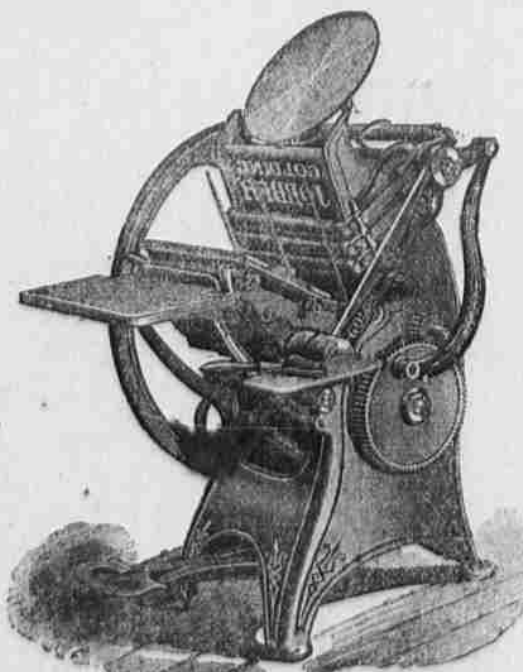

ISLAND NEWS.

(From Our Own Correspondents.)

KAUAI.

A little trouble occurred last week between the manager and the German laborers at Koloa, about the Emperor's birthday. The decision of the court was adverse to the laborers, whereupon they quietly went to work.

About 4 o'clock on Sunday morning, the 23 ult., a fire was discovered in the cane at Hanamaulu. About thirty acres of rattoons had been burnt when the fire was brought under control. Mr. A. S. Wilcox, the manager, had just gone to Honolulu, but his neighbors, with a commendable spirit, came promptly to his help. Lihue Mill, with all necessary forces, was at once set to work

to help grind the burnt cane. The following Friday a break occurred at Lihue Mill, which caused a delay until Monday. The loss would have been light but for the break. The fire is thought to have been the work of an incendiary, though no convicting evidence has been found.

Blake, arrived yesterday 51 days from Sydney. She brings 500 tons of coal to W. G. Irwin & Co. She had N. E. winds and squally weather throughout the voyage. She is discharging at the Likelike wharf. Sthr C. R. Bishop brought 1852 bags of sugar, the Captain reported very rough weather at Hamakua.

EVERYBODY at Government House was busy to-day.

Dysentery still continues to be prevalent on Molokai.

The Gazette published a special edition this morning for the Alameda's mail.

The Chinese immigrants, who arrived by the City of Tokio, have been liberated.

\$2.50 per share on the H. A. Co.'s stock is now payable at the office of C. Brewer & Co.

The last money paid at the Government buildings, during the past quarter, was to the Gazette.

The Police Court resembled a dry goods' store this morning, when the property of M. Michiels was displayed in the larceny case.

Mr. David Graham Adee's fourth article on "What He Saw And Heard In Honolulu" is commenced to-day on the fourth page.

The first retail license, for the present biennial period, was issued this morning to a new Chinese firm who are starting in business on Nuanun street.

Last evening's band concert was well attended and appreciated. Later in the evening the hotel and its cottages were serenaded by some amateur Hawaiian minstrels.

Mr. B. Block, the secretary of the Statue Committee, left this morning by the Alameda. The president is still willing to receive subscriptions.

In the civil branch of the Police Court yesterday two cases of damages were continued, and the case of L. Aseu v. J. M. Kaulahe, assumption for \$21.80, was settled out of Court.

THE Mortuary Report for March shows a decrease in the number of deaths, as compared with those of the past few months. Fifteen people died outside the wards, nine were unattended and seven were non-residents. Of the 49 deaths, 34 were Hawaiians.

Later in the evening he paid a visit a little higher up the street and made another raid.

WELLS, Fargo & Co. shipped to-day, by the Alameda, over 60 packages of merchandise, besides nearly \$3,000 in American gold and silver coin for which one per cent is charged for transportation. Remitters of small amounts find this a cheaper way of paying their debts abroad than by sending drafts or money orders at 6 and 2 1/2 per cent, respectively.

Among the lepers at Molokai is a boy who is supposed to have contracted the disease by pricking himself, in play, some years ago, with a needle which had been used on another boy who had the leprosy. From the patient's previous sur-

roundings and antecedents it is impossible to conceive in what other method he could have become a leper.

Hilo district has at last been favored with good rains.

The prisoners who were at work on King street yesterday morning managed to smash a water pipe, causing a small deluge.

A LOT, on the plains, having 75 feet frontage to Kinau street, was sold yesterday by Mr. E. P. Adams for \$800. Mr. J. Farnsworth was the purchaser.

ONE of the three new bulletin boards to be erected at J. M. Oat, Jr., & Co.'s store is for Wilder & Co.'s steamers, one is for the Inter-Island S. N. Co. and the third is for general telephonic news of vessels arriving.

A MEETING of the Trustees of the Planters Labor and Supply Co. was held yesterday morning, when communications from Washington were read and general business matters were dealt with.

