A QUESTION OF NOMENCLATURE.

Judge Cooley's Forum argument resolves itself to a matter of names. He expresses doubt that a "Provisional" government has the right to transfer a country, over the destinies of which it has acquired guardianship. Naturally he does not affect to deny that a republican, oligarchical or other regular and established form of authority could make an annexation treaty—in which, event all we should have to do in the way of getting jurisdiction would be to reorganize Hawaii under a republican dictatorship, and proceed at once to business.

For example: The present Government, exercising the powers vested in it by a successful revolution, could impose an educational and property tax on the suffrage, following thereby an American State precedent, and call an election to choose the rulers of a Hawaiian republic. As the great preponderance of the wealth and intelligence of these Islands is on the Annexationist side, the result would be a President and Legislature in hearty sympathy with the policy of union with the United States, and fully empowered, as Judge Cooley must admit, to make an Annexation treaty.

ANNEXATION'S SOLID BACKING.

We print to-day a complete list of Hawaiian citizens and residents who pay taxes on an excess of \$10,000, classifying each name according to the owner's political views and preferences. To ascertain these, the signatures upon the Annexation Club roll have been consulted, personal expressions have been secured, "common fame" has been somewhat relied upon and the services of people of widest acquaintance on the Islands have been obtained to review the roster and perfect its showing. To make assurance doubly sure the STAR has already given the list a wide publicity and has every few days asked its readers to send it any information at their hand which might make the exhibit more complete. Several corrections have been handed in and noted down. As a result we are able this evening to prove the truth of Claus Spreckels' February statement to the San Francisco Examiner that a vast preponderance of the wealth of the Hawaiian Islands is enlisted against the Monarchy and on the side of annexation to the United States.

HILO, June 15.—If history has a habit of repeating itself, Kamehameha day just past, shows but a sorry exhibition of the rule, for there has been little, if any, of the attendant festivities which usually go to make that day a gala one among Hawaiians. The day opened with regular old-fashioned Hilo weather, and the cats and dogs which tumbled in profusion from the sky during the morning soon converted many of the streets into muddy canals. The weather clerk failed to get over his ugly mood till about noon, after which the sun took a hasty peep at things, and finally emerged giving us a beautiful afternoon.

Whether it is the dampness that has rendered the Kamehameha day celebration more merciful this season than at other times, the fact remains that there have been fewer walls of agony from the persecuted pig which at such times is ruthlessly slaughtered to cater to the Hawaiians' inner wants. The lanais and luau have been but few, and the usual cavalcade of peacock wreathed hats and maile leis sweeping through the streets this year non est. Only occasionally some dusky rider, with spirits afire from superindulgence in aguardiente, would race by shouting defiance at phlegmatic policemen.

So that taken altogether, June 11th just passed has proven rather a lugubrious anniversary, unless the predictions of our Aloha Aina friends that the ex-Queen would be reinstated on that day, a report which has been circulating here for some time, shall prove to have been borne out in fact.

The unprecedented spell of sultry weather that has held reign so long is probably the underlying cause of so much sickness around lately. A regular epidemic has been raging here, and there is hardly a family but one or more of its members are *hors de combat* with la grippe. Even our genial Dr. Williams has been laid low on a bed of sickness for some time, so that now the mission of healing all devolves upon Dr. Frances Wetmore, and what would happen if she were to prove vulnerable to the insidious malady is a contingency we would rather not contemplate.

How different the climate on the rolling upland slopes of Mauna Kea. There one feels none of that lassitude or the debilitating effects such as are induced by a residence along the lowlands of the sea coast. On these highlands the climate is dry, salubrious and invigorating. One tract alone exceeds fifteen miles in length and lies between the upper part of Waiakea and Laupahoehoe, the upper line winding along the Mauna Kea slopes and the lower extending from one to three miles into the heavy Ohia and Koa forest. It is a rolling tract of extreme fertility, covered with luxuriant growths of bunch grass and here and there with the rich orchard or blue grass. Irish potatoes, barley and oats have been successfully raised, and of the former two crops can be raised per annum as the frost during the winter months is not sufficient to kill them.

Puu Oo, Aahuwela, Puakala and Keanakolu are prominent localities in these parts, all lying outside the forest line at an elevation of from 5000 to 6000 feet, just outside the edge of the forest and above the heavy rain belt, with sufficient rain-fall, however, to supply all the moisture needed for the growth of agricultural products of all kinds, and there are never failing springs of clear, cold water, fed probably from the snows of Mauna Kea.

