Excitement. The town has been all excitement during the day over a rumor that started early in the morning, to the effect that the Ministry had, at the King's request, resigned.

It is very difficult to get any reliable information. It is pretty safe, however, to say that the rumor is founded on fact.

Of course, the Ministers will hold office until their successors are appointed. The appointment of a new cabinet is probably found to be a difficult matter.

At all events, at this hour—3 o'clock p. m.—we cannot learn that anything definite has been accomplished in this direction.

The sentiment of this community, if we understand it aright, and we think we do, is not of that nature which can be satisfied simply by the dismissal of one set of men and the appointment of another set.

Past experience of this kind of thing has not had a tendency to inspire confidence in the permanent benefit of any such arrangement.

The King has, in the past, appointed and dismissed cabinet after cabinet at pleasure, and may do so again. It cannot be forgotten that His Majesty has usually been guided by his own will and whim, and not the wish of the tax payers and the good of the country.

Any ministry that may have been acceptable to the country and endeavored to expend the public revenue for internal development and improvement, has had short life.

While, on the other hand, ministers destitute of principle and patriotism, and ready to mislead the public funds held in trust by them, for the furtherance of the King's crack-brained notions and schemes, have been tenaciously held on to.

We are not in the humor to accept any compromise that will allow an opening for a reproduction in the future of what we have had too much of in the past.

A real, complete, thorough change, which will exclude from every official position all dishonest and incompetent persons and put in their places men of honor, rectitude and fitness, is what the intelligence and respectability of the country want.

Nothing short of this will satisfy. Moreover, there must be a positive and undeniable guarantee of its continuance.

The King must be prepared to take his own proper place, and be content to reign without ruling. We want capable responsible Ministers, not irresponsible clerks.

THE HAWAIIAN \$2,000,000 LOAN.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—Presuming on your valuable space, I should like to offer a few remarks in reference to the Hawaiian Government Loan floated recently.

Of the \$2,000,000 authorized by the Act, there has been raised in Honolulu \$500,000 and in London \$1,000,000, leaving a balance of \$500,000 yet to be floated on the London market.

I annex a table showing the various appropriations as per Loan Act and also the amounts expended according to the statement published in the Government newspaper.

Table with columns: Appropriation under Government Loan Act, Amount, Spent by Government. Includes items like Interest, Encouragement of Immigration, etc.

Adding unexpended. Cash in Bank at "Prison" 115,000 00. Cash in Treasury, Honolulu 6 47.

Part loan raised in London, (presented by abouts of cash not stated by Government) 200,000 00.

Part loan not yet floated 500,000 00. Total \$2,000,000 00.

Going into details, we find that the Loan was floated in London on the representations on the part of Hawaiian Government agents that out of the \$2,000,000 to be raised, \$665,000 or 1/3 of total loan was to be devoted towards permanent improvements and encouragement of immigration, but as yet only \$131,620.71 has gone for these objects.

It would be worth while for the London bondholders to appoint a committee to watch that the balance of money unexpended be spent on improvements according to the Act, and not frittered away on senseless baubles and bribes to palace favorites.

As regards the encouragement of immigration, the Government state that \$46,096.51 has been spent under this heading. The amended Loan Act was approved on 15th October last and since that date no immigrants have been introduced here under Government auspices, the last arrivals being the Portuguese who landed from the Amama in September last.

Perhaps the \$46,000 odd went on account of the Amama shipment consisting of 251 adults and 237 children; if so, I want to know how much was paid for commissions and to agents and officials of the Bureau of Immigration and how much for fares and food of immigrants. At this rate the \$150,000 allotted for immigration purposes will only serve to pay for the introduction of about 500 more adults and a like number of children.

Certainly it will not help much towards "Hoo-lu-Lahu!" For electric lighting \$6,359.14 has been spent. What has been done in this line has been confined to the palace and approaches and front of Gibson's house, whilst Fort and other main business streets and the wharves have been left in total darkness.

Next comes one of the most interesting parts of the business, the expenses of floating the loan. Commission is allowed by the Act at the rate of 5 per cent, and the amount stated as paid for the \$1,500,000 floated is \$29,970, but there is also another item that must be reckoned on when calculating the expense of the Loan.

