IMMIGRANTS ARE BEING "DOCTORED."

Washington, Sept 25—Startling frauds are said to have been discovered by Special Agent Fishberg of the Immigration Bureau to the effect that it is the practice of many foreign steamship companies to "doctor" emigrants before they leave Europe so that they will be able to pass American inspectors. Fishberg has been abroad for seven weeks investigating the methods of housing and caring for emigrants.

The report was handed to Commissioner General Sargent today and among other things it alleges that companies, particularly those carrying Italians and Greeks, house women and children, sick and well, in the most squalid boarding houses, where the sick are "doctored" to an appearance of health. The work is said to be so clever and the deception so complete that thousands of persons are admitted yearly to the United States. They are said to have the most dangerous diseases.

In one house, Fishberg says, fifty sick emigrants were being cared for in one room. They had been rejected by the ship's surgeon as cases that would not pass muster. The man in charge boasted that he would have them "fixed up" so that they could get into the United States.

The system of "doctoring" has led to another evil. Quack doctors impose upon those who have been finally rejected and rob them under the pretense that they will be accepted into the United States.

Fishberg says he saw the ship surgeon pass under the eyes of ship agents two cases of deformed hands, a case of small-pox, one of locomotor ataxia and one of paralysis.

Baron Kaneko Not Coming.

New York, Sept 25—Baron Kaneko, who has been in this country as the financial agent of the Emperor of Japan, has been recalled. He will return to Japan with Baron Komura, one of the peace envoys, the party starting on Wednesday and going by way of Montreal to Vancouver and sailing for the Orient on the Empress of India October 25. He said today:

"I have been in this country nineteen months, during a most critical time in the history of the Japanese. I have been received in every quarter in the most friendly manner. Americans have shown a keen interest in my country and her affairs. As for the relations between the United States and Japan, they will, in my opinion, become closer. The interests of the two nations in the Far East in the future should go hand in hand. I am sure nothing will occur to interrupt those relations."

Cruiser Calabria Arrives.

The Italian cruiser Calabria arrived off port at daylight this morning and anchored in the stream about 7:45 o'clock. She immediately fired a salute to the American flag which was returned by the guns at the naval station. The cruiser, which is third class, will be here about two weeks, during which time a public reception will be given on board.

Lost Treasure Found.

Traverse City, Mich, Sept 8—One hundred and fifty thousand dollars in Spanish gold has been unearthed on North Fox island, off Grand Traverse Bay in Lake Michigan. The gold is supposed to be booty stolen in Chicago in 1871, the year of the great Chicago fire. Frequent attempts have been made to find it, and the final successful effort is said to be the result of recent discovery of a chart drawn and hidden by one of the robbers.

BOULEVARDS A LUXURY.

Surely, it is to laugh. At the supervisors meeting the other evening, a very flattering and flowery letter was read over the signature of J A McCandless for the Hawaii Promotion Committee. It wanted nothing but roads—and good macadamized roads at that—to belt this island as well as beyond Moanalua into Ewa, so that autos would have a clear girth to travel. Good roads are a luxury and so are automobiles, and why should the County expend good money for the mere pleasure of others. Let us have good roads, by all means, good for any ordinary traffic, but let motors alone to accommodate themselves as best they may to conditions. If a road is good enough for the people, why, it must also be good for motorists, who don't pay enough taxes for the luxury. Probably our promotionists care only for the pleasure of such as these and never mind those who cannot afford such luxuries, and yet they pay most of the road taxes. If the Promotion Committee wants good roads, why not let it dig?

KINNEY'S POLICY IS SOUND.

"Every Portuguese home in Hawaii is an argument for protection." Right you are, Mr Kinney. He is further right in his interview in last evening's Bulletin, by saying in support of his foregoing assertion: "I think we should work for the element we now have here. We have 17,000 Portuguese. It is useless to deny that they are fitted to the country and its conditions. With all the disadvantages with which they have been confronted, I'm informed that probably not more than 3,000 have yet left the country. Now, build on to that basis." Pololei; sure mai hoi kela! He's hit the nail right on its head, but our labor employers don't and can't see it the same way as he does, because they want cheap, cheap labor to make big, big, very big dividends. It is to be wondered whether Bryan tipped Kinney.

TOPICS OF THE DAY.

The suggestion that local sportsmen combine for the purpose of acquiring and operating a first class yacht in the proposed races between Honolulu and the Coast is a good one, provided, however, that men can be found willing to put a half million dollars into the project.

