

KAWAIHAU BASEBALL LEAGUE HOLDS A "QUIET" MEETING

A meeting of the Kawaihau Athletic Association was held at the Kapan Court House last Friday evening, and the decisions arrived at by the officials and directors, a majority of whom knew no more about baseball's innsand-outs, or how to properly decide vital baseball problems, than a layman knows how to solve the Federal income tax law, would have been rather humorous, were it not for the fact that the decisions were meant to oe "for the good of baseball in Kawaihau," as one director expressed it.

The officials first sustained the protest of the Allies team, who failed to snow up on Nov. 28 for a regular scheduled game with the Libertys, who were on the field ready to play, the latter being declared winners by the umpire via the forfeiture route of 9 to 0. The three reasons deemed oy the officials as sufficient to warrant the protest being sustained and the game played off, were as follows:

"That the Liberty's manager had een properly notified late Saturday evening, when they had six other days to do it, that the Allies wanted the game postponed, and he had agreed to it provided he could notify the players in time, which he could not do as the time was too limited. This means that two teams in a league with a regular schedule, had the power to postpone any game at any time for no apparent reason, with one day's notice.

"That the game was forfeited at searly two-o'clock when the umpire should have done it at once, according to rules adopted by the league, in pite of the fact that games on other Sundays were nearly always started after half past one.

"That three of the Liberty's players were not in uniform, and therefore could not be included in the lineup at the time to make a full team in the field, but it was shown that in nearly every game in this "bush" league, some player had always appeared without baseball uniform, and that officials admitted the fact. However, they ruled that the failure to wear uniforms in other games was proper, but was against the rules in this particular instance."

During the "quiet" discussion that ensued, before a decision was arrived at by a vote of six to one to sustain the protest, the Farmer's manager, ex-Representative M. R. Aguiar Jr., tried to bring into play some parliamentary rules of procedure, which were immaterial, so far as the question at issue was concerned, as different methods to arrive at the same final result was simply wasting valuable time. Just plain questions to the point and without any red tape was decided upon, as none of those present claimed to know anything about methods followed by the lawmakers.

Another "quiet" discussion follow ed when the representative of the Pacifics stated that he wished to file protest against the game won from them last Sunday by the Libertys. Mr. Robert Okita, representing the Pacifics, furnished those present with a couple of funny sayings that caused everyone to lapgh. President Hubert asked him, "on what grounds do you protest this game?" and the answer right back was "Kapaa grounds." In describing the game, he caused another laugh when he told the directors that "we were leading at the beginning of the 6th by one run but in the last half of the 6th, the Libertys

"naturally" forged ahead. It being shown to the satisfaction of the officials that the decision of the umpire in calling he game off was solely based on his judgment, the protest was not sustained, although one official stated that rules to the contrary nothwithstanding, he was in favor of ordering the game replayed. Just imagine officials in other leagues wasting time and energy listening to pro tests based not on interpretation of the baseball rules, but purely on judgment alone.

Before adjourning, the subject of the late starting of the games was brought up and a suggestion was made that the first game be limited to three o'clock, but the president and other directors ruled that the by-laws already contained a provision that any team which does not show up on the field with nine players at one o'clock forfeits the game to the other team. which has its full team on the ground before one. The team representatives were then told that on Sunday, if one team does not show up at one o'clock it would autmatically forfeit the game.

What an absurd ruling, when less than half an hour before they ruled that the game forfeited by the Allies, who did not show up at all that day, should be replayed, while some other team which intends-to-play but is a few minutes late, forfeits. When asked what would happen if both teams are delayed a few minutes after the limit set, the president ruled that both teams would have a game recorded as lost in their standing, a ruling so absurd that no comments are necessary



H. W. KINNEY ON THE JAPANESE PUESTION

The last number of the Atlantic contains an intelligent and illuminating article on the Japanese question in the light of our experience in Hawaii. Inherently interesting, this article becomes the more so when we note that it is from the pen of Henry W. Kinney, formerly superintendent of public instruction for Hawaii, and well known to many of our readers. Unquestionably he had special advantages in learning what was being done here, and to that extent he can speak with a considerable measure of authority. Following is the substanct of his more salient

Hawaii the Key to the Situation

After making a brief historical re view of the polyglot conditions here, and emphasizing the fact that the different races, having grown up together from racial childhood have, thus far. dwelt together in peace and harmony, he contends that the world will do well to consider the results of this great human experiment, and to make use of the data acquired here, for the solution of the greater racial problems which now confront it.

