TOPICS OF THE DAY.

In emergencies like these the Council of State may be called together at the request of the Executive—according to the Constitution—and appropriate sufficient money for all necessary expenditures in times of pestilence.

To-day is the birthday of the Queen. She is still in prison. Isn't it time now the members of society of all ranks and shades of opinion, supporters of the Republic like Star, the American League, steady business men of all shades of opinion are asking for clemency, to let all go. The part of wisdom seems to us to be general executive clemency. And we have sufficient faith in the mercifulness of heart of the Executive to believe it possible that mercy which—as Shakespeare says—"droppeth like the gentle dew from heaven" will be exercised. Heaven speed the day.

Armstrong Smith put in some good service for the Republic while in the East. He heard Crowley deliver a bad lecture at Vancouver. Mark Twain sent aloha to Honolulu by Mr. Smith. The lecturer was wild to come ashore.—Star.

Now where either on this ublinary pinhead on the waste of waters does the good come in? In helping Crowley out to the extent of a case or in getting hold of Mark Twain's Aloha? If that is "good service for the Republic" no wonder "the lecturer was wild to come ashore." Why "good service" must be as easy as falling off a log!

W. N. Armstrong, put now temporarily in charge of the editorial columns of the Advertiser was a cabin passenger by the Belgic. He writes a letter to that paper over his signature referring to a sworn statement by Awana—also a passenger—who it will be remembered went to Maui without being in quarantine) that there were three deaths from cholera during the passage. He states that on the day of sailing from Japan Minister Irwin and Consul General McIver caused every passenger on the vessel—steerage or cabin—to be examined. Also that Mr. Howard—agent of the line—instructed the physician on board to inform Mr. Armstrong from time to time as to health of the steerage passengers so that in case of trouble he might be able to give additional information to the health office in Honolulu. As the deaths occurred, the physician did inform him of the details of the diseases, which caused the deaths. No statement was made to him like the one made by Awana, and the physician stated that there were no cholera cases on board. The Chinese passengers did not come from an infected port. He asks for public judgment to withhold its decision on Awana's statement till the physician of the Belgic can be heard from. We endorse that action. Rumors and exparte statements should not be relied on at present. When the danger is over let there be a searching investigation and let the ax fall with a dull thud wherever necessary.

EDITORIALETTES.

There should be no questions of politics now. Cholera makes no distinctions in that line. Let us stand shoulder to shoulder.

The President of the Board of Health states that no physician has been refused permission to visit anywhere. He also complains that invitations to some physicians to be present at their deliberations have not even been acknowledged.

There is NO PROHIBITION on the USE or SALE of POI—only on its MANUFACTURE in the district given in another column. Bear that in mind.

Hawaiians—and all others—should see that their food is well cooked before they eat it. To eat raw food especially raw fish, is dangerous. Those who have eaten it so far, have paid the penalty.

Pia, (Hawaiian native starch) and guava leaves and young shoots (chewed or made into tea) are said to be good for bowel complaints.

No water should be used for drinking unless previously boiled.

No case of suspected cholera or which shows any symptoms of cholera should be concealed. All should be at once reported.

Respect all quarantine regulations.

This is not a time to discuss race feeling or to raise it.

Eat nothing raw.

NO POISON.

Hawaiians (by some of their so-called friends) are becoming persuaded that, the medicine administered to cholera patients is poison, given for the special purpose of decimating the race. Whatever mistakes the Board or its doctors may make they don't deliberately try to poison people. Every death—of Hawaiian or otherwise—causes more scare in their own houses and those of their friends than it does anywhere else. The stories are pure lies. The doctors are doing their best to cure every one. They don't want to run the chance of dying by contagion any more than the rest of us—

WISE AND OTHERWISE.

President Dole—in regard to closing churches—wished to follow here the practice elsewhere. If he had only adopted that as a rule, in other matters, we mightn't be where we are.

When the scare is over and the town cleaned up it will be time to criticize some things heavily, and be in order to ask questions. Just now we content ourselves with remarking that the danger is a common danger—common to everyone. Don't criticize too heavy, unless your criticism is likely to produce an improvement. Help all you can. When we have crossed the stream in safety then let us strip to the waist and fight. Just now, in the presence of the common danger, we are all brothers.

Dr. Rodgers has volunteered his services to the Board of Health to prepare bulletins of the state of progress of the cholera. The Board has thankfully accepted them. Dr. Rodgers deserves credit for his action. He was through the small pox epidemic here in 1880 and in charge of the special hospital and did good work then. That gives him experience of public feeling; as well as that of patients. Are there no others to volunteer?

