POLICE INSPECTION DAY

The police, both mounted and foot, were inspected by Attorney General Cooper at 10 o'clock this morning. The guardians of the peace and particularly the foot police, made a fine showing. There were in line, twenty-five police with three captains and as many lieutenants, thirteen mounted patrolmen, the captain and two lieutenants, five bicycle patrolmen, Hack Inspector Macy, two drivers of the patrol wagon and two special police officers. Captain Parker was in command.

The men were first drawn up in line in their street uniforms, with helmets and clubs. Minister Cooper, accompanied by Marshal Brown and Deputy Marshal Chillingworth, appeared on the scene when the men were at attention. The men gave the right hand salute and then the Attorney General went the regular rounds.

The most interesting part of the inspection was when, ten minutes later, the foot and mounted police appeared with their guns, the former dressed in mountaineers' uniform with blue sweaters, white trousers, leggings, black handkerchieves and white canvas hats.

After going through the manual of arms, the mounted police fell out, leaving the natives alone. They were then spread out in open order and, at the command, went through the bayonet exercises without a single command. The men have been most carefully trained by Captain Parker, to whom much credit is due. So perfect was the drill that the people who watched the men could not help but applaud. At the conclusion, Attorney General Cooper walked up to Captain Parker and congratulated him and the men for the excellent showing.

NEW ASSIGNMENT OF TROOPS

Manila, March 18.—The entire American force has been reorganized, two divisions of three brigades each being formed. General Lawton today assumed command of the First Division, which consists of the Washington, North Dakota and California Volunteers, under General King; six troops of the Fourth Cavalry; the Fourteenth Regiment; the Idaho Volunteers and a battalion of the Iowa troops, under General Ovenshine; the Third and Twenty-second Regiments of Infantry, and the Oregon Regiment, under General Wheaton, and Dyer's and Hawthorne's light batteries.

General MacArthur's division consists of two batteries of the Third Artillery, the Kansas and Montana Volunteers, under H. G. Otis; the Colorado, Nebraska and South Dakota Regiments and six companies of the Pennsylvania Regiment under General Hale; the Fourth and Seventeenth Regiments, the Minnesota and Wyoming Volunteers and the Utah Artillery.

A separate brigade will be assigned to provost guard duty consisting of the Twentieth and eight companies of the Twenty-third Regiment of Infantry.

An attack was made by the rebels yesterday upon the battery at Lona Church, but they were repulsed by the Pennsylvanians with heavy loss. Lieutenant Thompson and Privates McVay and McCause of Company C were wounded.

A gunboat with a company of the Twenty-third Regiment on board is now on the lake attacking the small towns. She was last heard of off Morong and Santa Cruz.

Rev. W. M. Kincaid, pastor of Central Union church, led the union meeting at the Methodist Episcopal church last night. There was a congregation that filled the place.

PUNCHBOWL FOR CEMETERY

President Dole and Committee Find Soil Perfectly Suitable.

An Accident That Might Have Had Serious Consequences Happily Has No Worse Results Than An Impromptu Joke.

President Dole personally conducted another expedition in the new cemetery quest yesterday afternoon. This was to the crater of Punchbowl. Two wagonettes picked up the party at McIntyre's corner at 4 o'clock. F. A. Schaefer went along in his own buggy. With the President the other members of the expedition were David Dayton, John W. McDonald, Charles Wilcox and representatives of the Advertiser, Star, Independent, Makasinana and BULLETIN. W. H. Cummings, the road supervisor, awaited the party at the Tantalus road, having with him a laborer with pick and shovel.

Mr. Cummings showed the way to about a dozen trial pits, sunk to test the character of the earth, at different places within the crater. Even in those close under the rocky rim of the crater the digging was seen to be a very easy matter. These were indeed the only pits where any rock formation was visible, and it was such as to yield readily to the pick. For the rest, a thick stratum of vegetable loam lay at the surface, and below it strata of volcanic ashes and sand. Not the slightest doubt was left that practically the whole basin within the summit rim was eminently adapted for the making of graves. The soil was also seen to be of very fine quality for the cultivation of trees and flowers to beautify a city of the dead. Attesting this feature is a rank jungle of laurens mingled with kiawe trees. Water, as President Dole observed, could be laid on through a special pipe from Luskaha reservoir, which is from three to four hundred feet above the higher levels of the site. The area suitable for the purpose in view was estimated at a hundred acres.