During her short stay in the Orient Miss Alice Roosevelt received presents valued at several hundred thousands of dollars. As her distinguished father's salary as head of the nation is only \$50,000 a year, the young woman would appear to have done well during her short tour.

Secretary Taft's visit to Honolulu has resulted in the ordering of 200 more troops to Camp McKinley. This is not a large number but is enough to mean a few thousand extra dollars in trade for Honolulu. It is another advance, too, toward a large garrison which will carry thousands of men.

The announcement that the band will begin its regular concerts next Monday evening will be hailed with delight. This class of music has long been a part of the life of Honolulu, and only a temporary suspension of it has been felt. Now that the band has been taken over by the county, this island will be able to hear and enjoy it more.

W A Kinney is about right when he said that we of Hawaii must fight free trade in the Philippines if we are to succeed, that is, our sugar industry. Asiatics may save the plantations in having cheap labor, but our real salvation lies in our being able to employ our own people instead of bringing in Asiatics, and furthermore, by making those citizens that are here contented with their lot.

That meeting of the Board of Immigration seems to have been planned so that Col W J Bryan might

see what it was doing and hear what the members had to say and advance about introducing prospective laborers and settlers. It was well known that Mr Bryan would that afternoon call upon the Governor, and the meeting was therefore called, and Mr Bryan saw, heard and had a say as to what class of people to bring in—Italians from Northern Italy.

The public has an interest in the case of the four Japanese newspapermen who were arrested for criticizing the acts of their Consul. The Constitution grants freedom of the press, and Japanese are as much entitled to that freedom as anybody else. If Mr Saito felt himself injured by the utterances of the newspapers in question, he had ample facilities and power to bring damage suit against them. It was never shown, at the beginning of the case or since, that the criticisms were criminally libellous.

The gambling house back of the Chinese store on Emma street above Vineyard has been in unobstructed existence for many years. Once a neighbor complained to the police on account of the noise late at night. The Chinese proprietor was warned later in the same day by a police officer that he would thereafter have to close the games at 11 p m. These facts came before the grand jury a year or two after but nothing was done although the place was then running and has been running ever since. (It ran, for instance, throughout Mr Henry's term of office).

A Well Rung Bell.

The seating capacity of the cozy, well-ventilated lecture room of Odd Fellow's Hall was filled to its full seating capacity last evening, the occasion being the first lecture by Dr Fred Bell, the oratorical, actorial, singtorial missionary, whose subject, advertised, by the Tiser, specially, as a something or other was in connection with the Midnight Mission in the Slums of New York. Dr Bell, or Professor Bell, or simply "Fred" Bell, proved himself a dandy in the line of holding an audience. For nearly an hour and a half the lectures may really have been said to have enthralled the audience, over three-fourths of which were of the fair sex, even compelling, fairly compelling, by his impressorial capacity, the audience join in a chorus, which won applause. The bell was rung at 8:10 o'clock and no school bell, auction bell or fire bell could have done as much presentation of the pronoun "I" as Prof Dr Fred Bell did in his brief hour of action. His solos were apt and well presented, his digressions were many and well thrown in that the large audience never were in doubt of the fact. The Doctor is a *lusus naturae*, he having publicly proclaimed that he, personally, had nine children! But, this is a digression; the lectures are well worth attendance for the experience that may be gained; the Prof puts wit and wisdom, aside from song and story, in his talk and an evening could be well wasted spent there by a visit to one of the Doctor, Professor, Bell's lectures.

LOCAL AND GENERAL NEWS.

A gale was reported as blowing over Midway Islands yesterday.

Judge Robinson began the hearing of criminal jury cases today.

The first attendance upon the Y M C A night schools totalled 104.

This afternoon the steamer Nihsu will leave for Kauai with a load of coal.

Sale of the Waikiki Annex at the beach has been postponed to October 21.

Repairs to the tug Fearless will be completed by the last of this week.

The steamer Lehua left yesterday for Molokai and Maui on lighthouse business.

Sailors of the Griffel, now in port say they deserted because the ship is full of fleas.

The Mauna Loa will get away at noon tomorrow for Maui and Hawaii ports.

The Parker ranch case still held the boards in Judge Robinson's court today.

Another meeting of the Kalihl Improvement club will be held on Monday evening.

Yesterday the ship St Francis departed from her anchorage outside for Eleele to discharge coal.

Yesterday afternoon the Tenth Infantry baseball team defeated the naval station nine by a score of 9 to 5.

As they are cleaning ship, only a few of the men of the Italian cruiser Calabria will be allowed ashore tonight.