A further meaning of *mai okuu* is the "sitting disease," because, as stated by old Hawaiians of 1803 and 1804, and handed down traditionally, anyone caught by the disease, whether on the way or in the house, would always be in a sitting position as if about to make a discharge, and shortly afterwards life would be extinct. Such is another of THE INDEPENDENT's interpretations, both unlike the Bulletin's rendering of the literal (?) meaning of the word. Native Hawaiians now say that there is no similarity between the *mai okuu* and the cholera. Anyone now contracting cholera would writhe in pain and agony, while the other was just the opposite; life merely passed away without any effort, struggle, or agony. What say our historians to this matter of fact, as well as tradition?

The following heading to a petition was picked up typewritten—on the street. It was handed to us—as a straw to show which way the wind blows. Who is doing it? Or is it a joke?:

ENGLISH TRANSLATION.

To His Excellency, Grover Cleveland, President of the United States of America.

We, the undersigned native Hawaiians, hereby petition Your Excellency to annex the Hawaiian Islands to the United States of America, in order that, we may have peace and stable government.

The Board of Health are trying to get uniformity of treatment of the cases carried out. This is most laudable and praiseworthy. In order to do this the one form of prescription is to be kept at the Health Office. Why not use Marsden's suggestion? Get the one form of prescription made up. Put it out in cheap packages at 5 cents, 10 cents or a quarter, in the hands of all Chinese, Japanese, or other storekeepers, and prepare placards stating that the prescriptions, ready made—with directions—can be had there. Then you will perhaps save much trouble.

The closing of the churches has been enforced by the Board of Health. Perhaps this was wise. But did it ever occur to the Board

that the parent of Fear is called Ignorance? Let the people meet as usual. Keep strict guard. But put up official notices at each meeting. Let the public have the fullest information. But let them have it in such a way that they will believe there is no concealment. Thus and thus only you drive away fear. As we have stated above, fear is begotten of ignorance.

STRAIGHT SOUND SENSE.

"In opposing general amnesty the Advertiser has said that some people out of jail are instigating opposition to the present regime." Suppose they are? Did our contemporary ever know of a government anywhere that did not have opponents? The present Government of Hawaii, however, has provoked more than ordinary political antagonism by its small, mean ways of dealing with people who refuse to admit that it is the best administration that this or any other country has ever been blessed with. This Government has no enemy that will do it more harm than the Advertiser in its attitude toward the political prisoners. That paper virtually says that the Government is afraid to let a parcel of crushed conspirators out of jail for fear they will start some fresh plot against its existence. The Advertiser will not allow the Government to afford the noblest proof of strength, which is magnanimity."

So says the Bulletin. We endorse every word of it.

Cholera's Meet.

A meeting of the teachers of the islands was held this morning at the Y. M. C. A. at which about 50 persons were present. A committee was formed to draw up an outline of the aims of the society, to be styled the Teachers' National Association, and to suggest a course of study for the year; and to report to-morrow morning at a meeting called for 9 o'clock.

REGULATIONS OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH.

OFFICE OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH, HONOLULU, Aug. 31, 1895.

1. No persons are allowed to go from the District of Honolulu to any other District of the Island of Oahu without a permit from the Board of Health.

2. No freight or baggage shall be taken from the District of Honolulu to any other District of Oahu without a permit from the Board of Health.

3. No Schools, public or private, on the Island of Oahu, will be allowed to open until further order of the Board.

4. Church and Sunday School Services on Sunday, September 1st, in the city of Honolulu are prohibited.

REGULATIONS OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH.

1. From and after this date all persons are forbidden to use any water from the Nuuanu stream, or Honolulu harbor, or from bathing in said stream or harbor, from throwing anything, liquid or solid, into said stream or harbor, or permitting any liquid or drainage flowing into said stream or harbor.

2. The sale, in the District of Honolulu, of fish, shell-fish or any product of the sea is prohibited.

3. Until further orders no passengers or freight will be allowed to be conveyed from the Island of Oahu to any other island of the group.

4. No letters or mail matter shall be taken from the Island of Oahu to any other island of the group, excepting from the General Post Office in mail bags; no mail matter shall be allowed to leave the Post Office until thoroughly fumigated.

5. The manufacture of poi is prohibited in that portion of Honolulu bounded by Nuuanu street on the East, Judd street on the North, and on the West by a line drawn from the corner of Judd and Liliha streets, down Liliha street to the sea.
