SOVEREIGNTY.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—The Advertiser of last Tuesday contained a leader in which appeared the following remarkable language:

There is a question involved in this case far more important to this country than the currency or the sale of bonds. It is this: Can any or all the Judges of the Supreme Court call in question the acts of His Majesty in Cabinet Council. If the constitution of this country gives them that power, the sooner it is amended the better for everybody, and for nobody more than the Judges themselves. No similar thing was ever heard of before in any country whether its constitution were monarchical, oligarchical or republican. It is a very dangerous power to put into the hands of even such men as judges are usually chosen from. A Judge acts but under the King's commission, he is a subject of the realm and public servant. He holds a highly responsible place but his judicial function is but that of a substitute for the King to whom in theory all appeals for justice between subject and subject are directed. To say that he shall sit in judgment upon the actions of him from whom all his authority and jurisdiction is derived is absolutely absurd.

No one will be likely to deny the importance of the question and it is perhaps as well that Mr. Gibson, through his factotum, has raised it. The theory that all government comes from the sovereign has never been acknowledged by any English-speaking people since the days of the last Henry. Since then—and never so distinctly as to-day—it is the people from whom all government must proceed. In delegating a portion of their power to certain public servants known as "Kings," "Judges," "Ministers" and the like, the people abate no title of their authority. Kings are sovereigns in name only, the real sovereignty is vested in the people. When they fail to exercise it—through ignorance, apathy, effeminacy or corruption—it is seized upon by designing men, who become tyrants; and who are none the less so because the tyranny is a mild one. MISREPRESENTATION.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—In last Saturday's Advertiser I read the following, referring to the mass meeting: "An account of this meeting, which we will only characterize as 'incorrect,' has been published in one of the opposition journals, evidently written for circulation abroad, where its mis-statements cannot be criticised by eye-witnesses as they are here." No impartial person who knows the truth of the matter can deny that the Advertiser's long paragraph about this meeting was "evidently written for circulation abroad, where its mis-statements cannot be criticised by eye-witnesses as they are here." To characterize the major portion of that paragraph as "incorrect" would be exceedingly mild; "deliberate misrepresentation" would better satisfy the demands of truth. Could any honest man who was present at that meeting write: "Three opposition speakers had their say, waxing warm in their denunciations of the Government, but failing to warm up their audience?" Every eye-witness knows the audience did "warm up." Again it is said, "It soon became evident that a majority of those present did not belong to the 'opposition to the Palace' party." It soon became evident to whom? Not to the speakers, not to a majority of those present, nor can I believe it was evident even to those who wished it to be so. A number of persons were clubbed together in a certain part of the room, who attempted with all their might to make it "evident" that a majority present favored

the Government; but they know what a miserable failure they made of it. The Advertiser article confesses that "no attempt was made to oppose the passage of the resolutions which had been prepared for the occasion." Why was no attempt made? If it was evident that a majority present did not sympathize with the object of the meeting, it seems strange that the resolutions were not voted down. "No attempt was made," because the leaders of the little club in the corner knew very well that any attempt to oppose the passage of the resolutions would have been futile. This is how it appears to

AN EYE-WITNESS.

THE hotel burglar was arrested yesterday, shortly after 1 o'clock, by Captain Mehrtens. The case had been placed in his hands by His Excellency the Attorney General, who, with Mr. D. G. Adee, had used every means to discover the offender. Mehrtens has been watching the hotel for two nights and employing such tactics as were thought necessary to unearth the culprit. From what was seen, heard and discovered, Mehrtens yesterday arrested Joseph Young, who has been engaged as night clerk at the hotel for two weeks. Young is 22 years old and of fair complexion, he belongs to Boston and is a deserter from the U. S. S. Herford. He has already appeared twice before the Honolulu Police Court. Subsequent to his arrest he confessed that he saw a light in the room of the ladies, when going his round, but that he only wished to look at them when asleep, so got a key of one of the doors, got close to the bed and touched one lady on the arm. Young will be brought before Judge Bickerton this morning.

