Roosevelt in White House.

WASHINGTON (D. C.), September 20.—President Roosevelt will spend his first night in the White House next Monday. Mrs. Roosevelt and the children will arrive on Wednesday, coming directly to the White House from the train, and Wednesday evening will see the entire family comfortably established in the White House. The decision of President Roosevelt to personally move into the White House Monday was made known today, and his chief object in moving in before his family arrives is to superintend the preparations for their arrival. The little space available at the mansion for private apartments for the Executive makes it necessary that it be utilized to the last degree, and it is to get this space in shape before that President Roosevelt will devote his spare time during the two days he occupies the White House before the arrival of his family.

WILL DOLE GO?

We have taken very little stock in the prophecies of obscure or inspired organs on the Mainland and here, predicting the "retirement" from public office of Governor Dole. We had the same feeling in regard to the relations of Dole and the Washington government as we had in the Humphreys incident. That is, we felt sure, that Washington would tell us to fight our own battles, work out our own salvation, and remain in the state of "test of capacity of self government" for the period, for which Dole, Humphreys and others, were appointed by the President.]

We are inclined to change our views now. We publish below an article from Leslie's Weekly, and the character of that journal is such, that charges of inspiration or ignorance would not stick for a moment. When Leslie's Weekly predicts the speedy retirement of Governor Dole, and the journal admits, that it was through Dole's misrepresentations, not to say falsehoods, that Hawaii was annexed, there are reasons to believe that the Washington Government will sacrifice any amount of Dole's to secure harmony in the new territory and "pacify" the Hawaiians.

Leslie's Weekly's article reads:

"Recent events in Hawaii indicate the approaching retirement of Governor Sanford B. Dole, the man who has been at the head of all the various governments the Hawaiian Islands have known since the day, in 1893, when the monarchy was first overthrown. He was chief justice of the Supreme Court at the time of this first successful revolt against the Hawaiian royal line, and resigned the office to become President of the provisional government. Since the day when he laid aside the robes of a supreme justice and took up the powers of a ruler, Sanford B. Dole has known no rest from constant and indescribably bitter criticism. Americans who thought that the Hawaiians wanted annexation because they did not fight against it have since learned otherwise. The Hawaiians, in fact, are not 'pacified' yet, as the election last fall and the events of the present legislative session have shown. The most natural target for them, and for the not inconsiderable element among the whites who sympathized with them, for one reason or another, was, and is, the man who took the leadership in the first steps that proved fatal to the Hawaiian monarchy. For seven years, from 1893, when the Queen was deposed, to 1900, when

Hawaii received the benefit of a government provided by Congress, Sanford B. Dole held the reins of government in the turbulent little nation, passing through several royalist plots and revolts, and leading a hard campaign of five years in behalf of annexation to the United States. When this campaign was won and Congress made Hawaii an American Territory, Dole was appointed first Governor, and the events that have followed have driven him into retirement, seriously suffering from nervous prostration. In Honolulu there is a very general impression that Governor Dole would like to resign, as well as that his state of health may finally compel him to do so. He has been under such constant fire ever since 1893 that resignation must have always appeared to him objectionable, as yielding, and until the present moment, when his thorough seclusion has for the time caused him to be lost sight of, there has never been a time when his resignation would not have been regarded as a triumph of his enemies, perhaps as a retreat in fear of an oft and confidently predicted 'removal.' The retirement of Governor Dole from public life will remove a figure that was very prominently before the Americans for some years while the Hawaiian controversy lasted, and it will take from Hawaiian affairs one who more than any other man holds the credit for piloting the little country through an extraordinary series of difficulties."

We do not want Dole to be relegated to privacy on account of 1893. We would be willing to forget his treachery, his violation of his solemn oaths and his perjury generally, if he had turned out to be the right man to conduct the affairs of this young territory. He has been weighed and found wanting. He has been unable to forget, that he no longer is en-wrapped in the powers of a tyrant, heading a provisional government. He surrounds himself with the narrow minded clique of the family compact and retains his "ministers" and Executive Council. He deigns to allow important proclamations in regard to national matters, stirring the hearts of the whole civilized world, to go forth signed by a typewriter in his office. He absents himself from meetings, held by citizens, at which regrets and sorrow are expressed by high and low, by American citizens and foreigners residing under the flag, which covers the bier of William McKinley. His health is broken down, and he is physically unfit to attend to the business of the Territory. He and his tools in the Legislature hampered progress, delayed work, wasted the valuable time of the brief session, and then had the audacity to blame and abuse the Hawaiian members, who were willing and anxious to get down to business instead of listening to the Dole obstructionists in the Senate and House.

Then Mr. Dole declined to extend the session, although he knew, that the first meeting of a Legislature under the changed conditions would naturally be unsatisfactory on account of the inexperience of the legislators. In fact he did not give the Legislature a fair show, because he—Bourbon as he is—can not understand, that a governor is the servant not the master of the people. He has not mustered up sufficient courage to call an extra session, although he is well aware that the treasury is crying for funds, and that on November 15th two local banks will present their I. O. U.'s for a quarter of a million dollars, for cash loaned to Dole's bankrupt government. When approached on such matters, of enormous importance to the taxpayers, the governor becomes dazed, cannot remember anything, and takes refuge in the Puuwaawaa forests, where no newspapers—not even THE INDEPENDENT—reach him.

We pity him for his illness and failing health, but business is busi-

ness in this world, and Mr. Dole ought to be the first man to acknowledge, that he is not fit to be at the head of our little government and that he feels compelled to resign or retire or do any other old thing, as long as he "gits." That his retirement will be a blow to the family compact is undeniable, but, really, the compact doesn't need further subsidies. It is said that the Kohala water scheme didn't materialize, but even that defeat will hardly be felt by Dole's real life guards, those who "promoted" plantations and filled their coffers, with the other fellows coin. As to Dole's successor we can say nothing, until Hannerly Cooper, formerly of Manoa and now of Pearl Harbor, returns from Washington with a new capacious carpet bag.

Czolgosz's Trial.

BUFFALO, September 20.—Leon Czolgosz, the murderer of President McKinley, is still stolid, sullen and at times defiant, despite the efforts of the authorities to induce him to make a satisfactory statement. All of the artifices which are usually employed with success upon the ordinary prisoner have utterly failed, and the police have about abandoned the hope of getting from him any confession that will incriminate others who were parties to the conspiracy to assassinate the President. The prisoner is still kept in solitary confinement and is closely guarded every moment of the day and night, so that there is not the remotest chance that he will be able to end his own life. Superintendent of Police Bull believes that solitary confinement may possibly loosen his tongue, but his guards are not so sanguine.

The work of collecting and arranging the testimony against the conspirators goes laboriously on, and there is not a single thread, no matter how slender it may be, that is not being followed to its end.

Judge Robert C. Titus, one of the counsel assigned to defend Czolgosz, the President's murderer, returned today from Milwaukee. He and Mr. Lewis, his assistant counsel, at once held a conference, from which Judge Lewis declined to see newspaper men, but sent out word that Judge Titus had not decided as yet whether to accept the assignment as counsel.
