LEGISLATURE IN SESSION.

THE REFUNDING PROPOSITION AGAIN BEFORE THE SENATE.

Senator McCandless' 4 per Cent Resolution Voted Down--Big Morning's Business in the Senate.

FIFTY-EIGHTH DAY, MAY 4.

THE SENATE.

After the usual preliminaries the Clerk read a communication from the Lower House giving notice of the passage of a number of minor Acts.

Senator Holstein read a petition from residents of Kailua, calling attention to the advantages that place as a port of entry.

Senator Rice reported three new acts printed and they were distributed.

Senator McCandless' resolution, relating to the refunding of the public debt, came up on the order of the day.

Minister Damon was asked to give his views on the resolution, but claimed that he could not do so as long as his bills were laid on the table.

Senator McCandless said he did not see that the bills had anything to do with his resolution, which was for the purpose of bringing before the Senate a definite proposition and obtaining the sense of the Senate thereon.

The chair ruled that discussion of the resolution was in order. Senator Baldwin said if it would expedite matters he would move to take up Bills 18 and 19 from the table. This would bring the whole business before the Senate and open up the matter for free discussion.

Senator Waterhouse seconded the motion, saying that the Senate and the Committee was clearly in favor of the refunding proposition, although they were opposed to the terms proposed by the Minister of Finance.

Senator McCandless claimed that the motion was out of order as an amendment to the resolution, and the Chair sustained the objection.

Minister Damon, being again called on for some remarks on the discussion, said he had no desire whatever to force any bills or measures through the Senate. The Executive's bill had been simply taken out of its hands, and not even accorded the courtesy of a second reading even by title. The matter was in the hands of the Senate, they had the bills on the table and could take them up and act on them at any time. He did not see how the Senate in reason could ask him to discuss bills which they had taken entirely out of his hands. In answer to a direct question as to what effect the passage of the resolution would have on the Executive, he was hardly prepared to say. He thought it would cramp their financial efforts considerably. He did not see why the bills could not be taken from the table and discussed on their merits. They could be amended to suit the views of the Senate and the Executive would do their best to carry out its wishes. Because the discount was fixed at 15 per cent was no reason why the full limit should be used. The bonds might be negotiated for less and he would not say that they could not be.

Senator McCandless thought the Government overlooked the present value of Hawaii's credit; that it was better than the Executive gave it credit for. He compared our credit in 1892 and showed by quotations from B.F. Dillingham's letters as to what 4 1/2 per cent bonds could be placed in London in that year. There was no comparison between our credit now and in 1892, it was so much improved.

Minister Damon finally came out flat-footedly and said that the Executive had already given the

matter very earnest consideration and could not entertain the suggestions made in the resolution.

Senator Baldwin said in spite of the slurs which had been bandied about to the effect that the Senators were acting in the interest of home bond-holders, as far as he was concerned it was not so. He did not own nor had he ever owned any Hawaiian bonds. He thought it was due to the Executive to take the bills from the table. Although he rather favored the resolution of Senator McCandless and would vote for it if its passage was insisted on, he thought the better way would be to refer the bills back to the Executive.

Minister Damon said he did not propose to put any bonds on the market that could not be redeemed at a moment's notice in the event of annexation.

The resolution was lost by a vote of seven to six. Senators Wilcox, Lyman, McCandless, Northrup, Hocking and Horner voting in favor of it and Senators Waterhouse, Rice, Kauhane, Baldwin, Wright, Schmidt and Holstein against it.

The bill for setting apart a portion of land for the use of a Chinese hospital was referred back to the Judiciary Committee.