On the south edge of this tract a trail, which could easily be widened, leads over the flow of 1855-56 to Hilo. This lava in many places is exceedingly friable and scoriaceous, and it would not be a very expensive matter to connect with the old Judd road, built in years gone by from Kona for fifteen miles, straight over the mountain towards Hilo.

From Keanakolu on the north down to Laupahoehoe is only a few miles, which could be connected by a good cart road, leading over the Kapaa ridge, which, according to old legends, was the last eruption from Mauna Kea. Near Keanakolu also are the Douglas pits, named so after the distinguished but unfortunate naturalist, who met his death in one of them during the thirties.

Contained in this belt is nature's sanitarium for those tired and worn out from living in the warm regions along the sea coast. Here the health-seeker will find health-giving heights, where one's outing, riding and hunting will create a new lease of life, where good wood fires of an evening are not to be despised, and where one contentedly piles the blankets around during the winter months, awakening in the morning to find that Jack Frost has been busy over night etching the window panes with those fancy creations he knows so well how to produce; then as the sun mounts over the tangled mass of the forest line, to take a quick ride over the hills, where ferns and grasses shine like diamonds of ice, that sparkle and scintillate as they are kissed into life by the flood of sunlight.

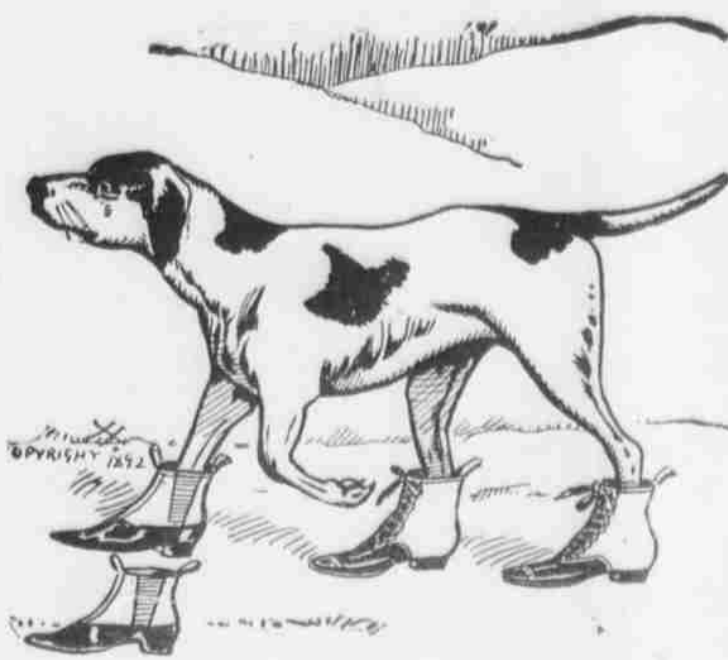

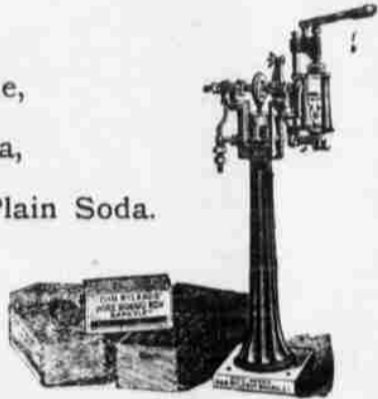

At Waimea so far 34 names have been given in as representing the number of individuals desirous of securing homesteads on the Paupani tract, while for Paupani close by, so far about 25 names have been given in to date. On both these tracts settlers are anxious to locate at once, and it is not outside the realm of probability that within one year Waimea will be an important agricultural center. The need of preserving the forest remnants through this section has already been commented upon in a former letter and can not be emphasized too forcibly, and it is to be hoped that the Board of Agriculture will see its way clear to establish a branch nursery there. In all likelihood between seventy and eighty lots will be laid out within the next few months, and it would not be a bad policy to make it incumbent upon the settler as one of the conditions of his tenure, to set out the young trees which shall be furnished him free of charge by the Commissioners, along the boundary lines of his lot. This mode of procedure would not alone form the nucleus of a young and growing forest, but would supply him with a boundary fence that shall last, as likewise supplying him with a sufficient quantity of fuel.

