THE WRITING ON THE WALL.

The Thurston organ is very much worried because there is a possibility that the property qualification for voters to the Hawaiian Senate as arranged in the Cullom bill will be stricken out and that the "adventurers" will be able to control the Hawaiian vote as they did in the days when the Advertiser adventurer had not yet arrived on our beach.

We think that Mr. Thurston's organ is borrowing trouble because we don't think that there is a scintilla of a chance to pass a Hawaiian territorial bill during this session of Congress. Of course we would like to see a final form of government established here but how can we expect it whenever the administration organ, the New York Tribune, says that "it is not to be supposed that Congress will adopt a territorial policy for any of our new possessions."

The American farmers and workmen don't want any act of Congress which will be a menace to them and bring them into competition with Hawaiian sugar barons and their coolies. They will prefer to let the Hawaiian question stand over till moved on.

As far as we are concerned here we have no objection to offer against a property qualification for voters. We feel confident that Mr. Thurston and his clique will be snowed under in such a manner that they will never endeavor to enter the political field again. The Advertiser evidently does not understand that the feeling against the "missionary" gang is such that it would be fruitless for any of them even to run for office on Molokai, Mr. Thurston's old stamping grounds. It is not the Hawaiians only who are opposed to the Advertiser clique. It is the leading and richest foreigners, the Portuguese colony and the Asiatic merchants. The ex-royalists, as the Advertiser talk about, need not exert themselves in upholding an opposition towards the small minority represented by the Advertiser; the "best" men of this community from Niihau to Puna will see that at the first election the missionary vampires are snowed under politically for good and forever.

A Suspicious Case.

Dr. Jobe this morning discovered a slightly suspicious case at the house of S. K. Ka-ne in School street. The patient is a Japanese and the report was sent in by Mr. Ka-ne himself. The man has been removed to the suspect hospital where he will be carefully watched. Following is Dr. Jobe's statement to the Board of Health regarding the case: "Temperature, 101; pulse, 120, and feeble; eyes, injected; lymphatics rather too prominent in both inguinal regions, but not tender, so he says; tongue furred and edges red. Retribution for Rats

The Citizens' Sanitary Committee have arranged the following program for the destruction of plague conveying rats:

1. Date of the contemplated massacre; Thursday and Friday afternoon and evening next.
2. All who have traps are to set them on those days. They who have not are to use poison which may be obtained from the Sanitary Committee or Benson, Smith & Co. This poison is specially concocted for the purpose. The poison can be purchased very cheap.
3. Containers with water, easily accessible, should be placed near the poison as the rats on feeling the pangs of the poison fly to water.
4. Dead rats must not be handled nor permitted to touch any part of the body. Saturate them with kerosene and burn them. The stick or shovel removing them should be submitted to fire.
5. The poison should be well scattered.
6. The number of rats killed are to be reported to the sub-inspectors of each apana.
7. Extreme caution must be used to keep the poison out of the reach of children, fowls and domestic animals. The poison should be collected very early in the morning and safely stored away.

LOCAL AND GENERAL NEWS.

Miss Mary H. Krout, the talented correspondent of the Chicago Inter-Ocean and author of an interesting book on Hawaii, passed through on the Coptic after a tour of China and Japan in the interests of her journal.

A. G. Silva, a well-known Portuguese died yesterday at his residence at Miller street. The deceased was 64 years of age and leaves several sons prominent in the Portuguese colony. The cause of death was pneumonia.

Two Japanese who had changed their residence without a permit was each fined \$5, in the district court this morning. A fine of \$10, was imposed on the Japanese boy who ran away from the premises of T. B. Murray, because he thought he had the plague.

New passes are being issued from the Marshal's office allowing the bearers entrance into the quarantined districts. The passes will not allow an entrance into block 19. Special passes for that purposes will have to be obtained from the Board of Health.

Mr. Chester Doyle returns thanks for the literary contributions forwarded to the drill shed camp this morning, but considerable more is wanted. Narrow gauge matter is not required the material should be cut on broad gauge interestingly picturesque lines.

The Japanese Methodist Episcopal Church will hold services to-morrow at Waikahalulu church, School street, between Nuuanu street and School street bridge, at 11 a. m. and 7:30 p. m., Sunday school 10 a. m., Prayer meeting Wednesday evening at 7:30 o'clock.

When the Kaimiloa was taken to the Marine Railway it was found that her bottom was covered with the large pearl barnacles of the South Seas from which the natives manufacture something similar to the mother of pearl of commerce. They were soon gathered up.

