A Fitting Tribute

The late ex Senator Stephen M. White was a true friend of independent Hawaii, and we publish the following tribute to him from the Argonaut, a paper politically opposed to the ex-senator:

By the death of ex Senator Stephen M. White the State of California loses the most famous of its native sons. However one may feel with regard to his political opinions, there can be no dispute as to the fact that he was a man of large intellectual force. With a presence that would always attract, a voice so powerful that it could be heard above the din in the most tumultuous assembly, an eloquence that would sway an audience however unfriendly, and a logic that would command respect, he was one of the great orators that this State has produced, and it is small cause for wonder that he rose to the front rank among the statesmen of the country. His career showed the progression through minor positions that every politician must experience, but his evolution was unusually rapid, for he was less than fifty years of age when he passed away, after having reached the highest positions in the gift of the people. After his admission to the bar he made his home in Los Angeles, and a few years later was elected district attorney, in which position he gained a reputation as an able and energetic prosecutor. At the Stockton convention of 1884 he first became known throughout the State, when he was elected chairman and proved his usual executive ability as a presiding officer. Two years later he was chairman of the Democratic State Convention, and at the election that year became a State senator. Being elected president pro tem. of the senate, he succeeded to the position of lieutenant governor when the death of Bartlett promoted Waterman to the gubernatorial chair. It was in the field of national politics, however, that Senator White gained his most conspicuous position. In 1888 he was a delegate to the national convention at St. Louis, and elected chairman. The ability he displayed in this position caused him to be elected as permanent chairman, and nearly made him the Vice-Presidential candidate. In 1893 he was elected United States Senator after a fierce contest in the State legislature. In the Chicago convention of 1896 he organized the silver forces, and, as a consequence, was elected permanent chairman and also head of the platform committee—a very unusual combination of the two highest honors of the convention. The people of California may well feel that they have suffered a serious loss in the death of Stephen M. White.

THE MILITARY APPROPRIATION

After a careful consideration of existing conditions we have come to the conclusion that it would be unwise for the Legislature to cut out the appropriation for the National Guard of Hawaii.

If the peace of the Territory is to be preserved and the citizens are to feel safe in a land which will be swamped by negroes and Porto Ricans, we must have trained men who can be depended on in an emergency. The police force is excellent, we all admit, but its numerical strength is absolutely inadequate to cope with circumstances, which undoubtedly will arise. Honolulu may yet be able to take care of herself between the police and the U. S. garrison, but how about the plantation districts where the influx of a most undesirable element continues by every steamer arriving here? There have been serious strikes on Maui, a strike of Porto Ricans has just been reported from Oahu, and the examples will be followed in every district. Eventually this dissatisfied element will leave the plantations, drift to Honolulu en masse, or roam around the country, in bands perhaps, and terrorize the rural districts.

Robbery, rape, arson and other crimes will be the natural results, and where is the protection to be found? In the rural districts we find perhaps two to six policemen—that is if they can be found—but what can these underpaid officers do against a crowd, composed of the vicious element, which "King" Baldwin and his vassals need for their plantations? We can say that the "excellent" reports from Hawaii and Maui in regard to the negroes and Porto Ricans, which appear in newspaper articles, are not supported by private information received in regard to these latest additions to our population. It is well understood that the Porto Ricans will make trouble, as soon as some of them understand the English language, and the negroes openly say that they are only waiting for reinforcement of their own people, when they will make things hot. As we have said Honolulu may yet be able to hold her own, but where would the people of Maui and Hawaii be, if the military companies now organized were disbanded? It is all well and good to talk about citizens' guards and the like, but it takes trained men to cope with a mob, and the citizens' guards, excellent as they may be, are not composed of trained men. A "citizens' guardman" may get a government rifle and keep it "handy" in his bedroom, but when called upon to use the rifle, it is nine to ten that he cannot hit a flock of barns. We urge the country members of the Legislature to carefully consider the conditions as they are today or will be in the near future in their respective constituencies, before they strike out from the appropri-

tion bill the amount asked for the territorial military.

