DECISION ON YACHT RACE

The Yacht Bonnie Dundee is Declared Winner in First Class.

Failure to Publish an Arrangement—Decided on 1896 Conditions—Generous Concession by President Dole.

Regatta Day, held September 17, 1898. First class yacht race. In the first class yacht race of the day there were three entries, viz.: Bonnie Dundee, entered by S. B. Dole. Hawaii, entered by W. L. Wilcox.

Marion, entered by J Lightfoot. The conditions of this race, as given out by the regatta committee to a majority of the officiating judges, were as follows: Bonnie Dundee, scratch. Hawaii, 29m. 17s. Marion, 35m. 2s.

"Time allowance in the first class, according to agreement, is the difference in the actual sailing time of the yachts in the regatta of September 16, 1898. The Bonnie Dundee allowing the Hawaii and Marion the time she defeated them by. * * * This race was over an estimated course of 21 miles."

The paper bearing these conditions and time allowances, as quoted above, was signed by Walter E. Wall under date of September 16, 1898, and addressed to the "Regatta Committee of 1898, S. E. P. Taylor, Esq., Chairman." This document also fixes the time allowances for the second class yachts from calculations made, based on Herreshoff's Table of Allowances for Small Yachts of this class.

On the morning of the race the committee stated, and informed the judges, that the owners of the yachts Hawaii and Marion would not start in a race with the Bonnie Dundee under the usual time allowances given, or as those which were allowed them in the regatta of 1896 (they were under the Herreshoff system), but, in order to fill up this event for the day, as published in the advertised program, would start if the Bonnie Dundee were sufficiently handicapped so as to place the contesting yachts on a more equal footing, as under the present system of time allowance they felt that they were outclassed, considering the Bonnie Dundee to be only a racing machine instead of a yacht as compared with the Hawaii and the Marion. Otherwise, they would not compete with her, for it would be a foregone conclusion as to the winner, and the committee might as well give the captain of the Bonnie Dundee the prize to sail her over the course without any competition.

In order to have the event take place the committee decided on arranging the time allowances as above mentioned for these yachts and for this particular contest, thus, in their judgment, equalizing matters for the competitors and making the contest of interest to yachtsmen, spectators and the general public.

The conditions and the time allowances mentioned, as arranged by the committee for this particular race, we find do not appear in the published official program, nor in any of the newspapers of the city, as should have been for the better understanding of all concerned. The omission of having this most important notice inserted in its regular order in the program, is what brings about the question now at issue of how to decide the result when a misunderstanding is found to have occurred in the making of the terms and conditions.

Facts in addition to those above quoted are as follows: The yachts came to the scratch, sailed over the course, and finished in accordance with the conditions as

officially published. According to the time recorded by the official timekeepers' book, the start and the finish of the race were as follows:

According to this showing, the yacht Hawaii takes first place, besting the Bonnie Dundee 21m. 5s.; and the Marion second, beating the Bonnie Dundee 16m. 36s.

This would be our ruling under the agreement and conditions as stated above, provided that it had been accepted by all of the contesting parties. But before the judges gave a decision on this race, Captain S. B. Dole of the yacht Bonnie Dundee made a protest, personally, to the judges and to the regatta committee, as to what appeared in one or more of the local papers, reporting the Hawaii the winner of this race on the conditions as above mentioned, because he had no knowledge of such an agreement as it had never been submitted to him. He wanted to know which member of the committee reported that he had agreed to such a proposition, and said that the only time he was approached on the subject was when a member of the committee met him on the street a day or two previous to the race, and wanted to know whether he [Dole] would be willing to enter the Bonnie Dundee in the regatta races, when in reply he stated his willingness to do so, but added that he would waive the time allowance given to the Bonnie Dundee by the yacht Helene according to our customary rules.

Here the matter ended. Captain Dole then made a formal protest against the giving over the prize to the yacht Hawaii, but was informed that no decision had been rendered, as the judges were waiting for the timekeepers' report, and nothing could be done before it was received.

By taking Herreshoff's system of time allowance (as adopted by the committee of 1896) the Bonnie Dundee would give the Hawaii six minutes, and the Marion ten minutes. The result then would be as follows:

The Bonnie Dundee thus beating the Hawaii by 2m 12s, and the Marion by 8m 26s. And if we took the Sailing Rules adopted by the Hawaiian Rowing and Yacht Association, which allow the smaller yachts one minute per ton measurement, the result would be more favorable to the Bonnie Dundee. She would be a winner in either case under these two rules, recognized by yacht clubs in the United States and Great Britain.

Under the foregoing statements of the facts and circumstances, we feel justified in declaring the First Class Yacht Race to have been a

DEADLY ELECTRIC CURRENT

Two Men Killed by Live Wire on King Street.

