THE AMERICAN BANK

Hon. Cecil Brown is advised, by the Gaelic mail, that all arrangements for establishing the American bank of Hawaii will be completed on the arrival of the Australia. There is nothing else to report by this mail, as it has not yet been decided who are to be the Hawaiian incorporators. Col. Geo. W. Macfarlane will return in the Australia, accompanied, as he said before he left here, by Mr. Little, the leading San Francisco promoter of the new bank.

The President and all the Directors will be Honolulu men," Mr. Brown said in answer to a question. He did not wish to say who would be President.

The Gaelic from 'Prisco.

The O & O S S Gaelic came into port a little before 12 o'clock last night and moored alongside the Pacific Mail wharf. The Gaelic left San Francisco a day behind time, and on that account arrived much later than she was looked for in port. About fifty saloon passengers for Honolulu were brought by the Gaelic, and a score of others are on their way to Yokohama, Nagasaki and Hongkong. Purser G E Chapin reports an extremely pleasant passage from San Francisco. Mr Chas E Brown the former purser of the Gaelic, who is well known in Honolulu, is taking a holiday for a few weeks.

Redding, Cal., May 24.—James Saell of Fall river, in this country, recently shipped a herd of fifty mules to the Hawaiian Islands. He is so well pleased with the market there that he has bought 10 more, which he is to send to the islands in two shipments.

WILL BE THE KAIULANI

President Wight of the Wilder Steamship Co. returned from San Francisco on the Gaelic last night where he has been to purchase a boat for the Inter-Island trade. The new boat will be called the Kaiulani after the late princess, and in site will resemble the Hawaii. Mr. Wight informed the BULLETIN reporter that it would be a matter of six months before the boat was completed. She will have a capacity of over 7000 bags of sugar, and her dimensions are as follows: Length over all 150 feet, 30 feet beam and 12 feet depth of hold.

Hay & Wright of San Francisco have the contract for her hull which is to be of wood, while the machinery and fittings will be supplied by the Union Iron Works. The Kaiulani will be fitted with the latest improvements for handling freight.

Mr. Wight says that everything is activity along the San Francisco water front, on account of the transport service, more than anything else.

For Rebating of Fire Risks.

At the meeting of the Board of Underwriters, held in the Chamber of Commerce yesterday afternoon at 2 o'clock, the first step was taken towards the rebating of fire risks in these islands.

The first thing to be done in this connection, will be to secure the services of an expert in such matters from California.

DR. H. STANGENWALD DEAD

Sad Event Happened at 5:45 O'clock This Morning.

Complication of Diseases—Funeral From the Home Tomorrow Afternoon—Outline of Life of Deceased.

The sad news was spread about the city this morning of the death of Dr. H. Stangenwald at his home in Nuuanu Valley at 5:45 o'clock from a complication of diseases. Deceased had been ailing for about two months. The funeral will take place from the home at 3 o'clock tomorrow afternoon. Interment will take place in Nuuanu cemetery in a spot picked out by deceased himself.

Dr. Stangenwald was 70 years of age, having been born in the year 1829 in Dresden, Germany. Deceased studied medicine at one of the best colleges in Vienna and was surgeon during the war between Prussia and Hungary. At the close of the war he embarked for New York and then, hearing of the gold fever in California, took a vessel around the Horn to San Francisco where he remained for a short time. In about 1850, he came to the Islands and opened a photograph gallery above Duffin's market which stood where the Nott building is at the present time. There are in the possession of many of the old people here samples of the work of Dr. Stangenwald with ambrotypes.

Late in the fifties Dr. Stangenwald went back to Vienna to complete his course in medicine. This done, he returned to Honolulu and opened an office on Merchant street. The building in which this office was situated was torn down but a few days ago to make room for a modern building.

Dr. Stangenwald built up a very large practice and was particularly popular with the natives who nicknamed him Kauka Minkoole which means a doctor who does not take a minute to cure. For quite a time past he had not practiced at all.

One of Dr. Stangenwald's hobbies was his laboratory where he conducted experiments in chemistry and electricity. It was very rarely the old doctor accorded any one the privilege of entering this place. It is said by the old kamaoians here that Dr. Stangenwald had a storage battery in his laboratory long before any such a thing was thought of but that, not knowing the nature of his discovery, he failed to get out a spark. When the storage battery was finally announced the doctor saw what a mistake he had made.

Shortly after his arrival here the second time Dr. Stangenwald was married to Miss Mary Diamond, an aunt of W. W. Diamond of this city. From this union came three children all of whom are dead. One was poisoned, another drowned and the last had convulsions. His second wife was Miss Anne Diamond, the younger sister of his first wife, and who survives him.