The Schools Are the Solution The schools have played the par amount part in the assimilation work which has been done so successfully in Hawaii. Living in regulated camps, each race more or less by itself, even the children have little opportunity to come into contact with American influences. They speak their own language and cling to their own traditions. The public school is the one place where they can learn English, and where the avenues to American civilization are opened up

English the Avenue of Americanism

Thrown together, with that easy sense of Democracy natural to children. English was the one common medium of speech-they just had to learn it. And as they began to realize the advantage that it gave them on the playground, in the school, and later, in the affairs of life, they were glad to learn it. And so successfully did they learn it, that to a very surprising de gree they outdistanced the other races in their knowledge of it.

Not Hot-Beds of Propaganda The Language Schools, he thinks, have not been a serious evil-have NOT been hot-beds of Japanese prop aganda or Japanese influence; and in any case, will disappear within a few years, as it is certain that the child ren following the present school generation will never be sent to these schools.

Morally Fit for Citizenship

It has been held by some people that the moral standards, and the whole moral outlook of the Japanese people are so entirely different from ours that they can never, in any reasonable period of time, be assimilated to curs, and accordingly the Japanese are morally ineligible for citizenship. Is Their Americanism Superficial?

In answer to the more or less common and perhaps natural suspicion that Japanese Americanism is very superficial and unreliable, he points to the avidity with which young Japenese enlisted during the late war, and the good service they rendered. And he feels very confident, on the assurance of a Japanese diplomat, that in the extreme case of war, they would fight for the United States against Japan.

Wants To Keep Them At Home What is the attitude of the Japanese themselves, especially of the Government, to the Japanese problem, and the underlying cause of sit, emi-

gration?

Mr. Kinney declares that Japan does not desire any large emigration ently free from the disease. of her people to distant countries, but does resent having her citizens discriminated against. "Japan is interested in keeping her man-power concentrated. Only thus can she remain strong; and the government for that reason favors, not emigration to the United States, Canada or Australia, but having Japanese settle in Korea and Manchuria." He admits that the emigrant classes don't want to go to Korea and Manchuria, but in the end assurance of realization. the government policy must prevail.



THE DEADLY AUTOMOBILE

The deaths from automobile accidents in the United States for 1919 aggregated 12,000, or about 110 per million. The automobile is responsible for more than three times as many deaths as result from all other accidents combited. The automobile in a word is far more deadly than the whole menagerie of rampaging terrors that civilization has turned loose to przy upon men.

The vast proportions of this great evil are due mainly to reckless driving, incompetence on the part of the driver, and careless pedestrans. Many an otherwise good driver grows careless, drives too fast, or takes chances. The novice who ventures onto the streets prematacely is a constant menace whom everyone dieads to meet. The irresponsible pedestrianespecially children, who, on some sudden impulse, are apt to do the unexpected-these are the dread of every careful driver.

The number of automobiles is steadily increasing, and the traffic on our roads is becoming more and more congested, so that increasingly the utmost care must be exercised to goord against accidents-and this care must ole late not only your own slips and mishaps, but those of the other fellow, too.

Be just as careful as you can, Be always on the job. Go slow in all critical places.

MIND THE ORDINANCE

With increasing traffic there will be increasing need for the most rigid enforcement of tradic ordinances. When there were only a dozen cars on the Island it did not make much difference which side of the road they were on, nor how they dimmed their lights or honked their horns. But with 1500 cars, it is a different matter; every one must observe the rule of the road and conform strictly to the ordinances or serious accidents will result. We are no longer a backward, rural population-we are metropolitan, and we must behave as such, which means that more and more, strictly and implicith, we must conform to the ordinances, and more and more these ordinances must be enforced without fear or favor.

WHAT'S YOUR HURRY?

The breakneck speed with which some people drive when there is no reason and no justification for it lays them open to well-deserved criticism. It is one of the fallacies of our age to go everywhere in a rush and to do nothing when you get there. Just a little more time, a little more leisurely, and a little more carefully would save many a smash up-many a repair bill, and many a doctor's fee, to say nothing of suffering and bitterness,

The Legend of the Demi-Gods

At Pohakuloa the leader halted the party and told them the interesting story of the Demigods who swam all the way from the South Seas in one night, on the way to the Hawaiian Olympus, and arriving too late, were caught by dawn and were turned into

It was here she caught his hovering spirit and injected it into the lifeless body, restoring him to life; and it was here that she herself fell in love with him-with all the disastrous consequences.
