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- Over forty dollars, not exceeding \$50 25 cents

No order will be issued for more than fifty dollars. When a larger sum is wanted it must be procured in two or more orders.

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An order is payable on presentation, only at the office drawn on, and the person to whom it is paid must receipt for the amount.

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No money-order business transacted on Sunday.

Pamphlets, containing more full details of the money-order system, can be had on application at any of the post-offices.

Foreign Money Orders cannot be issued until money order treaties have been made with such countries as it may be desirable to extend the system to.

THE ENTERTAINMENT

for the benefit of the Library and Reading Room Association will be repeated to-night at the Music Hall. An account of Thursday night's performance will thus have a double interest. The proceedings opened with an excellent selection by Camarosa, played by the Symphony Club. Every public appearance of this club seems to show a marked improvement. Then followed a tableau, "The Indiscreet Monk," representing a Spanish woman (Miss Richardson) exercising her powers of attraction over a monk (Mr. Bosse), who ought to have been reading his Breviary, but couldn't keep his eyes on it for two seconds together. This was one of the most thoroughly realistic tableaux presented; every detail was attended to. Then Mrs. Strong recited the story of the "Emperor's daughter," by Hans Christian Andersen. Next came three tableaux, representing Mephistopheles showing Faust a vision of Marguerite. Next Miss Castle played a Polonaise, by Chopin, charmingly. Seldom have we heard the more delicate nuances of expression in this writer's works, so tenderly yet so truly marked. Next came the hit of the evening—a musical extravaganza, entitled "Operetta—The Blind Beggars," by Offenbach. Mr. Purvis comes in arrayed as an old blind beggar, and after singing a song, with banjo accompaniment, informs the audience, in an aside, that he thinks he has struck the very finest thing in the begging line that could be. While he is regaling himself with the thought that now he has a walk in life undisturbed by rivals, Beggar No. 2 (Mr. Swanzy) comes in playing "Home, Sweet Home" on a tin whistle. The artistic imitation of the variations introduced by professional beggars into all their music brought down the house. After singing duets and solos they finally propose a game of cards, in which each thinks he is going to cheat the other by means of his eyesight. Mutual discovery that neither is blind tableau. The piece was enthusiastically enjoyed. Messrs. Purvis and Swanzy's acting was superb. To see this piece alone is worth the whole evening. Part II. was introduced by a selection from the Symphony Club not on the programme. Then followed Portraits by the Old Masters, a series of single figures on a frame. We would here protest against the introduction of those figures that have already been seen in the previous tableaux and the bringing on of those who are to come in further on. The programme is already a long one without this unnecessary artistic addition. Next came a trio, by Laechnor, for piano (Miss Castle), violin (Prof. Yardley), and viola (Mr. Marquez.) Next followed a representation of the old story of Pygmalion, the sculptor, falling in love with Galatea, the statue he has just carved. Pygmalion was represented by Mr. A. W. Richardson, and Galatea by Mrs. McGrew. This was one of the prettiest tableaux shown. Mr. T. H. Davies sang "Two's company, three's none," accompanied by Mrs. Davies. Miss Stotts, as the Christian martyr crucified, formed the central figure in the next tableau. Then followed Mrs. Paty's song, "Esmeralda," which literally roused the audience from the somnolent feeling produced by the long series of Portraits into an enthusiastic recall. In response Mrs. Paty gave "When the leaves begin to fall." Last came two tableaux from "Patience"—the twenty love sick Maidens and Bunthorne (Mr. Holdsworth) and the re-action and grouping of the same maidens round Grosvenor (Mr. C. A. Brown) and Patience, and the "rage, horror, and despair" of Bunthorne and Lady James. The

lower portion of the house was crowded, but there wasn't over a dozen in the gallery and balcony. It would be better to have not quite such long waits between the pieces, or else to have them long enough to put in some music for a song so as to give the audience something to think about while the next tableau is getting ready.

The stmr Jas. Makee brought 2,195 bags of sugar, and 30 bags of rice.

Both masts of the schr Julia will be taken out, preparatory to her going on the marine railway.

The brigine Morning Star has been repaired. She is docked near the fish-market, and will sail about the middle of June.

The tern J. C. Ford is loading at Brewer's wharf. She will leave about Tuesday for San Francisco.

LOCAL & GENERAL ITEMS.

The Building Committee of St. Andrew's Cathedral will meet to-day at 1 o'clock at T. H. Davies & Co's office.

"A Cigar Analyzed—A talk with young men about the use of Tobacco," will be Mr. Cruzan's theme Sunday evening. Services Sunday morning as usual.

At Heela on Thursday two Chinamen cutting cane were racing. The slowest one in order to delay his antagonist began to fool with him and in the contest one got cut in the neck with a can-knife. No serious injury was inflicted although the first report state that one had cut the other's head off.