Judge Robinson yesterday quashed the indictment against four Japanese charged with conspiracy against Consul Salto.

J T Hagner will arrive here about October 19 to become United States pay officer, purchasing pay officer and general store keeper.

The Maile Ilima footballers met yesterday for the purpose of organizing and it was arranged to have practice begin this afternoon.

The steamer Maui arrived this morning from Maui ports and will sail again at 5 o'clock tomorrow afternoon on the same route.

M T Simonton has filed \$1000 bonds, with Cecil Brown as surety, as commissioner to sell certain lots in old cyclomere park, Kewalo.

The old liner America Maru, which went through the late war, will arrive here next Tuesday from Japan on her way to the Coast.

News has arrived that the German training ship Herzogin E Charlotte put into Montevideo in distress and that repairs will take several months.

The cases of Sister Albertina vs David Kawanauakoa and W O Smith vs Pacific Heights railway were argued in Supreme court yesterday and submitted.

The coroner's jury in the case of Salo returned a verdict yesterday afternoon that the man came to his death by cutting himself with a razor with suicidal intent.

Poles and wires are being gotten in place for the electric system between Wainaha and Wahiawa, Kauai. L L Robertson will superintend this part of the work.

The funeral of the late Mrs J Hapai Nui is taking place this afternoon from the Honolulu Undertaking parlors, interment being at the Hill cemetery above the Insane Asylum.

Probably the next distinguished visitor Honolulu will have will be Governor Luke Wright, of the Philippine Islands. He will arrive here in the Manaburta about November 24 and will have a day in Honolulu. Governor Wright goes to Washington on Philippine business with the President and Congress.

Miss Anna Charlotte Grant, formerly of Hilo, was recently married at Manila to B W Cadwallader.

It is expected that the Claudine arriving here about October 19, will catch a part of the next mail from San Francisco, as she leaves there two or three days ahead of the Sonoma.

W G Irwin yesterday received the new four per cent bonds of the government, amounting to \$600,000. Hawaiian five for \$639,600 and \$73,400 cash were given in payment therefor.

Territory Wants Property.

A novel suit has been brought by the Territory against John F Colburn and Irene B Corawell to obtain possession of 15,000 feet of property on Kinsu street. It is set up that the property belonged to one Edmund Smith, who left here about fifty years ago, forsaking it entirely. In some way the property drifted into the possession of the parties named as respondents and it is desired to have the title escheat to the Territory.

Regular concerts by the band will begin again on Monday evening next when a program will be rendered in Emma square. The men were very much worn out by their recent long trip and hard work, so the Board of Supervisors gave them the remainder of this week to recuperate. Prof Berger secured some of the best new music while on the Coast and the band will present it at the coming concerts.

PRETTY OLD TO WED AGAIN.

Los Angeles, Cal, Sept 9—The colored people of this city are greatly interested in a wedding which is soon to take place here. The blushing bride, Aunt Susan Johnson, a full-blood nigger is 120 years old or, at least, thinks she is and has been married six times, surviving her husbands, all of whom were considerably younger than she. Aunt Susan was born on the Nickolls plantation near Warrenton, Va, in 1785, when George Washington was president and she says that she had often seen him when she was a child. The old woman has not a tooth in her mouth, and scarcely a hair on her head. Her face is deeply wrinkled, but she is still wonderfully active and vivacious. On her way from the east she lost her ticket at Dunlap, Ia. She was compelled to stop at Omaha and waited there until the ticket was found and forwarded to her, when she continued her journey, arriving here little the worse for her long trip. Her future husband is a negro, less than half her age. Since her arrival in this city the bride has been the recipient of many attentions from the people of her race and many called on her to hear her talk of older times, far beyond the recollection of the present generation.

Color Line Up North.

Bloomington, Ill, Sept 25—The barbers of Normal today announced their intention of refusing to shave six Filipino students at the State Normal University because their white customers threatened to boycott them unless they placed a ban upon the Filipinos.

Fifty Filipino students reached Chicago today from Washington to register in the various Western colleges and universities, where they will study American ways and business methods. The students are in charge of W A Sutherland, an attache of the Department of the Interior, detailed to look after them until they have been installed in the universities or schools they wish to enter.

Among the number are many sons of prominent families in the Philippines, who have been sent to the United States to gather knowledge with which to aid in the attainment of self government by the islanders.

More Troops Coming.

The garrison at Camp McKinley is to be increased by 150 to 200 men, who have been ordered from Portland, Ore, to Honolulu. Thus the force at the camp will be about doubled. The new troops will be Companies I and K, Tenth Infantry.
