## Governor Puts New Language School Rule Up To The Department

HONOLULU, Dec. 22—Governor Farrington has sent a letter to Teitaro Masuda, chairman of the meeting in Hilo which recently adopted resolutions urging the governor to postpone from January to September the effectiveness of the new school department regulation of alien language schools. Governor Farrington said: "It is always gratifying to have residents of the territory stand firmly by their declaration to support law and order. It is my understanding that the officers of the school department have sufficient discretionary authority to enable them to cooperate with the parents of school children to bring about a proper adjustment of the new regulations to suit the conditions in different localities."

## Thanks Extended To Maui For Hospitality Shown To Cape Town

Acknowledgement of the courtesies extended on Maui to the personnel from the British Cruiser Cape Town was received by the Chamber of Commerce this morning in a letter from Captain Jones, commander of the vessel. The letter was written on arrival in Honolulu yesterday and follows:

"On behalf of myself, the officers and ship's company of H. M. S. Cape Town, I wish to thank the Chamber of Commerce and, through it, the citizens of Maui, for the kindness and hospitality extended to us during our stay at Kahului. Everyone enjoyed the visit immensely and our only regret is that it was so short; we all hope that we may be privileged to call in again at Kahului at no distant date."

## First Case Teacher Comes To Attention Maui Accident Board

For the first time since the ruling of Attorney General Matthewman that school teachers come under the provisions of the Workman's Compensation Law the subject came to the attention of the Maui Industrial Accident Board yesterday though not in a form that called for official action. Joaquin Vincent, principal of Kealahou school was before the board asking information for the possible presentation of a claim on behalf of his wife, a teacher in his school. He was given a blank form of claim to be filled out and presented to the board if so desired.

Mrs. Vincent's claim, as told of by her husband, is not for injuries resulting from an accident as are most of the claims coming before the board, but for illness. The provisions of the act make it apply to "any disease proximately caused by such employment" and Vincent says that his wife suffered a nervous breakdown as a result of her work in teaching.

When the claim is presented the Maui Board will have to determine whether it has jurisdiction or whether the claim must be sent to the Oahu board, the chief place of business of the employer, the Department of Public Instruction being Honolulu.

If the Maui board shall hold that jurisdiction rests in this county then it will have to determine whether nervous breakdown is a "disease proximately caused by such employment or resulting from the nature of such employment."

## Mrs. King Is Divorced From Former Senator

HONOLULU, Dec. 22—Judge Desha of the domestic relations court yesterday granted Mrs. Emmaline King a divorce from former Senator Charles King, on grounds of desertion and non-support. The wife also was allowed permanent alimony of \$125 a month and possession of the King residence.

### WILL TRADE IN CHINA

(ASSOCIATED PRESS) WASHINGTON, Dec. 21—Herbert Hoover, Secretary of Commerce, today issued articles of incorporation act. This is the first firm qualifying under the recent China trade law which will sell machinery and merchandise in China.

### DIVORCED IN LONDON

(ASSOCIATED PRESS) LONDON, Dec. 21—Lady Ronda was granted divorce today from Humphrey Mac Worth on grounds of misconduct and desertion.

## College Instructors Alleged Home Brewers

RALEIGH, N. C., Dec. 21—Resignations of four instructors in the North Carolina State College of Agriculture and Engineering have been requested as the result of charges that they have been making home brew in their rooms.

## Departments Ask For Nearly A Third More Than Available Fund

HONOLULU, Dec. 22—Demands almost a third more than the estimated revenue of the Territory are contained in the budgets of the various departments of the government of the Territory which have been submitted to Governor Farrington. They ask for \$7,300,000 for the next biennial period and all the treasurer can see to meet such requests after deducting interest and sinking funds from the estimated revenues is \$5,600,000.

The demands are the heaviest ever presented and all departments are asking increases over the appropriations of two years ago.

## Prominent Newspaper Publisher Is Coming

HONOLULU, Dec. 22—E. W. Scripps multi-millionaire newspaper owner who is connected with the Scripps-McRae and Scripps-Howard interests, his son Robert, Roy Howard one of the chief executives of the Scripps interests, and several other guests, will arrive here early in January on the yacht Ohio in the course of a world cruise. The party may visit the other islands.

## Big Deficit Alleged In P. O. Department

CHICAGO, Dec. 22—General Charles G. Dawes, formerly director of the national budget, published today what he called the "submerged" post office balance sheet, showing deficits of \$16,198,000 for the first three months of 1922. He declared that bureaucrats were attempting to throttle the government, and added that government accounting was "a disgraceful and archaic system."