The drive up the Pauoa side and home by the Makiki route was a most agreeable outing to the party. An accident that might have been serious happened at Observation point. While the wagonette in rear containing the President and three others, was rounding the rugged hummock at the peak, it hit a big stone protruding in the inner wheel track. The shock dished the off hind wheel. There is a steep bank close to the road at the spot, and for a brief moment the occupants of the carriage thought they were going to be hurled down the declivity. The driver was alert, however, in putting added pressure on the brakes, and with one rocking heave toward danger the vehicle stood stock still. There was room enough in the other carriage for the stranded expedition. Editor Norris of the Independent could not resist the opportunity of chaffing the head of what he calls the "funny little republic" over the chance so narrowly averted of Mr. Mott Smith's accession to the presidency. Nobody laughed more heartily at the joke than President Dole.

Carter Promises Bought.
Mr. Kunst has bought the property of the late C. L. Carter at Waikiki. The sum paid was \$20,000. The yearly trips of Mr. Kunst to Honolulu decided him to purchase some place where he might go and be comfortable. He bought the Stevenson home in Samoa for this same reason.

Honolulu People Going.
Mrs. Irene Brown, Mrs. Noonan and Mrs. E. D. Teoney with her children, will leave in the Australia, sailing April 18. They will go to Lake Tahoe, there to spend five or six months.

DIVIDENDS 2 1-2 A MONTH

This Is What Honokaa Sugar Company Will Pay.

New Mill to Be Added to the Present Plant and Made in Honolulu—Other Stock Items.

Honokaa Sugar Company's stockholders held their special meeting this morning. It was decided to add a new six-roller mill to the present three-roller plant, which being itself new it is inexpedient to throw out. Preference will be given in the contract for making the new mill to the Honolulu Iron Works. This new mill proposition, with the added encouragement to home manufacture, originated with Mr. Pollitz, the San Francisco broker.

Dividends of two and a half percent monthly will be paid by the company. So today's meeting decided. At the end of the year whatever surplus may have accrued, over the monthly dividends, will be paid out as an annual dividend.

The proposal to divide the stock five to one and double its amount to \$2,000,000, mentioned in this paper the other day, was not carried at this meeting. It will be the special business of a meeting ten or fifteen days hence, as the Government requires some such notice before granting an amendment of that kind to the charter. The bulk of the new stock will be placed on the California market.

Very favorable reports on water come from the Kihai plantation. It is no longer a matter of doubt that the supply will be copious. Contrary to street talk, too, it is declared by conservative men that there is, practically, land enough for all the expansion that the capital will bear.

Owing to the good reports regarding both soil and water in the Lanai enterprise, the Maunalei stock is being enatched "baldheaded," as one operator puts it, by the Chinese in town.

THEY WILL DIVIDE AFRICA

Great Britain and France Agree Upon Terms.

Treaty Signed That Assures Peace in Valley of the Nile—Rights of Both Powers to be Protected.

London, March 21.—The convention between Great Britain and France, delimiting their respective frontiers in the valley of the Nile, was signed tonight by the Marquis of Salisbury and the French Ambassador, M. Paul Cambon.

Broadly stated, the terms of the convention are as follows: The exact frontier from the northern line of the Belgian Congo to latitude 15 is to be determined by a mixed commission, it being agreed that Great Britain shall retain Bahr el-Ghazal, with Darfur; France keeping Wadai (or Waday), west of Darfur; Bagirmi, South of Lake Chad; Kanea, north of Lake Chad, and generally speaking the territory east and north of Lake Chad, lying north of the fifteenth parallel.