Senator Holstein, from the Special Committee on the Portuguese petition, read a long report, which after reciting the grievances set out in the petition, says that as near as they can learn the total number of Portuguese in the country is 13,000. That since they first came here in 1886 there has been little or no change in the rate of wages on the plantations or elsewhere, that there has been no increase in the rate of taxation since they came here and that if any complaints of excessive taxation have arisen in isolated cases they are due to deficient methods in vogue in assessment and collection of tax, provisions for remedying which are now before the Legislature. The Committee feels certain that the Legislature is fully aware of the importance of the Portuguese residents as citizens and their desirability as permanent residents. The attention of the Portuguese is called to the provisions of the Land Act passed at the Special Session, in which provision is made for homesteads for all who want them and for larger tracts when desired. With regard to the complaint made about the importation of Chinese and Japanese, the Committee say they are fully aware of the evils ensuing from their importation, but as long as the Portuguese will not accept employment on plantations they can only advocate the importation of Oriental labor to the smallest possible extent, commensurate with the necessity of the planters. That class of immigration under existing conditions can only be limited, not stopped.

On motion of Senator Waterhouse the report was received and laid on the table, to be considered with any matter which may come up in connection with it.

The House bill relating to fights and affrays passed the second reading.

House Bill 27, relating to larceny, passed the first reading. Read a second time under suspension of the rules and passed.

House Bill 21, to promote fencing, was read the first and second times and referred to the Committee on Public Lands.

Senate Bill 40, amending Article 54 of the Constitution was referred to the Judiciary Committee.

Senate Bill 38, amending the Civil Code relating to the post-office department, was referred to the Committee on Commerce.

Senate Bill No. 36, appropriating \$750,000 for internal improvements, was made the order of the day for tomorrow.

House Bill 26, relating to the division of property in cases of divorce for adultery, was read the first and second time and referred to the Judiciary Committee.

Senator Brown from the Committee on Passed Bills reported

COUNTESS WACHTMEISTER

SYNOPSIS OF HER LECTURE ON "DEATH AND AFTER"

Theosophical Beliefs as Explained by the Celebrated Exponent of That Creed--Large Audience Present.

Harmony Hall was not large enough to accommodate the large number of people who turned out to hear the celebrated expounder of theosophical beliefs, Countess Wachtmeister, last evening. The lecture was intensely interesting and the lady's delivery magnificent. Her voice is clear, powerful and well-modulated. Every word is to the point of her subject and although eloquent she does not indulge in flowery metaphor or comparison.

The doctrine of re-incarnation was clearly defined and the seven principles, said the speaker, consist of the physical body, the etherial or astral body, the universal vital fluid which penetrates all nature, the principle of desire, mind, the spiritual soul and the universal spirit. The last three form a trinity and embrace the spiritual in man, which passes on from life to life throughout all eternity, gathering knowledge and finally becoming a part of the divine spirit. Theosophists believe that thoughts are things and that creations of the imagination, if vile, will become a source of terror to their creators. She instanced a sermon which she had heard Spurgeon, the famous English divine, deliver in London some years since on the subject of future punishment, in which he depicted the horrors of that state. She said it caused her to feel an intense pity for the speaker, as she knew that he would suffer in imagination for all of those creations of his mind.

"Death" said the speaker, "is a choking, a gasping for breath, a sigh and then an awakening into a period of infinitely longer duration than our present life, a subjective state of extreme happiness and peace, prior to being born again to a new earthly existence or objective state. Earth is a training school for the real life. We live in the lower life, we place our consciousness in our physical bodies and know but little of ourselves. Adepts, who have for twenty years been developing the inner faculties, can separate soul and body at will and, for a time, dwell in the plane above ours and bring us intelligence of that plane. Thus theosophists gather evidence from many sources and deduce certain facts which are inculcated in their teachings."

The last moments of one passing away should never be disturbed, said she, as at that time the mind reviews its life here and is looking in upon itself. We should not mourn for the dead. They do not sorrow for us and to wish them back is selfishness. Suicide is the worst of crimes, as the soul freed by unnatural process reincarnates quickly and is forced to work out the penalty of its error. We produce those causes which lead to our deaths ourselves. There is a state of vileness of the mind so low that the soul can no longer remain a tenant of the body and frees itself. Then it passes to a blissful state and awaits another period of manifestation, thousands of ages in the future, when it begins the process of development over again. When an affinity is formed between two persons they will always remain together. There is no separation after death.

