luang Netinatti, in a press conference, declared: "We subjects of Thailand deeply appreciate what Japan has done not only for Thailand but for peace in the Far East."

VINSON URGES NEW LAW TO STOP STRIKES

CALLS ATTENTION TO BIG LOSS OF MAN-HOURS IN INDUSTRY

WASHINGTON, Mar. 13—Representative Carl Vinson, Georgia democrat, to the House Judiciary Committee said that the strike in defense industries would cost enough man-hours of labor to manufacture 325 modern bombers and asked quick congressional approval of legislation to eliminate work stoppage.

He said that recent investigation covering strikes at 127 plants engaged in naval defense contracts showed "during 1940 up to the middle of February, 1941, strikes in defense industries alone revealed the loss of 7,817,360 man-hours of labor," and added he estimated about 24,000 man-hours of labor were required to construct a modern bomber; therefore, the above mentioned loss in man-hours labor was enough to build 325 bombers.

1st Kona 'Kankodan' To Leave on April 1

The first "kankodan" ever to be organized in the Kona district is scheduled to leave Honolulu on the 1st of April on the Tatsuta Maru and return on the 8th of July on the Asama Maru.

JAPAN SAILOR DESIRES LAND TO FREIGHTER

NIPPON FIREMAN TIRED OF DODGING MORE NAZI BOMBS

BUENOS AIRES, Mar. 13—Tired of being aboard a target for Nazi bombers, Motoichi Ikeda, 39-year-old Japanese fireman, aboard a British-chartered Greek freighter Aegeon, 5,285 tons, sought to leave ship for the purpose of returning to Japan.

Ikeda arrived aboard the Aegeon, which was carrying coal from Cardiff after a perilous voyage which was begun on January 25th last. The Japanese fireman boarded the Aegeon at Kobe on June 6th, 1940 and has been unable to leave the ship since then because the freighter only called at British ports. The war caught Ikeda aboard the Aegeon at Rouen, France.

Chartered by the British, the Aegeon made frequent trans-channel and trans-Atlantic trips. Part of a Canada-bound convoy of 35 vessels, the Aegeon was subjected to German aerial attack at 10 a. m. on July 4th, last year, 70 miles off Portland, England.

RED SINOS ARE CLASHING WITH CHIANG TROOPS

SOUTH YELLOW RIVER AREA SCENE OF BITTER FIGHTING

HONGKONG, Mar. 14—Armed clashes between communist forces and troops under the control of Chiang Kai-shek were taking place in the region south of the Yellow River, bordering the Hopei, Shantung, and Honan provinces, reports arriving here from Chungking revealed.

It was understood clashes occurred when communist forces attempted to move westward from the western areas of Shantung Province to areas in northern Honan.

SALVAGING JOB TO BE RESUMED BY ENGINEERS

TOKYO, Mar. 14—Led by engineer Yonenori Azuma, 80 divers and other workers left Kagoshima in Kyushu yesterday for the scene of the sinking of the 14,187-ton Philippine liner "President Quezon," former American Mail Lines "President Madison," to resume salvaging operations.

The Quezon sank off Nagarabe village near Kagoshima on January 27th, last year with the loss of one life, 110 passengers and the crew being rescued by Japanese vessels.

JAPAN TROOPS MOP UP CHIANG ARMY FORCES

LARGE QUANTITY OF BOOTY CAPTURED BY JAPAN TROOPS

SOMEWHERE IN SHENSHI PROVINCE, Mar. 14—Japanese troops which on March 5th started mopping up operations against the 25,000 enemy regulars of the 27th Army in the areas around Ling-chwanhsien successfully concluded operations today, army authorities here announced.

The enemy left 1250 dead, officials said, while 87 were taken prisoners and booty seized by Japanese included 3 trench mortars, 4 heavy machine guns, 5 light machine guns, 258 rifles, 22100 rounds of ammunition, 300 hand grenades, and 6658 boxes of dynamite and other military equipment.