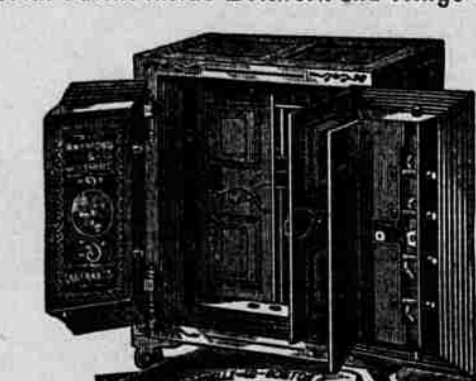

SHIPPING NOTES. The schr Kaluna sailed from Honolulu July 21st with about 80 returning S. S. laborers, had calm and light winds all the way down. She sailed from Juluit Nov. 8th leaving two of her crew there, received the trade in Lat. 30 N. O. Wednesday Dec. 12th was struck by a gale which filled the cabin with water. She hove to under double reef foresail, a heavy sea was running. O. Thursday Dec. 11th a.m. the foresail blew away, she hove to under balance reef mainsail until Saturday 5 p.m. thence to port. The captain reports all well on board the Morning Star and Julia. T. C. Lehua brings news of great damage done at Hana during the recent blow. H uses were blown down and a large quantity of cane destroyed total damage estimated at \$10,000. Also of about 12 new houses belonging to the Reciprocity Sugar Co being demolished and a portion of the mill blown away. The Spartan is in the stream, listed down to repair copper. The W. H. R. is here for repairs. S. Mr Kilauea Hou brought 400 bags of sugar and 120 bbls of molasses. She had to steam against the wind for 48 hours while at Kahului. The Likelike will sail on Thursday at 5 p.m.

LOCAL & GENERAL NEWS. The Chamber of Commerce continues its sitting at ten o'clock to-day. Mr. E. P. Adams' last Christmas sale will take place on Christmas evening.

TABO fell considerably yesterday when the horse, driven by a native from Palama, became frightened at a passing object and scattered his load on the road.

A Chinaman who got on board the Lehua, on her last trip, at Keane, died between 3 and 3 o'clock on Monday afternoon before the arrival of the steamer in port.

The holidays at Iolani College will commence on Friday and continue till 14th January. Early application should be made for intending boarders as there are but few vacancies.

FROM Sunday morning till Monday morning was as cold a 24 hours as has ever been known in Honolulu. The average temperature was 64°. Rainfall this storm 2 1/2 in. O. Monday night the thermometer fell to 58°.

A native who has been blind for some years, was found dead yesterday morning near the What Caer House at Palama. He had apparently committed suicide by strangling himself with a scarf which was found tied tightly round his neck.

Some good and handsome jewelry and watches are now offered for sale by Messrs. G. W. Macfarlane & Co. There are diamonds, rub, emerald, sapphire and pearl rings, silver goods of new designs, chronographs, minute repeaters and ladies' watches.

The laborers brought by the Kaluna are a very strong and healthy lot.

Messrs. Lyons & Levey hold a sale of wines this morning and Christmas goods this evening.

A cook, who had deserted from the Mariposa, was arrested yesterday and safely ensconced in durance vile.

The case of the German laborers was brought before Chief Justice Judd yesterday, and resulted in their speedy return to Governor Buckle's domicile.

Special Meeting of Legislature Progress F. & A. M. will be held this evening at 7:30 o'clock in the First Degree Visiting Brethren are cordially invited to attend.

To-day's supplement is a double one. It contains an analysis of the irrepressible masher, the lake steamer lost, then and now, Pat's novel decision, high and low life in Mexico, and Mellis grand announcement on the second page.

When the Julia left Honolulu, three boxes belonging to Dr. Mauritz were accidentally shipped by her. It is a pleasure to learn that they have been returned to Honolulu by the Kaluna, the Julia having left them at Butaritari.

HOLIDAY goods, consisting of laces, embroideries, satchels, fans, tidies, children's dresses, flowers and feathers, beaver hats, etc., all new, are now open for inspection at the store of Meffuons Mellis. His announcement is made on the second page of the supplement.

REVD. H. F. E. Whalley and Rev. W. A. Swan are now under going an examination for priesthood. The examination, which commenced on Monday will conclude to-day, three papers being given each day. His Lordship the Bishop and Rev. G. Wallace are the examiners.