The French sphere will extend south of the Tropic of Cancer to the western limit of the Libyan desert.

The signatories agree to equality of commercial treatment from the Nile to Lake Chad and between the fifteenth and nineteenth parallels of latitude.

The latter clause permits France to establish commercial houses on the Nile and its affluents.

The signatories undertake to refrain from exercising political or territorial rights outside of the frontiers affected by the convention.

THE ORPHEUM.

Boyd and Oro did clever work in single turns, in song and tumbling respectively. A laughable farce entitled "Married Maehere" in which Jim Post figured as the henpecked husband caused great merriment. The whole winding up with a contortionist act by Antonio Van Gofre, the world famed boneless man, who is simply marvelous as an illustration of how ossification can be held in abeyance if not altogether defied.

Trouble at Kukuihaele.
The Noeau brought the news this morning that there had been trouble between Japanese and Chinese at Kukuihaele over a Japanese woman. The extent of the trouble could not be learned as the message came over the telephone just as the Noeau was leaving.

Kahuku to Spread Out.
Kahuku plantation is considering the matter of spreading out to the upper lands already included in its territory. Surveyor Monsarrat has been at work taking the levels of the land and setting them down on paper so that the proper size pumps, etc., may be calculated on.

USURY QUESTION ON TRIAL

Maritime Registry Case Submitted to Supreme Court.

An Appeal Taken in Paris vs. Fernandez—Matter of Instructions to Trustees of H. A. P. Carter's Will.

Wong Kwai by his attorneys, Magoon & Silliman, makes a general denial to the complaint of Wong Sing Company.

In the equity suit of Paris vs. Fernandez, the defendant by his attorneys, Magoon & Silliman, has given notice of appeal from the decision of Judge Perry. The decision orders defendant to execute the lease bargained for, but leaves him free to do as he pleases with the 1400 cattle running on the land.

J. T. De Bolt, attorney for all the defendants excepting Wm. White, files a general denial in the suit of Testa vs. Kahabawai and others, debt on account of printing a newspaper.

After hearing argument on the bill in equity for instructions, of Jos. O. Carter and Geo. R. Carter, trustees under the will of H. A. P. Carter, vs. Frances Crohore, Agnes C. Galt, Cordelia J. Carter and Sibel A. Carter, Judge Stanley requested briefs to be filed within five days. Robertson & Wilder for complainants; Thurston & Andrews for respondents.

Mary Achi vs. F. A. Severin, appeal by defendant from District Court of Honolulu, was argued and submitted in the Supreme Court this morning. Achi and Johnson for plaintiff; Henshall for defendant.

Lincoln D. Spencer vs. Collector General of Customs was argued and submitted yesterday. Kinney, Ballou & McClanahan for plaintiff; Attorney General Cooper for defendant. This is the maritime registry case of the bark Star of France.

The appeal of plaintiff on points of law from the District Court of Honolulu, in the case of J. H. Schrack vs. J. H. Hare, is being heard by the Supreme Court. J. T. De Bolt for plaintiff; S. F. Chillingworth for defendant. Judge Wilcox in the court below threw out the case on the ground that the note of hand forming its basis showed that a higher rate of interest than one percent a month was charged. The suit was for a balance due on the face of the note, the amount of the note including the interest charged the borrower. Interest had been collected at various times on the amount overdue, but at the trial below plaintiff could not say how much.

About Mail from States.
A great many people have, since the arrival of the Alameda, been complaining that letters, confidently expected, have not arrived from the States. Their minds will be set at rest when they are informed that the Alameda brought only two days mail and that the bulk of the mail from the States was sent through in the transport Cleveland that sailed two days before the Alameda. This transport should be telephoned at any minute now.