Latest reports from abroad in connection with the unidentified Spanish man said that his parents, Jose Corpas Calvo and Rafaela Ramirez Gordo who migrated to Hawaii about March, 1907, were located in Spain and the man, Victoriano Corpas (not Cortez or Cortas) Ramirez, was born in Amaulu camp 4, Hilo, sometime in 1918, according to his parents' reports.

Andrew Cortez after an interview with the officials in the mainland clearly indicated that he is not related to the alleged Hilo man, it was disclosed.

Although the Spanish government would not accede to the request for a stay of death yesterday, Col. Walter Dunham, secretary to the Governor requested the local Catholic mission for a hurried check of all registrations in 1918, reports said.

AMERICAN SOURCE FROM KOBE REPORTS MATSUOKA WILLING IF INVITATION IS TENDERED

Hull Declines Comment Pending Receipt of Further Details Saying His Statement For Present Will Be Purposeless

WASHINGTON, Mar. 13—Secretary of State, Cordell Hull declined to comment before a press conference on the report that Japan's Foreign Minister, Yosuke Matsuoka, would be willing to visit London and Washington, if invited, after the conclusion of his European mission.

Hull indicated that he had no information about the matter.

The question was raised in connection with an American press report from Kobe quoting Matsuoka as saying that he would be willing to extend his trip to both the English and American capitals if invited.

Cordell Hull, when pressed to say what attitude the United States government would be likely to adopt regarding the offer, said that he thought no useful purpose would be served by his commenting until he knew all the facts.

 good night."



Where U. S. Outposts in Pacific Are Located







SENATOR CARVALHO HAS TWO MEASURES AFFECTING THE COUNTY OF HAWAII

Senator V. A. Carvalho of Hawaii recently introduced in the Senate two measures which should be of interest to local government employees.

Senate Bill No. 172, if enacted into law, will require all government employees, both territorial and county, to take the oath of allegiance to the United States of America. The measure reads:

SENATE BILL NO. 172

"Section 1. Every person prior to appointment or reappointment to a regular full-time position, excluding employment on a daily basis, in the service of the Territory of Hawaii or of any governmental subdivision thereof, shall be required to take and execute an oath of employment. Said oath shall be as follows:

"(a) In the case of a citizen of the United States of America:

"I hereby declare an oath that I will support and defend the Constitution and Laws of the United States of America and of the Territory of Hawaii against all enemies, foreign or domestic; that I will bear true faith and allegiance to the same, and that I take this obligation freely and without any mental reservation or purpose of evasion: SO HELP ME GOD."

"(b) In the case of an alien whose appointment otherwise may be made legally:

"I hereby declare on oath that during the period of my employment and residence in the Territory of Hawaii, I will abide by the laws of the United States of America and of the Territory of Hawaii and will engage in no subversive or other activities for the purpose of destroying or harming the American form of government or for the purpose of inciting action on the part of any individual which would be detrimental to public peace, health and safety, and that I take this oath freely without any mental reservation or purpose of evasion: SO HELP ME GOD."

"SECTION 2. The applicable oath set forth in Section 1 hereof shall be administered by the appointment authority or his duly

authorized agent and a copy of such oath signed by the person taking the same shall be retained as a public record in the files of said appointment authority.

"Section 3. Every citizen and alien engaged in a regular full-time on a daily basis, in the service position, excluding employee of the Territory of Hawaii or of any governmental subdivision thereof on the effective date of this Act shall be required to take and execute the oath prescribed respectively in Section 1 (a) and Section 1 (b) hereof. If such oath has not been taken and executed in the manner prescribed by Section 2 hereof within sixty (60) days after this Act takes effect by any such employee, his employment shall be terminated automatically as of the sixtieth (60th) day after this Act takes effect; provided, that refusal on the part of any employee to take and execute such oath shall terminate automatically his employment as of the date of such refusal.

"Section 4. This Act shall take effect upon its approval."

