The special session of the Legislature will meet on the 12th of June. The most important question which will be treated by the august body of super wise men is the new land law. It is the intention of the government to open up to settlers the vast lands now owned by the government and it is proposed to dispose of them on the very easiest and best terms. The lands which especially will be offered are of different natures and suitable for different purposes. Grazing and coffee lands, sugar and fruit lands and lots suitable for the small farmer or for residence only will be placed in market. If the government succeeds in establishing a land boom under the suggested term, it will be entitled to great credit and a great step will have been taken in the line of solving the present question of "hard times" now

But whether the lands to be offered are to be used for the cultivation of coffee or the promotion of guava jelly, one fact remains; it is necessary for the prospective settler to purchase an Aermotor and secure sufficient water for his premises. 3.T.B 7 8