Every Territory and State have militias, and that it is the wish of the government at Washington that we shall continue our volunteers, can be seen by the fact that an appropriation there was granted for the assistance of a militia in the Territory of Hawaii. We believe in retrenchment where it can be had without injurious results, but we believe first and foremost in the safety of our families and ourselves.

TOPICS OF THE DAY.

"The remark of Solicitor-General Richards in his argument in the Supreme Court in the Hawaiian insular case, that 'if it were desirable to do so, Congress could part with Hawaii, as it could with the Philippines, because neither is a part of the Union,' has spread like wildfire among the natives, who are seeking to so direct the efforts of the Hawaiian members of the legislature as will, in their judgment, lead to the undoing of annexation and the restoration of the independence of Hawaii and the Hawaiian flag."

So says the Argonaut which must have been misinformed. We don't think the Hawaiians have paid the slightest attention to the remarks of the Solicitor General.

Adjoining the Sanitary Steam Laundry at Kawaiahae is a good sized lot owned by the government and at present used as dumping ground for rubbish, not a very "sanitary" method. We suggest to the authorities to have the lot cleaned up to be used for the numerous children in the vicinity as a play ground. The district, in which the lot is located, is thickly populated by poor people living in tenement houses, and the streets are the only place, where the large number of children, belonging to these people, can get some fresh (?) air and have a chance to run around as children ought to do. It is not a "sanitary" system to have small children confined in a tenement house, especially in a country like this, where the creator intended the people to live in the balmy air of the breezes from the Pacific. The mothers of these children cannot take them for a walk or out to the Park. The mothers are at work, sewing, washing, doing the chores in families, making swipes, playing che fa, or 7 and 11, all serious occupation, which cannot be neglected for the sake of the health of the children. It won't cost a great deal to get the lot in proper shape, and a great benefit will be done to the poor little ones. Let us have the playground.

At the Opera House.

Every seat in the Opera House was taken on Saturday evening in spite of counter attractions when "The Girl I Left Behind Me" was presented by the Belasco-Thall Company.

Miss Florence Roberts was brilliant as ever in the part as Kate Kenyon, and she was greeted with great enthusiasm by the appreciative audience.

There is not much to the play in itself, but it took the fancy of the audience and all through it Miss Roberts was well sustained by the other members of the company.

Tomorrow evening Lewis Morrison will make his first appearance in Honolulu in "Rochelle," which during the week will be followed by the "Merchant of Venice" and "Faust."

People who wish to witness a high class dramatic acting should secure tickets in advance because it is sure that the repertoire for this week will draw crowded houses.

A three story building will be erected on Merchant Street on land adjoining the former Gulick premises by Judge Humphreys, and The Republican will occupy the whole building which it is expected will be finished in August next.

THE FAIR AND LUAU.

The Maternity Home Thronged With People.

The fair and luau given on Saturday for the benefit of the Kapiolani Maternity Home was an unusual success. From 2 o'clock in the afternoon to nearly midnight a large crowd of people were coming and going. They enjoyed the luau a la Hawaiian or the tempting dishes served at the "foreign" table and they spent their money in a lavish manner at the different booths where refreshments, curios, fancy work, flowers, ice cream, etc. etc., were obtainable. Queen Liliuokalani presided in a beautiful decorated booth where there was a large demand for ribbons on which she placed her autograph. The decoration of the whole place was beautiful and the scene presented a charming night with the crowds of merry well dressed ladies, girls and children among whom mingled the shriners, officers from the men of war in port and the men from the town. Berger's band was in attendance and in the evening there was dancing. The financial success was splendid and it is estimated that the Home will be richer by about \$3,000, the best result of any of the annual fairs yet given. Great credit is due to the ladies who had the affair in hand and to Prince David Kawana-kaoa, who had devoted much time and assisted greatly in scoring the success, and to Mr. Ernest Parker whose exquisite artistic taste was seen in the decoration of several of the booths and in the prettily painted candy packages. The strangers who were present enjoyed themselves very much, took snap shots and everything and everybody and asked innumerable questions. The Competitive Drill.

