THE RAILWAY PROSPERING.

Mr. Dillingham has favored the Bulletin with a printed copy of a special semi-annual report of the Oahu Railway and Land Company for six months ending June 30, 1894. Figures are given showing a gratifying increase in the net gain of the railway business as compared with the preceding six months, and especially as compared with the first six months of 1893. For the first half of this year the net gain was \$20,111.77, the previous six months it was \$16,728.53, and the first six months of 1893 \$5,585.69. For the whole of 1892 the net gain was but \$5,838.33. The year 1891, its second of business, was the best the company ever had—the net gain having been \$31,837.08—but, if the latter half of this year should only be equal to the latter half of 1893, this year will show an increase over 1891. The railway carried 17,625.5 tons of freight the first half of this year. While the traffic has increased, the running expenses have been reduced, which accounts for the large ratio of net gain. Including the ranch and land business, etc., of the company, the total receipts have been \$27,811.12 in excess of expenses. As the interest on bonds is chargeable against the revenue from the sources mentioned, and amounts to \$26,157.70, there is left a balance of \$1,653.42 to the credit of net income. In his concluding remarks Mr. Dillingham says the change in the tariff on sugar in the United States will increase the receipts of road to the company from \$8000 to \$12,000 per annum. There will also be a larger output of sugar, he says, and a consequent increase of freight. Reference is also made by the general manager to the Kahala extension now progressing. It is with great gratification that we record these facts, indicating that Mr. Dillingham's intomitable enterprise, pursued under untold discouragements and at great personal risk, is gradually realizing its rewards, besides the immense benefits to the country resulting from the railway directly and indirectly.

The object of the Salvation Army throughout the world is to "reach the unreached" and they've succeeded in thousands of instances. We do not believe the reformations have always been permanent any more than the efforts of Francis Murphy or the ministrations of Dr. Keeley have proved entirely satisfactory in the matter of intemperance. They, like Mr. Moody, work upon the sympathies of the people, they get them first interested and then enthusiastic, when slap, bang, comes a desire to do better. But because there have been backsliders among the Salvationists or among the people who have once yielded to the persuasive eloquence of the late John B. Gough or a Murphy there is no reason why these reformers should not be encouraged. If a man or woman has gone to the dogs and a curbstone preacher is successful in lifting them up, even temporarily, it is infinitely better than if they had continued on a downward course. Temperance lecturers and Dr. Keeley have been scoffed at because their cures have not been permanent. Suppose they have not! Take, for instance, a man who draws his wages Saturday night and spends it in rum before Monday morning, leaving his wife and children without the necessities of life; "a bad state of affairs you will say." Well, suppose by some means or other he has a year of sobriety, is it not a blessing for his family to have just that one year? Intemperance and crime are close friends and scientific men consider them as diseases, oftentimes hereditary, which like consumption may be cured or relieved according to circumstances.

The Salvationists reach both by getting a hold on one, for it seldom happens that a man who thinks he is religious is a drunkard. We are not giving a lecture on religion nor are we exhorting people to give up their "stout and bitter," nor do we propose to don a red coat and shout hallelujah from one end of town to the other, we merely wish to call your attention to the fact that up to the hour of going to press there has never been a windmill introduced that would compare in any respect with a galvanized steel Aermotor. There are instances right here in Honolulu where wooden mills have been taken down and a steel Aermotor substituted. This has not been done except through a preference for good things, and because people wanted more water than any wooden mill would pump. A little 12 foot wheel out at the Ostrich Farm forces water 65 feet high through six hundred feet of pipe. It will do more than that but it happens that nothing more is required. A gentleman called on us the other day and wanted a mill and pump that would raise the water fifty feet and force it through thirty-two hundred feet of pipe. We guarantee to do it and never turn a hair. We have never heard of a wooden mill of the same size that would do it, some day there may be one made but we doubt it because the tastes of the people run toward lighter material. The Aermotor has been tried here and is no longer an experiment. When a customer calls upon us to purchase one we first ascertain the work to be done; if it is within the power of a windmill to do it we say so and then guarantee it; we have never had to take a mill back.