This is the charge item of \$93,006.47 for "Sundry Disbursements" and "Cash on hand" very cunningly slumped together. As the Government, like George Washington, cannot tell a lie, we will allow that there is some cash in hand, say the odd \$6.47, leaving a balance of \$93,000 unexplained on the part of the Government.

No margin or allowance is made in the Loan Act for "Sundry Disbursements," so in the absence of any explanation, this \$93,000 can only be treated as part expense of floating the Loan. \$29,970 and \$93,000 together make \$122,970 or over 8 per cent on \$1,500,000, certainly a tidy sum to go towards swelling someone's bank account.

Whilst the rate payers are bled to the above extent for bonuses and commissions, absolutely nothing has been done towards getting the inter-island cable, improving the streets and harbor, and wharves of Honolulu, or the roads, bridges and landings of the Kingdom.

No explanation is offered by the Government as to what has become of the \$200,000 raised in London, but the present whereabouts of which is not given in the Government statement. Rumor says that it has gone towards paying for a pleasure yacht for the King and liquidating the expenses of the Queen's trip to Europe.

Lastly, a writer in a local newspaper, has done well in pointing out the bungle perpetrated in the mode of issuing the bonds, i. e., if the Government figures are correct, calculating the £ sterling as equal to \$5 instead of doing so at the present course of exchange between the States and England, viz: about \$4.86, means a loss to Hawaiian rate payers when the \$1,500,000 bonds are repaid at maturity in London, of no less than \$12,000.

Verily "blundering and blundering" are the chief features of our present Government, and the sooner it is abolished the better for all parties both native and foreign. ONLOOKER.

THE "ELELE" NEWSPAPER.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—Testa be blowed! Who is Testa anyhow? Since when was he made responsible or rather irresponsible editor of Mr. Hayselden's "Elele" news-

paper? It is but a few short weeks since he breathed hot breath against Gibson and the King because of their neglect of his personal merits and claims, and if he is now conducting the "Elele" it is to express precisely what he is told to put into print to influence the natives: Testa is no more a free agent than if he were a convict, and his masters are responsible for the atrocious advice of the "Elele" to sweep the foreigners out of the country, that is to massacre them and confiscate their property.

This is what the "Elele" advised the Hawaiian people to do, although it was not expressed in these exact words. Inasmuch as the authorities are arising and preparing to shoot down all who oppose their lawless acts, there is great significance in the "Elele's" incitement to massacre. If the native Hawaiians could be induced to attack their white friends and neighbors, an excuse would be found for using the machine guns and Austrian battery upon the doomed whites, to make a clean sweep of opposition and suppressed treason.

And it is significant that on the very evening of the day on which this murderous advice appeared in the "Elele," an attempt was made by a section of the police, doubtless under instruction, to provoke a riot by shadowing the British jubilee banqueters at dinner, and subsequently forcing a fight upon a small section of them when quietly leaving a gentleman's private residence on Richard street, close to the Palace wall.

Had a riot ensued it would have been construed into an attack upon the Palace in all probability, with consequences too fearful to contemplate. This plan miscarried, thanks to the forbearance of the young gentlemen, but its inception can be brought so close to some of the Ministry and the "Elele" ring, as to leave no room to doubt their responsibility. "TAKE UP THY BED AND WALK." EDITOR BULLETIN:—That is the advice the "Elele" gives Mr. J. T. Waterhouse by name, and all other foreigners in the kingdom. "If you don't like things as they happen, get up and dust, and leave Hawaii for the Hawaiians." This is all very well, but how can it be done? If the foreigners took every thing with them that belongs to them, the country would be stripped of all its wealth, fixed and moveable, and the king and his people would be left with their breech cloths and tabu sticks.

Intelligent Hawaiians understand that Hawaii, as it now exists, belongs to the foreigners who made it what it is, and the natives enjoy equal advantages with the foreigners without having contributed a cent of the expense. When Hawaii belonged to Hawaiians the common people were slaves, and the chiefs waged incessant war with each other. One hundred stand of arms and a keg of nails would have bought the fee simple of any island in the group. The cry of "Hawaii for Hawaiians" is absurd, and they are the enemies of the native people who raise it. I am FRIEND OF THE HAWAIIANS.