On Tuesday, in the Civil Court, the case of D. M. Kealalaina v. Kawaki, assumpsit for \$101 was withdrawn. E. O. Hall & Son v. Ho Sun, assumpsit for \$93.90, was settled out of Court. S. J. Kanuha v. W. L. Holokahiki, assumpsit for \$20, continued. Tai Toong v. Ah Chuck, assumpsit for \$200, was continued.

In the Police Court yesterday, J. Clemes a gross cheat, charged with obtaining \$18 from Mary Rose, under false pretences, was found not guilty. Kapale for larceny in the third degree was sentenced to six months hard labor and fined \$10. An assault and battery case was fined \$4, and a disorderly conduct received forty-eight hours.

SHORTLY before the Kaluna left Butaritari, a Chinaman, who had been a store-keeper there, was found dead with a long sword stuck in his body. He was buried by order of the King and the missionaries, and an inquest was subsequently held on the body, an attempt being made to prove that he had committed suicide, but the length of the sword precluded any such idea.

An important meeting of the Privy Council was held yesterday to discuss the new coinage. It was finally decided to make it a legal tender in the payment of debts, on a par with the American silver coin, in accordance with the law of 1876. This law defines what proportion of silver coin can be tendered, with gold, in payment of debts, duties or taxes. A resolution of condolence, in consequence of the death of Hon. J. Moanuil, was also agreed to.

In the Civil Court on Monday the case of Look Sang v. Wong Kwal, a case of trespass, damages \$100, resulted in a verdict for plaintiff for \$139.75 and costs. M. Mrs. Smith & T. H. Weston for plaintiff and Mr. F. M. H. Tech for defendant. Appeared to the Supreme Court. In another trespass case, Kanihawale v. Haole, damages \$50, judgment was given for the defendant. An appeal was noted to the Intermediary Court. Mr. Russell for plaintiff, Mr. J. Kaulukou for defendant.

LAKE STEAMER LOST.

HASCOCK (Mich.), November 21.—It is feared the steamer Manistee, plying between this port and Duluth, has sunk with her crew and twenty-five passengers on board. She left Bayfield at midnight on the 15th instant for Ontonagon, on her way to this port, and has not been heard from since. The steamers Duluth and China left Bayfield one hour and a half after the Manistee for the same point, but did not see her yesterday. A tug was sent to find the Manistee. It returned to-day bringing a bucket, marked "Manistee," and a portion of the pilot-house. The boat being old and heavily loaded and the sea very rough, it is feared she has foundered. Two tugs have been cruising for her the last three days. A telegram was received this morning stating that the tugs had found a part of the cabin, which was washed ashore some distance above Ontonagon.

DULUTH, November 21.—The propeller Manistee was windbound at Bayfield till Thursday, necessitating the transfer of a large number of her passengers to the steamer City of Duluth. She then cleared for Ontonagon last night. To-day the portions of the wreck found here leave no doubt among marine men that she has gone down with twenty-five persons on board.

HIGH AND LOW LIFE IN MEXICO.

A Mexican gentleman would no more be seen carrying a bundle of the smallest size than he would a load upon his back. I am confidentially informed, on good authority, that it is no special humiliation to carry a book, providing it be a small one, and is not wrapped in paper—but there they draw the line. Some gentlemen occasionally condescend to call at the post-office for their mail, but generally all such onerous duties are delegated to the servants. Therefore, the smallest family must maintain a retinue of "mozos" and "creados" (servants)—which perhaps is well, in "the grand economy of the whole," since the serfs far outnumber the masters in Mexico. A gentleman never travels from town to town, on business or pleasure, without one or more mozos in attendance. When he disports himself on horse or muleback, his mozo rides—just so many paces, no more nor less, behind him. In fact, every duty in life which another can possibly perform for him, is done by his servants. The most high-toned "F. F. V." in ante bellum days was never more waited upon, and African slavery, in most respects, was preferable to this serfdom, for the blacks were at least sure of enough to eat, and of being cared for in sickness and old age. A Mexican creado considers himself in receipt of a princely income if paid "dos reales" (twenty cents) per diem for his services, out of which he clothes himself and supports his family. Gentlemen who are not housekeeping, and therefore cannot feed their servants on the refuse of the table, frequently pay a valet six cents a day, which is sufficient to buy all the tortillas and red beans he requires for food. As for necessities, he decks himself in his master's cast-off clothes—than which Solomon in all his glory was never so arrayed—depends upon his own light fingers for the indispensable cigarettes, and sleeps at night, rolled up in his saraph, on the hard stones of the court with the blue sky for a counterpane.—*Springfield Republican.*

PAT'S NOVEL DECISION.