TO PROTECT SAILORS
 San Francisco, March 20.—The U. S. Shipping Commissioner in San Francisco has come to the assistance of sailors who earn a living in deep-water ships relative to the recent cut in wages from \$20 to \$15 per month.
 The usual custom followed by masters of such vessels is to secure a crew from boarding house keepers who agree to furnish the men at a certain scale of wages.
 For the past two years the amount paid to sailors on deep-water vessels has ranged from \$20 to \$30 per month. A recent act of Congress which goes into effect on April 1 allows a sailor's wages for but one month to be allotted to a boarding house keeper. In the face of this law and the fact that as sailors are nearly always in debt to the boarding house keepers the latter have agreed to furnish men at \$15 per month when it would naturally be to their interests to secure a higher scale of wages for the men who are in their debt.
 The Shipping Commissioner views this action with suspicion, and it is thought that the boarding house keepers and masters of deep-water ships have an agreement by which the sailors will be paid only \$15 per month and the balance, which they should receive under the old scale, will go to the boarding house men.
 This morning the Commissioner refused to sign crews for three American deep-water snips now in the harbor and telegraphed to Washington for instructions.
 The duties of a Shipping Commissioner and the aim of many acts of Congress are to see that sailors on American ships receive their full wages and are treated properly. While the sailors grumbled at the cut in wages they are in no position to help themselves. It is the custom for boarding house keepers to furnish food and lodging of sailors relying upon the allotment of their wages to secure payment of the debts. When board is refused to a sailor he will submit to anything the boarding house keeper may say and is only too glad to get to sea instead of going hungry on shore.
 The outcome of the test cases made today by the Commissioner will be of interest to all engaged in deep-water traffic.

INDIAN SUGAR BILL.
 Measure Establishing Countervailing Duties Passed.
 Calcutta, March 20.—The Legislative Council today adopted the countervailing sugar bill. The Viceroy of India expressed satisfaction at the unanimous feeling of the Council on the subject of the bill. He said the fullest inquiries have shown the necessity of haste in the case and he condemned the bounty system as being a "vicious expedient for selfish interests."
 Lord Curzon also asserted that the Indian Government was only exercising its legitimate right in relieving the country and helping an important industry and a great number of cultivators.
 London, March 30.—Reginald McKenna, Liberal member for North Monmouthshire, raised the countervailing duty question in the House of Commons today by asking if it was proposed to pursue the same policy in Great Britain. Mr. Balfour, the Government leader and First Lord of the Treasury, feuded the question, declaring that there was no indigenous sugar production in Great Britain as there is in India.

Anderson Will Return.
 Washington, March 17.—Under orders from the War Department, General Anderson, now in command of the first division of the Eighth Army Corps in the Philippines, will return to the United States, probably on the next transport to leave Manila, and will be assigned to the command of one of the military departments in this country, in all probability the Department of the Columbia, with headquarters at Vancouver, Wash. General Lawton will succeed him in command of the first division of the Eighth Corps.

It is no reflection on the young men that the Government motto now is 'Give the little ones a chance.'

Agoncillo has finally turned up in Paris. It wouldn't be surprising if he settled down in Spain as an old enemy sometimes makes the best friend for such a cause as that of the Filipinos.

The cut throat policy that has resulted in the failure to elect a United States Senator from California will pale into insignificance at the next election when the knife will be drawn to pay old scores.

Women are becoming an increasing power in politics. And women are not an unknown factor in the stock market. Query: Are the women of Honolulu in favor of stopping importation of Asiatic labor to Hawaii?

"Closing in on Aguinaldo" has been used so often by correspondents in describing the movements of American troops that the people are beginning to figure up the area of Luzon to find how many miles the troops have to march before they get closed in upon Aguinaldo.

It is now stated that no one but Cervera deserves the credit for bottling his fleet in Santiago harbor, since "Cervera bottled up himself." Congress might promote the Spanish admiral for meritorious conduct during the war. If this would stop the wrangling over the distribution of glory, the people would be satisfied.

The destruction by fire of the Windsor hotel of New York in broad daylight, accompanied as it was by great loss of life, demonstrates that with all the improvements of the nineteenth century the fire fiend is still a hard foe to conquer. Fire proof buildings have yet to be proof against fire and the best organized fire department of the country has its limitations.