The Countess closed her remarks with the following beautiful sentiment:

"Life is a chariot, the soul the charioteer; the mind is the reins and the horses are the senses. The passions are the objects along the pathway of life. Control the steeds by keeping a firm hand upon the reins that the progress

of the chariot may be devoid of accident and the driver arrive at his journey's end in safety. Christ has said 'ye are sons of God.' Remember this and at death be worthy of the peace that passeth understanding, for man is the master of his destiny."

A Narrow Escape.

What came very near being a serious and possibly fatal accident, but which happily amounted to nothing but a scare, occurred at the police station this morning. Ernest Renkin, Captain of the mounted police force, was testing a Lee-Remington rifle in the gun room of the station house, when the gun accidentally went off and the ball passed so close to several officers as to cause a perceptible breeze amongst their whiskers and carried away the lower portion of one leg of clerk Batchellor's pants. It finally lodged in the ground outside the building and, aside from the dilapidated trousseurs aforementioned and the causing of the hair of several members of the "finest" to raise an end, no harm was done.

The Kamehameha Concert.

The concert at the Kamehameha school grounds on Saturday evening was a financial success and an extremely pleasurable affair despite the rain. Sixteen numbers were given. The overture was good, the negro melody, "Great Day," first rate and the chorus, "Mountaineers," especially fine. Miss Richards and members of the Glee Club sang a lovely ballad, "The Bird," in fine style and its rendition was sweet and pretty. Most of the numbers were given in a manner which was creditable in the extreme and the boys of the school are to be complimented upon their enterprise, tact and general direction of the affair.

Another Minstrel Show.

Members of Company D minstrels held a meeting last evening and decided to give another performance in about six weeks. The boys will start rehearsing at once and will undoubtedly put on a first-class show. New songs will be sent for by the Australia, new specialties will be introduced and the boys who expect to hold down the ends in the first part are looking for local hits. Gus Murphy will have charge of the stage. Company D expects to spread itself this time and provide an entertainment that they and Honolulu will be proud of. Program and other announcements will be made in due time.

A Monologue on Goats.

Goats are of many kinds, from the sacred Ixob of India, which jumps from precipice to precipice, to the equally sacred animal that hunts the precincts of Kakaako and northern Waikiki. But the best of the breed is now on exhibition at the Anchor Saloon, in the shape of Bock Beer or buck beer, the festive and belligerent goat being the proper emblem and indicative sign of its presence. This beverage is a fine spring drink. It annihilates that tired feeling common to the masses at this season.

Disturbing the Peace.

Six Portuguese on King street pooled their funds on Saturday and purchased enough liquid refreshment to get into condition for a fracas. Officer Barton happened along and endeavored to quell the row. All he got out of it, however, was a black eye. He left hurriedly, called in the assistance of brother officers and the sons of the Azores were conveyed to the city chateau on a charge of disturbing the peace and resisting an officer.

CUSTOM HOUSE OPIUM.

TOWED TO SEA AND THROWN OVER-BOARD YESTERDAY.

Sixty Thousand Dollars Worth of the Contraband Disappears Beneath the Waves Three Miles Out.

The opium vault at the Custom House was treated with quite a surprise party on Sunday morning at 7 o'clock. Without noise or commotion, fourteen men, some of them armed with revolvers, some with hatchets, some with lanterns, some with record books and some with note books, entered the vault and commenced the labor of despoiling that treasure-filled stronghold. Some \$60,000 worth of that Oriental contraband that opens the doors to dreamland, stored away on shelves, in trunks, in valises, in shoes, in tea-kettles, in tins, in shoe-boxes and in cases, leaking out in the walls and floor, covering the hands and clothes of the workmen, presented a scene of unusual interest in the weird lantern light and suggested the death of many hopes of greed and gain in many lands. What a motley crowd of capitalists, merchants, sea-faring men, clerks, laborers, adventurers, etc., must inwardly groan to see the loss of so much of their capital, their head work, their time and their labor, their worried days and sleepless nights expended only to store the vault of the Custom House, and find rest in the briny ocean's depths.