A jolly set of Irishmen, boon companions and sworn brothers, had made up their mind to leave the "ould sod" and wend their way to "Ameriky." There were five in number—two Paddies, one Murphy, one Dennis and one Teague. It so happened that the vessel they were to go in could only take four of them. At length honest Teague exclaimed: "Arrah! We'll cast lots to see who shall remain." But one of the Paddies vowed that it was anything but "jontee!" to do that sort of thing. "You know Teague," he said, "that I am an arithmetician, and I can work it out by subtraction, which is a great deal better, but you must all agree to abide by the figures." All having pledged themselves to do so, Pat proceeded: "Well, then, take Paddy from Paddy you can't, that's very certain; but to take Dennis from Murphy is easy enough, and you will find that Teague remains. By my faith, Teague, my jewel, and it's you that'll have to stay behind." Poor Teague was therefore bound to acquiesce in this remarkably novel decision.—*Chamber's Journal.*

RUSSIAN CITIES.

The Russian Empire consists of thirty different races of people. Life there is not individual, but collective. There are but two cities, Moscow and St. Petersburg; the remaining towns are viewed as but accidents. In other countries the urban population constitutes one-third of the whole, in Russia but one-tenth. St. Petersburg and Moscow are the only cities, perhaps, in the world whose inhabitants are in part peasants. It is, therefore, not astonishing to find the work-people in the factories of these cities engaged on the conditions that they will be allowed vacations to sow their fields and reap their harvests.—*St. Petersburg Letter.*

I really think the Home Secretary should interfere and prevent what will speedily make us a laughing-stock for the whole civilized world. I refer to the choice of a public hangman. I have always considered that the first consideration in choosing such an official should be the name. The office is one of horror and gloom. Its holder should be a man of mysterious attributes, capable by his very name alone of striking terror into the heart of the would-be murderer. Calcraft and Marwood were grand names; but Bartholomew Binn! Good heavens! that the public executioner of a great empire like ours should rejoice in such an appellation! It is only suggestive of a funny story in a Christmas annual. What burglar would fear the clothes of a Binn? Anybody could get the better of a man with such a name. We don't choose a hangman solely for the sake of the comic papers, either he must apply for leave to change this ridiculous cognomen, or I shall feel inclined to ask all who believe in the Shandean theory to agitate for his prompt dismissal.

SCENES IN A PERSIAN CITY.

Resht contains over ten thousand inhabitants, and is important as being the principal Persian city on the Caspian, says a New York *Evening Post* correspondent. It is noted for its tobacco, which is very delicate and mild, and for a sort of embroidery on broadcloth called Resht work, which is sometimes seen in America in the shape of table-covers and sofa-cushions. The city is very unhealthy, owing to malaria from the low grounds and the stagnant pools of water which cover the numerous rice fields. The streets are narrow and winding; the houses low and built for the most part of mud and sun dried brick and thatched with mud and straw. Some of the summer places in the neighborhood are very pleasantly surrounded by rose gardens, and have fine avenues of shade trees. In a visit to one of these in company with a Persian of high rank, we were both amused and disgusted at the absolute control he had, not only over his servants, but over all inferiors as well. As we came to a party of boys bathing in a small river, the humor seized him to make one of his servants bathe, and, not content with this, he made other servants throw several of their fellows into the river with their clothes on, and was quite delighted at the sorry plight they were in as they came ashore. He had the boys, who came up begging for "shais," thrown heels over head from a high bank into the river. One little fellow was seriously hurt. The gentleman thought when his fun was over, that he had settled all scores by tossing a few silver pieces among them.
