NONE SO QUEER AS CAIRO.—Let the reader imagine a city of a million of inhabitants of all shades of complexion, and all in masquerade costume—men in nightgowns of various colors, some in Turkish dress, some in cloaks, and all wearing red hats or tarbooshes, a few of which are bound with green, to show the wearers are descendants of the Prophet; and many bound with white, forming turbans. Imagine the women with veiled faces, and wearing large and loose black silk wraps, or white or blue cotton sheets, enveloping them from their heads to their heels, and children without enough costume to require description. Then imagine such a city—where horses are few, and donkeys are used in place of street cars, and camels in place of drays; where the shops are not much larger than fair-sized closets, and the merchants speak a language that seems to be mostly made up of k's and g's. Then imagine that much of the business of the city is done by merchants who sit on their feet, and who often do not rise to display their goods, as all are within reach, in their little shops, situated in streets from six to ten feet wide, which are loosely roofed over with matting or pieces of board to keep out the sun. Imagine such a city, with its people dressed in such strange styles and variegated colors, and with the manners, habits and occupation of a thousand years ago, and you have a dim idea of what Cairo is to-day.—*Egyptian Corr. ILLICIT LIQUOR SELLING.

There appears to be a raid on Chinese shop-keepers in the country districts on this island, now going on, in respect to the illicit trade in spirituous liquors. Two cases are now pending in the Police Court of Honolulu, in which Chinese store-keepers at Waiialua and Koolau are charged with selling spirituous liquors, without license, of course. Everybody knows, and it has been notorious for a long time, that a great deal of the liquor sold here in the original packages is sold to Chinese; it is also well understood that these purchasers are not themselves the consumers—they are too shrewd and thrifty to be drunkards. A native paper of this city recently made the statement, that in the country districts of this Island liquor is being openly peddled on the public highways. The only peddlars in the country are Chinese. From the other Islands, Maui and Hawaii, we have very similar reports. In the single district of North Kohala, we are credibly informed that liquor can be freely bought at no less than forty different stores kept by Chinese. And so on, throughout the entire group, the business of illicit grog selling is going forward, to the manifest injury of industrial pursuits—to say nothing of the degradation, poverty and ruin it is bringing upon the native race.

Something should be done to stop the evil, and that soon. The Hon. Mr. Whitney hints at the remedy, in a communication to yesterday's *Gazette*: "There are, on this Island of Hawaii, gangs of Chinese and natives, secreted in the backwoods and other unfrequented places, who have never been molested in their illicit traffic in rum and opium, who might be captured and punished, were the executive power of the government stronger than it is." If that power is not sufficiently strong, let the Legislature be called upon to make it so. The practice of using informers, who are at once liable to suspicion, is not a generally safe one.

By a notice in another column it will be seen that a special meeting is called this evening for Oceanic Council No. 777 of the American Legion of Honor.

This is the first of the numerous Beneficiary orders now working in the United States, that has been introduced into these Islands.

It is a secret benevolent society, and its objects are:

To unite fraternally all white persons of good moral character who are socially acceptable, and if for beneficial membership, of sound bodily health, and between eighteen and sixty-five years of age.

To give all moral and material aid in its power to its members and those dependent upon them.

To educate its members socially, morally, and intellectually.

To establish a fund for the relief of sick and distressed beneficial members.

To establish a Benefit Fund, from which, on the satisfactory evidence of the death of a beneficial member of the Order, who has complied with all its lawful requirements, a sum not exceeding five thousand dollars shall be paid to the family, orphans, or dependents as the member may direct.

By it, many respectable people in moderate circumstances are enabled to carry a life insurance of from \$500 to \$5,000, which they could not do in the ordinary Life Insurance Co. The premium being paid by assessments on its members, only some 22 assessments have been levied in the three years of its existence. The writer has been insured for two years for \$5,000, at the average yearly cost of a little less than \$35 per annum at 43 years of age.

The steamer *Iwalani* from Kona and Kau will be due to-morrow morning.

The ball by the I. O. O. F. last night at the Music Hall was a great success. A fine night—a fine hall—full attendance of ladies—excellent music—what more could be desired? His Majesty honored the brotherhood by his presence during the early part of the evening.

Yesterday's sale of twelve Government lots on the plains, being those bounded by Beretania, Keeaumoku and Young streets, realized the sum of \$9,570. The first four lots brought \$870 each; the next four \$750 each; and the last four, \$775 each. His Majesty the King was the sole purchaser.

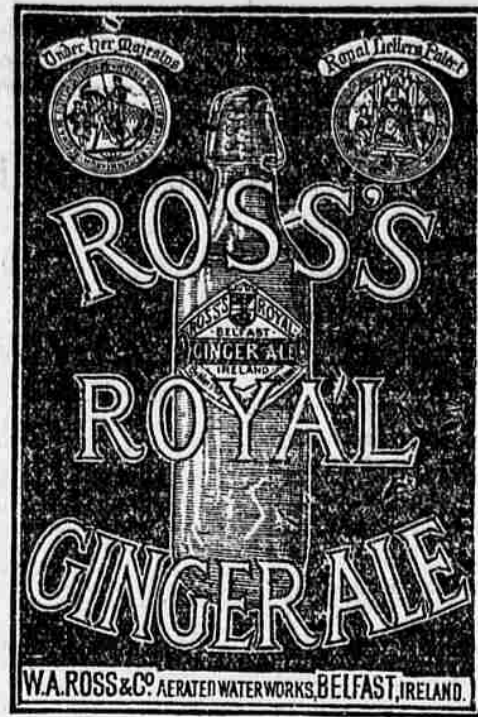

Kapiolani Park, June 10 and 12, 1882.