The varied assortment of opium was transferred from the vault to one of Huxace & Co.'s drays by customs guards Kanuha, Manoha, Eckland, Innis, Lounsbury and Williams; every box was opened and every tin checked; as it passed out to the dray it was tallied by F. B. McStocker, Deputy Collector of Customs and by C. B. Reynolds, agent of the Board of Health, and in the process passed from the hands of the Custom House and into the custody of the Board of Health. Geo. Stratemeyer, Port Surveyor; Jas. Kelly, Custom House storekeeper; J. T. Stacker of the Advertiser and a BULLETIN representative carefully watched the proceedings and prepared themselves to become expert authorities on various brands of the energy destroying compound by taking notes of the cabalistic characters on the tins and labels.

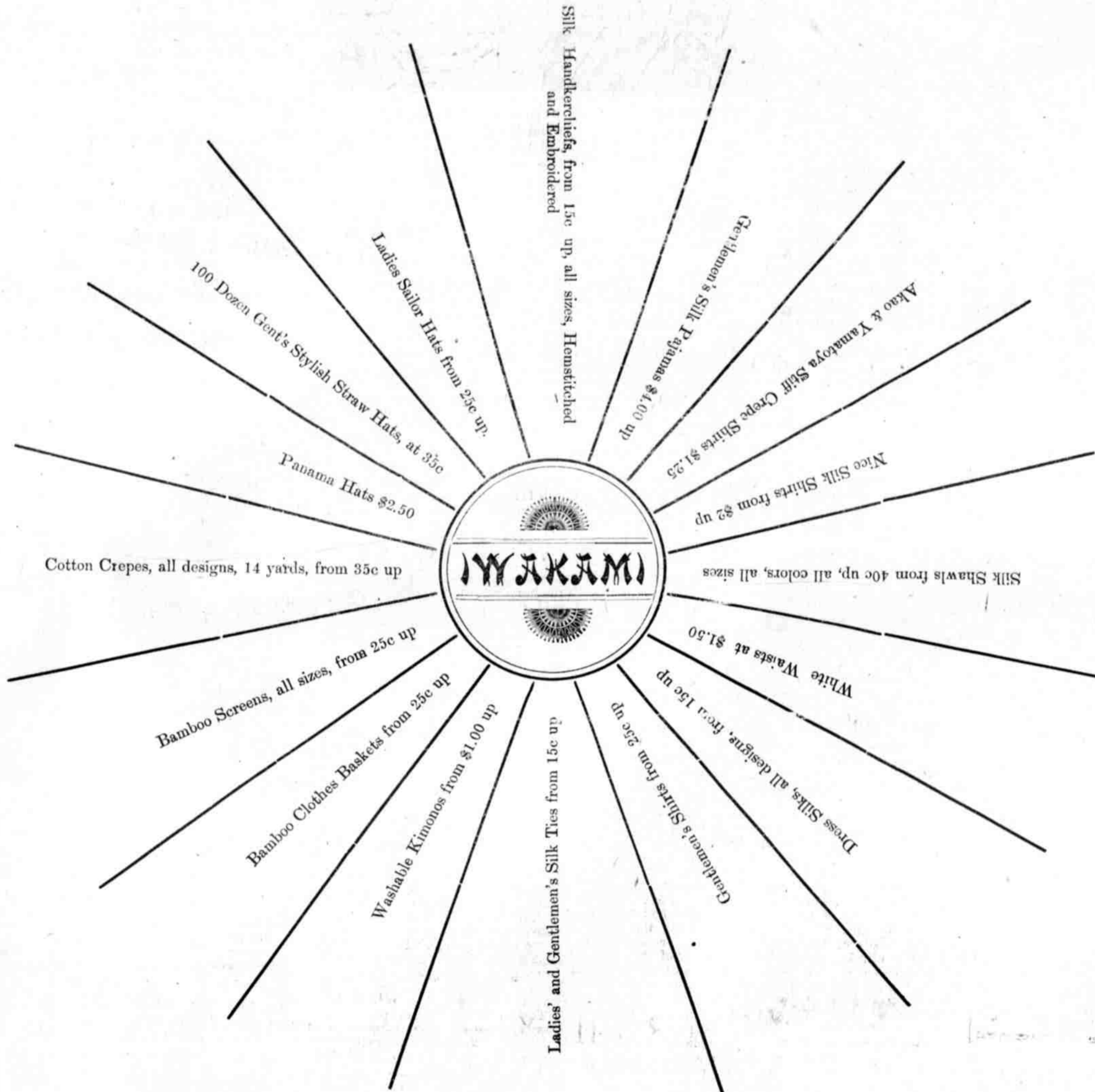
The loading of the dray was completed at 9:30 and the dope was taken down to the Pacific Mail wharf where it was transferred to a scow, and then machetes and hatchets were brought into play. The scow was half filled with water and the tins of opium were then cut open one by one and thrown down into the water in the scow, until the scow was filled full of a dirty chocolate-colored mixture of poppy molasses.