The capital stock of the company is \$250,000 and there are 10,000 shares at a par value of \$25 each. U.S.S. PHILADELPHIA IN PORT

Came from Samoa In About Eleven Days' Time.

Officers Tell of Situation at Apia—Mataafa Interviewed by Commission—Triumphal Entrance of Rebel Chiefs.

The U. S. S. Philadelphia with Rear-Admiral Kautz aboard, arrived from Samoa at an early hour this morning, a little short of eleven days from Apia. The quick trip was due to favorable weather throughout the voyage. The Philadelphia will remain in port about ten days, after which she will sail for San Francisco. It is supposed that she will go to Puget Sound after remaining in San Francisco for a short time.

Admiral Kautz is accompanied by his staff, Lieut W G Miller and Ensign Sellers. The other officers in the Philadelphia are as follows: Capt Edwin White, Commander; Lieut Com Leutze, Executive Officer; Lieut Com W S Hughes, Navigating Officer; Lieuts G H Brown, H A Field, F H Schofield and J H Hetherington, Watch Officers; Lieut Bates, Chief Engineer; Chaplain S McAlister, Fleet Surgeon; Street, Fleet Paymaster; Stanton, Fleet Marine Officer; Perkins, P A Engineer; Bush, Surgeon; Lung, Assistant Engineer; McMorris, Assistant Surgeon; Olell, Cadets; Pettengill, Babcock, Sweet, Fleet Pay Clerk; Doyle, Carpenter; Barton, Gunner; Jaffey and Boatwain; Crogan. Lieut Hughes takes the place of Lansdale killed in Samoa.

In an interview with various officers aboard the Philadelphia the following story of affairs in Samoa was gleaned:

"The Philadelphia sailed from Apia, Samoa, May 21. A day before this, Mataafa and his chiefs went aboard the Badger to be interviewed by the Commission. Their entrance into the harbor incensed the American and English beyond measure.

"The steam launch of the Falke started out in the morning towing a cutter from the Philadelphia and another from one of the British boats. The intention was to go down around the point to the place appointed by Mataafa. Once there, Mataafa and his people were to be distributed in the two cutters and taken to the Badger.

"When the return was made it was found that the launch was towing a very large cutter elaborately decorated in Samoan style. In this was the rebel chief Mataafa and his chiefs and, in two smaller boats astern were a hundred or more of Mataafa's people, unarmed. Farthest astern were the American and British cutters, empty. The Samoans were singing a jolly song as they entered the harbor, and the white flag at the bow and the Samoan flag astern of the large boat were flying as a triumphal march.

"The boats hauled alongside the Badger and Mataafa and his people were about to crowd aboard when they were stopped by the men on guard. They were told to wait until the Commission was ready to receive them. When they finally got aboard they were quickly interviewed by the Commission and, inside of an hour's time, were on the way back to their headquarters. This time, the American and British cutter did not accompany the launch from the German man-of-war.

"In the meantime, a complaint had been sent to the Commission from the American and British ships. As a result, the two boats with Mataafa followers were sent out of the harbor and the natives told to return to their headquarters.

"Nothing could be learned of the action of the Commission in regard to Mataafa as the greatest secrecy was preserved. Each member of the Commission is armed with orders from his gov-

INTER-ISLAND CO. STEAMER

Purchased in San Francisco By Vice-President Ena.

To Be Handed Over June 8—Sailing Date for Honolulu, Week Later—All About the Huene.

On May 25 the purchase of the steamer Huene by the Inter-Island Co. of this city was consummated in San Francisco. The vessel was formerly owned by Gray & Mitchell and plied between San Francisco and Sound ports. Captain Johnson who has been in command of the steamer for some time, will bring her to Honolulu.

The Huene is a wooden vessel with the following dimensions: Gross tonnage, 341.72; net, 200.92; length, 148.03 feet; beam, 38.6; depth of hold, 11.02. She was built by Bendickson in Humboldt in 1837 and made 9 1/2 knots on her trial trip. The engines and boilers were built by the Fulton Iron Works.

The Huene will be turned over to John Ena June 8 and will sail for this port in Welch & Co's Line about June 15. Upon arrival here some changes will be made in the steamer's deck plan as well as the accommodations for officers and crew which are at present below decks.

The Huene is named after a small but very important shipping port of Ventura County, Cal., to which is tributary most of the great grain and stock ranches of the lower Santa Clara valley.

FILIPINOS WANT TO KNOW

Why They Can't Have a Constitution of Their Own.