The body of Walter, the four year old son of Mr. T. Tieman, engineer of Ewa plantation, who died yesterday was brought to town by this morning's train and buried from E. A. Williams' undertaking parlors under the kindly supervision of Mr. W. W. Wright. Rev. H. H. Parker was the officiating clergyman.

TOPICS OF THE DAY.

The Kaimiloa, around which linger so many unpleasant incidents of crass perversity and folly of *Lancien regime* is being converted into a lighter; after having ruined a monarch, disgraced a premier, and caused a constitutional revolution.

This is the way in which the New York public opinion writes of our condition of temporary ill health: "Surgeon Carmichael, of the Marine Hospital service at Honolulu, reports an uneasy feeling there as the result of the ravages of the bubonic plague, which, in spite of the efforts of the Hawaiian authorities, appears to be on the increase. There have been 23 deaths from the plague since Dec. 12," (issue of January 25th)." Forsooth: this is a magnificent advertisement for Hawaii, and all through the Dole administration neglecting sanitary precautions to attend to annexation politics.

It is a compliment to Honolulu that U. S. Surgeon-General Wyman has expressed satisfaction and approval with the manner in which the plague scare has been handled in Honolulu. In course of time Americans will learn that we are not all "benighted pagans" as the annexation press strove to make us out prior to the raising of the flag. We are as much entitled to the highest privileges of American citizenship as the proudest and oldest State in the Union in spite of the Asiatic hordes that our missionary multimillionaires have assembled on our once happy and peaceful shores.

From January 8th to February 10 there have been landed at this port 4,356 Japanese and Chinese and still Mr. Dole and his planter compatriots would have us believe that their hearts yearn to make these islands the tropic home of the yeomanry of America. Mr. Dole prates about homesteads for American farmers and then permits the importation of thousands of Orientals to compete with white men; to fix standards of wages and diet and fifteen dollars a month and rice and soy. Out upon such rank hypocrisy. About all of the common sense of the Advertiser outfit seems to be concentrated in the Saturday morning sermons of that paper.

A Big Improvement.

E. B. Thomas, the well-known contractor has asked permission to erect a modern building on the corner of King and Smith streets and as soon as the quarantine is raised on that district the permission will undoubtedly be granted and Mr. Thomas expects to have the new building ready within 90 days.

The new building will be composed of steel, iron and plated glass framing nine pillars erected of bricks. The block will be about 15 feet high and will contain more steel iron and plate glass than even the Judd building does.

Mr. Thomas has built more solid blocks in this town than any other contractor has and he feels proud of adding one fine addition to the business center of Honolulu. The new building will have a frontage of sixty feet on King street and eighty feet on Konia street and will in all respects be up-to-date. The builders' yard now on the premises will be removed at once. The only regret Mr. Thomas entertains is the possible departure of his gold fish which have live in a large tub during the past seven years and which actually come to the surface and eat the crumbs of bread from the hand of Mr. Thomas upon his call.

We hope that other property holders will follow the example of Mr. Thomas and cause that part of the city to be a modern, sanitary business quarter.

BY AUTHORITY.

SANITARY REGULATIONS OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH FOR HONOLULU DISTRICT.

The following regulations shall
 apply to, and be in force within, the
 portion of Honolulu described as
 follows:

Beginning at the seashore, at the
 west corner of Loko Kuwili 2 near
 the east corner of the Kapalama
 Detention Camp and running mauka,
 along the Waipilopilo road to the
 old line of the Oahu Railway, thence
 along Oahu Railway to the boundary
 of Maunakea, thence mauka, along
 the Mokauea boundary and the Ka-
 lihi road to the survey station at the
 lower end of Mokauea ridge, thence
 in a straight line to the survey sta-
 tion above the north end of Wyllie
 street, thence along the central line
 of Wyllie street to Nuuanu street,
 thence in a straight line to the forks
 of the Manoa road, thence in a
 straight line to the corner of the
 Waialae road and the Kapahulu
 road, thence down the Kapahulu
 road and along Campbell Avenue to
 Monsarrat road, and thence in a
 direct line over the summit of Dia-
 mond Head to the seashore at high
 water line, and thence to the initial
 point.

REGARDING BUILDINGS AND YARDS

RAIN WATER.