At 12:15 the tug Eleu got up steam and towed the scow about three miles out to sea and back again. The salt water rushing in and out of the scow gradually cleansed it of its contents and left a mud-colored trail in its wake. The tins got jammed in one end of the scow and it became necessary to come back in smooth water and turn the scow around in order to clear the jammed-up end and force the broken tins out into the briny deep. Even then a great part had to be thrown out by hand. The Eleu finally returned to the wharf at 3:10 o'clock, having conducted to its final rest, 5065 tins of assorted opium taken from the Australia, the James Makee, the Velocity, the Wilder, the Dimond, the Claudine, the Henrietta, the Miowera, the Quarantine Station, the Ceylon and various seizures of the Marshal and his force.

IN THE HIGHER COURTS.

OPENING OF THE MAY TERM OF THE CIRCUIT COURT.

Disposition of Cases by Judge Perry Upon Calling the Calendar for the Term This Morning.

The May term of the Circuit Court opened this morning, Judge Perry presiding. There was the usual large attendance of attorneys, witnesses and jurymen present. For the Hawaiian jury there are twenty criminal and six civil cases and the mixed jury has ten cases before it. For the Foreign jury there are twenty criminal and fourteen civil cases. In eleven other cases the jury is waived. There are also fourteen divorce cases on the calendar.

At this morning's session the calendar was called through, and disposition made of the following: Republic of Hawaii vs. Juno Davis. Indictment for assault with intent to commit rape presented. Plea reserved till tomorrow.

Republic of Hawaii vs. Kauwahi. Forgery. Defendant pleads guilty and is sentenced to one month's imprisonment, \$10 fine and costs.

Republic of Hawaii vs. Henry Olds. Embezzlement. Defendant pleads not guilty.

Republic of Hawaii vs. Keomaka. Larceny 2d degree. The Attorney-General declines to prosecute.

Republic of Hawaii vs. Lui McKeague. Assault and battery. Appeal withdrawn.

Republic of Hawaii vs. Lima. Liquor distilling without a license. Set for trial at 9:30 a. m. tomorrow.

Republic of Hawaii vs. L. Kamekane alias Pipi. Liquor selling without a license. Appeal withdrawn.

Hattie Kekauluku et al. vs. Keawe et al. Demurrer filed.

E. E. Hobron vs. Limaou et al. Cause discontinued.

C. W. Booth vs. P. H. Kahau et al. Proceedings stayed by injunction.

The steamer Australia docked at 3 o'clock this afternoon from San Francisco.