Emmissaries Return to Camp Without Reaching Terms—Otis Reports the Details of the Fighting.

Manila, May 25, 5:30 p. m.—The Filipino commissioners left here by special train today. They will be escorted to their lines under a flag of truce. It is expected they will return soon.

President Gonzaga of the Philippine Commission, previous to his departure, said: "We greatly appreciate the courtesy shown us. We have spent some time with your commissioners, incidentally considering the American constitution. Its principles impress us profoundly.

"The plan of government offered the Philippines seems in theory to be a good colonial system. But why should a nation with your constitution seek to make a colony of a distant people who have been so long fighting against Spain to secure the same rights your constitution gives? You fought the same battle in America when you fought against England."

In the fighting at San Fernando yesterday fifty Filipinos were killed and many wounded. The Americans had two killed and twelve wounded.

General Otis' Latest Report.

Washington, May 25.—General Otis sent the following dispatch to the War Department:

"Manila, May 25, Adjutant General, Washington. On 23d inst. Third Infantry returning to Baliuag were attacked morning, noon and evening by a large force of the enemy suffering in casualties, two men killed and thirteen wounded; enemy repulsed, leaving on the field sixteen killed, large number wounded and prisoners. Yesterday enemy appeared in vicinity San Fernando, attacked Kansas and Montana regiments which suffered slight loss. Enemy driven through rice fields, leaving fifty dead, thirty-eight wounded and 23 prisoners; fifty rifles and other property captured their retreat through swamp land saved them from destruction; Lawton returning, leaving with MacArthur on the front regular troops to replace volunteers.

ART EXHIBITION CLOSING

Only the rest of this week, with but one evening, remains for viewing the Spring exhibition of the Kiloheana Art League in Model block, Fort street. It is open from nine to one o'clock daytime, and Wednesday and Saturday evenings.

"Konahuanni," D. Howard Hitchcock's masterpiece catalogued at the price of \$800, was sold soon after the opening. The same artist has more than a score of other works, in which he has achieved a high average standard. His landscapes and sea views of both Hawaii and Oahu islands are of the highest value as art descriptions of Hawaiian scenery. They are works of art as well which would do credit to any art gallery in the world.

H. Mott-Smith, in "The Brook," gives a sunset portrayal of a picturesque section of Nuuanu stream. It is a picture that grows on one, conveying a sense of the sweetest repose of late afternoon in Honolulu. This artist contents himself on this occasion with two lifelike portraits—one a speaking likeness of Mr. Davey—besides the work just mentioned. He is certainly an element of strength in the league.

Persevering contributors who have appeared in many former exhibitions are Mrs. H. Kelley, Philip H. Dodge, Miss A. Parke and Mrs. Alfred Willis, all of whom contribute works of great merit. Mrs. Kelley's Hawaiian female types attract a great deal of admiring attention.

Space will not permit a review of the hangings. Residents and visitors are, however, confidently recommended, without fear of their being disappointed, to spend an hour as often as possible at the exhibition. There is nothing in Honolulu that attests more highly the progress of the community in refinement.

A Challenge.

Registering for the Election.

Registration in Honolulu to date totals 261. Of this number 132 are Hawaiians, 59 Americans, 34 British, 21 German, 5 Portuguese, 2 Austrians and the remainder representing Sweden, Norway, Samoa, France and Japan. Ex-Attorney General Smith's name heads the registration list. Justices Judd, Frear, Stanley and Perry are on the list but the names of Mr. Dole and his Cabinet do not appear. A good proportion of the Hawaiians registered are members of the police or in government departments.

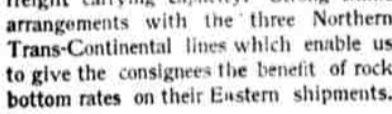

LETTER FROM CAPTAIN GRAHAM.

Ship E. W. Phelps, in port, May 30, 1899.

City Editor of the EVENING BULLETIN:—I notice an item in your edition of this date entitled, "Trouble on E. W. Phelps," which I consider very unjust. The facts of the case are as follows:

Arrived in port with sixteen men before the mast. I discharged six to help man the ship A. J. Fuller, to help the captain out; afterward let three more go in J. R. Thomas under similar conditions. Shortly after three deserted, which left four of original crew. One of them has not been on board since Monday. At no time has there been any trouble on board since leaving San Francisco. The Japs you refer to have been at work on board since shortly after our arrival cleaning and painting outside. The crews of the other deep water ships have dropped off one or two at a time until few if any of the original men left. Think your reporter has been misled. Yours sincerely,