## Patients Amused By Radio At Operation

MINNEAPOLIS, Dec. 22—When a Caesarian operation was performed at a local hospital yesterday, only a local anesthetic was used and the patient had radiophone receivers on her ears, listening to a specially arranged concert to distract her attention. The operation is said to be a complete success and mother and child both are doing well.

### WOULD PLEDGE OFFICIALS

(ASSOCIATED PRESS) WASHINGTON, Dec. 21—Representative Upham of Georgia, a former evangelist, speaking in the house of representatives today, called upon all high officials of the federal and states governments to declare sacredly that they will not themselves "build up the bootleggers' barbarous business by drinking illicit liquor while, at the same time denying the privilege to the poor devils of the masses."

### RULES AGAINST JAPANESE

(ASSOCIATED PRESS) OLYMPIA, Wash., Dec. 21—The superior court of Franklin County has handed down a decision that property occupied by a Japanese named Esekuta in the city of Pasco must be forfeited to the state under the clause of the constitution regarding the holding of land by aliens.

It claims the property in question was deeded to Buddhist Mission Society.

### RAILROADERS CONVICTED

(ASSOCIATED PRESS) LOS ANGELES, Dec. 21—Eight Union railroad workers were convicted at their trial here of conspiracy to obstruct interstate commerce. The case against them grew out of the strike of last August against the Santa Fe railroad when 20 trains were abandoned in the California-Arizona desert and the passengers left stranded.

## Charred Bodies Of Missing Army Fliers Found In Arizona

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 22—The charred bodies of the army aviators Col. F. C. Marshall and Lieut. Charles Webber, missing since leaving San Diego on flight December 7, have been found by cowboys 75 miles southwest of Tucson, Arizona, according to railroad advices received here. The bodies were found in the wreckage of the plane.

## Notra Dame Church Quebec Is Burned; Arson Suspected

QUEBEC, Dec. 22—Notra Dame Church, called the Basilica of Quebec, was destroyed by fire last night. The blaze is thought to have started in the electrical circuiting.

Notra Dame was established in 1647 and was one of the oldest as well as finest of the churches of the American Continent and was noted for its art treasures.

Insurance was carried. The loss has not been estimated.

The chief of the provincial police said this morning that he believed the fire was of incendiary origin as he had recently received a letter which said the splendid edifice was to be destroyed December 28.

### AMBUSHED IN MEXICO

## Honolulu Sheriff To Probe Graft Charge

HONOLULU, Dec. 22—Sheriff Rose said today that within a few days he would ask the narcotic officers for the original affidavits making a charge of graft against a member of the Honolulu police force. He said, also, that only one policeman was involved, not two as at first reported.

H. H. Wouters, chief of the narcotic force, has sent a letter to Sheriff Rose expressing his desire to cooperate with the police force in suppressing the traffic in narcotics.

## Wailuku Tree To Be Held In Open At Six O'Clock

### Perfect Weather Will Make Possible A Larger Attendance Than In The Past Few Years; Other Celebrations

Bright sunlight and blue skies in which hardly a hint of a cloud could be found this morning have made possible the holding of the Wailuku Community Christmas Tree in the open this evening for the first time in several years. It is to be located on the lawn near the Wailuku Town Hall, across from the court house and is to be held at 6 o'clock.

In striking contrast to the weather of the past two years is that of today. Last year and the year before rain was falling in "basketful" and the streets were drenched. Dark, glooming skies contained little of Christmas brightness. Today is perhaps unseasonably warm but never was there a brighter and happier looking sky.

Preparations have been made to distribute 1400 gifts and the bright, clear weather will enable all the children of the district to get out while in the two previous years there had to be a distribution of presents to some children in some of the camps that were kept home by the storms.

In the town hall this morning willing workers are putting up the Christmas packages which contain candy, fruit and a toy. The program will be short, consisting of the singing of several Christmas carols.

Other trees to be held today are Punene, in the park at 5 o'clock; Haiku in the theater, 6 o'clock; Waihee, in the old mill at 6:30, plantation time and Kahului in the Community House at 7.

Tomorrow Lahaina will hold the largest exercises of any community, all West Maui being embraced in it, 6 o'clock being the hour set, and Waikapu will hold its tree at the same hour.