The other measure sponsored by Senator Carvalho would grant a pension of \$350.00 per month to Henry K. Martin, present sheriff of the County of Hawaii, upon his retirement from employment in the government. At the beginning of the session, Senator also introduced the controversial Police Commission bill for the Big Island, which will become effective January 1st, 1942, if passed, the same date the pension bill for the present sheriff is intended to take effect. The latter measure reads:

Blind Craftsmen Aid Miss Ayako Mihara Returns from N. Y.

Reports from Iwilei, Honolulu, indicate that even the Territory's blind craftsmen are doing their share in the national defense program.

Hand manufactured brooms and mops are being made by the blind and until recently ten brooms and mop makers were sufficient to meet the public demand, but now the staff has been increased to 16 men. With the two additional men now being sought reports disclosed that about 20 dozens of mops can be produced in a day by the

Miss Mihara is a graduate of the University of Hawaii and has been connected with the welfare department since its establishment.

In spite of the fact that two years' study is required in order to complete the course at the New York School of Social Work, Miss Mihara finished the course in 18 months' time due to her actual experience in social work.

She is expected to be connected with the same department she was employed few years ago.

U. OF H. HORK DESCRIBED IN NEW PUBLICATION

The services of the University of Hawaii to the territory are vast and range widely in scope, according to a booklet, "The University of Hawaii Pays Dividends to the People of Hawaii," which has just been published.

Most persons know that the University trains young people of the territory to take their place in the business and professional world, points out the booklet, but not everyone is aware of two other major duties of the University—research and service to the community as a whole.

As a result of foundation work by the University's agricultural experiment station and extension service, local production of food Hawaii is on its way to becoming more self-sufficient. Experimentation with food crops, research on feeds for livestock, control of animal and plant diseases, in addition to the dissemination of this information to the growers of the territory have been among the notable services of these agricultural agencies.

In other fields, too, the "Dividends" publication discloses, University services have been invaluable. Professors have made studies of the Molokai homesteading project, of Hawaii's fisheries and other studies for the legislature; researchers are studying marine organisms which foul certain Navy vessels; sociologists have studied racial problems for the United States Congress and the Census Bureau; nutritionists are continually working on diet and health problems of the people of Hawaii; and a laboratory for testing the strength of building materials has been a constant safeguard against faulty construction in the territory.

An idea of the thousands of residents benefiting, directly or indirectly, by instruction and opportunity for educational benefit last year is given in the booklet. In a summarized statement, the following are listed: 2,703 regular students; 1,074 adult education and non-credit students; 1,323 summer session students; 4,711 persons in 326 4-H and other extension clubs; 16,000 who attended 1,200 agricultural extension club meetings; 1,568 problem cases served by the Psychological Clinic; 39,214 farm

NOTES ON PUBLIC HEALTH

Manufacturers of preparations for the treatment or prevention of colds which bear labelings making false or extravagant claims will be subject to prosecution for violation of the Federal Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act, according to instructions received here today by M. B. Bairos, territorial food commissioner, from the Food and Drug Administration in Washington.

"Present-day medical opinion supports the view that there is no known substance or mixture of substances which can be relied upon to prevent or cure colds," the notification stated. "Surveys of products which now appear upon the market show that many of them make claims which are not justified by the scientific facts; others exaggerate the effects which the medication will have upon the symptoms."

"It is the opinion of the administration," it pointed out, "that any reference to colds in the labeling of a drug should clearly indicate just what the effects of the medicine with respect to this disease condition will be and, if necessary, to avoid misunderstanding, just what the limitations of the medication are."

The first death from a communicable disease on Midway island ever officially recorded was reported to the Board of Health during the week ending March 1, according to Dr. James R. Enright, director of the Bureau of Communicable Diseases.

The death which was due to tetanus was chalked up against Honolulu, since Midway, although 1-

visits made by 31 county agents; 19,500 people who attended 309 public lectures; in addition to the thousands hearing weekly radio talks, thousands using bulletins and research papers published by the University, and thousands served in a variety of other ways, by conferences, consultations, and other contacts.