A HOME INDUSTRY.

Prosperity and Purity Promoted by a Local Corporation. No doubt there are many articles of domestic consumption now entirely imported which might with profit be produced at home.

In this regard capital at the back of enterprise might keep much money at home which is now going abroad, besides furnishing employment to many skilled and common laborers. This idea has been put in practice with gratifying success by the Honolulu Soap Works Company, which operates the only soap factory in these islands.

A reporter of the BULLETIN, curious to see and describe the process of making soap, visited the works yesterday. He was shown all over them by Mr. Johnson the manager. The factory has been in operation for some years. It does not transmute a mixture of grease and refuse matter into a base counterfeit of the cleansing agent, but makes a pure article of laundry soap out of pure tallow, rosin, caustic soda (lye), sal soda and palm oil. Positively no other ingredients and no adulterants are employed.

Mr. Johnson says the works render their own tallow from Hawaiian-bred stock, so that the soap must be pure. The company now buys and uses the entire output of tallow in the islands, and, as an inducement to the country butchers to save their tallow, has steadily advanced prices since starting in the business. The plant at Iwilei will now be briefly described from actual observation. Into a large kettle holding 20,000 pounds, rising from the ground through the second floor and fed from the upper story, all the ingredients are put. Steam is turned on and into the mass of tallow, etc., through perforated inch pipes running from the boiler over the side and down into the bottom of the kettle. After a certain period of "bubble, bubble, toil and trouble," as in the witches' cauldron of Macbeth, the now liquid and thoroughly mixed mass is run into vats. There it is mixed with the soda and thence carried to the soap frames, of which there are 16 holding 1100lb. each. In the frames the mass is allowed to cool. It is now good honest soap. The frames are removed, each bearing a huge cake of soap weighing 1100lb. No housewife wants a cake of soap of this size, any more than she does a mammoth cheese like that shown at the World's Fair. Consequently the cake is cut up into convenient sizes. To have this done it is placed in a slabbing machine, which is a very simple affair, being nothing more or less than a large wooden frame into which this big piece of soap fits to a nicety on a sliding seat. Two upright posts at one end with a wire across complete the machine. The soap is then pressed against the wire, which cuts it into slabs the thickness of the bars. These slabs are in turn placed in the cutter (a similar device) and cut into bars of the desired sizes. The beautiful glossy yellow soap is then taken to the packing room, where it is packed in boxes of 100 pounds each, the boxes being made on the premises. It is then removed to the warehouses of the company on Queen street ready for shipment. M. W. McChesney & Sons are the agents of the company. It is located at the agency that the present output of the factory is 16,000 pounds a week, but with the daily increasing patronage the company will be compelled to enlarge its plant. The soap is sold in retail by all dealers. Every bar is stamped with the words, "Honolulu Soap Works," without which none is Hawaiian soap.

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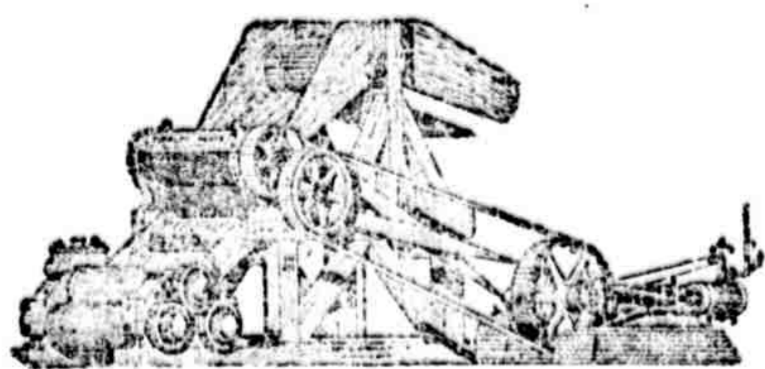