FULLER particulars are to hand of the Chinaman who was drowned from the Madras on Thursday. When the Kalua was out the day before her bow line parted, and a part of it was still hanging by the steamer's side. The Luka also had a bow line fast near the same place, and it is supposed that the deceased mistook the one for the other. At any rate he went down the broken line until he was right in the water. Captain English, the quarantine officer on the Luka, called out to the officers on the Madras, and finally the captain came along. Lines were thrown to the deceased, and he got one bowline over his head. Finally they commenced to haul in on the line he was clinging to, and he let go and sank. He had been in the water then for about half an hour. The Madras people wanted the schooner to lower a boat to pick him up, but as the Madras' own boat was in the water Captain English did not see the necessity of putting the schooner and its extra large crew in quarantine by doing a thing they were able to do. Why the people on the Madras did not make a large bowline round the rope the Chinaman was clinging to and thus slip it over his head and shoulders easily is unexplained. The deceased was apparently just recovering from the fever stage of small-pox, as his skin was peeling off in patches. The Luka is still outside at anchor.

The Races will commence at 10 A.M. sharp.

1st—PARK PLATE,

Hurdle Race; one mile dash; 4 hurdles; free to all; catch weights.

2nd—LEHI CUP,

Mule Race; one mile dash; free for all; catch weights.

3rd—QUEEN'S CUP,

Running Race; one mile heats; best 2 in 3; free for all.

4th—KING'S CUP,

Trotting Race; mile heats; best 3 in 5 to harness; free for all.

5th—KAMEHAMEHA PLATE,

Running Race; one mile dash; for Hawaiian bred horses not having a better record than 1:57.

6th—RECIPROCITY CUP,

Running Race; one mile heats; best 2 in 3; free to all Hawaiian bred horses.

7th—LUNAKAKAANANA PLATE,

Trotting Race; one mile heats; best 2 in 3; free to all Hawaiian bred horses.

8th—GRAZIER'S PLATE,

Running Race; 2 1/2 mile dash; free to all Hawaiian bred horses two years old.

9th—PRINCESS CUP,

Pony Race; one mile dash; open to all ponies bred in the Kingdom not over 14 hands high; catch weights.

10th—LUNALILO PLATE,

Running Race; mile dash; open to all horses bred in the Kingdom that have never run at Kapiolani Park.

11th—AMATEUR CUP,

Trotting Race; mile heats; best 2 in 3 to harness; owners to drive.

12th—EXPRESS CUP,

Trotting Race; one mile; free to all horses that have never trotted in any public race.

13th—FOOT RACE, BICYCLE RACE, etc.

Purses will be arranged as soon as the management can conveniently do so.

All horses entered for the above races will be under the control of the Judges, and their decision will be final.

All Running Races will be under the rules of the Pacific Blood Horse Association, excepting as to weights.

All horses to carry a rider.

No Pool selling will be allowed on the Park grounds.

All horses that are sold in Pools will be ruled out.

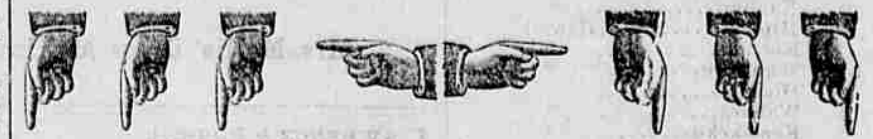

ONE TALL PEDESTAL of mazarine ground with most graceful and naturally colored leafage. A very handsome parlor ornament. Also

ONE TALL PEDESTAL in turquoise, with graceful and nicely colored festoons of fruits and flowers intertwined

TWO RIBBON FLOWER VASES of most unique design with mazarine ground and gold Japanese sprays

GARDEN SEATS beautifully decorated with naturally colored chrysanthemums and pink tied ribbons. Also ditto on celadon ground. Are very handsome garden ornaments

FLOWER POTS AND STANDS Of rare and beautiful design, with mazarine ground and colored enamel with birds beautifully embossed. All of the above mentioned are very difficult pieces to produce on account of the various combinations of color required, necessitating separate firings for each color produced. Some of the pieces have split in the kiln as many as eight times, so that when a piece is brought safely through the firing process, the value is quite apparent. 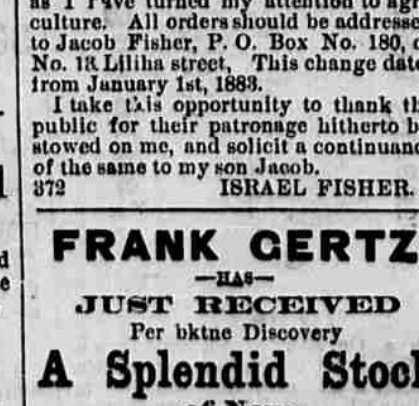

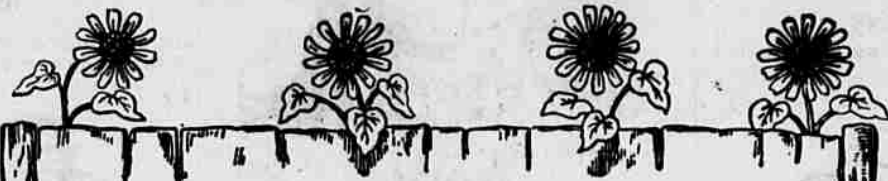