There was a very large crowd at the grounds outside the Drill Shed on Saturday evening to witness the competitive drill of four companies of the National Guard of Hawaii. It was a merry crowd and the green of colors of Ireland were in evidence on many coats in honor of St. Patrick, the patron saint and snake killer of the Emerald Island. Let us hope that it wasn't necessary for him to take up his old profession yesterday.

Governor Dole and staff, was present as were several members of the Legislature and officers from the men-of-war.

Those taking part in the contest were Company F, Captain S. Johnson; Company G, Captain Charles Wilcox; Company C, Captain M. Costa, and Company E, Captain L. J. Nahora Hipa.

For the four companies who competed there were three prizes: 1st—Trophy cup and seventy-five dollars; 2nd—fifty dollars; third—twenty-five dollars.

The companies competing went through the following exercises:

To form the company. Fall in, Alignment, Beats, Facings. Open Ranks, Inspection Arms, Close Ranks, Complete Manual of Arms, Loading and Firing, Turn a halt, Turn and advance. Being in line, march by the flank. Being in line, march column of fours to the front. Oblique in column of fours and resume the direct march. On right (or left) into line. Right (or left) front into line. Pass obstacles. Being in column of fours, form column of twos or files. Being in column of twos or files, form column of fours. Being in line, form column of platoons to the right or left. Being in line, form column of platoons to the front. Being in column of platoons, form company to the front.

Soldierly bearing, appearance, silence in the ranks and maintaining correct distances was also considered part of the drill and was marked accordingly.

In the extended order the field tactics included:

Being in column of fours, form line of squads to the front. Being in line of squads, deploy as skirmishers. Rally by squads, or platoons; Assemble. Being in column of fours; form line of squads to the right or left. Deploy; Lie down; Fire three volleys. Being in line, deploy as skirmishers on center squad. Change direction to the right or left. Advance by rushes. Rapid Fire. To the charge. Charge.

The standing of the various companies in the National Guard of Hawaii at the conclusion of the competitive drill was as follows:

1st—Co. F—Standing.....	94.00%
2nd—Co. G— ".....	86.07%
3rd—Co. E— ".....	83.08%
4th—Co. C— ".....	74.09%

Great cheering hailed the announcement that Co. F was the winner and then the crowd dispersed.

The showing of the men and the efficiency of the officers was highly creditable to the National Guard and to Colonel J. W. Jones, in command of the regiment.

Where Was Aggravation?

The match race between Tom Hollinger's Aggravation and Virgie A, the black mare belonging to Lieutenant G. R. Hancock and Al. Moore, came off on Saturday afternoon.

The race was for a purse of \$500 a side and the betting was very heavy, over \$5000 changing hands.

The race as a sporting event was rather uninteresting, but the results were mighty interesting to the backers of Aggravation who walked to town, and to the backers of Virgie A who went home "four-in-hand."

Opiopio was up on Aggravation but certainly didn't sustain his reputation as a jockey, and Nichols rode Virgie A.

The judges were Charles T. Wilder, Edgar Halstead and J. R. Shaw; starters, L. H. Dee and Charles Newman and C. H. Judd, and Frank Halstead acted as time keepers.

A Fitting Tribute

The late ex Senator Stephen M. White was a true friend of independent Hawaii, and we publish the following tribute to him from the Argonaut, a paper politically opposed to the ex-senator:

By the death of ex Senator Stephen M. White the State of California loses the most famous of its native sons. However one may feel with regard to his political opinions, there can be no dispute as to the fact that he was a man of large intellectual force. With a presence that would always attract, a voice so powerful that it could be heard above the din in the most tumultuous assembly, an eloquence that would sway an audience however unfriendly, and a logic that would command respect, he was one of the great orators that this State has produced, and it is small cause for wonder that he rose to the front rank among the statesmen of the country. His career showed the progression through minor positions that every politician must experience, but his evolution was unusually rapid, for he was less than fifty years of age when he passed away, after having reached the highest positions in the gift of the people. After his admission to the bar he made his home in Los Angeles, and a few years later was elected district attorney, in which position he gained a reputation as an able and energetic prosecutor. At the Stocken convention of 1884 he first became known throughout the State, when he was elected chairman and proved his usual executive ability as a presiding officer. Two years later he was chairman of the Democratic State Convention, and at the election that year became a State senator. Being elected president pro tem. of the senate, he succeeded to the position of lieutenant governor when the death of Bartlett promoted Waterman to the gubernatorial chair. It was in the field of national politics, however, that Senator White gained his most conspicuous position. In 1888 he was a delegate to the national convention at St. Louis, and elected chairman. The ability he displayed in this position caused him to be elected as permanent chairman, and nearly made him the Vice-Presidential candidate. In 1893 he was elected United States Senator after a fierce contest in the State legislature. In the Chicago convention of 1896 he organized the silver forces, and, as a consequence, was elected permanent chairman and also head of the platform committee—a very unusual combination of the two highest honors of the convention. The people of California may well feel that they have suffered a serious loss in the death of Stephen M. White.

THE MILITARY APPROPRIATION

After a careful consideration of existing conditions we have come to the conclusion that it would be unwise for the Legislature to cut out the appropriation for the National Guard of Hawaii.

If the peace of the Territory is to be preserved and the citizens are to feel safe in a land which will be swamped by negroes and Porto Ricans, we must have trained men who can be depended on in an emergency. The police force is excellent, we all admit, but its numerical strength is absolutely inadequate to cope with circumstances, which undoubtedly will arise. Honolulu may yet be able to take care of herself between the police and the U. S. garrison, but how about the plantation districts where the influx of a most undesirable element continues by every steamer arriving here? There have been serious strikes on Maui, a strike of Porto Ricans has just been reported from Oahu, and the examples will be followed in every district. Eventually this dissatisfied element will leave the plantations, drift to Honolulu en masse, or roam around the country, in bands perhaps, and terrorize the rural districts.

Robbery, rape, arson and other crimes will be the natural results, and where is the protection to be found? In the rural districts we find perhaps two to six policemen—that is if they can be found—but what can these underpaid officers do against a crowd, composed of the vicious element, which "King" Baldwin and his vassals need for their plantations? We can say that the "excellent" reports from Hawaii and Maui in regard to the negroes and Porto Ricans, which appear in newspaper articles, are not supported by private information received in regard to these latest additions to our population. It is well understood that the Porto Ricans will make trouble, as soon as some of them understand the English language, and the negroes openly say that they are only waiting for reinforcement of their own people, when they will make things hot. As we have said Honolulu may yet be able to hold her own, but where would the people of Maui and Hawaii be, if the military companies now organized were disbanded? It is all well and good to talk about citizens' guards and the like, but it takes trained men to cope with a mob, and the citizens' guards, excellent as they may be, are not composed of trained men. A "citizens' guardman" may get a government rifle and keep it "handy" in his bedroom, but when called upon to use the rifle, it is nine to ten that he cannot hit a flock of barns. We urge the country members of the Legislature to carefully consider the conditions as they are today or will be in the near future in their respective constituencies, before they strike out from the appropri-

tion bill the amount asked for the territorial military.

Every Territory and State have militias, and that it is the wish of the government at Washington that we shall continue our volunteers, can be seen by the fact that an appropriation there was granted for the assistance of a militia in the Territory of Hawaii. We believe in retrenchment where it can be had without injurious results, but we believe first and foremost in the safety of our families and ourselves.

"The remark of Solicitor-General Richards in his argument in the Supreme Court in the Hawaiian insular case, that 'if it were desirable to do so, Congress could part with Hawaii, as it could with the Philippines, because neither is a part of the Union,' has spread like wildfire among the natives, who are seeking to so direct the efforts of the Hawaiian members of the legislature as will, in their judgment, lead to the undoing of annexation and the restoration of the independence of Hawaii and the Hawaiian flag."

So says the Argonaut which must have been misinformed. We don't think the Hawaiians have paid the slightest attention to the remarks of the Solicitor General.