Failure of four States to elect United States Senators calls for suggestions of the dangers of legislative deadlocks at a time of national crisis. There are dangers of course, but if the election of any one of these Senators meant the completion of a party majority or jeopardized a party measure the force of the national party would be brought to bear to break up petty legislative squabbles.

It takes the people of Kansas to prove that there really is something new under the sun. The Democrats of Wichita have nominated a Salvation Army man for mayor whose platform is: Free street car rides to and from the church, every policeman to carry a Bible, all business to be suspended on Sunday, and every woman caught wearing bloomers to be fined \$10. This is the first time on record that Democrats could be designated as the missionary party.

Hawaii is so thoroughly taken up with its local industrial enterprises that hardly more than passing attention is given to the development of trade with the Northwest. The British American line with hardly six months elapsed since its inception gives Hilo a local steamer and makes a change for the better in its regular liner. The interest shown by Tacoma and Seattle in developing the Hawaiian market should be

reciprocated by Hawaii in the development of its new agricultural industries. Washington and Oregon are a natural market for Hawaii's coffee and tropical fruits. San Francisco has been a good friend, but business is business and this territory cannot afford to look indifferently upon the advances made and the market offered, with direct communication, by the leading cities of the Northwest.

 What do you think of Hawaii?
 How do you like the climate?
 Do you believe in expansion?
 What is the situation in Washington?

What does McKinley think about the governorship?

What kind of a government are we going to get?

Don't you think the Sugar Trust is fighting Hawaii?

How soon before sugar will drop to two cents?

When will the Nicaragua Canal be completed?

Don't the people in Washington think that Hawaii is the best all round good child that has ever got into the union?

What does Congress think of Mr. Dole's minority report?

When you go to the Volcano what do you think you'll think of Hilo?

These are simply a few stock in trade questions that will be put to the visiting Senator from Wyoming and when he has answered them with statements favorable to Hawaii, the people will rest comfortably, confident that nothing unfavorable to Hawaii can happen in Washington.

THE BIGGEST REPUBLICAN.

Taken in all his dimensions Speaker Reed is at the present time the biggest man in Republican politics, the President alone excepted. During the last session of Congress he has brought the people to a knowledge of the power of one man in the legislative branch of the government to check the fulfillment of the Executive policy. Reed with his power to appoint committees and thereby determine the success or failure of pet legislative schemes of members of Congress controls a patronage quite as useful for political purposes as the official patronage of the President. The President proposes and the Speaker disposes has been the program in the last Congress and it is even chances that this situation will be continued in the next Congress, the object in view being the control of the national nominating convention in 1900.

This condition of affairs is by no means beneficial to the country, although it is not likely to be disastrous to the party. In the long run Reed will be the sufferer since McKinley's policy is one of progress before which Reed stands as the stumbling block. Reed is and always has been opinionated since his first ap-

pearance in his State legislature. By his direct opposition to the administration in its expansion policy with cable and canal accompaniments, the Speaker has reached a crisis which is likely to relegate him to the rear or possibly into the Democratic party. On the policy of expansion Reed and Bryan stand on practically the same platform. Their only serious difference is in relation to finance.

Reed as a Democrat, however, is not a probability unless the expansion policy is carried to the point of a general shake up in all the parties. He will not be turned down in his own State, where the Republican leaders endorse McKinley's policy, because, like Hale, he is too able and powerful a man to be replaced by a Congressional novice. Thus he stands at outs with the administration and not in full sympathy with his party, but at same time holding his place at the head of the House of Representatives. Reed aspires to be President but like many Speakers before him, has exercised his power with such freedom that he will fall in with his predecessors as among those "too big to be President."