Following is the most important news: Mrs. Cornwell, mother of W. C. Cornwell, died in San Francisco two days before the steamer left.

Baron Hirsch, the great Austrian financier, died on the 20th.

Another battle was fought between the British troops and the Matabeles on the 26th. The British were repulsed being outnumbered ten to one.

Another account says the Matabeles were defeated by the British and the latter after gaining complete possession of the field, retired to Bulawayo. Their loss was only three killed and six wounded.

Sugar 4 5-16ths. An agreement has been reached between Chile and Argentine on the boundary question and a protocol was signed on the 26th.

A Kansas cyclone killed a number of people on the 26th.

Sharkey lasted out the eight rounds in his great fight with Choynski and won the money.

On the 27th the Italian Cabinet decided against reopening the campaign in Abyssinia in the autumn, on the ground that such a course would be disastrous to Italy.

Russia has ordered seven ironclads and ten cruisers for her Pacific fleet in view of Japan's extensive naval preparations.

General Maceo has given the Spaniards a shock by sending Bermudez and Sainz across the trocha with 1000 men. The Cuban leader himself has not yet tried to cross the eighteen-mile barrier of trenches, fences and forts which the Captain-General has thrown across the narrow part of Cuba to imprison the dread mulatto cavalry leader in the eastern end of the island and force him to surrender or fight 40,000 Spanish troops with his half naked and hungry followers.

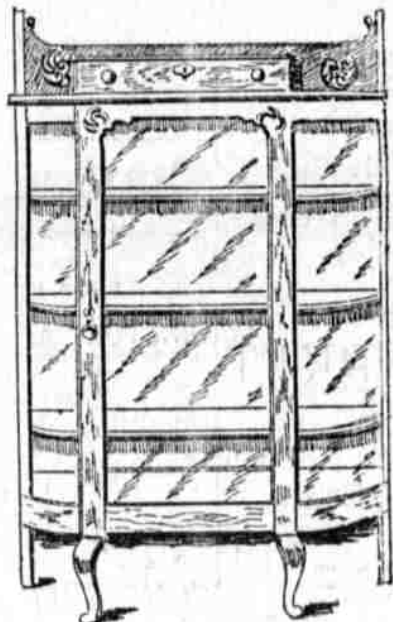

THE LICENSE ACT.

A Correspondent Grows Bitter in Discussing its Provisions.

EDITOR BULLETIN:— That it is the duty of all the tax payers in this community to pay their individual share for the revenue of the country is a self-evident fact. The statement of the Minister of Finance clearly shows that the present revenue for the forthcoming biennial period will not pay the salaries of a useless and, to many, obnoxious army, the salaries of the Government officials and the interest on our loans. This deficit is due to the inefficient way in which the taxes are assessed and collected, and the disclosures of the last three weeks show that the poor man, the small tradesman, the mechanic and the Portuguese are and have been taxed up to the last dollar, while the sugar barons, the monopolists, the corporations and the large real estate property holders have in numerous instances fraudulently evaded the just payment of taxes to a serious extent. It necessarily devolves upon the wiseheads in the Senate to meet this difficulty and their method of action is plain to all: namely, to press still harder on the trading community and to grind yet finer the men who one and all are bitterly complaining of the hard times and comparative loss of business with former years. To this end the License Act has been reopened and every possible petty scheme to license, from barbers to butchers, has been sieved through and through to the last grain.

It has been known and recognized by all advanced nations and thinkers that the License Tax is the most cruel and injurious to the struggling tradesman and mechanic. It steps in and deprives him of the capital with which he hopes to gain a living. It prevents many poor people from endeavoring to make a start for themselves and instead of assisting to make self-supporting producers and consumers it is an absolute bar to civil advancement. For example a man with a growing family, anxious to become his own master, has saved \$300. He believes with the assistance of his elder children he can get a living and build up a trade as a book seller, and stationer, but before he can sell a dollars, worth the Paternal Government takes from him \$57 or a sixth of his capital. That \$57 spread over a year's business makes all the difference between an economic living and ruin. In three months he shuts up and the Government will of course return the license money for the unexpired three-fourths of a year. Not if they know it. These cases and hundreds of more pathetic ones could be adduced.