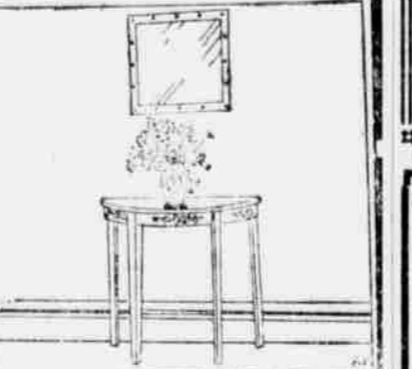

No. 98—Arrangement And Suitable Furniture For The Hall

The function, that is, the use, of a room comes before all other considerations in its arrangements.

The hall is the anteroom to the drawing room, living room and the dining room of the house. It is the first part of the house that is seen—and the last. Therefore the impression that it conveys is most important.

It should give the keynote of color and personal charm to the rest of the house, and should be furnished with such objects first, as are necessary to an arriving or departing guest, or a messenger who may be detained there and second, if space permits, with supplementary objects of suitable character.

The first necessity is a table. It may be a console or one of our grandmother's folding card tables. Above it should hang, at a height convenient to the average person, a mirror, and beside or opposite to this group should be chair of formal and dignified design.

The table may hold up a lamp, a card tray, a bowl or vase for flowers, and the smallest hall is at once welcoming and charming. Should proportions permit, an oak chest may well be added.

**NEEDED MAUI LEGISLATION**

With the new year at hand it is time that the county legislative committee and the Chamber of Commerce committee on legislation should get together, formulate a list of the legislation that is desired and have a definite program ready for the Maui legislators to work in conjunction to carry out. It seems desirable that such a program should be submitted to the Chamber at its annual meeting on January 11, and to the board of supervisors on either the 10th or 12th. Then the legislators and the board and members of the two legislative committees could meet together before the legislative session and discuss what is desired.

It is not suggested that Maui should look on the legislative session as a "pork barrel" for there are many things that Maui wants more than appropriations of territorial funds. Among them may be mentioned a greater latitude in the handling of its school affairs. There is reason to believe they would be more satisfactory if the department of public instruction were confined to the matter of handling teachers, securing and assigning them, and laying down the curriculum for the schools. Most other points could well be left to the county. The county knows best what are its school needs and what money it should raise for them.

There are numbers of matters connected with taxation in which this county is deeply interested, especially in the matter of having the rate based upon current year valuations instead of that of the previous year.

In the management of its own integral and internal affairs it should have a larger say and that of the legislature should be curtailed.

The matter of closing of pool rooms during the hours of usual industrial employment should be settled. The subject of regulating pool halls on Maui is now pending in the courts. The county treasurer acted but his action is held up by legal proceedings. The law should be amended also to strike out any ambiguity and any doubt that pool tables are to be taxed and regulated as well as billiard tables. The Japanese pool room owners have defied the county flatly so there must be action by the legislature so that they can operate only when permitted and as permitted.

There are a number of matters connected with the loan fund that should have action and before the program is laid before the legislators for them to carry out, there ought to be a full and free discussion of the subject in general and in reference to particular portions. Such discussion would come properly at the annual meeting of the Chamber.

**TAKEN NOT GIVEN**

In another column today is printed by request a letter which says a wrong impression may have been "given" by a recent editorial on the Cone Suggestive System. Maui News is always glad to give a hearing when asked even though, as on this occasion, it feels there has been no occasion given to take an exception.

The reference to Christian Science in the editorial in question was not designed to be disparaging and said that Christian Science had progressed furthest of any suggested method. The writer of the letter says that Christian Science has not progressed in the line of suggestion.

As a matter of fact Christian Science uses suggestion, spoken and unspoken, in all of its practices and this is said without attacking the faith or in any wise belittling it. All teaching is done through suggestion.

As to what was said about medical science not to be abandoned, that is also true. The editorial did not say there had not been cures and healings through Christian Science. Probably on second thought the writer of the letter will admit that the great majority of folk have not yet become Christian Scientists. The social system demands that its members shall have all the mental comfort obtainable by them and forbids the putting of the majority to discomfort. If medical science were to be abandoned at this time it would be to the mental disquietude of a great majority of the people. For instance, they are not ready to have members of a family in which there is contagious disease mingling with both that family and the public.

This paper believes that Christian Scientists should be permitted to enjoy to the full their belief and get what benefits they can from it. At the same time the Christian Scientists will have to yield to the rules and regulations of the social system. Toleration of their belief they should be given and equally they should be tolerant with others and so will have to tolerate medical science for others whether or not they accept it for themselves.

There is no intent to enter into any controversy on the subject of Christian Science which has no cause to complain of the attitude of the editor toward it, since he has on various occasions and in various places spoken in its defense.