Adjoining the Sanitary Steam Laundry at Kawaiahaeo is a good sized lot owned by the government and at present used as dumping ground for rubbish, not a very "sanitary" method. We suggest to the authorities to have the lot cleaned up to be used for the numerous children in the vicinity as a play ground. The district, in which the lot is located, is thickly populated by poor people living in tenement houses, and the streets are the only place, where the large number of children, belonging to these people, can get some fresh (?) air and have a chance to run around as children ought to do. It is not a "sanitary" system to have small children confined in a tenement house, especially in a country like this, where the creator intended the people to live in the balmy air of the breezes from the Pacific. The mothers of these children cannot take them for a walk or out to the Park. The mothers are at work, sewing, washing, doing the chores in families, making swipes, playing the fa, or 7 and 11, all serious occupation, which cannot be neglected for the sake of the health of the children. It won't cost a great deal to get the lot in proper shape, and a great benefit will be done to the poor little ones. Let us have the playground.

At the Opera House.

Every seat in the Opera House was taken on Saturday evening in spite of counter attractions when "The Girl I Left Behind Me" was presented by the Belasco-Thall Company.

Miss Florence Roberts was brilliant as ever in the part as Kate Kenyon, and she was greeted with great enthusiasm by the appreciative audience.

There is not much to the play in itself, but it took the fancy of the audience and all through it Miss Roberts was well sustained by the other members of the company.

Tomorrow evening Lewis Morrison will make his first appearance in Honolulu in "Rochelieu," which during the week will be followed by the "Merchant of Venice" and "Faust."

People who wish to witness a high class dramatic acting should secure tickets in advance because it is sure that the repertoire for this week will draw crowded houses.

The Competitive Drill.

There was a very large crowd at the grounds outside the Drill Shed on Saturday evening to witness the competitive drill of four companies of the National Guard of Hawaii. It was a merry crowd and the green of colors of Ireland were in evidence on many coats in honor of St. Patrick, the patron saint and snake killer of the Emerald Island. Let us hope that it wasn't necessary for him to take up his old profession yesterday.

Governor Dole and staff was present as were several members of the Legislature and officers from the men-of-war.

Those taking part in the contest were Company F, Captain S. Johnson; Company G, Captain Charles Wilcox; Company C, Captain M. Costa, and Company E, Captain L. J. Nahora Hipa.

For the four companies who competed there were three prizes; 1st—Trophy cup and seventy-five dollars; 2nd—fifty dollars; third—twenty-five dollars.

The companies competing went through the following exercises:

To form the company. Fall in, Alignment, Beats, Facings. Open Ranks, Inspection Arms, Close Ranks, Complete Manual of Arms, Loading and Firing, Turn a halt, Turn and advance. Being in line, march by the flank. Being in line, march column of fours to the front. Oblique in column of fours and resume the direct march. On right (or left) into line. Right (or left) front into line. Pass obstacles. Being in column of fours, form column of twos or files. Being in column of twos or files, form column of fours. Being in line, form column of platoons to the right or left. Being in line, form column of platoons to the front. Being in column of platoons, form company to the front.

Soldierly bearing, appearance, silence in the ranks and maintaining correct distances was also considered part of the drill and was marked accordingly.

In the extended order the field tactics included:

Being in column of fours, form line of squads to the front. Being in line of squads, deploy as skirmishers. Rally by squads, or platoons; Assemble. Being in column of fours; form line of squads to the right or left. Deploy; Lie down; Fire three volleys. Being in line, deploy as skirmishers on center squad. Change direction to the right or left. Advance by rushes. Rapid Fire. To the charge. Charge.

The standing of the various companies in the National Guard of Hawaii at the conclusion of the competitive drill was as follows:

1st—Co. F—Standing.....	94.00%
2nd—Co. G— ".....	86.07%
3rd—Co. E— ".....	83.08%
4th—Co. C— ".....	74.09%

Great cheering hailed the announcement that Co. F was the winner and then the crowd dispersed.

The showing of the men and the efficiency of the officers was highly creditable to the National Guard and to Colonel J. W. Jones, in command of the regiment.