1. Where the space between the
 buildings is less than fifteen feet,
 the water from the roofs of the
 buildings on the sides of such space
 shall be conducted in water tight
 leaders and made to discharge into
 suitable drains leading into street or
 alley gutters; and if the building
 abuts on an alley or roadway of like
 width the same rule shall apply.

AIR SPACE BETWEEN BUILDINGS.

2. There shall be a clear air space
 of ten feet between all buildings
 except those fronting on a street.
 No building except such as fronts
 on a street shall be built within five
 feet of a boundary line. The word
 "buildings" in this paragraph shall
 be construed to mean and include
 sheds, lean-tos, privies, and all other
 structures.

LIGHT AND VENTILATION OF DWELLINGS.

3. Each and every room intend-
 ed or used for human habitation
 shall be provided with at least eight
 square feet of window area having
 unobstructed access into the open
 air for each 100 square feet of floor
 space in said room, and free access
 shall at all times be had to the same
 by the occupants of the room; and
 at least one-half of such window
 space shall be movable and available
 for ventilation.

AIR SPACE UNDER BUILDINGS.

4. Every building shall have on
 an average at least twenty inches of
 clear space for the circulation of air
 between the floor timbers and the
 ground, and shall have sufficient
 openings for ventilation in the outer
 walls to admit a free circulation of
 air; but, in case this air space cannot
 be secured without reaching "ground
 water level" then there shall be no
 air space, but the floor shall be of
 concrete or masonry.

YARDS, AREAS, COURTS, ETC.

5. Yards, areas, courts, alleyways
 and other open spaces within or be-
 tween buildings, where water is used
 for washing of any kind, shall be
 properly graded and cemented, or
 paved so as to be water proof, and
 drained into trapped drains properly
 connected with sewer or cesspool,
 and no permanent wooden floor or
 grating shall be maintained over the
 same.

WATER TIGHT FLOORS.

6. All houses, structures, rooms
 or parts thereof, in which water is
 used or intended to be used, in such
 quantity as to render the floor or
 floors thereof constantly damp, shall
 have such floor or floors, made abso-
 lutely waterproof, with proper drain-
 age into trapped leaders conveying
 the water away into cesspool or
 sewer; and the water proofing of all
 such floors shall be done in a man-
 ner satisfactory to the Board of
 Health.

7. No building or structure shall
 be used as a residence or place for
 human habitation or abode which is
 situated upon land where there is
 standing water within eighteen in-
 ches of the surface of the ground;
 nor shall any building or structure
 be so used that is placed on land
 that has been made by filling in with
 refuse or garbage, or that is declared
 by the Board of Health to be of
 foul or corrupt material.

REGARDING PRIVY-VAULTS AND CESSPOOL.

8. No privy-vault, sink or cess-
 pool in Honolulu, shall hereafter be
 located or constructed within fifty

feet of any stream, lake, pond, well
 or spring of water, nor within two
 feet of the line of any lot; nor shall
 it be made more than eighteen or
 less than six feet deep, or placed in
 such a position that it is not easily
 accessible for emptying and clean-
 ing.

9. When deemed necessary by
 the Board of Health, the sides and
 bottom of any privy-vault, sink or
 cesspool, shall be made either wholly
 or in part water tight, so as to pre-
 vent any saturation of the ground
 about the said vault, sink or cess-
 pool, and shall be provided with
 suitable ventilating arrangement.

10. No structure or cover shall
 be put upon or over any privy-vault,
 sink or cesspool, until it has been
 inspected by the proper Agent of
 the Board of Health and approved as
 meeting the requirements of these
 regulations and of public health.

11. Any privy-vault, sink or cess-
 pool, already constructed in Hono-
 lulu which has become a nuisance,
 or in any way dangerous to life or
 detrimental to health, shall be re-
 moved, re-constructed, or altered to
 meet the requirements of these re-
 gulations and of public health, as
 directed by the Board of Health or
 its Agent.

12. The Board of Health or its
 Agents may cause the emptying or
 disinfecting of any privy-vault, sink
 or cesspool that may be deemed of-
 fensive, or when required by public
 health, at the expense of the owner
 or occupant of the premises.

13. Within thirty days after the
 public sewer system is put into
 operation the use of privy vaults
 and cesspools shall be entirely dis-
 continued within the limits of such
 sewer system, and all privies shall
 be removed, except in so far as per-
 mission may be granted by the
 Board of Health to transform the
 same into approved water closets
 connected with the sewer system.

14. No privy-vault or cesspool
 shall be excavated or maintained
 within ten feet from any dwelling-
 house or inhabited building or cook-
 house or place where cooking is
 done.