The Committee on Licenses have hunted everything in sight to gather in. Notaries Public \$50.00. Now of my own personal knowledge I know of more than five whose books will show that they have not taken \$100 in the last Next real estate, commission year, and loan agency. It is almost impossible to separate this business. The real estate man with land to buy or sell must be a commission agent, and he must lend or borrow in most cases a part or the whole of the money to be invested. In many instances the balance to be raised is too small to be worthy of the attention of the banks, and so the real estate agency must either come under the utterly absurd category of money lender at a license of \$250 or lose the sale. I submit that the real estate agent is considered in all advanced states as a most valuable factor in opening up the country, making it in the power of the small men to take up land and in every way benefitting the community, and for this the wise men in the Senate would tax him \$250, not on his earnings but on what he may possibly make. Gentlemen of the Senate: This is not taxation but persecution. It seems cruel injustice to endeavor to wring \$250 out of four or five men who are striving to get a fair living and are instrumental in selling those lands owned by the capitalists who do not pay one-tenth of 1 per cent their due proportion of the revenues of the country.

Gentlemen we are willing to do our share, but we object to favoritism or persecution. We seek justice. K. P.

We look about on the islands—we look from Maui, from Maui to Kauai, from Kauai to Oahu, for we would not willingly, slight altogether that third in size and fourth in importance and in beauty (home of the capital) island. From this comparatively speaking, mite, we say Oahu, we look to Hawaii, the "head and front" of this most imperial group. A little family of islands, mere pigmies, dwarfs of our island world; and yet, if at its best, a group that can mix and shake up and shake out volcanoes, rainbows, waterfalls, wonders and marvels to delight an astonished and gaping universe—a sovereign remedy for all the ills of life. A climate for which God could do more; and He brake the mould. Sea, sky and land; hill and dale, gulch and pasture in comparable fact. From cappa to chausa a thing of beauty. Such is Hawaii nei today, April, in the Year of Our Lord 1896. Show to us a more prosperous year—a finer harvest! Your garners filled to over-flowing—your sugar warehouses, what of them? Certainly, Smith, Jones and Brown of Kohala, and of Makapala and, of course, Niulii shout to him:—"Come in—come in, what's matter you—and sleep and eat, forever." And, figuratively speaking, beg of him on their knees not to slight their call. But, qui bona? A man, a parson, even an unfamly man, half of the whole, a bachelor must have a Hall, "hall" (haul) somewhere, somehow—that's right, that's logic. Give to us our ain shanty—every time. Visiting is one thing—home's another. "Any fool knows that"—Dundreary. Go to. Let us have no more of those fine, airy foundation—leas dwellings made of no timber on earth or in Hawaii; and that have never, in anyone instance, materialized—let us have, now Lent is come and gone for another year, and we must have made some good resolves, let us have that "place." We need a comfortable rectory, a parsonage, a house, a home in Kohala, one that shall be worthy of the church and a delight to the eye and heart. Let us have it and no more a do. 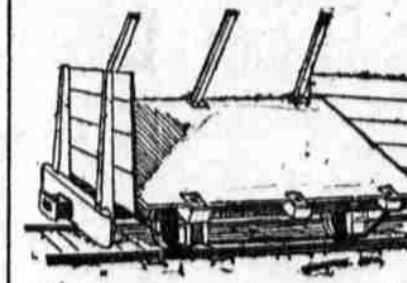