The following gentlemen comprise the Committee of Arrangements:

W. G. IRWIN, CECIL BROWN, H. R. MACFARLANE, Capt. A. N. TRIPP, JAMES DODD, H. A. WIDEMANN.

Programme:

- Leahi Cup, \$40—** Mule Race; mile dash; free to all; catch weights. Entrance, \$5.
- Kapiolani Plate, \$100—** For Hawaiian bred horses; mile dash; catch weights. Entrance, \$10.
- King's Plate, \$125—** For three-year-olds; open to all; best 2 in 3; to carry 100 lbs. Entrance, \$15.
- Park Cup, \$75—** 3-4 of mile; free for all two-year-olds bred in the Kingdom; catch weights. Entrance, \$10.
- Reciprocity Plate, \$100—** Trotting Race; mile heats; best 3 in 5 to harness; free to all horses that have not a better record than 2:40 in any public race in this Kingdom. Entrance, \$15.
- Queen Emma Plate, \$100—** Running Race; 3-4 mile dash; free for all to carry 100 lbs. Entrance, \$10.
- Express Cup, \$75—** Trotting Race, one mile, free to all horses that have been driven in a public hack six months previous to this 11th of June. Entrance, \$10.
- Kamehameha Plate, \$200—** Trotting Race; mile heats; best 3 in 5 to harness; free for all. Entrance, \$20.
- Lunamakaaiana Plate, \$100—** One and a half mile dash; free for all to carry 100 lbs. Entrance, \$15.
- Regent's Plate, \$100—** Free to all horses bred in the Kingdom; best 2 in 3; catch weights. Entrance, \$10.
- Pony Race Cup, \$50—** One mile dash; open to all ponies bred in the Kingdom, not over 13 1-2 hands high; catch weights. Entrance, \$5.
- Kaiulani Cup, \$75—** Hurdle Race; one mile dash, 4 hurdles; free for all; catch weights. Entrance, \$10.
- Donkey Race Cup, \$25—** Free for all; each man to ride his neighbor's donkey, the last one under the wire wins. Also, a Bicycle, Tricycle, and Foot Race, for 200 yards, for medals and a cup.

All horses entered for these races will be under the control of the judges, and their decision will be final.

All running races will be under the rules of the Pacific Blood Horse Association, excepting as to weights.

All horses to carry a rider. All trotting races will be under the rules of the National Trotting Association.

No pool selling on the Park grounds. All horses that are sold in pools will be ruled out.

In order to secure and maintain order, no one will be allowed on the track without the association badge, which can be obtained on the grounds.

Permits to train horses on the Park track can be obtained from Mr. H. R. Macfarlane. Jockies' colors must accompany entrance fees. All entries to close Saturday, June 3rd.

The Daily Bulletin.

THURSDAY, APRIL 27, 1882.

The Submerged Forest near Golspie.

A Golspie correspondent writes: Great interest is being taken by antiquarians and others in a submerged forest which lies mid-way between Golspie and Littleferry. It is about fifty yards below high water mark, and was never known by any one in the neighborhood to have existed. It was discovered accidentally by a person walking along the beach in the fall of last year, and the fact having been communicated to a member of a local Field Club, the matter is being taken up with great spirit. It has been resolved to clear away the sand bank covering it, with the view of discovering its extent, &c. At low water of extreme tides a splendid view of it can be obtained. The stumps of several large trees in one complete mass, with the roots attached exactly in the position they grew, can be easily seen. The wood proves to be birch. It is supposed that the prevailing westerly winds exposed it to view, by driving off the sand which had accumulated there for age.—*Sci. Am. Journal.*

Disraeli and Prince Albert.

Some of the papers have been quite hysterical about the Queen's long friendship for Lord Beaconsfield and her keen appreciation of his talents. The real fact is that the Queen had scarcely ever seen Lord Beaconsfield when he became Prime Minister in 1868. He had managed to offend Her Majesty and Prince Albert in the days when he was leading the protectionists; and it is, I believe, a fact that, until Mr. Disraeli was Chancellor of the Exchequer, he was never once invited to a State entertainment. These functions were then more frequent and more brilliant than they are now, and, so far as I remember, a formal protest against the exclusion was secretly sent to the Palace by several of Mr. Disraeli's followers, it being pointed out that it was an unprecedented thing for the leader of the Opposition in the House of Commons to be thus neglected; but Prince Albert was not fond of Mr. Disraeli, and if he had lived it is quite certain that Lord Beaconsfield would never have become a Court favorite. It is rather an odd fact, by the way, considering the highflown eulogies of which the Prince Consort has ever been the subject, that the three statesmen whom he most disliked, and whom he did his best to thwart and put aside, were Lord Palmerston, Mr. Disraeli and Mr. Gladstone. During the nine months Mr. Disraeli was in office in 1868, he managed to ingratiate himself with the Queen, who, in the first instance, would scarcely hear of his becoming Prime Minister, and the good impression he then left was rendered permanent during the first months of his second tenure of power.—*London Truth.*

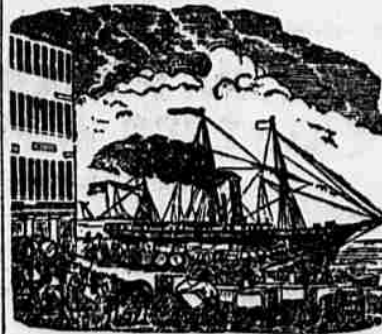