One a Native Hack Driver—The Other a Soldier—Heroic Deed of Chas. Thurston—Inquest This Afternoon.

Death must certainly be a terrible thing in any form, but to be stricken down in the middle of the night by a subtle, unseen force without one chance to save one's self, must be a thing terrible beyond imagination. Such is the death that Alohikea, a native hack driver, and Private Hannan of the Engineers Corps, in camp here, met with while the heavy rains were falling last night.

A live wire hanging across King street from Richards to the engine house and lowered to its dangerous position by the breaking off of one of the pins, was run into by Alohikea at about 12:55 a. m., while on his way to the stables to put up.

The horse was caught fairly in the head by the wire with water soaked insulation, and dropped on the spot. Alohikea must have attempted to jump out to see what ailed his horse for he was found dead by the side of his carriage. The wire passed over the top and Alohikea must have come into contact with it as he was about to alight.

Just at this time, Privates Hannan and Gertz of Co. L, Engineers Corps, drove along from the direction of town in Joe Rodriguez' hack. They were on their way to camp.

Coming upon the dead man and hack, Hannan jumped out to see what the matter was. He ran right into the wire and was killed instantly, his body still remaining in contact with it.

Gertz ran to the help of his comrade and grasping him, was immediately thrown to the ground. It was impossible for him to loosen his hold. The current was passing through his body and he was being thrown about like a piece of cloth. His cries for help were most pitiful to hear.

It was just at this time that Chas. Thurston of the No. 1 Engine Co., rushed out into the street. He saw in a minute what the trouble was and grasping the dead Hannan by the shoes, the only safe place, he pulled him off the wire. This heroic deed saved the life of Gertz who now lies in the engine house, very much prostrated over the death of his friend.

In the meantime Joe Rodriguez drove to the police station. Officers were soon on the spot and bodies were removed to the police station. This morning that of Hannan was taken to the undertaking parlors of E. A. Williams to be prepared for burial, while Alohikea's body was taken in charge by his people.

An inquest is being held this afternoon.

The funeral of Private Hannan will take place from the Catholic church at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon. Members of deceased's company have the funeral in charge.

The case of Alohikea is a very sad one. He was a steady, hard worker and the only support of his poor aged mother, whose grief over the death of her son was most pitiful to see.

The drivers of Stand 84 will make up a purse to be given to the poor old woman as temporary assistance.

The matter of the wire is creating much talk in town today. There is no doubt the heavy rain caused the pin to slip or break. The responsibility, if any, will very likely be brought out in due time. An investigation will be made.

THREE APPEALS DECIDED

An Administrator is Personally Liable for Negligence of Servant.

Where There is No Defense the Plaintiff Wins—Co-partner Rightly Restrained from Breaking Agreement.

The Supreme Court by Chief Justice Judd, with whom sat Associate Justice Whiting and substitute Justice Arthur A. Wilder, has rendered a unanimous decision in the case of Sam Kalua vs. D. G. Camarinos. Plaintiff claimed \$150 damages for the negligent driving of defendant's servant. Defendant pleaded in the District Court that, as the servant was employed on account of the estate he was administrator of, he was not personally liable for the negligence. This plea the District Court sustained, and an appeal was taken on the point of law to the Supreme Court. The judgment is reversed and the case ordered proceeded with against defendant as an individual upon its merits. This is the law laid down:

PASSING OF NOBLE LADY

One of native's nobility passed away last night, when Mrs. Harriet Carter expired shortly before midnight. She was 63 years of age and her last illness had been patiently endured for three months.

Mrs. Carter came to the Hawaiian Islands as the wife of Captain John L. Hempstead, master of a whaling ship, in the year 1852. This her first husband died a short time later, and she was married between thirty and forty years ago to Samuel M. Carter, brother of Jos. O. Carter and for a long period before his death within this decade a highly esteemed business man of Honolulu.

By her first husband Mrs. Carter leaves Miss Hattie Hempstead—who, by the way, inherits the amiable and charitable traits that will ever sweeten her mother's memory—and of her second family Fred. W. Carter, manager of the American plantation, Molokai; Mrs. Oran Kately of Port Ludlow, Wash.; former Judge A. W. Carter, Mrs. J. L. Young, J. H. Carter, Miss F. M. Carter and Mrs. F. T. P. Waterhouse.

Mrs. Carter was the incarnation of peace and goodwill to her neighbors, using the word in the sense taught by the Great Master of Love. Absolutely unostentatious in the constant exercise of active charity, she carried into many an afflicted or distressed home of this town the sunshine of her wondrously benign nature. She was quick and sympathetic to every appeal of suffering. It may be said that none of the people who have known Mrs. Carter, in these forty and odd years of her residence in Honolulu, ever heard an unkind word pass her lips.