THE OPIUM STEAL AND THE MARSHAL.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—I notice in your paper, or one of your contemporaries, that 4,000 tins of opium had just passed through the Custom House and were delivered at the store of the Opium licensee on Nuuanu street. How is this? The Supreme Court has decided that it is unlawful to sell opium to anyone who is in the habit of using it, and that a physician prescribing it for any such person is liable to fine and withdrawal of his license to practice.

In the face of that decision the law is being violated daily. Opium is sold by the tin or dozen tins—in large or small quantities—to anyone who brings a certificate from a physician of any nationality and the Marshal. The Marshal's certificates had his name stamped, and were sold in blank, by the book, to the licensee or his agents, \$1 each being charged under the regulations issued by Mr. Aholo, Minister of the Interior.

The opium vendor therefore furnishes the Marshal's license. In this way a large sum of money has been unlawfully collected by the Marshal, half of which was to be conveyed into the Treasury. This should be inquired into, because since the decision of the Supreme Court in question the issuance of the Marshal's license is a participation in an illegal traffic, which, in the case of the Marshal of the Kingdom, becomes a very serious offense indeed.

The fact is patent to all that, the present Government ignores the Supreme Court and disregards its decisions. The "Elele" newspaper declared a short time ago, in English, that the reason for reorganizing the Supreme Bench was because the Government had no confidence in it as previously constituted, that is, in Chief Justice Judd and Justice McCully and Preston. Messrs. Bickerton and Foran were added to the Bench, being men in whom the King and his Ministers had confidence. But these judges concurred in the opium decision referred to, and yet the Attorney-General permits the Marshal of the Kingdom and the opium licensee with his staff of Chinese physicians to violate the law with impunity, and sell and distribute a poisonous drug, to wit opium, by wholesale and retail. If it be true that the King's Chamberlain has one-third interest in the opium license this would explain the

matter to persons familiar with the crooked methods of money getting in high places in this kingdom, but what will intelligent visitors say about it? What kind of a report will they make abroad regarding the corruption and infamy of the Government, where such things are of daily occurrence? Who will respect its promises to pay when the Government is so conspicuously regardless of lawful and moral responsibility? If the truth in these matters had been known in England, the Hawaiian Government could not have borrowed a shilling, and the fools who lent their money there will now stand in dread repudiation, which should be a trifle compared with the infamy the Executive of this kingdom stands charged with.

A duty devolves upon law respecting people, and that to bring test cases in this opium business against the Marshal and the licensee. Let the Supreme Court pass upon them, and the people will take measures to enforce their decree whether the King and his Ministers please or not. As things now stand the Government is openly setting the law at defiance by the acts of the Marshal with the connivance of the Attorney-General. LEGALITY.

PUBLIC TRUST FUNDS IN THE HANDS OF GOVERNMENT.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—Besides the certificate money and the Postoffice Savings Bank Deposits there is still another "Special Deposit" in the hands of Government which the writer of the communication under the above title in your Saturday's issue appears to have overlooked. This is the Japanese Fund, amounting at 31 March, 1886, to no less than \$28,002.05.

The Auditor-General in his report does not profess to have very definite or clear ideas about this fund. He says, "this fund seems to be derived from a percentage of Japanese contract laborers' pay, paid over to the Government by special agreement, and placed on the Treasury Books in the shape of a banking account, in which I have no authority over until such time as it becomes merged in the general receipts of the Treasury, and being closed in with the period, cannot be drawn without legislative authority." Why the Auditor-General should merely "seem" to know the source of this fund and not ascertain definitely for himself for what purpose the money is lodged with Government, is beyond my ken, and in the statement about having no authority over the money until it becomes merged in the general receipts of the Treasury, I beg to differ from him entirely. I hold that the moment any money is placed in the hands of the Treasury Department and entered in the Government Books, it becomes the Auditor-General's duty to watch over and verify the proper expenditure of same. How also does the mysterious operation of being "merged in the general receipts of the Treasury" take place? By a simple transfer entry in the Treasury Books as I should imagine, or does it require the occult help of the Kahuna or versatile Registrar of Conveyances to effect the change.