**A STANDARD OF LIVING**  
 (Milwaukee Journal)

"An ideal in the hearts of our friends is what we all try to live up to, and so when you say you believe in me you help me," wrote a wise woman the other day. We hear a good deal and say a good deal about standards of living, meaning generally standards expressed in terms of necessities, conveniences and comforts. But really no one lives by such standards. Rather we live by what we think we can do that in some way is worth while. And so long as we don't get an ingraving habit of mind so that we can't do a decent act without expecting that some one is going to praise it, it helps to hear now and then that some one thinks we are doing a fair job of living. As a star for wagon-hitching purposes, an ideal in the hearts of our friends is not merely a poetic thought, but a living reality that keeps souls and consciences alive and individuals carrying heavy burdens with a heart that is light.

"High Notes," the Maui High School weekly which appears in the Friday issues of Maui News, has not suspended publication. Its entire editorial staff is on vacation. It will resume publication on January 10. With school at recess there's no school news any how, says one member of the staff.

Maui will have its annual costume ball, the announcement is made. It cannot be held New Year's eve since the old year is departing on Sunday but it's next to it, for it will be held Saturday night, one week from tomorrow.

From the work that is being started in smoothing out the lumps and humps in Wailuku pavements one would think there was to be a county election in a few days instead of its still being several months off.

Better finish that shopping up at once or else do it next week and lay the purchases away to be given as Christmas gifts in 1923.

**Taking Of Census In Palestine Not Easy**

JERUSALEM. — (By Associated Press Mail)—Palestinians are temperamentally afraid of the census. In the days of Abdul Hamid and other Ottoman rulers a census was taken only in order to increase taxation or to conscript the men for military service. The pre-war days are still fresh in peoples' minds, and therefore most of them today prefer to remain uncounted. Because of this, and the feeling which has run very strong among the Mohammedan and Christian populations on account of the Balfour declaration, the present government's demand for a census has met with considerable opposition.

The government evidently has been perfectly sincere in its purpose to find out the total population of Palestine with the primary object of determining who is eligible to vote in a forthcoming election for members of the legislative councils of the government. However, every sort of opposition has been encountered, both from the intelligent and the ignorant. The Mohammedan-Christian society first sent out a manifesto to its constituency, advising them to do what they could to help the census along, but later the society retracted its manifesto. This resulted in open opposition to the census, especially in Nab-

lus, the ancient Shechem.

The government began by showing a strong hand and imprisoning a dozen notables, but it finally changed its policy, released all who had been arrested, and even consented to the demand to enumerate all absent Syrians, which had been put forward by the society.

When the day of the census arrived all the government schools of the country were closed so that the teachers could be used as enumerators. So strong was the feeling in some quarters, however, that in Jerusalem three Mohammedan and two Christian teachers refused to assist in the work, and were thereupon dismissed from service. This resulted in a strike on the part of all the boys in the school where these teachers held classes.

## With Maui's Girl Scouts

### Swimming For Girl Scouts

(William Longfellow, of the American Red Cross.)

"It is a fine thing to have the Girl Scouts committed to a wholesome outdoor program, which emphasizes swimming as a vital factor. If every Girl Scout were a trained swimmer the influence in eliminating drownings throughout the United States would be amazing. A group of a tenth of a million people working toward any one end can accomplish wonders, and this effort exerted toward the elimination of drowning, would have special effectiveness.

"The Girl Scouts have taken definite stand on the encouragement of life saving efficiency of officers and girls. It is one thing to be in favor of a certain policy and it is something else again to be able to do anything about it, to prove you are in favor of it. It is not so difficult for Girl Scouts in Summer camps, to voice their approval of a universal swimming program, but as soon as fall, with its chilly winds and congealing waters comes upon us, with a return to school, then it is not easy to swim regularly and regularly to receive swimming instructions, and to practice faithfully, all of which is necessary if one is to be at home in the water as on land.

"If we are to be prepared for the hazards of an out of door program summer and winter, we must swim regularly, every month in the year, under the best sort of coaching.

"You know a swimming pool without swimming instructor is apt to cause unsupervised swimmers to lose their technique and develop bad water habit. By bad habits I mean faults of breathing and stroke a swimmer cannot recognize herself. One thoroughly trained coach on the edge of the tank can keep the whole tank full of people swimming correctly and constantly improving. That is one reason why we find the modern teacher coaching from the bank instead of from the water, where only one swimmer at a time can be taught and then not very effectively, because the teacher is too close to see the faults in the stroke."

Will you kindly publish this letter in your paper, in order that a wrong impression which may have been given by your article "Come's Suggestive System" in your edition of December 11, may be corrected.