The Michiels mystery is still unexplained, although a former employee of that gentleman was, this morning, sentenced to twelve months imprisonment for a series of petty pilferings.

The rate of exchange at Bishop & Co.'s was reduced, this morning, to 5 per cent. for large and 5 1/2 per cent. for small drafts.

YESTERDAY'S Police Court business included nine drunks, three cases of assault and battery, three of disorderly conduct and one of furious driving. Three cases were remanded, one was fined and the remainder, thinking discretion the better part of valor, forfeited their bail.

The sale, at the residence of Mrs. Dudoit, commences at ten o'clock to-morrow morning. In addition to the whole of her handsome furniture, some valuable plants, flowers, ferns and garden tools will be offered. This will be one of the largest furniture sales that has taken place in Honolulu, for some time past.

AN assignee's sale, in the bankruptcy of Thos. B. Walker, will be held by Mr. E. P. Adams on Saturday. The property consists of all the bankrupt's interest in the building formerly occupied as the Delmonico, and those two buildings now occupied by Mr. S. Nowlein and Mr. P. A. Dias.

THE Alameda sailed at 3 o'clock this afternoon, with over seventy cabin passengers and a larger freight than she carried on her last trip to the Coast. Besides 2,250 tons of sugar, she had on board 2,200 bunches of bananas, 500 sacks of rice, 300 green hides and 150 tons of sundries. When leaving she drew 22 feet of water. The band played on the wharf as usual.

REPORTS of accidents, to the mill machinery, have been received from Kipahulu, Lihue, Lahaina, Ookala and Waimea. The accidents were not of a serious nature, in most instances the fly wheel coming to grief. At Lahaina and Lihue the delay in grinding was brief. At Onomea, where the mill had not been at work from scarcity of water, an accident was expected shortly after a start had been made, and new segments for the fly wheel have been sent for.

Customer, critically—That's better. Gimme something darker.

Dealer hands out a box of loud-voiced, tough, hard-drawing Key West domestics at the same rate.

Customer, (taking half a dozen from the box,) "Why didn't you show these up before?"

"We only sell these to a few special customers," remarks the dealer, as he bows the particular customers out and credits \$2.25 to his profit account.

Every one knows the customer who falls in during the busiest hour of the day, edges his way to a front place, gets the attention of the salesman by a loudly-uttered, "Say, boss, will yez give me a clay pipe. I dales here for me backer."

He gets a pipe with the mystic "T. D." inscribed on the bowl, and goes off happy, but not so happy as the dealer is to get rid of him.

One Kearny-street dealer avers that the cabalistic letters "T. D." stand for "terriers' delight," but as he is a member of an Orange lodge and inveighs against the Land League in and out of season, it is fair to assume that he does not speak the truth.

KNOWS WHAT HE WANTS. Another customer is the man who knows what he wants, is well up on values, and proposes to get what he seeks.

It is safe to say that this gentleman gets for eighteen cents as good a cigar as any man wants to smoke. Perhaps he only pays a bit for a smoke, but he is sure to have his money's worth, and equally certain to be served with a smokable article.

In talking with a large retail dealer, the other day, an Alta reporter received several hints on the cigar business. Said this gentleman, "The most costly bit cigar we sell is the imported Garcia, and among smokers who know a good article the brand has a very large run.

But it is well to be careful in buying Garcias. The firm puts up a second quality of the brand. These are culls; the broken, patched wrappers and badly rolled cigars. The filler is as good as the first quality, but they don't smoke well, and as for local imitations there are thousands of them.

Nearly every factory in town imitates the Garcia label, but a glance at the Custom House stamps on the box reveal the fact that they are domestic goods. Some of them are fair cigars, but they are not worth within five cents as much as the imported goods.

The best of the cheap imported cigars is THE MANILLA. They are worth ten cents, and most of them are made in China.

More than half the so-called Manillas sold here are domestic imitations. One can tell them by the way the wrapper is put on. The genuine goods have a wrapper laid lengthwise. The imitations made here are rolled around and around, diagonally.

Some people fancy that a cigar having light spots on the wrapper is sure to be good. Those spots are the marks of the tobacco worm, and it is supposed that the worm only attacks the best leaves.

There is a good deal of humbug about cigar smoking. I have heard that no one can tell whether he is smoking or not, unless he can see the smoke or the light on the cigar. I

know that I have been deceived myself in trying to know which of two cigars was lighted, after I was blind folded. Of course, one can tell by inhaling the smoke, but I really think one can draw as much flavor through unlighted cigars as through a burning one.

The taste of the tobacco in the mouth makes the saliva flow, the same as chewing tobacco.

Talking to another dealer about his customers, the reporter received the information that the hardest people to do business with were the men who were afraid to say they wanted a five-cent cigar, and force a salesman to show them half his stock before they could select a nickel domestic.

He found the same class of people among tobacco buyers. Some of them would look through box after box, and wind up by taking a plug from the same box they had used for months past.