The funeral will take place at 3:30 tomorrow afternoon, from the family residence in Judd street to Nuuanu cemetery. The pallbearers will be Wm. A. Kinney, Olaf Sorenson, J. G. Rothwell, J. F. Brown, John Waterhouse and Ernest Wed-house.

TO SEE THE WATER.

Public Invited to Look Over New Well on Kaimuki Tract.

A fine flow of artesian water has been struck on the Kaimuki tract of Gear, Lansing & Co. The water was encountered Thursday at a depth of 273 feet. Its volume is immense being 1,500,000 every twenty-four hours, assuring an abundant supply to the tract, which has greatly enhanced in value by the rich and opulent find. It is a twelve-inch well. It is located on the Kapahulu road near Wainalea.

HEALTH AT THE CAMPS

Were all the transactions of the U. S. force stationed here to be made public from day to day, it is certain that Honolulu would be furnished with much interesting matter.

The transactions preceding the final decision to move Camp McKinley to a more sanitary location are probably not very well known to the public. The visit of an agent of the Board of Health to Camp McKinley a few days ago and his treatment there has been dwelt upon.

This treatment of a member of the Board of Health did not please Dr. Wood, another member, so he drove out to the American Legation, Waikiki, shortly afterwards. There he placed the facts before Minister Sewall as an American citizen. He did not speak for the Board of Health but as a citizen stated that he believed the conditions at the army camps decidedly serious, and if continued would produce among the men the same disastrous conditions as those that have been noted in certain places in the States.

Something ought to be done and that, forthwith. If the conditions were not changed some one would have to suffer. Minister Sewall asked Dr. Wood to jump into his carriage and accompany him to the camps for an investigation into the existing conditions. This Dr. Wood did not care to do.

It is supposed Minister Sewall had a conference with Col. Barber as yesterday, word was received by Mr. Reynolds that an agent of the Board of Health would be very welcome at the camps. The treatment of an agent of the Board on a visit ordered by that body was very deeply regretted.

However, no agent of the Board of Health has been out to the camps. The one previously delegated for the work will not go out unless ordered by the Board. It is probable, however, that no one will go out now as it has been decided to move the camp.