15. No privy vault or cesspool
 shall be maintained or excavated in
 any place where for any reason free
 and unimpeded access may not be
 had to the same by an excavator
 cart.

16. No privy shall be built or
 maintained so as to entirely cover
 the cesspool or vault under the
 same, but the cesspool or vault shall
 project out on one side beyond the
 superstructure in such a manner as
 to allow the inspection and removal
 of the contents of said cesspool or
 vault. The contents of any privy
 vault or cesspool shall not be allow-
 ed to rise within eighteen inches of
 the top of the same or to such a
 height as to flow out onto the sur-
 face of the ground.

17. No cesspools or privy vault
 shall be built or maintained in any
 location except the same shall have
 a substantial water-tight curb which
 shall retain the earth without and
 the contents of the cesspool or vault
 within, and shall be provided with a
 substantial water-tight cover, hav-
 ing a small, movable lid in the same
 to facilitate examination and re-
 moval of the contents.

18. All cesspool or privy vaults
 shall have four-inch cast-iron vent
 pipes with caulked lead joints, or
 galvanized iron pipes, extending not
 less than twelve feet into the open
 air, and if within twenty feet of an
 inhabited building the top of such
 vent pipes shall extend above the
 roof of the highest building within
 a distance of twenty feet of the same.
 All such vent pipes shall run as
 direct as possible. Every privy
 shall have proper seats with hinged
 lids to cover the opening of same,
 which shall be kept closed when not
 in use.

19. All connections to cesspools
 or privy vaults shall be made with
 cast iron, lead, or vitrified sewer
 pipe. All urinals shall be connected
 to cesspools, vaults or sewer by
 trapped waste pipes.

20. All cesspools shall be prop-
 erly cleaned out at once, and here-
 after at least once every four
 months, and shall be thoroughly
 disinfected at least once each week
 with such disinfectant as the Board
 of Health shall direct; all such
 cleaning and disinfecting to be at
 the expense of the owner of the
 property.

21. All waste, soil, sewer or drain
 pipes shall be of cast iron, lead or
 vitrified clay. If of iron or lead the
 joints shall be caulked with molten
 lead; if of vitrified clay, they shall
 have tight cement joints, all joints
 to be smooth in the inside; open
 drains may be of water tight masonry.

22. All cesspool or privy vaults
 when abandoned and the use there-
 of discontinued shall be at once en-
 tirely emptied of liquid and solid
 contents, and shall be disinfected
 and filled with earth, sand, ashes, or
 other such clean materials; and the
 wooden curbing about the same re-
 moved to a depth of at least four

feet below the surface of the ground.
 In no case shall refuse, garbage or
 any unclean material be used in fill-
 ing such privy vault or cesspool.

23. All buildings and premises
 which do not conform in every re-
 spect to the requirements of the
 foregoing regulations are hereby de-
 clared nuisances and dangerous to
 the public health.

REGARDING GARBAGE.

24. Garbage will be carried away
 free of charge by the Board of
 Health carts within these limits, i.e.:
 School street mauka; Alapai street
 east; Liliha street west; and sea-
 ward by the waterfront.

25. It shall be the duty of each
 house owner, householder, lessee, or
 tenant who is a housekeeper, within
 the district in which the free re-
 moval of garbage is provided, to
 supply, and keep ready for use suit-
 able container or containers, of not
 more than eighteen cubic feet cap-
 acity and provided with tight
 covers, for the reception of all gar-
 bage, and to cause the same to be
 set out in such places and at such
 times as the Board of Health shall
 direct for the convenience of gar-
 bage collectors. All empty containers
 shall be kept clean and thoroughly
 disinfected.

26. Yard scrapings, tree cuttings
 and stable manure will not be re-
 moved by the Board of Health carts.

27. All garbage and refuse which
 is subject to decay shall be collected
 by householder or occupiers of dwell-
 ings each day; and if within the
 limits named in section 24 the same
 shall be placed in containers as pro-
 vided in section 25 for collection;
 and if beyond said limits the same
 shall be burnt or removed.

28. No garbage shall be used for
 filling house lots or other tracts of
 land.

29. No garbage shall be deposited
 in any place not authorized by the
 Board of Health.

Extract from Penal Code:
 "Section 874. Every person who
 shall violate any regulation of the
 Board of Health, after the same
 shall have been published, as pro-
 vided in the last preceding section,
 shall be fined not exceeding one
 hundred dollars."