It is likely that a new plan will be adopted regulating the possession of these holdings, and in this connection a scheme may be formulated somewhat similar to the one now in vogue in New Zealand, the main features of which are that the lessees are secured the value of their leases on an indefeasible title, with perpetual rights of renewal, thus having all the security and permanency of freehold tenure without making it necessary to sink capital in the purchase of land. If this system can be adopted, every spare acre in the country will be settled up by the small farmer.

Most of the mills are still grinding through the Hilo district. At the Hilo Sugar Company's mill, an accident occurred the other day in the shape of a broken roller although work was resumed on the three-roller mill after a delay of but a few hours. The Pepee-keo plantation crop will foot up to nearly 4800 tons and Honouliuli has about finished its crop of 2800 tons.

In Portuguese circles there is considerable excitement owing to a reported burglary of Mr. J. G. Spaso's store and which it is supposed was committed on last Saturday night. From the fact that the safe was not forced but the combination unlocked in the usual way, it is not altogether unlikely that the act was perpetrated by some one more or less familiar with the premises. In all about \$500 is said to have been stolen, although the goods and merchandise in the store remained untouched so far as known.

Our Puna Road Board has so far done excellent work. The ruts and breaks along the lower length of the Volcano road are being rapidly repaired and the roadway has been cleared of bushes and weeds. Along the sea coast road the same energetic display has been made between Makua and the 1840 ft. w., and if the appropriation holds out the intention is to finish the section between the latter point and Halepua, a distance of about three miles, between which the traveler is wedged in by guava tangles that double him with undesirable shower-baths in rainy weather. As far as our Hilo Road Board is concerned, there is nothing to chronicle, as nothing has been done.

Surrounded by their many relatives and friends Dr. and Mrs. W. L. Moore made their first public debut at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. D. H. Hitchcock, on Tuesday evening last, and we feel sure that the sincerity of kind feeling and good wishes accorded them on this the threshold of their married life will linger long in their memory as the assurance of a prosperous future. To the parents, also, the event has been one of unusual gratification, coupled, as it was, with the pleasant news that their son Howard had proven one of the few fortunate ones to whom were awarded the distinction of having their pictures adorn the "Salon" of 1893. This in the world of Art means an honorable introduction into the guild of professional artists.

Aside from D. Howard Hitchcock's own superior talent, a large share of his success is owing to the discerning faculty of C. B. Bishop, who early perceiving the former's great natural gifts, has generously supplied him with the means to prosecute his art studies in New York and Paris during the last three years, and now D. Howard Hitchcock's many friends will be pleased to welcome him back on his return this fall, when they hope to view the more mature and ripe efforts of his later studies.

A number of school teachers leave on this Kinohiwa for San Francisco, taking as a passenger Malcolm Brown of Honolulu, came near meeting with a disastrous termination to her voyage within a few miles from the port. It appears that after the tug left her and the vessel was about to tack to make her offing, the wind failed and the heavy swell which prevailed soon threw her into dangerous proximity to the rocks off Kalaia Point, near Onomea Bay. Fortunately, the anchors that were let go held fast until the return of the tug, which had kept up steam at the request of Captain Matson of the Lurline, who, anticipating some such mischance, had advised the officers of the tug to keep a watch on the Harvester.

CHICAGO SMOKE AND CLIMATE Should Be Carefully Considered by Her Who Would Go to the World's Fair

Two things of special interest Chicago presents to visitors this summer. One is the Exposition, the other is the climate. The first you may neglect if you want to, but from the latter there is no escape.

The Chicago climate is fearfully and wonderfully made. Therefore the preparations for an encounter with it should be prayerfully considered. Any misguided woman who thinks she can "go to Chicago in a handbag" would better secure a list of hospitals in advance. For a two weeks' visit she will need a trunk, and these are some of the things which she should put into it.

First and most important of all should be a serviceable outing dress. Let it be short and light of weight. Luckily, these requirements are not incompatible with the present fashion, so that you will not need to curtsy the spirit in order to satisfy the needs of the flesh. Of course, dark blue serge has no rival as a material for this suit. Have the Eton jacket lined, first for warmth, and second to preserve it in some sort of shape.