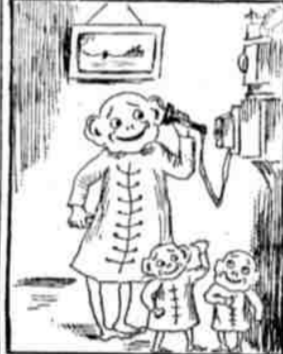

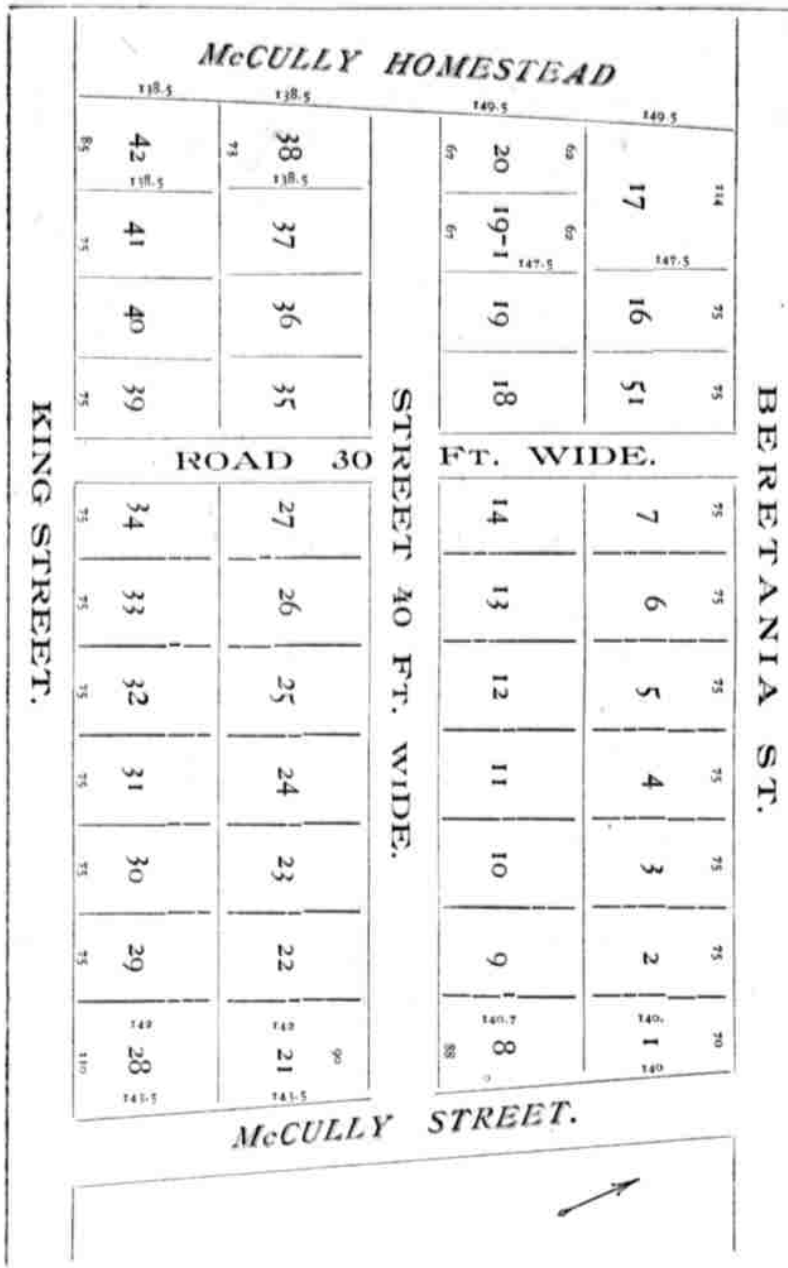

GENERAL KING'S AUTHORITY.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—In re Wilcox-King controversy it would seem that the sentiment of the general community were varied in the utterances of the learned jurist of the Police Court some days since. It appears to me, however, that had Judge Wilcox confined himself to the facts in the premises he had done better than to state what he did not know positively to be true. How does he know that Merriam and Wheeler have been "white-washed."

Upon inquiry by the undersigned it appears that General King has no authority whatever to order a general court martial of the offending officers it being left to the Department Commander to do so.

What report or recommendation General King has made to headquarters of the martial law incident remains to be seen.

A judge may assume a great many things to be fact but when he asserts a thing as a fact he must be sure that what he is saying. With all due respect to the court it would seem that Judge Wilcox has overstepped the bounds of his authority in criticising a man before he is positive of what stand has been taken.

The utterances Judge Wilcox on the bench and on the street are two different things, and when a man hears the Judicial thunder rumbling about his ears it is generally liable to make him warm. The correspondence at present being carried on would lead one to believe that King considers himself attacked without provocation.

Will Have Club House.

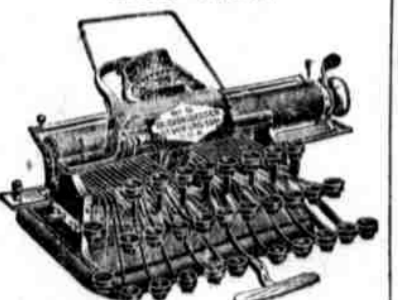

The other officers will be announced previous to the sailing of the Mazama on her first trip.

The name Mazama, more properly Mazame, is the term applied to a certain kind of Rocky mountain goat, noted for agility in the matter of climbing.

It might be interesting to know what is to become of the present captains on island steamers when the United States shipping regulations will be made to apply here. Very few of the present incumbents are licensed men but that will make no difference. They will be given the power of running boats between the islands.

It is different, however, with boats built from now on, such as the Mazama. The men in charge of these will have to be licensed.

race, and the yacht Bonnie Dundee entitled to the first prize, and the yacht Hawaii to the second prize, on the ground that the committee did not publish the rules and conditions under which they had decided the race should be run, and therefore the judges have been compelled to decide according to the Herreshoff rules under which the last previous race, that of 1896, was sailed.

However, in view of the unanimous offer of Mr. Dole contained in the letter hereto appended, we would suggest that the prize money be hung up for this last regatta, and added to the prizes for next year's first class yacht race, this to be sailed according to the rules and conditions agreed upon by the committee in the present case but not published. DEAR SIR:—The misunderstanding of the conditions of the first-class yacht race was not due to any fault of the competitors. By the conditions as announced to those who entered the Hawaii and the Marion, the former boat won the first prize, and the latter boat the second prize; and by the conditions as understood by those who entered the Bonnie Dundee, she won the first prize, and the Hawaii the second prize. The conditions as announced by the committee to those who entered the Hawaii and Marion were not announced to those who entered the Bonnie Dundee at all, and they never heard of them until the race was over.

As there seems to be no possibility of adjusting the matter, I suggest that the Bonnie Dundee be considered as out of the race, and the matter be settled on the theory of a race between the Hawaii and the Marion alone.