Seriously speaking, it is to be hoped that the Japanese Consul is keeping his weather eye open upon these savings of his poor countrymen, and that he will insist, in the circumstances now prevailing in obtaining some tangible security for repayment of money lodged. If the Japanese Government in making this deposit are under the impression that the money would be readily forthcoming at any time when called for, they are very much mistaken. The leading financial manager of this country whose opinion is to be depended upon, stated in a speech in the last Legislature that he had always voted against the reckless extravagance of the Hawaiian Government, but it was of no use, however, as the Government was made up of office holders who had one hand in the Treasury and the other on the taxes.

The condition of the Japanese men and women in this country may turn out a very deplorable one, when they find themselves minus their wages, and debauched with opium introduced here by the author of the "Opium racket." FUJI.

He refused to permit a collection to be taken up. The jump was merely in honor of the Queen's jubilee. He intends to jump at an early day off the Clifton suspension bridge at Bristol, the highest bridge in England.

A GREAT RACE.

RESULT OF THE CONTEST FOR THE GRAND PRIZE OF PARIS.

Paris, June 3.—The race for the grand prize of Paris was run at Chantilly to-day and was won by M. Aumont's bay filly, Tenebreuse. M. Daumon's bay colt, The Baron, was second, and Baron A. de Schickler's bay colt, Krakatoa, third. The other starters were Merry Hampton, Monarch, St. Luc, Lesancy, Frapoteau, Bavarde, Gournay and Vanneau.

A good start was made, St. Luc and Lesancy taking the lead, followed by The Baron, Merry Hampton and Bavarde, Frapoteau being last. After the first thousand yards Monarch yielded, and for fifty lengths along the incline Lesancy made the play. At the last round The Baron went to the front, alongside of Tenebreuse and Merry Hampton. Tenebreuse then went ahead and won easily by three lengths.

Novelties in the shape of indurated fibre pails and lamp attachments may be had at the Pacific Hardware Co.'s store, Fort street. The result is a neat, strong seamless, odorless, unpainted and unvarnished pail, which will not shrink, swell, crack, absorb moisture or increase in weight. The Oceanic Co.'s brigantine J. D. Spreckels arrived from San Francisco this morning, bringing dates to the 16th instant. We call the following news items from exchanges:— There have been only twelve entries for the jubilee yacht race around the British Isles. Emperor William's condition is causing considerable anxiety. Davitt denies having counseled any further resort to extreme violence in resisting the Coercion Act. Salisbury has declined to alter the Egyptian convention to please the Porte. The floods in Hungary have inundated 25,000 square miles of land. The will of David Dickson, giving Amanda Ebanbanks, a colored girl, \$500,000, has been sustained by the Supreme Court of Georgia. The charges of cruelty against the Superintendent of the New York Orphan Asylum have not been sustained. The yacht Atlantic again defeated the Galatea. Herr Most and a number of his followers will be prosecuted for their rioting at Oak Hill Park, near New York. Emperor William is reported to be in a state of restless weakness. In a word, the situation, although better, is far from being satisfactory. For the first time he is conscious of the gravity of his situation. He is affected mentally as well as physically. The physical condition of the Prince Imperial is the same. Dr. Mackenzie said that he is convinced there is nothing more than a wart about the size of a large pea in the Prince's throat. Taro Flour Poi!

New Receipt Discovered for
Cooking Taro Flour Poi.

On the Same Principle as Corn
Meal or Oat Meal is Cooked.

One pound of Taro Flour cooked this
way will make 5 pounds of hard poi.
Take the desired amount of Taro
Flour, mix it with cold water in suffi-
cient quantities to make it a thick paste.
Place it in a porcelain pot, (and no
other) on a slow fire, add hot water
slowly or enough to prevent it burning.
Keep stirring with a spoon or stick for
an hour while cooking; then set it on
another slower fire for another hour.
When cooked place it in a bowl or cala-
bash and let it remain for 24 hours; then
it is ready for use, adding sufficient
cold water to make it the proper thick-
ness. If found lumpy, squeeze through
a piece of mosquito netting.
All families desiring clean poi will
do well to give Taro Flour, prepared
this way, a new trial.
Those desiring sour poi must let it re-