You may take one skirt waist and have quite enough, or you may take a hundred and have none to many. It all depends on your selection. One dark silk skirt waist will answer every need. A light one of some wash fabric will at the end of an hour in the Chicago atmosphere, be fit only for the laundry. Too much cannot be said about the smoke of Chicago. It is not a thin, fleeting substance, dissipated by the lightest breeze. It is heavy, solid, thick, resisting even the force of the Windy City's gales. At the Fair grounds themselves it is not bad, but in the city, cleanliness is an impossible virtue. A dark outing dress, therefore, with a dark silk skirt waist and colored collar and cuffs should be the foundation of your wardrobe.

With these wear a simple dark hat; light in weight, in order to avoid as far as possible the headaches which are the lot of most women; broad of brim, to shield the eyes from the glare of sunlight reflected from the thousand walls of the "White City," and without feathers or perishable trimmings, for alas! it has been known sometimes to rain and rain hard in Chicago. The present style of sailor hat is a very desirable one for the World's Fair tourist, but women who cannot wear this shape will be glad if they do not buy the little "toque" so immoderately recommended. The eyes will suffer enough at the best, and a broad brim on one's hat will be a blessing not to be lightly disregarded.

So much for a hat. In selecting shoes, subtract largely from your price and add to the size of shoe you are in the habit of wearing. Walking and standing are as sure to spread the feet as water is to run down hill, and the mind and heart are loyal champions of their lower brethren. They will never be at ease while the latter are ill treated. Russel leather is softer and more comfortable than any other kind. It is also more presentable after half a day's hard wear. High soles are somewhat warmer than Oxfords, but on the other hand they are a good support to the ankle.

In point of temperature the Chicago climate doesn't seem to favor a happy medium. It runs to extremes very far apart in degree, and very close to gether in time. In the middle of the day, on the sunny side, of one of those white buildings, a salamander itself would have to gasp, while on the evening of the same day the Eskimos would be the only comfortable creatures in the grounds. Consequently, if you intend to remain out after 4 o'clock, either carry a good warm wrap or have one on deposit at some place where you can get it. And, if possible, have a jacket, not a cape. The lake breeze of which you have heard is not a myth, it is a raw reality—a cold fact of the most decided kind, and a non-respecter of fluttering capes.

An umbrella and two pairs of rubbers—one high for protection against rain, and the other sandals, to be worn only after the storm—will be necessities. A thin rain cloak should, also be added. The matter of gloves is, of course, one to be decided by each individual, but it may be suggested that, since it is only a question of time until the Chicago dirt will blacken the fairest gloves, and since the intermediate stages are not pleasant, it would be as well to buy dark gloves in the first place.

The question of underwear is somewhat of a mooted point. Many people adjure you, by all that you hold precious in life, to wear heavy under clothing. They enlarge in graphic terms on the famous lake breeze and the change which comes over the spirit of the thermometer when the sun goes down. But remember that the sun is up something over twelve hours out of the twenty-four, and, as a general thing, its rays are as warm as Carter Harrison's expressions of hospitality. It is much easier to wear extra wraps to the grounds when you go in the cool of the morning, providing there is such a period, and check them where you can get them in the evening. During the intervening hours you will have no yearning desire for flannels.

These will be the main requisites for what may be called the working outfit of a sensible woman tourist.

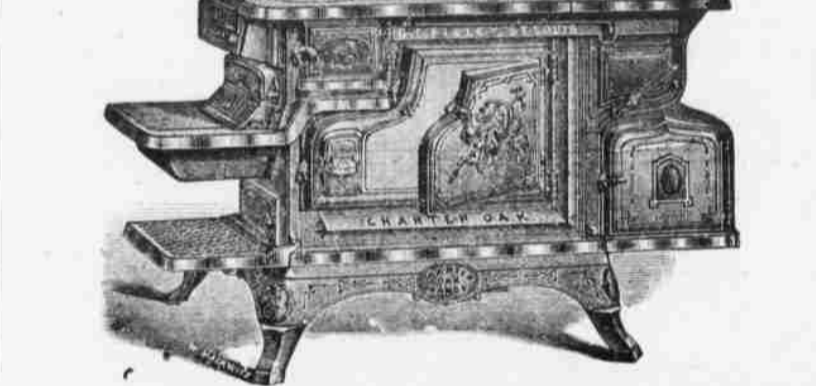