THE HANDS OF OTIS.
 Will Decide as to Ransom for Spanish Prisoners.
 New York, March 21.—A Washington special to the Herald says: Major General Otis and other members of the Philippine Commission will decide whether or not the ransom of the Spanish prisoners held by Aguinaldo is to be permitted.
 As a result of representations by Ambassador Cambon and the National Red Cross Society showing the deplorable condition of these prisoners. General Otis will be given power to act after advising with his associates on the commission. The President hopes it may be found possible to obtain the release of the prisoners, but does not wish to give General Otis direct instructions in view of his former objection on the ground that it would give Aguinaldo a means to secure military supplies.
 There are said to be about 500 Spanish prisoners, most of them priests. As the Filipinos blamed the priests for most of the hardships they suffered under Spanish rule, they are particularly inhuman in their treatment of the churchmen.

ENGLAND AND ARBITRATION.

John Bull Declines to Tell His Attitude at the Peace Conference.

London, March 20. -Replying to the question of Stanhope as to whether, in view of the position Great Britain has taken on the promotion of arbitration as shown by the Alabama, Behring sea and Venezuela arbitrations and the proposals for an Anglo-American treaty of arbitration, her majesty's Government will take the initiative in submitting to the peace conference a scheme for permanent arbitration, the parliamentary secretary of the Foreign Office said in the House of Commons today that the Government would use its best efforts to promote the principle of arbitration, but he added that it was not convenient to make a statement respecting proposals to be made to the conference.

Shakedown on City Roads.

There is shortly to be instituted an improved method in handling prison labor on city road work. The lunas are to be placed under the strict surveillance of the road supervisor. They will have to work in working hours or they will hear something drop about their own ears. The luxury of a newspaper under a shady tree, with back to the gang, will only be enjoyed by the luna at the peril of his job. Prisoners will not be allowed to gather wood to cook their grub in the government's time, but will have to do all that kind of thing within the lunch hour. It will, in short, be hard labor in conformity with their sentences—that is, as hard as free men have to work in these parts to earn their livelihood. The increased vigilance will incidentally serve the other purpose of preventing desertions. This has been an absolute function for the most part under the easy discipline in vogue, simply because the element in hand is only criminal and not idiotic. To run away and have to earn a living, under the circumstances, would stamp a prisoner as a subject for examination by the insane asylum board.

Writes His Own Answer.

J. Spooer has filed an answer to the complaint in ejectment suit of S. M. Damon and others, trustees of the Bishop Estate. He declares he has never been officially notified of the sale of the property, therefore has no reason to vacate his home. He has heard from good authority that the said trustees valued the property at \$25,000. Before he vacates in their favor he demands that they pay him \$5,000. He also demands a roadway across the property out to the Kalihi road and a deed for the same. Against the claim of \$1000 damages, he sets off a claim of \$5000 a year for each year "from the date of the forged deed," for damage sustained by being deprived of the use of his property either for sale or rent, thereby keeping him in continual destitution. "For over eight years," he concludes, "I have declared Mrs. Rice's deed a forged deed and there has never been one denial of the assertion, therefore I consider the non denial an acknowledgment of the fact."

Hercules Delayed. The Hercules was to have sailed in ballast for the Sound yesterday, but the captain was under the weather and decided to wait until today. The ship was to have sailed early this morning but, upon looking up the crew, it was found that four men had deserted during the night. It is not certain now just when the Hercules will be able to get away.

TO STUDY IN EUROPE. Naval Cadets Who Will Be Sent to Glasgow and Paris.

Washington, March 20.—Secretary Long has instructed Rear-Admiral McNair to abolish in June the construction course at the naval academy established by Naval Constructor Hobson. Five cadets who have passed the requisite academic course are now pursuing the course. Three have expressed a desire to enter the line in view of the quick promotion promised under the personnel law. The other two will be sent to the University of Glasgow, and the construction cadets in the first class of the naval academy will be sent to Paris, where they will continue for two years their study of naval architecture.

Rear Admiral Highborn, chief of the bureau of construction and repairs, desired that the cadets should receive instruction at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology or Cornell University but the department decided in favor of the English and French schools.

He is quite busy just now getting some things ready for the Mariposa so that he will not return to his work at the Diamond Head Signal Station until tomorrow afternoon.
