Marshal Parke returned from Hawaii last Sunday morning.

Nine vessels were lying at Mahukona, weather bound, last Saturday.

The Chinamen's distillery at Waipio, Hawaii, has been found and broken up.

The Jennie brought 100 barrels of oil from the whaler Mary and Susan now lying at Kealakekua Bay.

The dog catchers are around. Fifty were caught yesterday. Twelve mangy ones were shot. Fifteen were called for by their owners.

B. K. Holi died suddenly last week at Lihue, Kauai. He was a candidate for the coming Legislature at the last election.

The Chinaman who shot a policeman at Waipio, Hawaii, a short time since, was brought down on the Likelike Sunday.

Mr. S. G. Wilder has imported a diving suit. It will be used to-day for the first time, when a diver will be at work under the Likelike.

The Likelike is expected to bring down 200 tons of sugar this week from Kohala. It will be the first lot of sugar shipped by Railroad to Mahukona.

Passengers per Iwalani, for Windward Ports, yesterday: His Majesty the King, Hon. J. M. Kapena, Mr. J. O. Carter, Capt. Owens, Capt. Reynolds, J. L. Kaulukou, Samuel Maikai, W. L. Kaholokahiki and wife, Chas. Bent, and about 50 deck passengers.

Capt. William Tell, of the City Police, with a posse of men, made a raid on the Chinese wash-houses last Saturday evening, between 8 and 9 o'clock. They succeeded in capturing three Chinamen with opium in their possession. To prevent any escape from the back windows of the houses, a canoe with men in it was placed in the river that runs by. The Chinamen will be tried to-morrow in the Police Court. Another raid was made yesterday, this time on the two-story house on the corner of Chaplain Lane and Nuanu street, two Chinamen were caught.

The following is from our Hilo Correspondent, under date of the 22d inst.:

I have to report the arrival of the bark Sappho, Capt. Closon, 63 days from San Francisco, with 240 barrels Sperm Oil, taken on the passage to this port. She will remain in port about two weeks, to refit for the Arctic.

The Tern Sadie F. Caller, Capt. Larsen, with a cargo of 650 tons of coal, is also in port. She will discharge 300 tons of it here, and take the balance to Honolulu for Messrs. T. H. Davies & Co.

The schooner Malolo has just come to anchor in the bay. She arrived at the Costa Plantation last Sunday, where she has been lying ever since, unable to discharge on account of the bad weather.

The schooner Haleakala has also just arrived, not being able to discharge at the plantations.

The weather still continues terrible. Our roads are one of the things we read of—not mentioning the bridges.

Wm. Stein was drowned on February 12th in this harbor, by the capsizing of his boat.