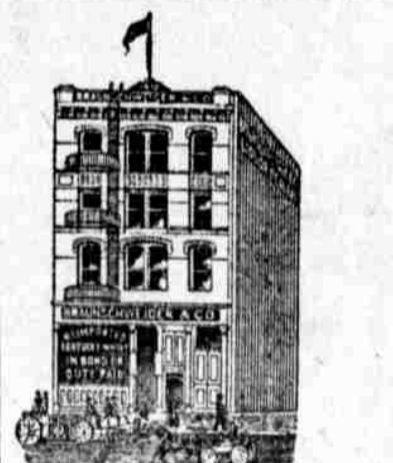

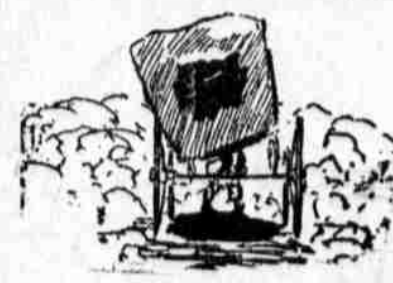

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

The clerk read Senate bill 31 to the House. This bill amends Chapter 30 of the Civil Code referring to corporations. Passed first reading.

Minister King sent in a reply to Rep. Rycroft's request for information as to the amount expended on the Puna road, Hawaii. \$8219.03 has been spent on said road and 12,500 feet completed leaving about 24 miles to finish.

Under a suspension of the rules, Rep. Winston presented a petition from twenty-five dairymen stating that many persons who kept cows sold milk without paying a license. Asked that they be made to pay, so as to stop unfair competition. Laid on the table.

Minister Cooper asked that discussion of Senate Bill No. 12, relating to licenses, be referred until Wednesday. Granted.

DR. C. W. DABNEY, Washington, D. C.

DEAR SIR: Yours of recent date in regard to the "Secretary" plow has been on my desk some days, but I delayed sending a reply in order that I might send some photos which go with this.

Deere & Company sent one of the plows, the first one which was completed, to this station, and we gave it a very thorough test in December last. The ground on which it was used was a field which had never been plowed more than six inches deep, and which had been in red clover for three years. With three good mules we were able to plow ten inches deep without making the work too hard for the team, and by working slowly a part of the ground was plowed to a depth of fourteen inches. The plow certainly does better work than I have ever seen done with any other implement. S. M. TRACY, Director.

Mr. Tracy, in a letter to Deere & Company, says: I have never seen ground left in as good condition after the plowing, the furrows being thrown so as to pulverize the soil more thoroughly than can be done by an ordinary plow, and all trash and weeds were completely turned under.

Mark Packets Arrived--Some Items Picked Up Along the Docks-- Passengers Arrived.

The steamer Mokoli arrived early Sunday morning with 900 bags Olowalu sugar.

The cargoes of the steamers Kaala and Kaena were put into the bark Fortuna.

The big liner China is due from the Orient on Wednesday. The Mariposa from San Francisco should be in on Thursday.

The Kinau will sail tomorrow morning for Maui and Hawaii. The Claudine for ports on Maui will leave at 5 in the evening.

The barkentine Planter, Captain Dow, sailed yesterday with 15,737 bags of sugar, weighing 1,837,696 lbs, and valued at \$68,206.02.

Some quick work was done by the crew of the steamer James Makee the other day, 5446 bags sugar being discharged in 2 hours and 17 minutes.

The tug Eleu attracted a good deal of attention by her action yesterday. She was engaged towing a garbage scow up and down outside the harbor for the purpose of washing a lot of dope into the sea.

Captain B. A. Martin, of the British ship Howth, at Victoria B. C. notifies the United States hydrographic office that on January 24, off Cape Horn, he sighted a monster iceberg, which was about 300 feet high and 700 feet long.

The American bark Pactolus, 1585 tons, arrived Saturday afternoon from Portland and Astoria. After discharging about 400 tons of ballast, she will load sugar for New York or Philadelphia. She is lying at Sorenson's wharf, and is a fine looking vessel.

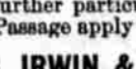
